The Genesee FFA Chapter traveled to Plummer Saturday to compete in the Farm Mechanics and Parliamentary Law contests. This contest consists of arc welding and tool sharpening, gas welding and soldering, and rafter cutting and tool identification.

In the afternoon the Parliamentary Procedure team of Tim Magee, Fred Morscheck, Nick Eglund, Ron Hopkins, Bob Schwenne, and Tim Grieser placed first in the district. A truckload of evidence was collected in the food market and authorities hope for a speedy trial to end in a conviction.





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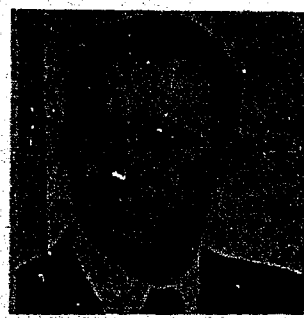
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Home Cookin' . . .

So I called her Saturday morning to see if the ingredients were all right—they were and so to those who want a delicious, melt-in-your-mouth molasses cookie,

By the way, the beef-casserole is from a Home Bureau cook book I've used for many years. It's an economical, easy-to-prepare dish. I'm still waiting for some recipes—how about sending some in?

SOFT MOLASSES COOKIES

- 1 cup sugar
 - 1 cup shortening
 - 1 cup molasses
 - 1/2 cup warm water
 - 2 teaspoons soda
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 2 cups flour
 - 1 teaspoon ginger
 - 1 teaspoon cinnamon or nutmeg—2 eggs
- Cream sugar and shortening, add eggs, molasses and water. Add dry ingredients and mix well.
Let stand in cool place several hours or overnight.

Roll in balls, dip top in sugar.
Bake at 350 degrees about 10 min.

BEEF-RICE CASSEROLE

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 1/2 cups boiled rice
- 1 large can tomatoes
- 2 small onions, chopped fine
- 2 tbsl. meat fryings
- Salt and pepper to taste.
- Put onion in hot fry pan brown, (about 5 minutes). Add beef and cook until brown. Add salt, pepper, rice and tomatoes.

Let simmer on low heat on top of stove above 30 minutes or bake in a moderate oven for 40 minutes.

JOB OPENINGS IN LATAH COUNTY

Secretaries, bookkeepers, a driver salesman, groceryman and sales ladies led the list of persons placed on jobs through the Moscow Office of Idaho Department of Employment during the past week. For the first time in several weeks, only a small percentage of the workers placed on jobs were involved in emergency snow and ice removal. Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow Office Manager reported his office placed 12 workers on jobs during the week. This is closer to normal for this time of year and compares with 34 placed during the previous week, and with 19 workers given job finding help during the same week a year ago. At the end of the week there were still 41 jobs open, a week ago there were 44 and a year ago this time the total was 45. Among the jobs still open are those for a welder, farmhands, TV repair-

man, carpenter, and carpenter apprentices, newspaper carrier, service station attendant, woods workers and a parts time trainee, secretaries, a bookkeeper, sales clerks, cafe and domestic workers.

Hartstein reported a slight increase in the number of workers receiving unemployment insurance from the week before. He said currently there were 274 idled workers claiming benefits. At the end of last week the total was 284, and a year ago 206. He said 23 persons filed new claims for benefits during the week. In the Moscow area there were 136 workers seeking jobless pay, a week ago 124 and a year ago 84. At Genesee the total remained 13, compared with 5 a year ago. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area there are now 73 persons receiving compensation, a week ago 71, and a year ago 65. In the Kendrick area the total remained 12, 2 less than a year ago. Thirty-three checks were going into the Potlatch area, 37 last week, and 33 a year ago

At Elk River the figure remained at 7, down 2 from a year ago. Unless load limits are imposed on highways in the area, or other factors cause curtailment in the logging industry, little change is expected in the number of persons receiving jobless pay, according to Hartstein's report.

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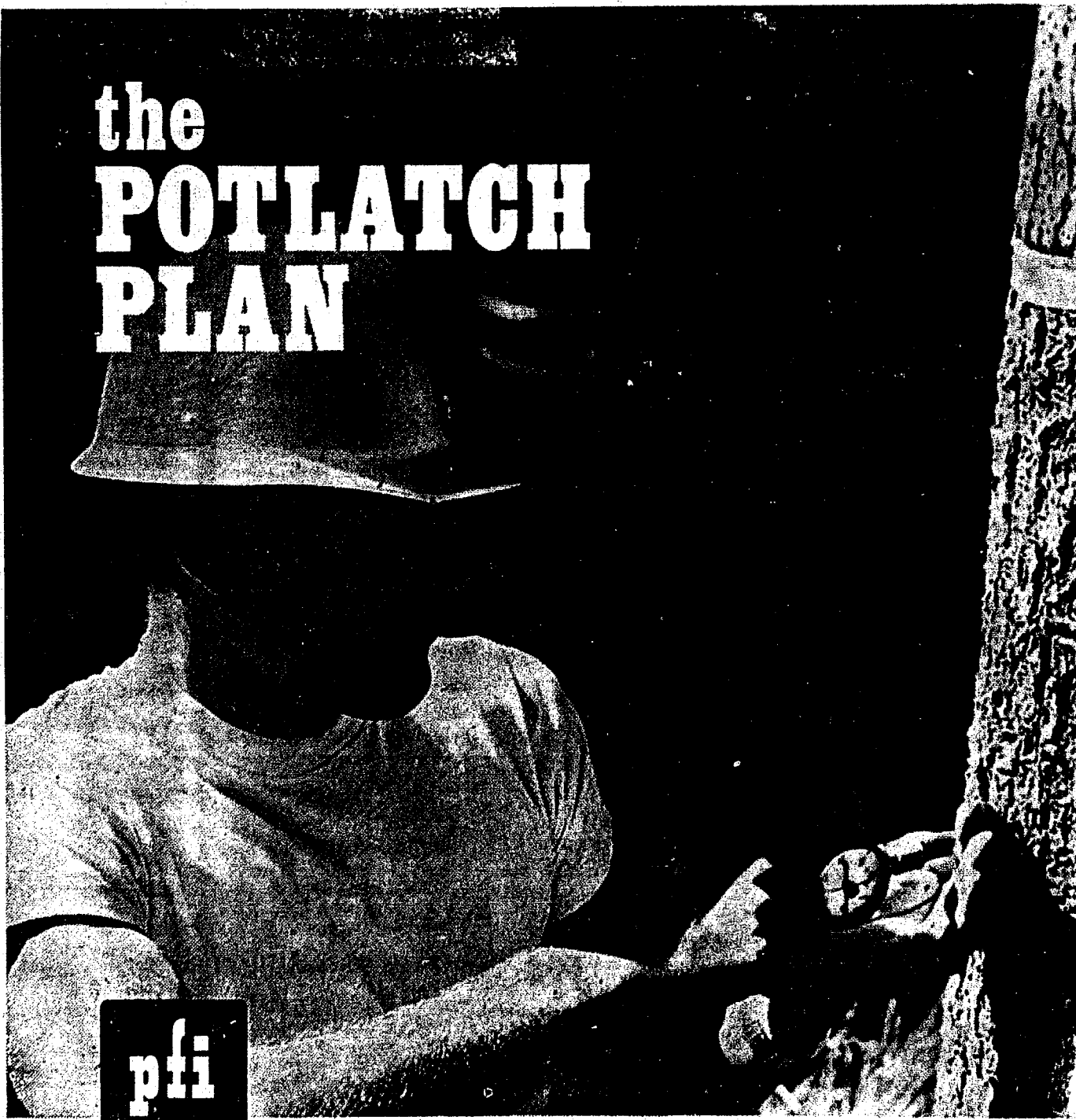

FOREST MANAGEMENT

Timber is a crop and like other crops it must be carefully managed. The founders of PFI, foreseeing the increased demand for forest products for a growing population, initiated a far reaching program of forest management including protection, culture, harvesting, new product development, marketing and research.

Good forest management not only assures continued delivery of goods and materials the trees provide, but includes all the other forest bounties: recreation, wildlife, forage, soil, water and minerals . . . and it carries the responsibility to deal

with the hazards of insects and disease and the ravages of fire. And it all comes under the heading of: Multiple Use Forest Management.
