PENALTIES STIFF FOR CONTINUED LAW VIOLATIONS

W. A. Campben, local Justice of the Peace points out that laws for continued violations of load, height and similar laws are very severe — and from the Idaho Vehicle Laws of 1961, page 140, Section 49-909 quotes: "Penalties for violations — It shall be unlawful and constitute a misdemeanor for any person to violate any of the provisions of this chapter, and any person convicted of such violation shall be subject to punishment by a fine not to exceed \$100.00 or by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 30 days and to the cancellation of registration of each motor vehicle operated in violation of any order for the regulation or suspension of traffic issued under the authority of this chapter, and the cancellation of the license of the operator."

Further, Mr. Campbell says that he believes most drivers are not aware of the new violation point count for traffic violations, and he quotes as follows:

Backing without reasonable safety; 1; driving on wrong side of road; 3; Flashing red light (failure to stop); 3; Following too closely; 3; failure to obey police traffic order; 2 one-way island (failure to obey the markings); 2; passing on wrong side; 3; passing without sufficient clearance; 3; passing on hill crest; 3; passing at intersection or grade crossing; 3; passing with view obstructed; 3; passing violation of white line; 4; failure to yield right of way at an intersection; 3; failure to yield right of way on left turn; 3; failure to yield right of way from private road; 2; failure to yield right of way to an emergency vehicle; 3; failure to yield right of way to pedestrian; 3; right of way failure to use due caution for pedestrian; 3; failure to stop at railroad crossing by school bus, bus or gas truck, 2, and failure to stop for a school bus 4.

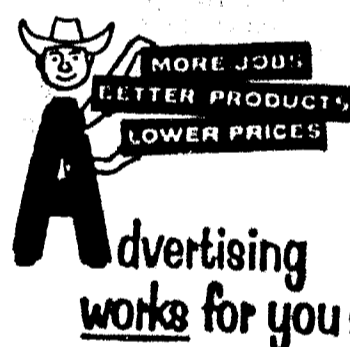
In the line of "variable point violations are: Failure to signal, 3 to 4; speeding, 3 to 4; failure to reduce speed for curve or hillcrest, 3 to 4; violation of posted bridge speed, 3 to 4; failure to obey local posted speed zone, 3 to 4; failure to stop at stop sign, 3 to 4; failure to stop when coming from alley; 3; pulling out from curb without being safe; 2; failure to obey traffic light; 3; turning right from wrong lane; 3; turning left from wrong lane; 3; turning without 500 feet visibility; 3; failure to yield when being passed; 3; failure to yield when entering through highway, 3.

He recommends that all study the law and obey it.

He added that the law says: Departmental action indicated by accumulated violation points — Total of 6, first letter addressed to licensee; total of eight, personal interview or examination; total of 12 or more, license suspension.

Its especially timely now during the Lenten season. This week, Mrs. Carl L. (Jeanie) Schornhorst gave us her recipe for Salmon Loaf, and says her family enjoys it, and adds that quite often, she cuts the recipe in half and it is just as tasty.

Mrs. Schornhorst is a busy housewife and mother who is always on the lookout for something different, yet nourishing, to serve her husband and four lively children.

SALMON LOAF
(Serves 8)

2 cans (16-oz) Salmon
Flake, remove bones and skin.
Stir in liquid from salmon plus milk to make 1 1/2 cups
3 cups coarse cracker crumbs
2 tbs, lemon juice
2 tsp, chopped onion
1/4 tsp, each, salt and pepper
Spoon lightly (do NOT press down) into greased 9x5x3 loaf pan. Bake 350 degrees; for 45 minutes.

KETOTIS IN SHEEP

Pregnant ewes that stumble and appear to be blind may have ketosis, the county agent advises on the basis of information from veterinarians and livestock specialists.

Ewes carrying twins or triplets are most likely to be affected. Although an inadequate ration is thought to be a major factor, this disease is often found in fat ewes. A disturbance in carbohydrate metabolism is generally accepted as the cause.

Symptoms of ketosis, also known as pregnancy disease, are labored breathing, convulsions, teeth grinding, and "going down". The ewe turns her head to one side. There may be nasal discharge. Death may occur in about 10 days. However, if the ewe has a lamb she may recover.

Authorities advise consulting a veterinarian. Treatment for pregnancy disease is not consistently successful, but use of cortisone products and glucose often helps. It is advisable, specialists say, to avoid stress such as sudden changes in feed, exposure to severe weather, and shipment of ewes that will soon lamb. Adequate feed is advocated, but not amounts that will make them fat. Exercise is good. Ewes that walk a reasonable distance for feed and water are likely to stay in good shape.

BIRD PATCH

Die-hard shotgunners who stayed with their sport until the last hunting season for quail and partridge closed January 26 in Hells Canyon from Brownlee Dam upstream, and the Idaho reaches of the Salmon River, wore triangle patches proclaiming, "I always ask permission."

"They found quality shooting for chukar partridge and good hunting for quail and Hungarian partridge, as well as excellent fishing for ocean run steelhead and trout, according to Stu Murrell, Lewiston, Clearwater regional conservation educator.

A new approach to landholder-sportsman relations last year, the Triangle Patch carries on the basic design of a long line of materials cut out by the Idaho Landholder-Sportsman Council, Inc. It reminds hunters and fishermen of the legal requirement to obtain permission to enter private property to hunt or fish. The Triangle Patch appears on all signs, advising "It takes all three—the landholder, sportsman and Fish and Game Department." Cooperation in other words, is the real basis for hunting and fishing.

YOUR GAME DEPARTMENT

By John R. Woodworth, Director Idaho Fish & Game Department

PHEASANTS WINTERING WELL

Lack of cover—not food—is the main cause of pheasant mortality during winter storms. Actually, ringnecks and other upland game bird species such as quail and partridge normally take on weight during the winter months in good habitat. Suffocating snow and ice during blizzards bring death to pheasants where they hit.

What birds need for survival during severely cold snaps or during blizzard conditions is protection from the elements. Ringnecks have gone 19 days without any food at all, losing about 40 per cent of their body weight, and quickly recover when returned to normal rations. Extended exposure to severe weather, on the other hand, can kill them.

Predator Calling Booms

Coyotes, bobcats, and foxes can be lured within shooting range of a blind or calling stand with sounds that simulate the screams of a rabbit in distress. Predator calls are made of hard rubber, plastic or wood and can be held between the teeth, leaving both hands free to handle gun or bow and arrows. Sound control ranges from a long, agonizing squeal to a series of short screams and muted cries, filled with anguish and quaver.

With numerous types of predator calls on the market, a growing number of sportsmen are learning the joys of using them during the off-season.

VANDALEERS TO PERFORM IN SOUTHERN IDAHO

MOSCOW—The University of Idaho Vandaleer Concert Choir will present a varied program ranging from Bach to sea chanties in its concert tour of southern Idaho, March 3 through 7. The choir, under the direction of Glen R. Lockery, will begin its 22nd annual tour with a performance at Meridian high school March 3.

Accompanying the choir on the tour will be a chamber orchestra composed of Idaho music faculty members and students.

NATIONAL FOREST GRAZING FEES SET FOR YEAR

The 1969 grazing fees for the National Forests and National Grasslands of the Forest Service, Northern Region, were announced this week by Neal M. Rahm, Regional Forester.

National Forest fees for the Region this year will be based on results of a study of public land grazing fees completed in 1968. This study established a fair market value base fee of \$1.23 per cow-month, to be reached in annual steps over a ten-year period. Cattle grazing fees for 1969 range from 43 cents to 84 cents per cow per month compared with a range of 35 to 84 cents for similar use last year. Sheep grazing, which cost between 4 1/2 cents and 14 1/2 cents per sheep month last year will range from 7 1/2 to 16 and one-quarter cents this year. Sheep fees will be raised over a ten-year period to reach the fair market value base of \$246 per sheep month fees for '69 additional Grassland grazing in Region 1 will be raised slightly from 1968, based on livestock selling prices of last year. A fair market value base for National Grassland grazing is being developed and will be implemented in 1970.

"The number of cattle and sheep allowed to graze is determined by the condition of the range and forage available," Rahm explained. "The National Forests of eastern Washington, northern Idaho, Montana, west South Dakota, and the National Grasslands of North Dakota and of Grasslands of North Dakota provide-

ed grazing for 240,000 cows and calves during 1968. The number of ewes and lambs totaled 108,730 last year. There was additional grazing by horses used by recreationists."

Grazing in the Region brought \$690,800 to the National Treasury last year. Counties in which the Forests and Grasslands are located shared 25 percent of this amount when

SCIENCE TOPICS

DECORATIVE BEANS, SEEDS CAN POISON

SOME OF THE NECKLACES made from beans and seeds, so much in fashion among young people today, are potentially hazardous and dangerous, University of Wisconsin doctors have found. Skin contact with certain beans often used in these necklaces can cause severe allergic reactions and eating the beans can cause serious poisoning and even death, the doctors report.

EXPERIMENTS with tadpoles and frogs have demonstrated that a single cell nucleus from a developed animal can be removed and then implanted in a fertilized egg cell in another animal, reports a University of Michigan physicist. He said that the egg cell will develop into an animal identical to the first. Agriculturists can use this technique, when it is perfected, to develop instant champions, he said. The best chickens, hogs or cattle can be selected and by transferring nuclei from a few of their body cells to fertilized egg cells, a whole herd of champions can be produced in a single breeding season.

THE EXTERIORS of many aircraft are cleaned with specially treated deionized water. Why is that necessary? Cec Bee Chemical Company, Downey, California explains that a film of oil actually helps protect dirty steel or aluminum surfaces and removing it leaves them open to attack particularly if the cleaned area has to be rinsed with water. Ordinary tap water in most localities contains harmful chemicals that stimulate corrosion and the water itself is a corroding agent. On the other hand, treated deionized water does not harm the surfaces and helps shield metal by depositing a protective film. EARTHQUAKES tend to crack along faults—fractures in the earth's crust along which two blocks of the crust have slipped with respect to each other says the U. S. Geological Survey. One crustal block may move horizontally in one direction while the one facing it moves in the opposite direction. Or, one block may move upward while the other moves

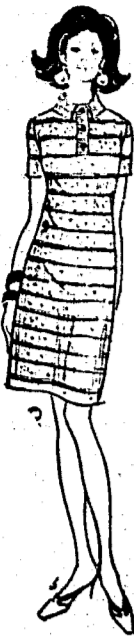
