GENESEE WINS DIST. BASKETBALL CROWN

After trailing through most of the first half the Genesee Bulldogs exploded for 24 points in a wild third quarter and went on to defeat the Troy Trojans 60-50 Saturday evening on the G. H. S. court and win the District 2, Class 4-A basketball championship and a spot in the State Tournament which begins in Lewiston Thursday, March 6th.

The game was close all the way, despite the Bulldogs' ten point margin at the final buzzer. Eleven times during the contest the score was tied; 6 of these ties came in the third quarter as the Bulldogs fought back from an early deficit.

Troy moved out to an early lead after scoring the first two points of the game. Jim Scharnhorst tied it at 2-2 with a long jumper from outside the key, then Troy took control of the game, staying 2 to 4 points up until the final two minutes of the first frame, when Terry Gelts evened it at 8-8. Troy scored a free throw to lead 9-8 going into the second period.

Nick Eglund sent the Bulldogs ahead 10-9 just seconds after the quarter began but Troy came back to regain the lead and was ahead 25-19 at the half.

The Scharnhorst boys, Jim and Bruce, combined to score 6 points in 1 1/2 minutes as the third quarter opened. Jim hit a field goal and Bruce canned four straight free throws. With 6:38 remaining in the quarter Troy called time out as their lead was now only 27-25. Fred Moschke tied it up 27-27 seconds later.

The lead was traded back and forth until the final minute of play when it was still tied at 35-35. In that last minute Genesee just couldn't seem to miss as they scored 8 points and badly rattled the Trojans.

Troy tried to rally in the final quarter but the loss of three of their starting five via the foul route was too much of a disadvantage. Bob Parkina, Bob Abbott and Mike Fredrick all were forced out of the game. Parkina left the game with his fifth foul after forcing Jim Scharnhorst into the end wall while attempting to block a lay-in. Jim was knocked unconscious and suffered a badly split scalp. He was unable to play the remainder of the game as the Bulldogs went on to their 60-50 victory.

Bruce Scharnhorst came off the bench to pace the Bulldogs with 13 points, while Mark Busch added 11 more. Bob Abbott led the Trojans with 18 points and Bill Sexton had 17.

DEATH CLAIMS DELMER G. MATHES

Delmer G. Mathes, Myrtle, was found dead in his home Monday morning, Feb. 24th. Death was caused by a heart attack. The body was discovered by neighbors, who summoned a doctor. Time of death was estimated to be between 6:00 and 9:00 a. m.

Mathes, 69, was a former resident, with his parents and family of Big Bear Ridge and also Little Bear Ridge. He was born Aug. 24, 1899, a son of John and Melissa Mathes.

Mr. Mathes spent several years in the U. S. Army during World War I. He worked in logging and mining activities and had retired about two years ago. He was living alone.

Survivors include three sons, Gerald L. Mathes, serving with the Marine Corps; LeRoy and Glen and one daughter, Bernadine, who reside in California. Two brothers, Elmer Mathes of Clarkia, Wayne Mathes of Weiser, and one sister, Mrs. Georgia Dillon of Portland, Ore.

LEGISLATORS RESPOND TO LETTERS

Mrs. Robert Pratt was one of the first people in Kendrick to write letters to area legislators in Boise, voicing her objections to the proposed bill that would consolidate the Kendrick School District with Lewiston.

District 5 Senator John Mix answered Mrs. Pratt with a letter informing her that he felt the proposal would find little support in the Senate. He said he favored consolidation when it is necessary, but only with the consent of the local district patrons involved. He assured her that he would oppose House Bill 221.

Harold Snow, Representative from District 5, replied and thanked Mrs. Pratt for her letter and wrote that he thought the bill had little chance of passage. He added he appreciated her reasons for opposing the bill. However, Mr. Snow gave no indication of his position in regard to HB 221.

WILLARD DYER NEW GENESEE POLICE, FIRE CHIEF

Willard "Moon" Dyer, a veteran Troy, Idaho, lawman, was appointed Police and Fire Chief for the City of Genesee at a meeting of the Genesee City Council held Monday evening, March 3. Dyer, who has recently been manager of the Troy Cafe, has had a long career in police and fire department work. He will begin his new duties immediately.

All members of the council, Ed. Jutte, John Myers, Jr., Jack Magee and Bill Roth were present for the meeting presided over by Mayor D. F. Scharnhorst. Also present were John Murray and Floyd Ochs of the WWP Co.; W. J. Phar, manager of the Genesee First Security Bank; Glen Utzman, Moscow accountant; Oscar Waggar and Willard Dyer.

Mr. Utzman was at the meeting to present his auditor's report on the financial condition of the City of Genesee. He reported that Genesee's financial condition is good and that the city was adhering closely to their budget. The only department which exceeded its budget was the Water and Sewer, and he recommended that if expansion of water and sewer lines within the city continue it might be wise for the council to consider raising the rates for these services. In the past two years the city has had large expenses as they extended their lines to service new areas near the city limits.

New Bank Building
W. J. Phar, bank manager, came before the council to discuss a proposed new building. He said the bank's architect had proposed construction of a building with a frontier-type styling. The building itself would be 40x40 and would be prefabricated by Boise Cascade Co. To add to the design the firm proposes to add a snake-covered canopy supported by wooden poles from the present Fire Hall and Easttime Tavern. They also propose to install wooden sidewalks on the surface under the canopy. The empty building north of the bank would be torn down back to the newspaper office, which would then become a separate building. The bank will move into the Burr Building while construction is underway. Phar said a completion date of 90 days has been set once work begins.

Gas Franchise Granted
After discussing the proposal from the Washington Water Power Company to furnish the City with natural gas service, the council voted unanimously to grant a franchise to the WWP Co. for that purpose. Mr. John Murray, Palouse Division manager of WWP, and Floyd Ochs, local representative, were at the meeting to answer questions and tell of the plans. Work will begin on the project as soon as final approval comes from the Federal Power Commission.

MISSIONARY COMING

Rev. C. G. Rudeen, Missionary to Nicaragua, Central America, will be the featured speaker at the Juliaetta Church of the Nazarene, March 11th, according to an announcement by Elton Hilliard, pastor of the local congregation.

The Rudeens have six children. During their furlough year they are making their home at Nampa, Idaho.

In the service at Juliaetta Rev. Rudeen will bring a missionary message and show colored slides of their work in Nicaragua.

C. J. Spence Dies Friday
Clifford J. Spence, 54, died at 12:40 Friday afternoon at St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston. Death was due to a heart condition. Spence had been in ill health for about three weeks.

Spence had been retired since 1949, when he suffered injuries in an accident involving blasting powder. His home was at Juliaetta.

Spence was born Nov. 11, 1914, at Mustang, Okla., a son of Mr. and Mrs. Jess Spence.

He lived in Oklahoma until 1917, when he moved to Colorado. He lived in Nevada from 1925 until moving to the Juliaetta area in 1930.

Spence married the former Olga Jones in Lewiston in 1940. She died in October, 1965, at Juliaetta.

Spence is survived by his mother, Mrs. Corbel N. Spence, Lewiston; two sons, Dennis K. Spence, Alaska, and Cleve C. Spence, California; a step-son, Jean Jones, Orofino, and a sister, Mrs. Jack O'Reilly, Bovill.

Funeral services were held Monday at 2:30 p. m. at the Brower-Wann Chapel with Rev. Wayne Schaub, pastor of the Orchard Methodist Church as officiant. Interment was in Normal Hill Cemetery.

BEEF STRAGANOFF
2 lbs filet of beef
1 onion, chopped
2 1/2 T. butter
1/4 cup bouillon
1 t. Worcestershire Sauce
1 cup sour cream (I use imitation sour cream)

10 mushrooms
Slice beef into thin bits. Mix with salt, pepper, and dash of flour. Fry chopped onion in saucepan with butter until golden brown. Add meat, fry together. Add bouillon, Worces-

tershire Sauce and sour cream. Mix well and cook until deep yellow brown. Caution: Don't keep on fire long enough to dry the sauce. Mushrooms, fried separately in butter, may be added.

1 cup mushrooms

Sprinkle chicken with salt and pepper. Heat oil in skillet, add chicken and cook until lightly browned. Mix tomatoes, green pepper, onion, the salt, and pepper. IDAHO DEPT. OF EMPLOYMENT

A decline was noted in the number of workers continuing to file claims for unemployment insurance in Latah County during the past week. Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow, Office Manager for the Idaho Department of Employment reported that 235 persons were filing claims for jobless pay at the close of business, February 28, 1968 compared with 270 active claimants at the end of the previous week, and 358 benefit seekers at this same time a year ago. Hartstein said that only 7 workers filed new claims for benefits during the week, and a total of 42 persons discontinued their claims. Most of those who dropped their claims returned to work in the construction industry, a few returned to work in other jobs, two used up all benefits due them and the remainder just did not continue to report, giving no reason. In the Moscow area the total dropped from 129 to 113, but was higher than the 90 of a year ago. The Genesee total remained 13 for the two weeks up from the 5 of last year. Fifty-seven workers were filing claims from the Troy-Deary-Bozwell area, down from the 74 of a week ago, and way down from the 146 of the end of February, 1968. Little change was noted in the Kendrick area, the current total being 12, last week 15, and last year 11. Thirty-five checks are going into the Potlatch area, up from last week's 34, but below last year's 57. At Elk River there are five persons seeking jobless pay, the same as a week ago, but only a 10th of the 50 who were filing claims a year ago. Hartstein said that the bulk of those who were filing a year ago were from the logging industry, which so far this year has continued to maintain high employment. Warmer weather and/or the imposition of load limits on the roads could cause wide spread unemployment in that industry at any time.

Job opportunities declined somewhat during the past week as compared with the previous week, according to another part of Hartstein's report. He said that only 13 new jobs

were listed with his office during the week, compared with 17 the previous week, and 24 during the same week last year. Only 7 persons were given job finding help during the week, less than half the number so served during the previous week and during the same week in 1968. Thirty-six jobs were still open, however, Hartstein said, and included openings for such workers as a parts clerk trainee, farm workers, woods workers, a newspaper carrier, machine shop workers and bricklayers, as well as sales clerks, typists, cooks, waitresses and domestic workers.
