It's all right sir, he replied. The troops are carrying a notice that 'we are swimming.'

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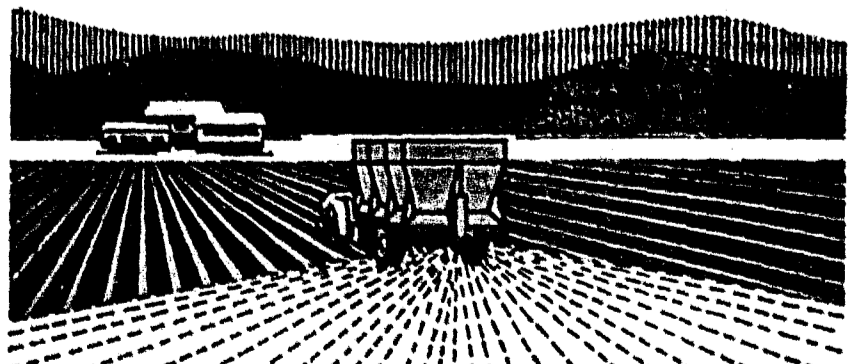

REP. GEO. F. BROCKE REPORTS ON THE LEGISLATIVE DOINGS

(Delayed From Last Week)

With the seventh week of the 40th session of the Idaho State Legislature coming to a close, and with ten days left many major problems remain to be solved. So far no major general fund appropriations have been introduced. Only one important tax bill has made its appearance and this is the bill that would raise all property assessed values to 20 per cent. To adjust for the loss the utilities would pay a gross revenue tax on their gross receipts and no taxing unit could levy over 106% of the prior year's tax revenue.

The appropriation for the public schools has been set at \$18,650,000 over the present appropriation, which would give the public schools some \$78,250,000. The amount of money each district will get will be determined by the formula. In order to make the distribution fair some changes will have to take place in the formula. This will be done this coming week.

A real surprise occurred in the House last Friday when members in favor of the 44 school district consolidation bill (HB-221), were able to draw this bill from the Printing committee by a 36 to 27 vote. These 36 votes indicate only one thing and that members of the House that favor of the 44 school district consolidation. The record of this vote on the bill will be found in the House Journal of Feb. 28th.

I suggest that the people interested in getting this bill killed look up the names of the members that voted for the printing of the bill and write to each of them at the Legislature, expressing their desire in this legislation.

Every effort will be made to hold this bill in the Education Committee. After this action Friday I am not sure that the bill can be held in Committee for the balance of the session.

Still to come before the Legislature is the Court Reform bills which have passed the Senate; changes in the Motor Vehicle Inspection bill, and consolidation of Highway Districts.

Passed by the Senate was a bill that would allow the Fish and Game Commission to make a charge for a steelhead card. The price of the card would be \$1.00.

Hearings are still going on, and will continue until the final hours of the session. It is expected that the Education Committee will have a hearing on the school consolidation bill.

So far 623 bills have been introduced in both houses of the legislature.

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IF SO, HOW MUCH SHOULD I PUT ON? AND WHEN?
