LAKE PEND OREILLE WINS 23rd BIG TROUT CONTEST

A whopping 32 pound, 8 ounce Kamloops trout from Idaho's Lake Pend Oreille was judged the largest rainbow caught on the continent last year and winner in the open-line division of the annual national contest conducted by Field and Stream magazine the Idaho Fish and Game Department said today.

Lake Pend Oreille Kamloops first were listed among Field and Stream winners in 1945. During the next 6 years, 1945-51, big trout from this lake made first place each year. In 1956, these fish not only won first prize, but seven of the top ten places. In 1958 and 1959, they captured nine out of ten places in the first division.

Lake Pend Oreille also produced the largest Dolly Varden registered on the continent last season. It weighed 21 pounds, 10 ounces.

Some of the largest outthroat trout caught on the continent last year were hooked in Henry's Lake, Idaho near West Yellowstone, Montana. The top three on flies in the national contest were caught at Henry's Lake. They weighed 9 pounds, 4 ounces; 7 pounds, 10 ounces, and 7 pounds, 3 ounces.

Home Cookin' ...

Mrs. Dan Zacantti, one of Kendrick's good cooks, contributes some very delicious recipes this week. The strawberry and rhubarb pie are especially timely, and they will soon be in abundance. Mrs. Zacantti adds that she plans on bringing in some of her Italian recipes. Cooking for her husband, Don and three children, keeps Mrs. Zacantti pretty busy, in addition to other household duties.

The Zacantti family moved to Kendrick two years ago from Oroville, California.

Come on, Kendrick and Genesee ladies, let's have some recipes.

STRAWBERRY-RHUBARB PIE

2 cups rhubarb
1 cup strawberries
1 cup sugar
2T flour
1/4 tsp. salt
Cut rhubarb into 1/2 inch pieces, mix with strawberries. Mix sugar, flour, and salt; fold in rhubarb and strawberries. Put into shell and bake at 450 degree for 10 minutes and 350 for 30 minutes more.

LEMON-LIME JELLO SALAD

1 pkg. Lemon-Lime jello dissolved in 2 cups pineapple juice
1 cup mayonnaise
1 cup cottage cheese
1 cup crushed pineapple—drained
1/2 cup nut meats (English walnuts)
2 or 3T horseradish, level
1 cup canned milk
Heat juice, dissolve jello, let set until thicker than syrup. Add rest of ingredients. Mix good, pour into mold. Let set several hrs. before unmolding.

LEMON JELLO CAKE

1 pkg. lemon and yellow cake mix
1 regular size pkg. lemon jello
4 eggs
3/4 cup oil
3/4 cup water
Add all together and beat for at least 5 minutes. Bake in pan at 325 degrees for 40 to 45 minutes. When cake is done and still hot, poke full of holes with a meat fork and spread on icing. Make sure most of it soaks into the cake.

Icing:
2 cups powdered sugar
1/4 cup lemon juice

GENESEE—The general committee for the 1969 Genesee Community Day celebration met Thursday evening and report plans are progressing slowly but smoothly for the yearly event which will take place June 14.

At the present time, the general committee is still in the process of finding people who will serve as chairmen of the various committees.

The following chairmen have been named so far: Marion Holben, races and games; Don Becker, bingo; Don Springer, reunion, and Robert Borgen, old time exhibit. It is hoped that all chairmen will be secured so a complete list can be made available.

The general committee has agreed that this year's celebration will fall into the same pattern as last year's, with, of course, a few minor modifications.

Mrs. Wayne Roach, a member of the general committee stated Tuesday that the Firemen are taking over the food stand, and, as in past years will sell pie and coffee. Mrs. John Myers will be in charge of ticket sales.

It is hoped to make this year's event one of the best ever.

DRIVING DELAYS ON N.-S. HIGHWAY

Lewiston — James W. Hill, assistant district engineer for the Idaho Department of Highways said this week that bridge foundations and footings have been completed and driving piers are now high above the rising waters of the Salmon River spring run-off on Project F-4113 (37) near McKinzie Creek and Slate Creek along U. S. 95. The 4.5 mile \$1,052,036 project, which is expected to be complete by August of 1970, will eliminate five one-way bridges and shorten the distance between Idaho's capitol city and northern Idaho by one mile.

Mr. Hill also stated that a small slide has recently developed on a rock cut on the northern end of the project which necessitates the removal of an additional 20,000 cubic yards of excess rock and dirt in the project area. The slide has not delayed progress, however.

Murphy Bros. Construction Co. of Spokane, contractors on the project, are continuing their drilling and blasting operations on a two-shift basis. Motorists may expect delays up to one hour following blasting operations, which are scheduled at 9:00 a. m. and 5:00 p. m., Pacific Standard Time. Motorists may also expect some other minor delays along the project north of Slate Creek because of heavy equipment crossing the roadway.

E. BRACK ANDERSON, 76, SUCCUMBS MARCH 31st

E. Brack Anderson, 76, a retired groundskeeper, died of cancer at Lewiston Manor March 31.

He lived and farmed at Cloverland in Asotin Co. from 1916 until 1937 when he moved to Uniontown. From 1937 until 1940 while he lived there he was employed on the Nick Jacobs farm.

In 1941, Anderson moved to Lewiston where he was groundskeeper at St. Joseph's hospital until his retirement in 1957. He then worked as groundskeeper for the Church of Nativity (Episcopal) and for individuals until last December.

In September, 1913, he was married to Attie Plummer at Volney, Va. They were divorced in 1938.

Anderson was born at Troutdale, Va. Dec. 20, 1892, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. N. Anderson. He grew up there and came with his wife to Asotin Co. in 1916.

Survivors include three sons, W. Gwyn Anderson, Genesee, and Del G. Anderson and L. Kyle Anderson, both of Lewiston; one daughter, Mrs. Nona Darnell, Chehalis, Wash.; one half-brother, Russell Anderson, and one sister, Mrs. Wane Arvin, both of Sparta, N. C.; nine grandchildren and seven great grandchildren.

The funeral will be Thursday at 10:30 p. m. at Brower-Wann Funeral Home, with the Rev. R. Scott Dills, rector at the Church of Nativity (Episcopal), officiating. Burial will be at Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens.

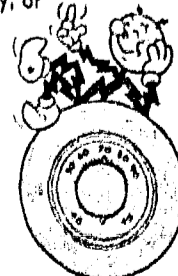

SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

Residents of the area who are receiving monthly social security checks are reminded by D. Gene Shaw, social security manager in Lewiston, to report directly to the Lewiston Social Security office any change of address or other events affecting continued receipt of their checks. Reports may be made by mail, phone, or in person. Appropriate report forms are also available at the Lewiston office. This reporting method enables the district office to take advantage of the increased capacity of its high speed communication circuits to transmit information to record centers. Until

recently, social security beneficiaries were encouraged to notify the social security administration about the occurrence of these events by mailing pre-addressed postcard forms to a record center. Events that affect receipt of monthly social security checks, in addition to address changes, are starting or stopping work (employment), marriage or remarriage in some instances, divorce, and death.

CONTROL OF LICE ON SHEEP

Moscow — An excellent time to control lice on sheep is within a month after shearing, suggests Leonard Burns, county agricultural agent. Treatment then will get rid of lice that would remain during the summer and increase next fall. Dipping, spraying or dusting will do the job.

Lice cause economic loss because they bother sheep as they eat scales and other particles as they feed in the wool. The sheep itch. They bite at their wool and rub against posts. The fleece is torn and reduced in value.

Biting lice spend their entire life on sheep, leaving one only to attach to another. Peak numbers occur in winter and sometimes last until shearing. Those that are left stay with the animals all summer and build up considerably when weather gets cold again.

Louse control is difficult when the fleeces are heavy. Insecticides do not penetrate well. Dipping is not practical then. Best results are usually obtained from treatments a few days after shearing. However, the period may be extended for several weeks, according to weather and other conditions.

If other animals are added to the flock after treatment, they should be sprayed or dusted to prevent reinfestation of the band.

BANK SAYS BUSINESS GOOD DESPITE THE TOUGH WINTER

Business in Idaho during the first three months of 1969 was good to excellent despite the handicap of a severe winter and deep snow throughout most of the state.

This is the report of the First Security News Letter which is being distributed this week. It was announced today by James Hoogland, Jr., manager, First Security Bank of Idaho, N. A., at Kendrick and W. J. Phar, manager, First Security Bank at Genesee.

The general outlook for agriculture in the state for 1969 is good, with somewhat higher prices for most crops and livestock anticipated. There should be at least equal production and both gross and net income per farm should be above that of 1968.

Cash receipts in the first quarter of 1969 from the sale of farm products were considerably above the total of \$112 million in the first quarter of last year. Prices for all livestock and livestock products are considerably above those of one year ago, according to the First Security.

Feeder cattle prices have been good to excellent for the past six months and somewhat higher than slaughter prices would dictate, while lamb prices are approximately 25 percent above year-ago levels, reflecting continued decrease in lamb production.

Potato prices have been excellent at approximately double those of the spring of 1968. Disappearance of the 1968 crop has been considerably above year-ago levels and forecasts are for some increase nationally in spring potato production.

Total personal income in the first quarter was approximately \$500 million, or about seven percent higher than in the first three months of 1968. Increases were shown primarily from higher total and average wages.

The outlook for the second quarter is generally good but some modification will probably result from a slowdown in the demand for products with anticipated slight modification from the over-exuberant economy.

Lumber production in the Gem State in January was 114.4 million feet board measure — an increase of one percent over last year. There was increased employment in logging and lumber production in February, but extremely heavy snow fall and alternate thawing and freezing have slowed down output.

First Security points out that employment during February was reported at 263,400, an increase of 7,800 or 3.1 per cent from a year earlier. Agriculture employment continued to decline, while increases were reported in lumber and paper, food products, mining, contract construction, trade and government.

TIPS ON TREE AND SHRUB CARE

Homeowners can improve growth and luxuriance of landscape trees and shrubs by fertilizing them in early spring, according to W. H. Snyder, associate professor of plant science and architecture at the U. of Idaho.

Snyder suggests using 4 to 6 pounds of actual nitrogen per year per 1,000 square feet of ground area covered by the trees or shrubs.

If you use ammonium sulphate, which contains 20 per cent nitrogen, apply 20 to 30 pounds of the fertilizer to the 1,000 square-foot area.

The fertilizer should be applied at the base of the plants. For trees, apply half in early spring and half in late June or early July Snyder says.

Snyder stresses that you should have your fertilization program completed by mid-July so the plants can go fully dormant before frosts and cold weather.

Fertilizer recommendations for trees and shrubs are generally made in terms of pounds per plant, per inch of trunk diameter or per foot of height.

Overfeeding young trees with nitrogen also can cause excessive growth of foliage in relation to trunk and root development, Snyder cautions.

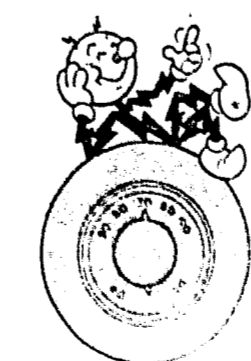
