



TIPS ON TREE AND SHRUB CARE Snyder suggests using 4 to 6 pounds of actual nitrogen per year per 1,000 sociate professor of plant science and equal applications for herbaceous pe-

> fertilizer contains 33 per cent nitrogen so only 12 to 18 pounds of material are required per 1,000 square feet.

> The fertilizer should be applied at the base of the plants. For trees, apply half in early spring and half in late June or early July Snyder says. For shrubs, equal amounts in early spring, in late May and in early July

Snyder stresses that you should have your fertilization program completed by mid-July so the plants can go fully dormant before frosts and cold weather. Nitrogen applied in August may force growth that will be susceptible to winter damage. If you do apply fertilizer in the fall, wait until October or later.

Fertilizer recommendations for trees and shrubs are generally made in terms of pounds per plant, per inch of trunk diameter or per foot of height. However, Snyder points out fertilizing on the basis of square foot area is much safer for smaller plants or those in sites that restrict the root system. Too much fertilization can damage these plants:

Overfeeding young trees with nitrogen also can cause excessive growth of foliage in relation to trunk and root development, Snyder cautions. You can wind up with a top-heavy tree that will require staking for several


