

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

The language of chemical pesticides s simple if you know what the term means. Many people do because agricultural chemicals are becoming common as their use increases. But if you aren't sure about such things as "wettable powder," "inert ingredients," and 'pre-emergenes," some tips from the county agent may be helpful.

Take "herbicide' for example. That means a chemical that retards or kills a plant you don't want. In other words. a weed killer. A selective herbicide is a compound that kills one plant but not another. It kills weeds

but spares the grain. Here are some definitions.

Wettable powder-Dry chemical in which the active ingredient is absorbed in powder. It can be mixed with water and sprayed

Inert ingredients-The part of the chemical compound that does not kill Sometimes called a carrier, it can be liquid or solid and is generally added to the chemical to make it easier to

Pre-emergence - Treatment after planting a crop but before it comes out of the earth,

Annual weeds-The kinds that complete their life cycle in one year. Perennials live longer.

Tolerant cropss-They are not bothered by pesticides.

Caibrated-Set to deliver a specific amount of spray mixture for a certain area such as square rods or acres. Residues-Chemicals remaining in or on a treated product. You have

to look out for them because of potential contamination of a crop or edible animal product. Germinating-Beginning to sprout




