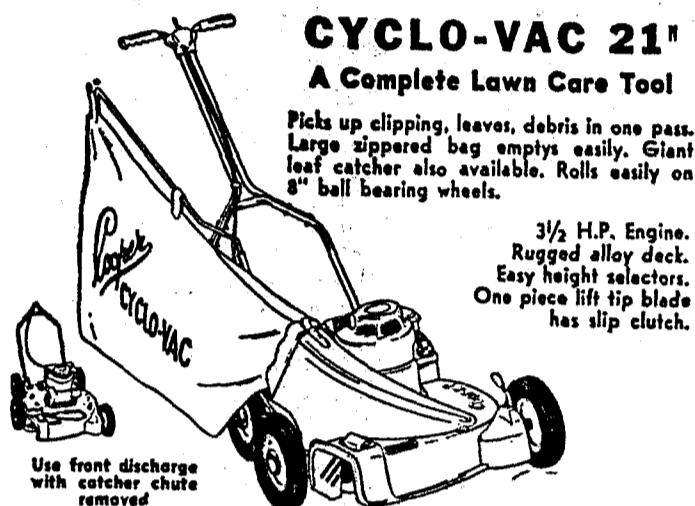

Esther's Tallarene sounds delicious and quite easy to prepare. That's what most of us are looking for in our busy everyday schedules. Something quick, yet nourishing.

TALLARENE

2 cups cooked noodles
1 lb. hamburger
1 can tomato soup
1 can corn
1 can ripe olives
1 cup grated cheese
1 medium onion, chopped
1 cup water (if needed)
2 T. butter
salt and pepper
Mince and fry onion in butter, add meat and brown. Add tomato soup, water and noodles, and cook until tender. Season with salt and pepper. Add corn and olives and more water if necessary. Pour into baking dish. Sprinkle with cheese. Cook 45 minutes in slow oven. Let stand 15 minutes with lid off, before serving. Cheryl's recipe for Rhubarb Upside Down Cake is timely now as rhubarb is at its peak and plentiful. One of the ladies at the Gazette office told me she has used it many times and found it to be delicious.

RHUBARB UPSIDE DOWN CAKE

Oven: 375 degrees Time: 35 minutes
10 marshmallows
3 cups rhubarb
Cut into buttered pan. Sprinkle with ¼ cup sugar, ½ tsp, nutmeg ¼ tsp, red coloring
Sift Into Bowl:

1 cup flour
1¼ tsp. baking powder
¼ tsp. salt
½ cup sugar
Add 2 eggs, 2 tbsp. melted butter,
1/3 cup milk and vanilla
Mix and pour over fruit.

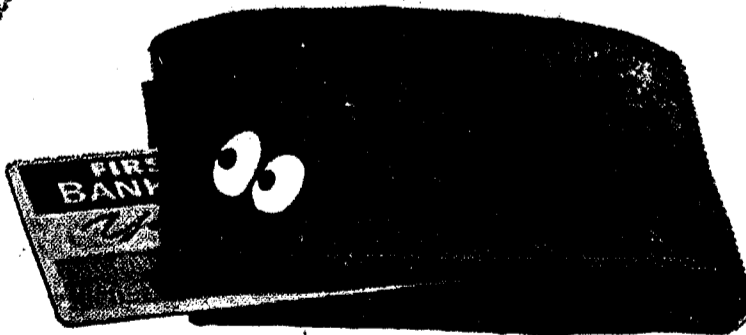
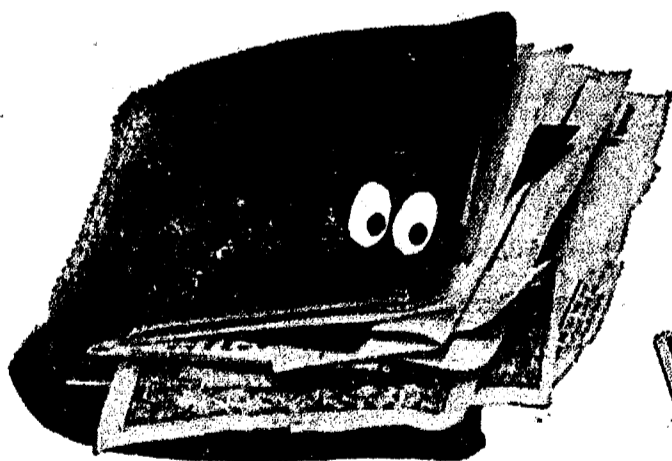

LEGAL NOTICES

ORDINANCE 200
TITLE VI
CHAPTER 4

An Ordinance providing for penalty for conviction, misdemeanor offense of allowing or permitting a dog to run at large, maximum penalty on conviction, impounding, reclaiming, sale, destruction or disposal of unlicensed dogs and dogs running at large and providing for the repeal of all prior ordinances or parts thereof inconsistent herewith, and providing
BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Genesee, Council of the City of Genesee, County of Latah, State of Idaho, as follows:
SECTION 16:

RUNNING AT LARGE AND PERIOD OF TIME: During the period of January to December 31, both dates inclusive, of each year no person, the owner or harbinger in charge of any dog, shall permit or allow such dog to run at large within the City of Genesee. Any dog, licensed or unlicensed, which may be found so running at large, may be taken up, impounded, sold or destroyed as herein-after provided. In any prosecution under this section, it shall not be necessary to allege or prove an intent on the part of the owner or person in charge of a dog to allow or permit such dog to run at large.
SECTION 17: VIOLATION AND CONVICTION: Any person who violates the provisions of Section 16 above shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by the imposition of a fine not more than \$100.00.
SECTION 18: LICENSING AND IMPOUNDMENT: Any dog not licensed as hereinabove provided and any dog, licensed or unlicensed, running at large in the City of Genesee shall be

taken up wherever the dog may be found by any of the City of Genesee police officers or marshals and impounded. If the owner be known he shall be notified orally, by telephone, or in writing. If the owner is not known, notice shall be given by posting of a notice in two public places within the City of Genesee with one of said places being at the front door of the City Hall.
SECTION 19: PENALTY: The owner or person in charge of any dog impounded under the provisions hereof may recover possession of said dog by payment of the annual license fee with penalty, if any, and an additional sum of fifteen dollars (\$15.00) to cover cost of impounding and giving notice and an additional sum of two dollars (\$2.00) per day for feeding such dog.
SECTION 20: LENGTH OF TIME OF IMPOUNDING: If the impounded dog is not reclaimed within five (5) days after impounding, such dog may be sold to the highest bidder and if the same cannot be sold, the dog may be destroyed or otherwise disposed of by the City of Genesee.
SECTION 21: PRIOR PROVISIONS: That all prior ordinances or parts or sections of prior ordinances inconsistent with the provision hereof be, and the same are hereby repealed. This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage, approval and publication.

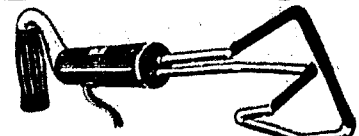

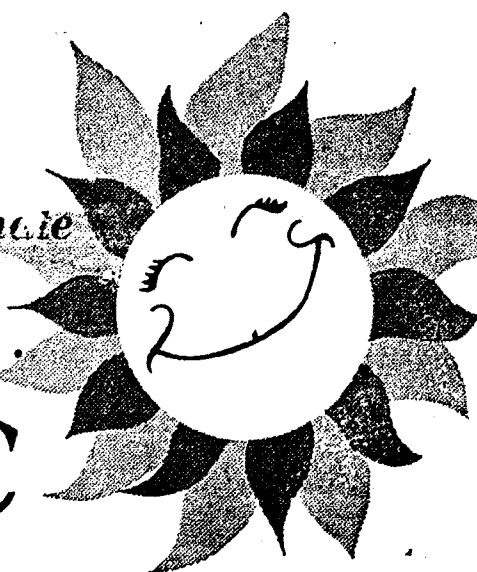

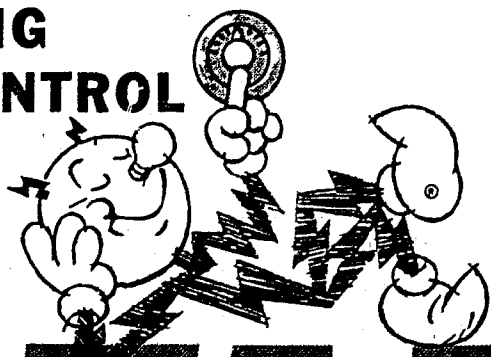
