**SEARCH-RESCUE WORK**  
Department personnel last year took part in 110 search and rescue missions, totalling 1,324 man-hours and 8,685 vehicular miles at a cost of \$5,094. This represents just a part of total resources available to anyone who is lost, sick, or disabled in the Idaho back country. Massive search efforts involving scores of men, aircraft, boats, snowcats, and horses can be organized and tailored to meet individual needs.

Requests for help in search-rescue work may be made to the county sheriff, district conservation officer, forest ranger (state or federal), Bureau of Land Management, Mountain Search and Rescue Unit, Civil Air Patrol and other qualified organizations in the area.

**DWORSHAK ELK TRAPPING**

So far, 313 elk have been live-trapped and marked in the Dworshak Dam area on the North Fork of the Clearwater River. Sixty tags have been retrieved, mostly from hunters who have bagged marked elk. The program started in 1963 to find out the movement of elk, daily, monthly

and seasonally. Two cows have been equipped with collars with radio transmitters, and the plan calls for ten. The work, which is financed by the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, is done during April, May and June because elk migrate out of the area during the summer months.

**GOOSE NEST SURVEY**

Idaho's annual goose nest survey is completed in southwestern areas and continuing in other parts of the state. Starting about April 1 on the Snake River islands from Walters Ferry to Farewell Bend, and on the Payette River below Emmett, goose nest egg counting is completed and evaluation underway by early May. The nesting season is later at higher elevations.

Gosling production on the lower Snake River was calculated at 733, which is about 10 percent lower than it was last year. A total of 189 nests was found, with 145 of them (76.6 percent) successful for an average hatch of 5.1 goslings per nest. On the lower Payette River, 88 nests were found, 56 of them hatched successfully, producing a calculated 286 goslings. This was down 38 percent from last year in the same area.

**PNGDA MEETING JUNE 11-13**

Transportation for the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Union Pacific Railroad. James V. Springrose, vice president of transportation for Car-gill, Inc., a Minneapolis based company dealing with merchandising and grain exporting, will be the moderator, Jackson reported.

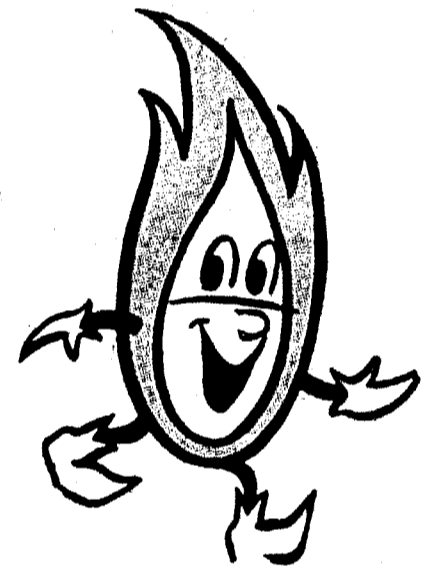

**Home Cookin'...**

With warm weather bearing down, our eating should be kept light, yet nourishing, and something easy to prepare, and enough made at one time to be used for several meals. A cool gelatin salad, a casserole, and graham cracker dessert. It's a refreshing sound from bread, meat, potatoes and gravy. Though, of course, there are some who still enjoy that old standby fare, no matter how high the thermometer soars.

**GREEN SALAD**  
 1 pkg. Lime gelatin  
 12 marshmallows  
 1 small can crushed pineapple  
 1/2 cup diced celery  
 1/2 cup boiling water  
 1/2 cup heavy cream  
 1/2 cup mayonnaise  
 Mix gelatin and marshmallows in water and let set until cool. Then beat until foamy. Add celery and pineapple and mix well. Whip cream, add mayonnaise to cream. Add to other ingredients and mix well. Chill until set.

**SAUSAGE DINNER**  
 1 1/2 cup macaroni  
 1/2 onion  
 3 T butter  
 1 green pepper, chopped  
 3 cups canned tomatoes  
 1/2 tsp. sugar  
 1/2 tsp. salt  
 1/4 tsp. pepper  
 1/4 lb. sausage  
 1/3 cup dry bread crumbs  
 Cook macaroni, saute onion in butter for 5 minutes. Add green pepper, tomatoes, salt pepper, sugar, simmer for 15 minutes. Form sausage in 6 flat patties. Place 1/2 macaroni in casserole, next the six patties and cover with remaining macaroni. Pour tomato mixture over all and sprinkle top with bread crumbs. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes. Serves 6.

**GRAHAM CRACKER DESSERT**  
 1/2 box graham crackers  
 2 cups powdered sugar  
 1/2 cup butter  
 2 eggs  
 1/2 tsp. vanilla  
 1/2 pint cream  
 1 small can pineapple  
 Line 13" x 9" oblong pan with 1/2 of crackers. Mix 2 cups powdered sugar with 1/2 cup butter and 1/2 tsp. vanilla. Beat in two eggs, one at a time. Whip 1/2 pint cream, and mix in small can pineapple. Pour powdered sugar mixture over crackers, then pineapple cream mixture. Cover with remaining cracker crumbs. Chill several hours before serving.
