SCHOOL BOARD MET THURSDAY

Trustees and officials of Joint School District No. 283 met Thursday evening, June 12, at the Kendrick school for their regular monthly meeting. This was also the annual reorganizational meeting for the board.

Harry Newman was re-elected as chairman of the board for another term with Floyd Helmgartner elected vice-chairman. Richard Benjamin was administered the oath of office and seated as Trustee from Trustee Zone Two, Kendrick. Other trustees on the board are Herman Renfrow and Luther Parks. Also present at the Thursday meeting were Superintendent of Schools, James V. Muscat and clerk A. O. Karikkeberg.

The trustees, at this meeting, approved a change in the time of the regular board meetings. The board will now meet on the second Thursday of each month.

The board also passed on and approved for payment \$4300 for current bills against the district.

Members of the board discussed and will now accept applications for the position of assistant cook at the Juliaetta Elementary school and also for a janitor job at the Juliaetta school. All applications must be submitted to Supt. Muscat prior to the July 10 meeting. Further information may be obtained from the superintendent.

In other action: the board discussed and approved for study a proposal to change from bulk milk dispensers in the milk program to cartoned, or individual containers. The board will check into the cost factor of this proposal and report at the next meeting.

The board read and discussed a letter from the State Superintendent of Schools, D. F. Engelking relating to a proposed educational television network within the state and District 283's participation in it. It was decided that if the cost can be brought to within \$1 per pupil, this district will enter into the program. A TV is a valuable supplementary teaching aid if the cost to the district is not prohibitive. Whether this district can join in the program will depend on the number of other schools in the state who choose to join and also upon the University of Idaho, from which the programs would originate.

Ken's Stationary of Moscow was awarded the bid for the typewriter and adding machine maintenance for the coming year. City Cleaners of Lewiston was awarded the low bid on the cleaning of band uniforms, choir robes and curtains. Supt. Muscat reported he was very pleased with the cost of this yearly expense for the district.

While students are enjoying the summer vacation, routine maintenance and repair of the school property is being accomplished. Supt. Muscat reported that four classrooms will be repainted for the first time since the school was constructed and put into use. The metal flashing on the roof of the school building will also be inspected and repaired where necessary.

Wayne Dust, newly named athletic instructor at Kendrick, has accepted summer employment with a Coeur d'Alene firm and will not arrive in the area until later this summer.

Supt. Muscat also said that two new teachers have been hired by the district. One is a second grade teacher from Twin Falls and the other will be in charge of the reading program at the Juliaetta school. Further information will be available later this summer on the new teachers.

SET GARBAGE OUT SUNDAY NIGHT

Because of the extra work involved with the summertime operation of the city swimming pool, Marshal Nye said he will begin picking up garbage very early Monday mornings so they will have time for other duties. With this in mind, he requested that local residents set their garbage out Sunday evenings. This will only be for the summer months and the public's cooperation is requested.

GENESSEE C. D. A SUCCESS

GENESSEE—The 11th annual Community Day celebration had perfect cooperation from the weather and more than 1500 from Genesee and surrounding towns turned out to enjoy the day's festivities.

The breakfast committee reported serving over 300 at the early morning meal held at the Firemens hall. This was slightly above the figure from the 1968 Community Day breakfast.

KPUL radio arrived early and set up their equipment and kept folks informed about the day's activities.

Forty children participated in the kiddies' parade at 9:30, preceding the main parade. Winning first in the event were brother and sister, Steve and Vicki Myers; 2nd, the Greenwell sisters, Kathy and Mary Ann, and third was won by the Holfeltz girls.

The color guard led the main parade at 10:00 a. m. followed by the 30 entries. First place was awarded to the Happy Valley 4-H club, who received \$15; Dick Flodin, with his old saw display, won \$10 for second place, and winning third place honors were the two surviving members of the class of 1919, Mrs. W. O. (Hilma Hanson) Borgen and Mrs. Lillian (Schlueter) Preiss, Lewiston, who were accompanied under the watchful eye of their former high school English teacher, Mrs. S. E. Posterrick, the former Mary Burke, of Moscow. The class of 1944, accompanied by a former teacher, Ben P. Cook, also rode in the parade. Both classes toured the school, guided by custodian Joe Kalafus, and had dinner together.

Approximately 750 were fed at the beef barbecue dinner served from 12 noon till 2 p. m. Serving was under the supervision of the Jay-C-Eltes, assisted by other local women and the JayCeCs. The menu was barbecued beef, bread, beans, cole slaw, potato chips, pickles, relish, coffee and kool aid. Four hundred pounds of beef was rolled and roasted on the mobile barbecue pit, which was mounted on a trailer. The meal was boned by Joe Theissen into 12 to 14 pound roasts.

A large and interested crowd attended the Genesee FFA steer judging contest held at the old pump house. Exhibition hall was one of the main attractions of the day. Featured at the hall were many old time pictures, clothes, hand work, old dishes, school books, bottles, old newspapers and even an old Sears, Roebuck catalog. An old time kitchen was set up on one side of the room by the Cloverette 4-H group, complete with cook stove, pots and pans, table and chairs, rocking chair, oil lamp, and even a spittoon. About 150 visitors signed the register book throughout the day. Bob Borgen, chairman of the committee, reported there were around 220 displays plus the bottle display.

The gymkhana, sponsored by the Genesee Rim Riders at their arena east of town, attracted large crowds. The ping pong ball drop from an airplane was of interest to the many youngsters who scrambled for the balls, and opened them eagerly to see if they had won a prize.

The lunch stand, operated by the Firemen and their wives, and located in the Firemens hall was reported to have done a good business.

WEATHER REMAINS WARM AND DRY

Clear skies and a bright sun continued to keep the temperatures well into the nineties this week. While fishermen, campers and swimmers were enjoying the near-perfect outdoor weather; farmers—especially those with pea crops in the fields—were beginning to worry about the hot temperatures and the lack of moisture.

Having begun in both the Genesee and Kendrick areas and the crops look very good. It was a wet late spring and this combination is excellent for producing abundant hay stands. As cutting time drew near the weather turned dry and warm to allow the farmers to cut and dry the hay before baling it. The haying season also provides employment for many high school youths and gives them an opportunity to toughen-up winter soft muscles while earning their summer money.

Pea growers aren't quite as happy with the weather. The hot temperatures that invaded the area just as the peas were blooming and setting on serve to shorten and setting will hurt the peas both in quantity and quality unless rain is received in a very short time. There just isn't enough available moisture in the ground to fill out the pods properly.

The lack of rain will also hurt the small grain crops as the wheat and barley begins to head out and fill. Most of the fields look good from a distance because of the wet spring that allowed a quick, easy start for the crops; but it is the right amount of rain at the right time that determines whether there will be money in the bank this fall.

Fishermen are happy, though, as the dry May and June quickly brought the lakes and streams down from their winter and spring high levels. Reports of improved catches in many of the nearby mountain streams are being heard.

JIM LYLE, ALUMNI SECRETARY, RETIRES

Moscow — "I never had it so good," says Jim Lyle, University of Idaho alumni secretary as he drives to work in a new gold-colored Buick Electra with silver trim, carrying out the University's colors.

University alumni from all over the nation—5,460 of them—contributed a dollar or more to buy the car with all possible extras. It was a going away gift for the popular alumni leader, who will retire at 65 November 1 after 23 years of service.

Lyle isn't worried about the gasoline mileage on the biggest car he has ever owned because there was enough money left over from alumni contributions to present him with a check for \$1,000 to "buy gas."

The presentation was made by Alumni Association President Iver J. Longetelg, Craigmont, at the annual alumni commencement banquet May 31.

But it's still hard to believe that this has happened to me," Lyle says happily. "Whatever I've done to help the alumni or university was done simply because I loved doing it. They are both great."

During his years as Idaho's alumni secretary, Lyle has traveled to every corner of the nation to meet with old grads, but mostly he looped the State of Idaho, time and again. There isn't a post office in Idaho that Lyle hasn't visited. They're good places for meeting alums.

But what makes Lyle special is his personal interest in each graduate of the University of Idaho. He cannot only tell you who among the alums had a new baby, but how much it weighed.

University colleagues claim traveling by car with Lyle is time consuming-but fascinating. He rarely drives through the smallest town in Idaho without spotting an alum, braking the car, and getting out for a sidewalk visit.

Idaho President Ernest W. Hartung, says, "Without Mr. Lyle's efforts we would not have an Alumni Association. No one has worked harder in this endeavor."

Taking over the alumni leadership at the end of World War II, Lyle faced the big job of bringing up to date the records on the university's 15,000 alumni, of which cards existed for only about 2,000. Alumni now total more than 67,000.

Before being appointed alumni secretary in 1946, Lyle spent 13 years as an Idaho teacher and school superintendent. He taught a year at Peck in 1929, three years at Southwick from 1930 to 1934, was superintendent of schools at Kendrick and Grangeville, and assistant state superintendent of schools at Boise.

SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

A total of 12,527 persons residing in this area were receiving \$1,060,000 in monthly social security benefits as of December, 1968, D. Gene Shaw, District Manager at Lewiston, Idaho announced today.

There were 5,480 women, \$4,255 men and 2,525 children receiving monthly benefits. Children over age 18 attending school numbered 307. Seven hundred seventy-nine disabled adult children were receiving monthly social security benefits, according to Mr. Shaw. It was interesting to note 3,687 beneficiaries were receiving

social security benefits other than retirement benefits, which the general public usually considers social security to be.

A breakdown by county indicates there were 980 beneficiaries living in Clearwater County receiving \$83,000 in monthly social security benefits. Idaho County had 1,552 beneficiaries receiving \$123,000. Latah County contains the second largest number of beneficiaries with 2,723 receiving \$240,000 each month from social security.

The smallest county, Lewis, had 755 persons receiving \$65,000 in social security benefits. Nez Perce County, containing the largest population, also had the largest number of social security beneficiaries. In Nez Perce County, 4,149 persons were receiving \$351,000 in monthly benefits. In Asotin County, Washington, more than half the persons receiving social security were retired workers. Of the total 2,368 persons receiving \$198,000 each month from social security, \$1306 were retired.

1,500 CHINOOK PASS OVER CLEARWATER DAM

Over 1700 spring chinook salmon have passed over the Clearwater Dam at Lewiston the Idaho Fish and Game Department reported today, and this year's run is not yet over. These fish are returning from eyed egg plants made by the Department in 1965 on the Selway River drainage.

According to Monte Richards, Coordinator of Basin Investigations, the program to reintroduce chinook into the Clearwater River started in 1961. Prior to 1927, the Clearwater had a natural run of chinook. However, since that year chinook runs were eliminated, for all practical purposes, due to inadequate fish passage when the Clearwater Dam was constructed.

Efficient fish passage has since been provided by modifying and replacing the original fish ladders. This work was done through the cooperation of the Idaho Fish & Game Department, U. S. Bureau of Commercial Fisheries, and the Washington Water Power Company.

Fish passage has also been provided at Selway Falls on the Selway River to allow returning Chinook unrestricted access to spawning areas above this barrier.

Richards noted that since the start of the program in 1961 approximately two million eyed chinook eggs been planted annually (except for two years; 1965-600,000 and 1968-3,000,000) in the upper Selway River drainage. Early plants were made in open streams and the eggs suffered the same hazards and mortalities as naturally spawned eggs. Starting in 1965 all eggs plants have been made in controlled flow hatching channels. This significantly increased the survival of eggs and fry, Richard said.

The 1700 chinook returning to the Clearwater so far this spring have resulted primarily from the small egg plant made in 1965. Richards pointed out that only 600,000 eggs were planted that year due a small chinook run and the short supply of eggs.

The highest previous return was 990 chinook during 1968. This was from open stream egg plants. Indications are that the run returning in 1970, which will result primarily from two million eggs placed in hatching channels during 1966, could be larger than this year's run.

Richard stated that if returns continue to increase, the Department will consider a chinook sport fishery on the Clearwater River in the next few years.

RATE OF P. L. 480 PURCHASE AUTHORIZATION INCREASES

During April more Food for Freedom purchases of American farm products were authorized than during the entire first quarter of 1969, according to reports received by Chairman Clarence A. Jensen, of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Latah County Committee.

Between April 1 and May 2, P. L. 480 (Food for Freedom law) purchase authorizations for over 2.2 million tons were announced. This compares with 2.1 million tons of American farm products for which authorizations were issued from January 1 through March 31.

More than 90 per cent of this tonnage was authorized for purchase of wheat or wheat flour and other grain the chairman said. All purchases for P. L. 480 shipments abroad are made by traders buying on the open market.

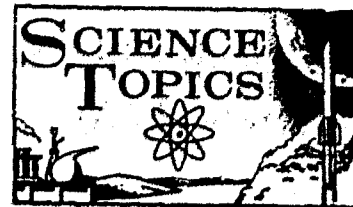
Purchase authorizations issued for wheat during April totaled more than 30 million bushels. These included: hard winter wheat, over 18.2 million bushels; white wheat, almost 8.5 million bushels; soft red or soft white wheat, more than 3.3 million bushels; durum wheat, about 110,000 bushels; and soft red wheat, about 55 bushels.

Over 168,000 tons of wheat flour were authorized for purchase.

Other P. L. 480 grain purchases authorizations during the April 1-May 2 period included: Over 17.5 million bushels of grain sorghum; almost 8.2 million bushels of rice; and more than 2.6 million bushels of corn.

Other American farm products included in the April P. L. 480 purchase authorizations were: Vegetable (soybean and cottonseed) oil; non-fat dry milk; sweetened condensed milk; cotton, cotton fabric, inedible tallow, unmanufactured tobacco and cattle hides.

Eighteen Nations received purchase authorizations: Bolivia, Brazil, Ceylon, Chile, Congo, Dominican Re-



EARLY MAN WASN'T A 'SWINGER'

MAJOR CLUES to the mystery of the evolution of man may be given by the fingers of an ape's hand, says a University of Chicago biologist. Unlike men, all great apes display certain anatomical features helpful for tree living—such as hands with long, curved fingers and relatively weak thumbs.

"The basic adaptations of man's early ancestors probably never resembled closely those of any present day ape," he said. "Furthermore, man and ape have followed their own evolutionary paths for a long time, adapting in different ways." Man's emergence as a separate family may date back as far as 25 million years. If this theory is correct, man is a more distant relative of the modern apes than some scientists have supposed. Even so, the scientist, believes that African apes are man's closest living relatives.

A POLYVINYL GELATIN with the consistency of human flesh has been developed by researchers at the University of Michigan. When formed into pads and cushions it shows great promise for becoming a major new aid for handicapped persons, paralytics, and possibly athletes. The gel is a soft, nonabrasive pad that acts like human fatty tissue. It can be made into seat cushions, mattresses, and brace pads.

MARS—the Red Planet—changes markedly with its seasons, reports a University of Texas astronomer. He said that one of the main observable features on Mars is the seasonal fluctuation in the size of the polar caps. When the polar caps shrink in size, they apparently evaporate directly from a solid state into a gaseous state without first becoming a liquid, indicating they are probably compressed of dry ice (solid carbon dioxide).

DEVELOPMENT of new lightweight alloy should enable tank trucks to carry larger quantities of products such as cryogenic gases, says Chemetron Corporation, Chicago. The maximum gross weight now permitted on most highways is 73,200 pounds. Reducing the weight of the transport equipment will, of course, increase the weight of the payload allowed.

GLACIERS are a potentially important water, reports a U. S. Geological Survey glaciologist. He says that glaciers are one of the few sources of water that remain unexploited and that with the advance of civilization into the subtropical regions more attention should be paid to these ice masses. "About three-fourths of all the fresh water in the world—equivalent to about 60 years' precipitation over the entire globe—is locked in glacier ice," he said.

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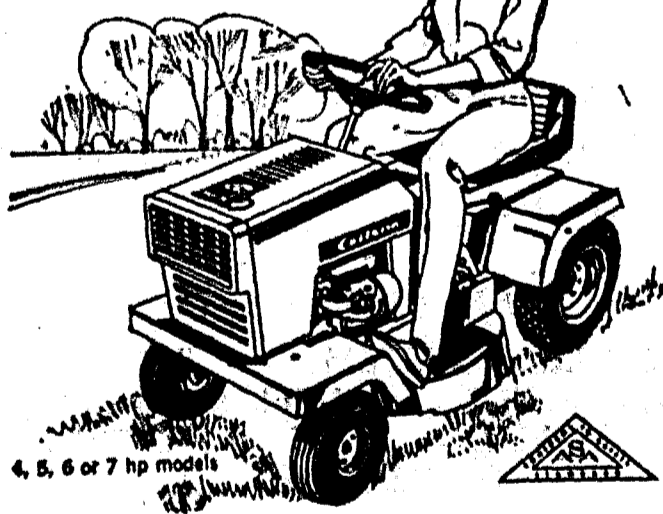

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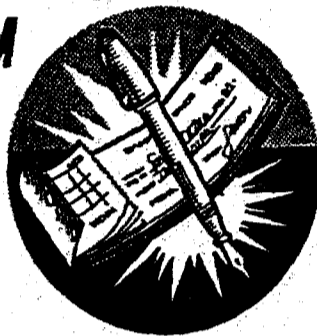
