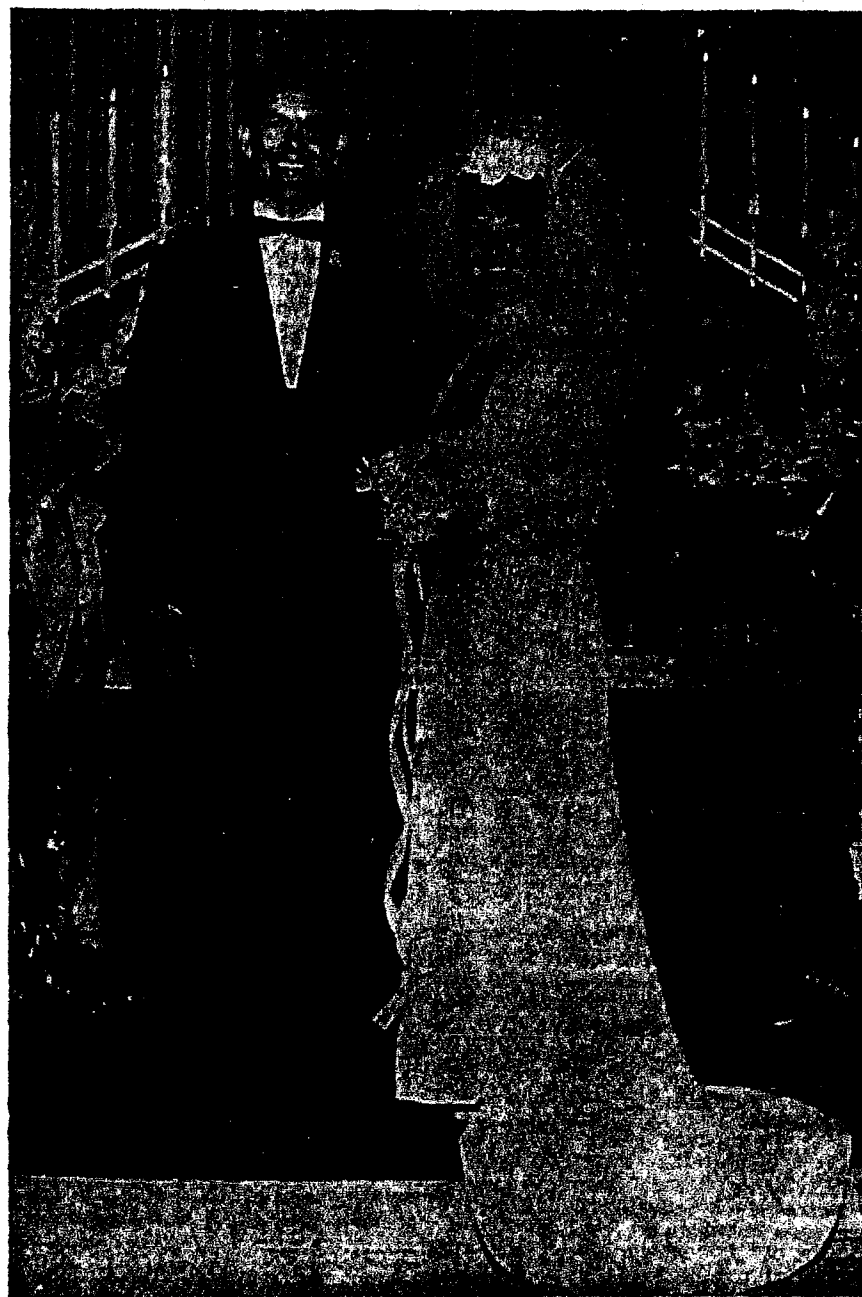


Stevens - Bakke Vows Exchanged In Lewiston Church June 14

ESCAPES INJURY AUTO CRASH

Janine Holsington, 19, Moscow, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Holsington of Kendrick escaped with only minor cuts and bruises after a fiery two-car collision on Highway 8 near Deary Saturday completely destroyed the car she was driving.

Robert Dale Olson, 29, Deary, the driver of the other car, was still listed in critical condition in a Spokane hospital where he was transferred after first being treated at Gritman.

The accident was investigated by Latah Deputy Sheriff John Edwards after it occurred three miles south of Deary shortly before 6:30 p. m.

Edwards said Olson was heading toward Lewiston when the two vehicles collided. The force of the impact whipped the cars around. The Holsington car remained on the highway; his came to a stop on the shoulder of the road.

The rear of one car slammed into that of the other and a gasoline tank exploded. Olson was flung to the pavement at impact. Moments later, the fuel tank of the other car exploded and both cars were engulfed in flames.

Miss Holsington was able to get clear of her car and away from the fire. She was taken to Gritman and treated for a cut on the face and knee.

ONLY .83 IN. RAIN

Despite the cool, dark weather of last week, only .83 inches of rain fell during June in the Genesee area, reported John Luedke, who maintains a rain gauge for the Soil Conservation Service.

This is almost an inch less than that of last June when 1.82 inches of moisture fell during the 30 day period. Rainfall in 1967 was 2.1 in. and in 1966 totalled 1.22 inches.

If you want to plan a picnic in June that is free of rain—go on the 4th, 9th or 21st of June, said Mr. Luedke—there has been no rain on those three days for 15 years. This might be of interest to the Deary Strawberry Festival folks, who always seem to choose wet days.

His family reports, "It's mighty good to see him!"

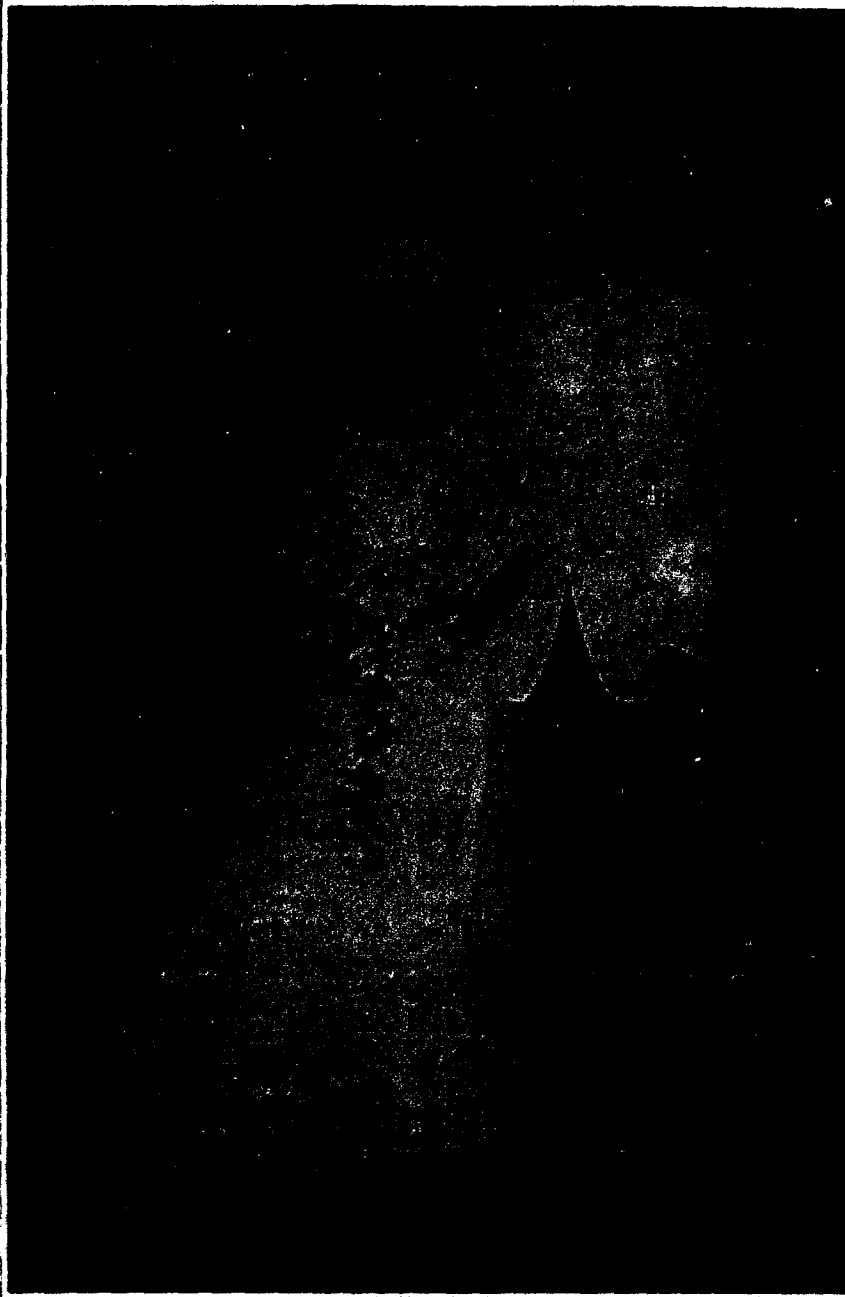

CHI RHO GROUP SPEND WEEK END IN SPOKANE

GENESEE—On Friday afternoon, June 6, a group of Junior High students from the Genesee Community Church Chi Rho, took a weekend trip to Spokane. The group included: Cindy Nelson, Ron Nichols, Anita Bakken, Dale Anderson, Chris Wishard, Curt Hermann, Sally Purcell, Craig Kanikkeberg, Kathy Bennett, and Jeff Boyd. Mrs. Everett Wishard and Mrs. J. P. Hermann went as chaperones.

The group's first stop was at the New Contemporary Jewish Temple, in Spokane where they attended services that were led in a Hebrew chant. They also saw scrolls of the Bible including the Torah. The hymnals were printed back to front rather than the traditional front to back with English translation.

Following the services, the young people went to Zephyr Lodge on Liberty Lake outside of Spokane where they spent the night and helped the caretaker with chores on Saturday morning.

In the afternoon the group traveled back to Spokane to St. John's Episcopal Cathedral. Here they attended a performance entitled, "The Improvisations of Contemporary Life," put on by the Evolutionary Theatre Company of Seattle.

A tour of the Gothic Cathedral followed. Of special interest, the group noted stained glass windows that depicted scenes of the history of Christianity through time to the actual building of the Cathedral just after World War II. These included many incidents that have occurred in North west history.

They also saw large spike iron nails that had been silvered and mounted to form a cross that hung at the sanctuary front. The nails came from the Coventry Cathedral in England, with whom St. John's became affiliated in October, 1968. The ends of all the pews were hand carved wood designs, each one different, including one on the front of the pulpit. The main sanctuary was flanked by three chapels just off-side, that represent each of the three congregations that merged to build the Cathedral. Only reachable from within the Cathedral is a small walled garden with a view of the city. Also noted was a large pipe organ that had three sets of pipes, each set being located at a different place in the sanctuary.

Before returning to Zephyr Lodge for the night, the group went swimming at the Spokane Y. M. C. A.

On Sunday morning the student chapel at Gonzaga University was visited. Although they did not attend one of the regular folk masses because none was being said that day, the group was able to see how University students had remodeled the chapel during the past two years. During regular folk masses, the congregation stands before the altar as there are no pews in the brightly colored chapel.

Next visited was a Greek church service at the Greek Orthodox church. This service emphasized the congregation as spectators to a ritual rather than congregational participation. Worship was led by a priest, two altar boys, and a bishop who chanted the Greek. The altar was enclosed behind sliding glass doors displaying colored icons that portrayed church saints, Christ's disciples, and the Last Supper.

Before returning to Genesee, the group revisited St. John's Cathedral to see the carillon chimes in the cross tower of the cathedral, a special treat which had been specially arranged for the group. They were able to see the 49 bells move as the carillon-ner played them on a special keyboard.

The young people said there were many different times during their trip that they noticed actions, thoughts, symbols, etc. that were similar to their own religion. They concluded that all religions express similar beliefs only through different media.

1 lb. can baked beans
¼ cup catsup
2 T. vinegar

Heat oven to 350 degrees
Sauté onion and garlic in butter for 5 minutes. Stir in sugar, mustard, beans, catsup, and vinegar. Mix well. Season if necessary. Pour into 2-quart casserole and bake covered for 25 minutes. 8 servings.

Salmon Permit Cards

Chinook anglers are reminded that they must have in possession a valid 1969 salmon-steelhead permit card when fishing for these species. They must record the month, date, and place where all catches are made immediately after landing fish. Resident youngsters under 14 years of age are exempted from license requirements but not salmon-steelhead permit card regulations. In lieu of license numbers to record, vendors must write "under 14" across the tops of permit cards. Nonresident boys and girls who have not reached their 14th birthday are required to fish with licensed fishermen. Salmon or steelhead catches of juveniles must be recorded on permit cards and included in the bag limit of licensed fishermen. Trout and other game fish likewise are counted as part of the bag limit or licensed fishermen.

TEN NORTH IDAHO COUNTIES RECEIVE HELP FROM EMERGENCY FUND

Ten North Idaho counties will receive state help from Gov. Don Samuelson's Emergency fund to pay half of the extra-ordinary cost incurred by local units of government combating the snow emergency of last winter.

The counties include: Benewah, Bonner, Boundary, Clearwater, Idaho, Kootenai, Latah, Lewis, Nez Perce, and Shoshone.

In a letter to County Commissioners the Governor stated that sufficient funds were available for the state to help those counties that were severely hit by snow during the winter. "Fortunately, we escaped a very potentially dangerous flood condition with sufficient funds for this payment and for emergencies through the end of the 1969-71 biennium."

Samuelson said. "The adjusted total cost to all these counties above and beyond their normal snow removal costs is \$271,434.24. The state payments for reimbursement is \$135,717.00. The distribution of these funds to the various cities, highway, and road districts is based on reports of the Bureau of Public Accounts on above normal snow removal costs incurred by these units during the emergency. The state reimbursement is half these above normal costs as I hoped."

The Governor pointed out, that in order to simplify the disbursement of the payment, the total amount would be sent to the counties. The county in turn would disburse the payment to the cities, highway, and road districts that were given state aid.

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

ANNA M. ROSENAU OBSERVES 80th BIRTHDAY

Anna M. Rosenu celebrated her 80th birthday June 16 at the Lewiston Civic Club House with about 60 relatives and friends in attendance. A potluck dinner was held, followed by an afternoon reception.

Highlights from Mrs. Rosenu's life were presented in a program entitled, "Remembrances of Anna" in 1893 at the age of three she came to Idaho from Illinois with her parents, Herman and Marie Morscheck, brother, Fred, and sister, Della settling near Genesee. When she became of school age, she was tutored in English by a friend because her only spoken language was German. Since a school term was only for three months, she attended three different schools a year, two in the country and one in town. At fourteen years of age she was confirmed into the American Lutheran Church.

In 1907 Mrs. Rosenu graduated from high school in a class of five, and then attended the Lewiston Normal School, boarding in Clarkston and riding the ferry across the Snake River. Once when the Clearwater was too high for the ferries and the freight train bridge had just been constructed, she and her sister, Della, walked across the bridge on ties that hadn't yet been nailed down. On another occasion Christina Thuesen-Kauf and she walked up the Lewiston Hill, following the electric light poles to a dance at her grandparents' house, about five miles from Genesee.

Mrs. Rosenu's first teaching position was at Mt. Comfort Country School near Nez Perce, Idaho. Then she taught two years in Engle Country School and in Danielson Country School near Genesee, having about twenty-five pupils at each place.

On December 31, 1911, she married Gustave D. Rosenu. They lived on a farm three miles northeast of Genesee, and there were born five children, three of whom are now living.

In 1948 the Rosenu's retired and moved to Lewiston where Mrs. Rosenu still lives. Mr. Rosenu died in 1955. She is still active, participating in the Dorcas Class of Trinity Lutheran Church as well as attending services, tending her own lawn and flowers for which she recently got a Green Thumb award, crocheting for her grandchildren, and pickling huckleberries in the summer.

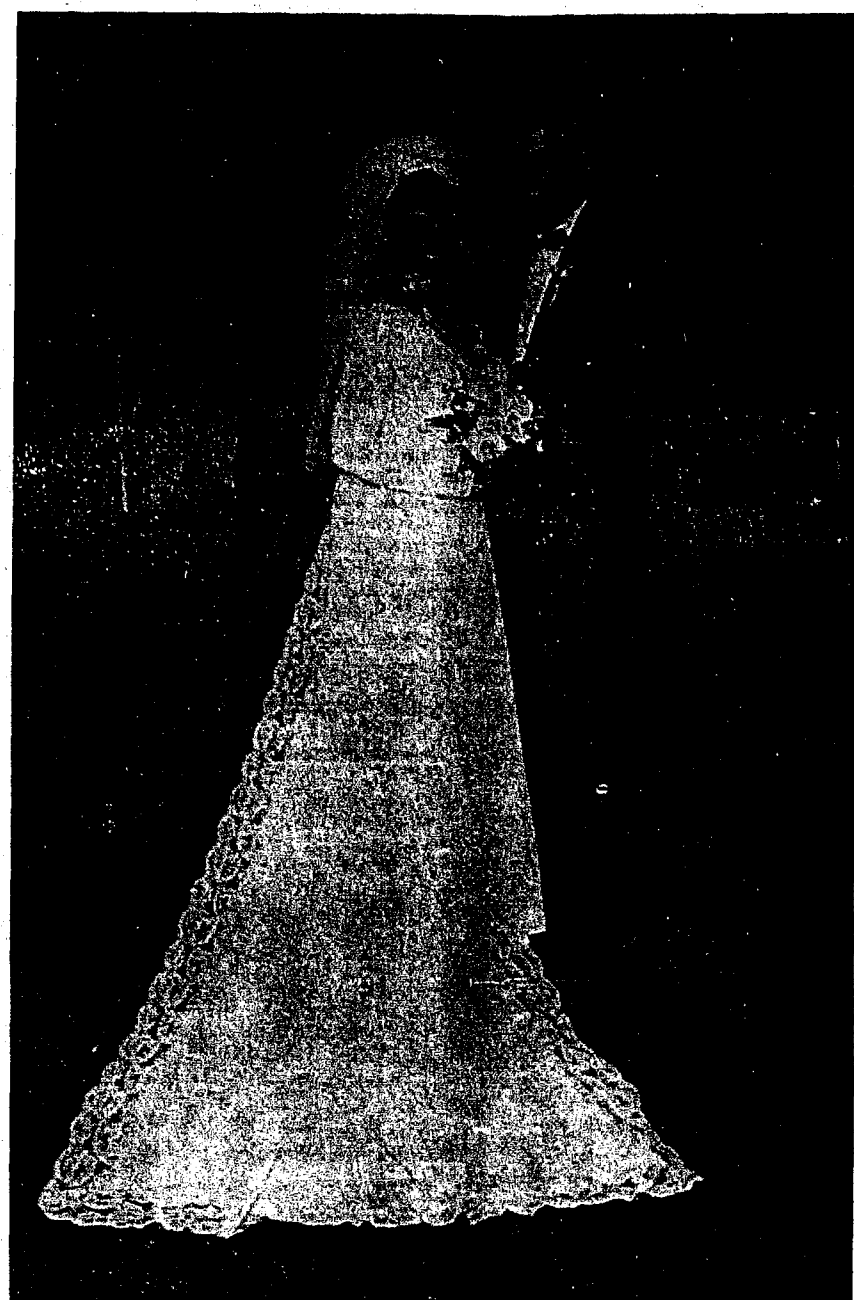
