## SPLIT TREE ENDANGERED KARAVAN CAMPERS

A near tragedy was averted by an alert camper in the Whitehouse Campground by the Lewis-Clark highway, in the Clearwater National Forest, 85 miles east of Kootskia, Friday afternoon, July 4.

Split from wind shake about 20 feet up from the root, a giant grand fir wavered precariously in the wind above 10 camper-trailers parked in the overflow area. The vacationers were part of an organized camping club from Kendrick known as the Kendrick Campers.

Heroine, Janice Whittinger, 12, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Whittinger, Southwick, heard an unusual eerie squeak around the base of the tree where, she and two other girls were playing with a chipmunk. Upon checking further, the girl, along with teen-agers Eva Wilken and Jolene Brammer, Kendrick, noticed a long split opening and closing in response to a steady stiff breeze.

After being momentarily frozen with fear from the girls' report, the group rallied and took direct action. Despite the imminent danger of property damage, injury, or loss of life should the tree fall on the trailers nestled beneath it, the campers didn't panic. Rather, they organized an orderly retreat out of the area in less than 10 minutes.

In response to their urgent request for help, Powell district ranger, Jim Jordan; dispatcher, Al Crouser; and "Smoky" Bob Schultz rushed to the scene removing the source of danger by felling the tree. It was bucked and wood stacked in short order, thanks to the enthusiastic efforts of the Kendrick group assisting in the mop-up operation. Seems there is more than one way to get a wood supply in the campground these days.

## WATER BALLET GROUP FORMING

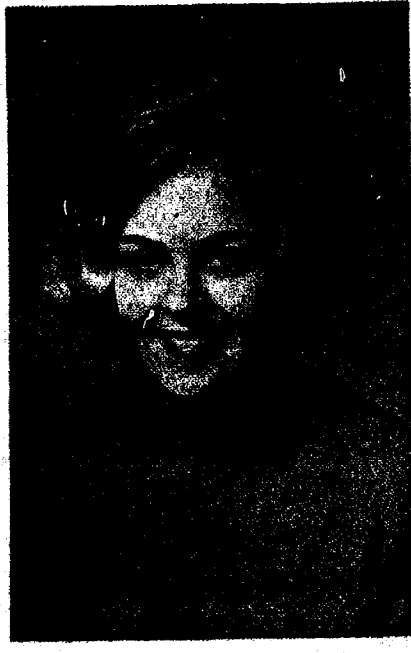

## GENESEE SWIM LESSONS JULY 14-25

GENESEE—There is still time to register children for swimming lessons which will be held mornings at the Moscow Pool from July 14 through July 25, excluding Saturdays and Sundays. Call Mrs. Charles Swanson, ATLAS 5-3941 or Mrs. Dick Schornhorst, ATLAS 5-3111. It is preferred that children have their season tickets before Friday (tomorrow-July 11). The Genesee School District will provide the bus or busses to transport the youngsters, with qualified drivers. The Genesee Firemen will pay for the insurance and Genesee mothers will be chaperoning on the bus and at the pool. Swimming bus will leave Monday at 8:15 from the School Bus garage. The bus will return between 11:30 and noon.

The swimming instructors are Red Cross trained. Tickets this year are ages, 6-12, \$5.15; ages 13-17, \$6.18; ages 18 and over \$7.21, and family tickets are \$17.45. The tickets are good for the entire season, and there is no other charge for lessons. Hours of operation of the Moscow Pool are 1:30 to 5 p. m. each day open to public swimming; 5 p. m. to 7 p. m. family swim, 18 and over, and 7 p. m. to 9 p. m., 13 years of age and over. Swimming lessons are in the morning. The pool season usually runs through August.

Several rules will be followed and it is requested that the students understand them.

1. No running on the bus. No hitting or throwing of objects.
2. Children will stay seated at all times.
3. No littering of the bus with candy paper etc.
4. If a child is unable to attend a session, please call Mrs. Dick Schornhorst, ATLAS 5-3111 at least an hour before bus time.
5. Rules at the pool will be followed. No horseplay in the dressing rooms. No running around the pool. No street shoes in or around the pool.
6. Rules will be enforced. Any child not obeying will forfeit the privileges of attending.

## FRED STEDMAN TO RETIRE AFTER 25 YEARS WITH P. O.

Fred O. Stedman will retire soon after 25 years and three months at the Kendrick Post Office—17 years as Postmaster and 8 years 3 months as rural carrier.

Born at Yuma, Michigan January 4, 1901, he came west with his parents, Mr and Mrs. N. H. Stedman, settling at Cosmopolis, Washington, where he completed grade school and two years of high school, graduating from the Weatherwax High School at Aberdeen, Washington in June of 1921.

After graduation he worked as second cook in the logging camps around Aberdeen, before coming to Lewiston in 1924. In Lewiston he secured employment at Potlatch Forest, Inc., in the shipping sheds and was transferred to the 4-square department when it was established. He had the privilege of labeling the first package of 4-square lumber packaged in that plant.

Mr. Stedman returned to Aberdeen for two years and then came to Kendrick with the family, due to illness of his wife's father, Samuel R. Stanton. In 1939 a house fire destroyed the home and a month later a forest fire destroyed all that was left. He rebuilt his home from lumber salvaged from the Fairview school house, which he had purchased. He farmed until April 1, 1944.

On April 1, 1944 Mr. Stedman was appointed postmaster at Kendrick relieving Clyde Dougharty, who was retiring because of poor health. He held that position for 17 years, until April of 1961 when he transferred to the rural route upon the retirement of Everett W. Fraser.

He was married to Geneva Stanton, daughter of Samuel and Ellen Stanton, at Kendrick September 4, 1927. She worked as his clerk for 16 years, retiring in December 1965 after 20 years because of ill health. They have two children, Barbara Joy Comyn, of Seattle, Washington and Rev. Samuel N. Stedman, of Sweetwater, Idaho.

Mr. Stedman says he'll join the "Honey Do" club with Marvin Long—"you know, "honey do" this and "honey do" that, and also do some fishing, camping and gardening.

**PEOPLE ARE EATING  
MORE MEAT**

Boise—People are eating more red meat and the trend is expected to continue, an economist of the University of Idaho extension service said today in the June issue of "Economic Facts for Idaho Agriculture." Quen Facts for Idaho Agriculture said tin Banks said consumer demand has been unusually strong in 1968, the average was about 45 pounds per capita during the first three months. That is an increase from the same period a year ago.

January-March consumption of pork was up about 3 per cent, beef consumption was slightly larger. There was smaller consumption of lamb and veal.

Marketings of fed cattle continue strong, the summary said. Winter shipments were 6 per cent larger than a year ago. Cattle feeders in April they were planning an increase in spring marketing. Developments are being carried out. Shipments out of feedlots are expected to continue large in the summer.

Western feeders are accounting for nearly all the increase, the analysis said. Feeders in the Corn Belt plan slight decreases. Fed cattle prices during the summer are expected to continue well above a year earlier. They were strong in April and May when some analysts predicted weakness to develop. Market weights remain low. Cattle have been moving from feedlots to packers as soon as they were ready.

Hog slaughter in July-September is expected to continue moderately above a year ago. Hog prices will likely average about what they were last summer in spite of larger pork prices. Continued rises in pork prices, the economist said, will depend substantially on growth in consumer incomes and high employment.

The hog-corn price ratio is expected to continue favorable to producers.

**DEPT. OF LAW ENFORCEMENT**

Disturbed by the number of vehicle accidents and highway fatalities occurring in Idaho, State Rep. Joe N. Wagner, D-Lewiston, asks "What is wrong, and who is to blame? What can we do to curtail this deadly and costly traffic menace?"

Pointing to the 300 who lost their lives in traffic crashes in 1968, Wagner said, "No doubt the refusal of many motorists to accept the responsibilities that go with the privileges of driving is the major cause of the accidents."

"Lack of good judgment and pure carelessness on the part of drivers contribute to many of the worst accidents."

"With the tremendous increase in highway traffic today, it is essential that everyone drive with extreme caution. However, I believe if steps outlined in our Idaho Traffic Safety Commission safety program are carried out we can start to correct this highway's manners indifference — if the motoring public will cooperate."

The representative said every motorist should realize his number may be up next on the traffic accident list and should work towards finding a solution to the state's annual highway slaughter.

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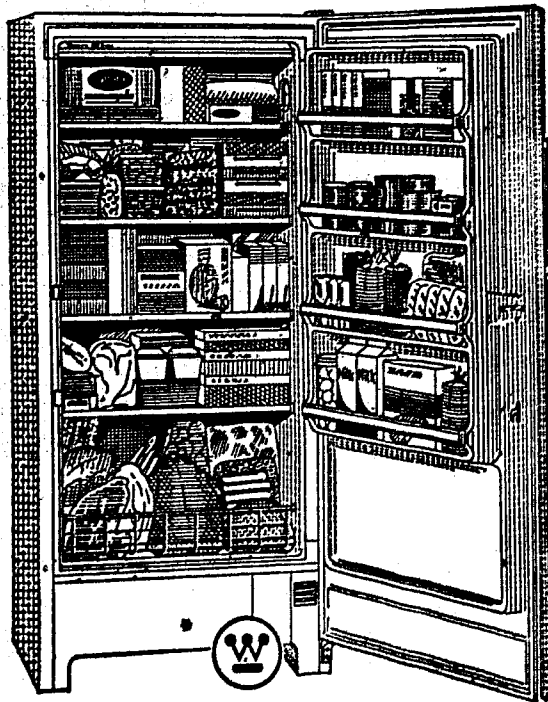

**PEOPLE ARE EATING  
MORE MEAT**

Boise—People are eating more red meat and the trend is expected to continue, an economist of the University of Idaho extension service said today in the June issue of "Economic Facts for Idaho Agriculture." Quentin Banks said consumer demand has been unusually strong in 1969, the average was about 45 pounds per capita during the first three months. That is an increase from the same period a year ago.

January-March consumption of beef pork was up about 3 per cent, but consumption was slightly larger. There was smaller consumption of lamb and veal.

Marketings of fed cattle continue strong, the summary said. Winter shipments were 6 per cent larger than a year ago. Cattle feeders indicated early in April they were planning an increase in spring marketings. Developments in April and May show these intentions are being carried out. Shipments out of feedlots are expected to continue large in the summer.

Western feeders are accounting for nearly all the increase, the analysis said. Feeders in the Corn Belt plan slight decreases. Fed cattle prices during the summer are expected to continue well above a year earlier. They were strong in April and May when some analysts predicted weakness to develop. Market weights remain low. Cattle have been moving from feedlots to packers as soon as they were ready.

Hog slaughter in July-September is expected to continue moderately above a year ago. Hog prices will likely average about what they were last summer in spite of larger pork prices. Continued rises in pork prices, the economist said, will depend substantially on growth in consumer incomes and high employment.

The hog-corn price ratio is expected to continue favorable to producers.

**DEPT. OF LAW ENFORCEMENT**

Disturbed by the number of vehicle accidents and highway fatalities occurring in Idaho, State Rep. Joe N. Wagner, D-Lewiston, asks "What is wrong, and who is to blame? What can we do to curtail this deadly and costly traffic menace?"

Pointing to the 300 who lost their lives in traffic crashes in 1968, Wagner said, "No doubt the refusal of many motorists to accept the responsibilities that go with the privileges of driving is the major cause of the accidents."

"Lack of good judgment and pure carelessness on the part of drivers contribute to many of the worst accidents."

"With the tremendous increase in highway traffic today, it is essential that everyone drive with extreme caution. However, I believe if steps outlined in our Idaho Traffic Safety Commission safety program are carried out we can start to correct this highway's manners indifference—if the motoring public will cooperate."

The representative said every motorist should realize his number may be up next on the traffic accident list and should work towards finding a solution to the state's annual highway slaughter.

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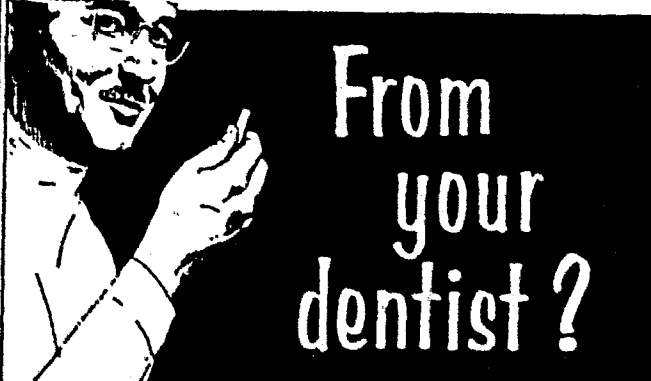

In finding gainful employment. 23 new jobs were listed with his office during the week, and 40 remained unfilled at the end of the week. Hartstein noted that all of the available jobs called for full time workers, most with training and experience. Secretaries and TV repairmen topped the list, with several openings in each line of work. Bookkeepers, salesmen, cooks, waitresses, and domestic workers were also needed, as well as carpenter apprentices and bricklayers.

Twenty-five jobless workers filed new claims for unemployment insurance during the week, according to another part of Hartstein's report. He said most of these were workers who were idled as a result of the end of classes at nearby schools and colleges. A few workers who had been laid off from area sawmills also filed claims for unemployment insurance during the week. The total number of workers in the county seeking employment benefits rose from 74 to 91. This compares with 70 for the same period one year ago. Most of the increase was in the Moscow area where there are now 52 active claimants with 48 last week, and 43 a year ago. In Genesee there are now 7 persons seeking jobless pay, a week ago there were 4, and a year ago also 4. Seventeen persons from the Troy-Deary-Bovill area are seeking benefits, compared with 12 last week and 13 last year. Fourteen checks are going into the Potlatch area, there were 10 last week, and 9 at this time a year ago. One person from the Kendrick area is currently receiving benefits, the same as a year ago.

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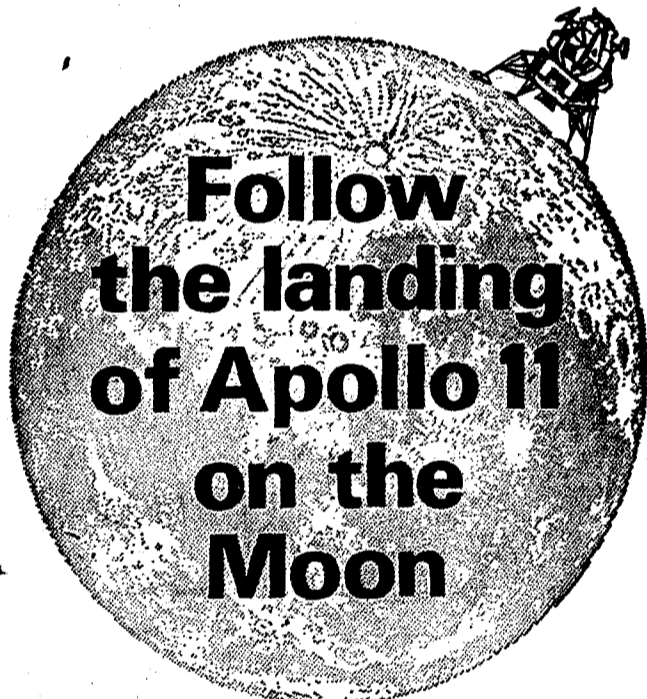

**YOUR GAME DEPARTMENT**

**Owyhee Sheep Hunt**  
Bighorn Sheep Hunt 541 will be in the southwestern corner of Owyhee County on the north side of the East Fork of the Owyhee River between the mouth of Battle Creek and the mouth of Deep Creek. Actually, the area extends from the bottom of the East Fork canyon to a couple of miles out of the plateau from the rim. The dates are September 27 - October 5.

The most direct route from the Snake River is along Poison Creek Road from Grandview to Big Springs ranch, a popular sage grouse shooting grounds then along Squaw Meadows and Dickshooter road to the confluence of Battle Creek and the East Fork of the Owyhee River. Another four-wheel road crosses Juniper Mountain on the northwest and eventually reaches the mouth of Deep Creek after crossing several tributary forks of the main Owyhee River.

**Goslings Go To Killarney**  
For the third year in a row, Canada goose goslings have been transplanted from eastern Idaho to Killarney Wildlife Refuge on the lower Coeur d'Alene River near Lake Killarney. Twenty goslings were liberated in 1967, 52 last year and 16 recently. 11 goslings of this year's release are half-grown and can shift for themselves. Five others are small, and must be pen-raised for a few weeks. The goslings, and previous transplants were removed from a captive flock of Canada geese at Tautpous Park at Idaho Falls.

The purpose of the transplants is to establish a nesting population at Killarney Wildlife Management Area, and to enlarge local hunting opportunities before the big honkers move down the flyway to wintering grounds for migratory waterfowl. There has been no verified reproduction from previous goose transplants to Killarney, but one two-year-old hen is suspected of having brought off a brood this year. The average goose is sexually mature at three years of age, although some successfully breed in their second year.

**EARTH-TO-MOON LASER 'RULER' TO BE TRIED**

ONE OF THE LONGEST and most accurate "rulers" in existence will be bounced off a reflector to be from the earth to the moon. The ruler is actually a laser beam that will be bounced off a reflector to be placed on the moon's surface by Apollo 11 astronauts Neil A. Armstrong and Edwin E. Aldrin Jr. July 20. Instruments for generating the beams are now being installed at the University of Texas' McDonald Observatory atop Mount Locke in W. Texas. Cooperating in the experiment are the NASA Goddard Space Flight Center and the University of Maryland.
