**EARTH-TO-MOON LASER 'RULER' TO BE TRIED**  
ONE OF THE LONGEST and most accurate "rulers" in existence will be bounced off a reflector to be from the earth to the moon. The ruler is actually a laser beam that will be bounced off a reflector to be placed on the moon's surface by Apollo 11 astronauts Neil A. Armstrong and Edwin E. Aldrin Jr. July 20. George Brocks, Jr. of Brocks and Sons, said his firm started taking deliveries of Alaska peas and some rape seed last week, but he added it would be the middle of next week before deliveries were coming in steady.

Agrow Seed Company in Genessee has been taking seed peas since last week and some of the farmers out on the Rim, who are growing under Agrow contract this year, have finished their harvest. Other Rim-rocker farmers are well into pea harvest operations, but this is always a very early section and Agrow said it would be next week before most of the fields are ready.

Genessee Union Warehouse has also taken some of the early peas and small grain, but they, too, feel the main harvest is about one week away, if the weather conditions remain the same.

While the rain has stopped and the fields are now dry, the temperatures have been dipping down in the middle and high thirties on several mornings this week in the higher elevations. A report from Pullman Tuesday morning put that city as the coldest spot in the nation with 34 degrees!

## WHEAT ACREAGE MAY BE REDUCED

An additional ten per cent cut in allowable acreage is expected under the national Wheat Allotment program, it was learned here yesterday at a meeting of the executive committee of the Idaho State Wheat Growers Association.

Earl Hoopes, Rexburg, vice president from Idaho of the National Association of Wheat Growers, said he had received predictions from Washington, D. C., sources that the acreage cut would be imposed on growers if the Substitution Clause will remain in effect, allowing growers to substitute wheat for feed grains and remain in compliance with the regulations.

Robert Henry, Boise, transportation consultant to the ISWGA, explained the status of a bill now before Congress which will update size and weight restrictions for trucks using the Interstate Highway System. The bill has enthusiastic support from western wheat producers.

Henry said that highway trucking standards now in effect were written in 1948 and designed for roads of that day. Passage of the bill would greatly increase transportation competition and efficiency. Henry asserted he added that bill provisions would be highly beneficial to the economy of Idaho.

Wynne Henderson, Nezperce, ISWGA vice president, reported to the executive committee that he and other wheat growers in Lewis County were backing a protest against agricultural land tax assessments as recently raised by growers in Nezperce county.

Henderson said a court case would charge tax officials with unfair assessment practices in estimating value of agricultural property.

Harold West, Boise, executive secretary, announced that the film on Idaho wheat growers "Old Mr. In-Between" had now been viewed by nearly 20 million persons in TV audiences all over the country.

## IDAHO BUSINESS GOOD IS REPORT

Business in Idaho for the first half of 1968 was rated good to excellent, and the outlook for the third quarter is generally good.

This is the report of the quarterly First Security Bank News Letter being distributed this week. It was announced by W. J. Phar and James Hoogland, managers of First Security at Genessee and Kendrick.

The News Letter is edited by Dr. Elroy Nelson, First Security vice president and economist.

The publication notes that leading indicators recorded some decline in May and June and some slow-down in the pace of national and local economy for the third quarter is anticipated.

Personal income for the first half of 1968 exceeded \$1 billion, and 8.7 per cent increase over the first half of 1968. Higher employment and average wages accounted for the major portion of the increase, reports First Security.

The general outlook for agriculture in Idaho continues to be good to excellent. Cash receipts from farm marketing during the first half of the year were considerably above the \$204 million of 1968. Prices of all livestock and livestock products accelerated in June, with meat animal prices increasing to 24 per cent above June of 1968.

Lamb prices are also considerably higher primarily due to a decreased supply. Imports however, which are not subject to quotas, are considerably above last year's levels and higher lamb prices should continue thru December. Potato prices in the Gem state have been good to excellent and are considerably above those of 1968. Preliminary data indicate fall and summer potato crops at the same levels as last year. Potato processing through April utilized nearly 32 million cwt., according to First Security.

Despite heavy rains which caused considerable decrease in sweet cherry output, fruit production should double, while pears and tart cherry production should triple that of 1968. Sugar beet output is expected to exceed last year's crop as well.

Lumber production for the first four months of 1968 was reported at 543.9 million feet board measure, slightly higher than one year earlier. Prices of lumber and mill products increased from April 1968 to April of this year but declined rather significantly in May and June. Paper production for all types of paper has shown an increase.

Manufacturing output, especially in metals, potatoes, and paper and food products, has shown considerable increase over last year, according to First Security.

The News Letter reports total employment in the state during May was 282,500, an increase of 6,000 from 1968. Agricultural employment was down 900, but non-agricultural employment was up nearly 7,000. Increases were also shown in the mining and construction industries.

 Overall odds against drawing an antelope permit averaged nearly 4-1 in recent years, 10-1 in more popular hunts. Odds against drawing a moose permit average as much as 15-1, depending on the hunt. High odds also prevail against drawing permits for some mountain goat hunts, a few bighorn sheep permits, and even controlled elk and deer hunts. Thus, it is unlawful for any person whose name was drawn to hunt antelope in 1967 or 1968 to apply for or use an antelope permit in 1969. It also is unlawful for any person who ever killed a moose on any previous hunt in Idaho to apply for or use a 1969 permit.  
 Applications for all controlled hunts must be received at the Boise office of the Idaho Fish and Game Department not later than 5 p. m. July 16, or postmarked not later than midnight July 16. The first public drawing will be held in Boise July 23, 1969 at 2 p. m.

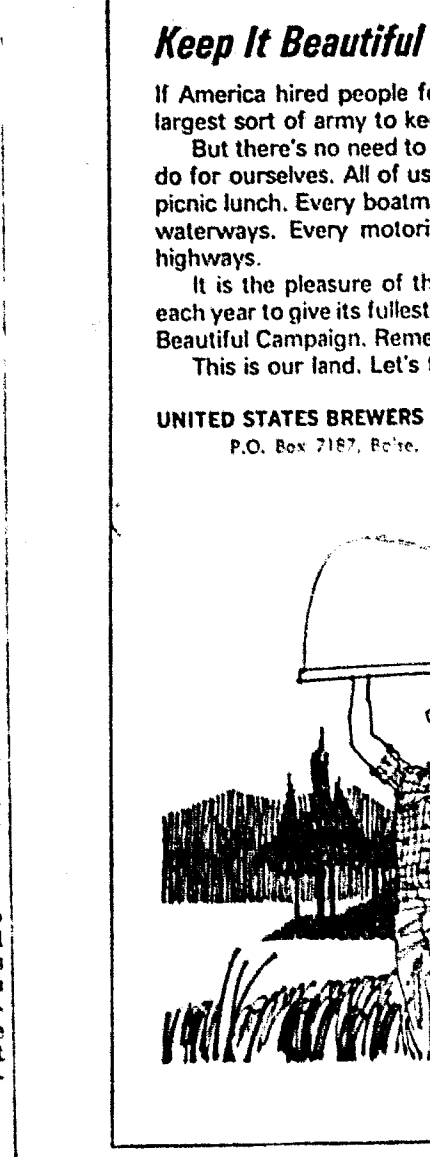

**CATTLE OWNERS URGED TO MAKE BUSINESS PROFIT-CENTERED**

Cattle owners not only have an obligation to provide beef for today's population, but they must be concerned about feeding the peoples of the world in the future, Dr. Frank Baker, chairman of the Animal Science Department, University of Nebraska, told an audience at the U. of Idaho Thursday.

Addressing the National Poiled Hereford "Pattern for Progress" Clinic being held on the Idaho campus, Baker urged his listeners to "Accept Socrates' statement that 'the unexamined life is not worth living.' This cattle industry must be examined to find a better way to meet these needs."

Baker pointed out to his audience that the purebred breeder received only two per cent of the gross income of the beef industry. "If you find the better way in purebred cattle production, then registrations, tenure and returns will increase."

After listing the numerous cattlemen's organizations that most of his audience were members of, he condemned the bickering are arguing going on between the different organizations and segments of the cattle industry.

"Perhaps it is time for the beef industry to rise above the vested interests of individuals in the industry and plan together for the mutual

benefit of the industry," Baker said.
