

## BAKER HOME LOST IN TUESDAY FIRE

Tuesday morning, July 22, between 9:00 and 10:30 a. m. the home belonging to Mrs. Winnie Baker, on the old school house hill, was completely destroyed by a fire of undetermined origin. No furnishings or personal possessions were saved from the fire.

The Kendrick Fire Department responded quickly to the fire alarm, but the house burned so rapidly, all they could do was keep the fire from spreading to other nearby structures. The Juliaetta Fire Truck came to aid in the battle, but the fire had burned itself out and was under control.

The home was occupied by Mrs. Baker and her son Howard Baker. They were taken by J. K. ambulance to Dr. Christensen's office where Howard was treated for burns on one arm and on the back of the neck. Mrs. Baker was burned on her arm and Howard was then taken to St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston—Mrs. Baker by J. K. ambulance, driven by E. M. White and Bob Magnuson. Mrs. White followed the ambulance, talking Howard in her car.

The fire also burned telephone cable near the Baker residence, cutting off phone service to several homes on the hill in Kendrick and service to several surrounding ridges—Cedar Ridge, Bear Ridge and the Southwick area. The phone company immediately went to work to restore this phone service.

Only the Washington Water Power light line to the Baker residence was burned—Chair Reed, local WWP representative—taped this off and no other light lines were damaged.

**Grass Fire Monday**

Monday afternoon, the fire alarm was sounded about 5:00 p. m. for a grass fire located by a shed behind the Potlatch Telephone Company office. The fire was extinguished before causing too much damage.

## NELSON BARN DESTROYED IN FIRE

GENESEE—A fire, apparently caused from faulty wiring, completely destroyed a large hay barn at the Adrian Nelson farm 1 1/2 miles east of Geneese Saturday afternoon.

Also lost in the blaze were 2500 bales of hay; 2 saddles, harness, and other small farm equipment.

Estimated loss is undetermined at this time.

The fire was first noticed by Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Stout who were passing the Nelson farm enroute home and saw smoke coming from the building. They aroused the Jay Nelson family, who reside on the farm, who immediately summoned the Geneese Volunteer Fire Department. Three engines responded to the call. After losing the barn, the fire fighters turned their attention to saving the machine shed, filled with farm equipment, located about 25 feet away.

The building was partially covered by insurance.

Mr. and Mrs. Adrian Nelson and Mr. and Mrs. Jay Nelson said Monday they were very grateful to the fire department for their quick response and efficiency in saving the nearby building which could have easily been lost. The Nelsons also thank neighbors and friends for their help in fighting the fire.

## PHILIP SCHOOLER, 81, PASSES JULY 18

GENESEE — Philip Schooler, 81, Lewiston and former Geneese resident passed away Friday at Coeur d'Alene where he was visiting his nephew, Howard Schooler. Death was attributed to a heart attack.

Mr. Schooler was born January 14, 1888 at Oneida, Kansas to Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Schooler. He came to the Moscow area with his family in 1905 and to Geneese in 1906.

He attended Geneese schools, and was one of 11 young men from Geneese who enlisted in Navy Aviation at Spokane in 1917 and entered boot camp together at San Diego, California. Enlisting with Schooler were Edward Hagen, Charles Gray, Harry Christenson, Fred Hove, Clarence Borgen, Will Wardrobe, Dick Green, Harry Schooler, Colin Wilson and Leon Larrabee.

A veteran of WWI, Mr. Schooler was a charter member of Bielenberg-Schooler American Legion Post 58 of Geneese.

On May 19, 1933 he married Kate Magee Vandenberg at Geneese. She passed away December 24, 1965.

The Schoolers farmed in the Rockford and Sprague, Washington area until his retirement in 1961 when they moved to Lewiston.

Phil was also employed for Potlatch Forests, Inc. at Headquarters and had done some trapping.

Survivors include a brother, Ben Schooler, of the Bahama Islands; two sisters, Adah Schooler Steltz of Pullman, Washington, and Idah Schooler Pauley, of Coral Gables, Florida, and several nephews and nieces.

Funeral services were held Wednesday from the Geneese Community church with the Rev. Lyman Winkle pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Coeur d'Alene officiating.

Burial was in the Geneese City Cemetery.

## BULLDOGS LOOK TO GRID CAMPAIGN

## 1969 WHEAT CROP WILL BE SMALLER

The Idaho wheat crop of 1969 will be substantially smaller than it has been the past two years, a University of Idaho extension economist said today in the July issue of "Economic Faces for Idaho Agriculture." Quentin D. Banks, marketing information specialist, noted that the federal crop reporting service indicated harvested acreage will be less than in 1967 and 1968 and that the yield is expected to be below the average of last year.

The official June estimate for winter wheat in 1969 was about 37 million bushels—19 percent less than last year's record. The forecast for spring wheat will be available later in July. Total U. S. wheat production was estimated at five per cent less than last year. However, storage stocks for carryover are substantially larger. Therefore, the total supply of wheat for domestic use and export will be substantially larger than it has been for several years.

Wheat prices have not shown much strength through the past marketing season, Banks said, and there is not much basis for encouragement in the present situation. However, he said prices may not fall quite as low this harvest season as they did last year in most wheat-producing areas of Idaho. Wet weather, damaged grain, and storage problems, all contributed to local marketing problems and depressed prices last year. Heavy livestock feeding and higher prices for feed grain are currently giving some support to wheat.

Barley prices have been above wheat prices in many Idaho communities during much of last year. Feeding wheat to livestock has increased and is an important factor in setting local wheat prices. This is expected to continue through much of the coming year. Livestock feeding has continued to expand in Idaho and through out the nation. Local demand for feed grain remains strong and it appears the use of wheat for livestock feed in Idaho will be high again this summer.

On the topic of cattle, the economist said slaughter cattle prices appeared to be easing off through the last week of June. This is causing some uneasiness, he said, about prices levels through the rest of the year. Marketings through May and June ran somewhat less than expected and were slightly below a year earlier. Increases in six states in the number of cattle on feed in May and June, along with lower marketings indicated some buildup in cattle on feed. Increase in slaughter weight of cattle marketed in recent weeks is also a matter of concern to feeders.

However, he said, consumer income are still high and demand for beef is holding strong. It seems reasonable to expect cattle prices to continue only slightly below mid-June levels through the summer months.

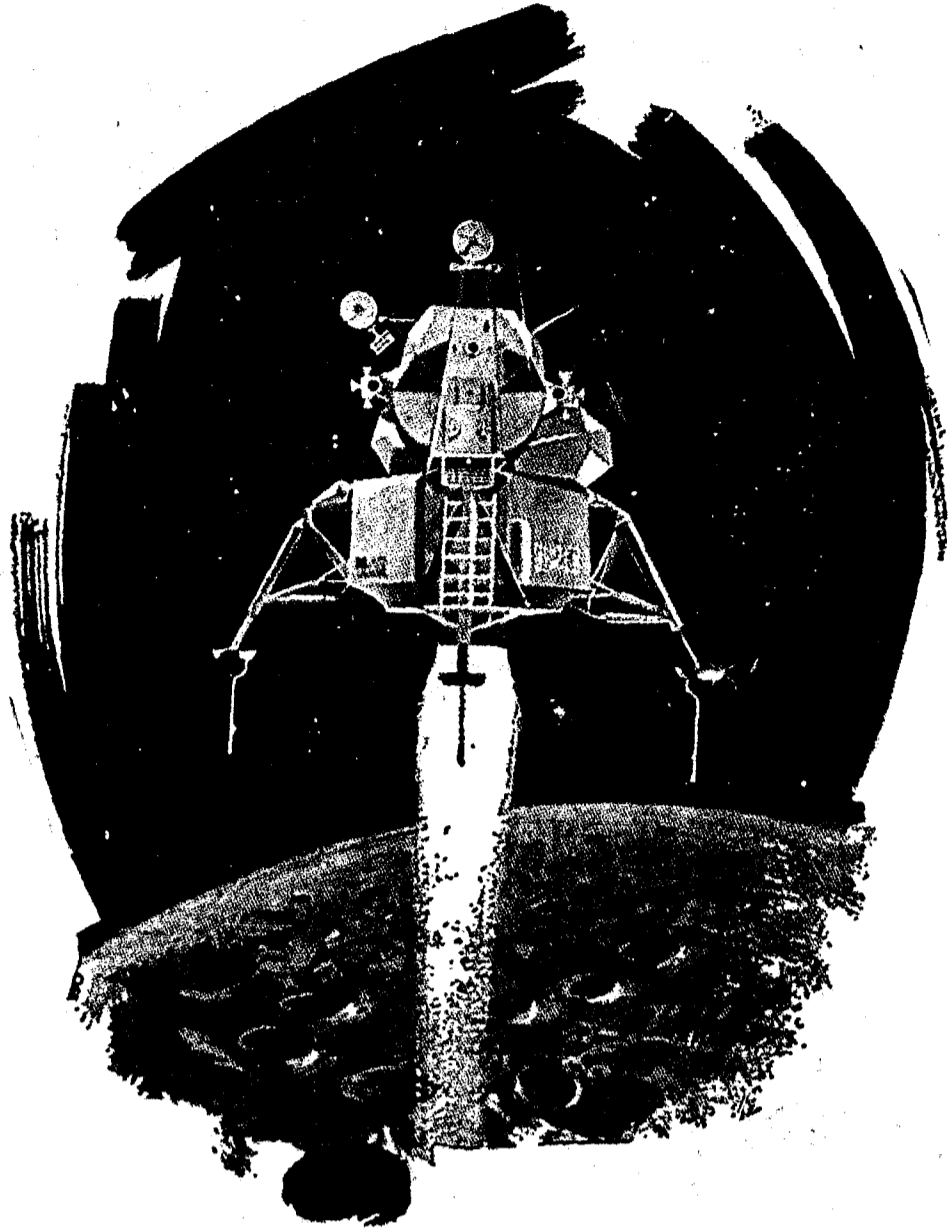

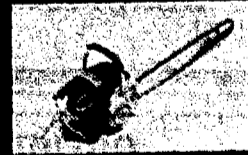

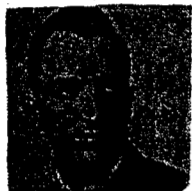

**SOIL TESTING STANDARDIZED**

Idaho took a giant step forward on July 1 by standardizing soil testing methods and terminology with Oregon and Washington.

Prior to July, the soil testing methods differed in laboratories and between states, making it impossible to relate results from one laboratory and state to another. Adding to the confusion was the terminology used by each laboratory and state to report the soil test results.

According to Frank Parks, in charge of the U. of I. soil testing laboratory, soil testing standardization will involve two routine diagnostic testing procedures: sodium bicarbonate extraction for alkaline to neutral soils of Southern Idaho and in some areas on acid soils, and sodium acetate extraction used on acid soils of Northern Idaho.

Commonly accepted chemical terms will be used as the official terminology for reporting soil testing results, Parks reported. For example, phosphorus and potassium levels in the soil will be reported as "parts-per-million (ppm)" rather than "pounds-per-acre" (lbs. per acre). Other nutrients will be reported in a similar manner.

These standardized terms will, in effect, mean laboratories will be talking in a "universal" language. Results in one state will have meaning in another state and vice versa, Parks stated.

The Interstate Soil Test Coordinating Committee is composed of representatives from Idaho, Oregon, and Washington, with Dr. A. P. Halverson of Washington as chairman. Montana and Utah also are represented on the committee, but these states plan to standardize their soil testing at a later date.

**IDAHO DEPT. OF EMPLOYMENT**

The total number of workers continuing to claim unemployment insurance benefits through the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment declined for the first time in several weeks. Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager reported today that there were 75 persons currently seeking jobs as compared with 86 filing claims during the previous week. A year ago there were 69. Eight workers filed new claims for benefits during the week and a total of 19 closed their claims. Most of them returned to employment, Hartstein reported. And most of the idled workers are living in the immediate Moscow area. Many of these workers will receive benefits for a short time and then find employment, as conditions are relatively good in the area, he said.

Little change was noted in the job finding department of the office, Hartstein reported. He said his office found jobs for 26 workers during the week compared with 25 for the previous week, and 30 for the same week a year ago. There were still 49 jobs unfilled at the end of the week, compared with 37 at the end of the previous week. Little change has been noted in the general types of jobs available. Needed are good secretaries, a bookkeeper, telephone solicitors, domestic workers, and cafe workers, as well as TV repairmen, a hardware salesman, insurance salesmen, a carpenter, carpenter apprentice, bricklayers, a shoe repairman trainee, an assistant manager for a lumber yard, a scaler, and an aircraft engine repair apprentice. All of the jobs available are for year round workers, Hartstein said, and repeated that there are still a number of young men and women seeking work for the balance of the summer season.

**LICENSES AND STICKERS**

The Department of Law Enforcement suggests motorists take a few minutes to check validity of driver licenses and vehicle inspection stickers. Both have expiration dates and should be renewed promptly. Such a check may save a trip to court—or prevent, an accident.

**WATERING YOUR LAWN**

When you water the lawn, give it plenty. Let the sprinklers run until the soil is soaked about a foot down, advises county agricultural agent. Lick-and-promise sprinklings, he said do not do a satisfactory job. It takes more than a wet surface to keep the lawn growing vigorously.

Watering is often necessary a day or two after a rain. There may be more need for moisture than is apparent in the color of the lawn. However, watering every day is not advisable under most conditions. If the soil is constantly wet, it will become soggy. Except on extremely sandy soils, it is usually not necessary to water more than once or twice a week. Morning is generally the best time to sprinkle under most conditions.

Mowing is important in health and appearance of the lawn, too, the county agent reminded. A sharp mower at the right cutting height does the best job. If the mower is dull it chews off the grass and causes it to die back, giving an off-color appearance. If the lawn is not cut short enough, cuttings will build up on the surface and prevent food from reaching the soil, thus causing the lawn to lose color.
