KENDRICK MAN GETS HIGH POST AT WASHINGTON

Dr. Glen E. Wegner, a former resident of Kendrick, was named a deputy assistant secretary in the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, it was learned here last Thursday afternoon. He will be concerned with legislation in the field of health.



The appointment was announced by Robert H. Finch, secretary of the department, at Washington, D. C.

Dr. Wegner, 30, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Glen Wegner of Kendrick, was graduated from Kendrick High in 1956. He was student body president one year and earned letters in football, basketball, track and baseball. He was graduated from the College of Idaho, Caldwell, in 1960 and was elected senior of the year.

Dr. Wegner, a pediatrician who also has legal training, will be responsible for the development and coordination of legislative activities connected with the department's health programs.

He has been a member of the department since 1967, working as a clinical research associate at the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development, a part of the National Institutes of Health. The last year he has been a special assistant to Dr. William H. Stewart, surgeon-general of the U. S. Public Health Service. He worked on administrative and legislative aspects of the department's health programs. Dr. Wegner was graduated from the University of Washington School of Medicine, Seattle in 1964. He then interned at Boston and Baltimore.

TWO AREA FIRES, INDEX EXTREME

The State Forestry Department reports that a fire which started Sunday in Bedrock Canyon area, a few miles from Lenore, was contained early Monday morning. Some grass and tree snags were still burning, but State Forestry crews patrolled the fire lines on Tuesday. An estimated 575 acres of grass and brush burned in this fire. Fifty men, including 25 state of Idaho employees, railroad personnel and area people with the help of three bulldozers fought to contain and control the blaze. Airplanes from Grangeville also dumped retardant into the deep canyon area on Sunday.

Another fire was started on Paradise Ridge Sunday. The State Forestry crew extinguished this one, confining it to two-tenths of an acre.

Dick Benjamin, District Fire Warden, reports the burning index of the area covered by the Kendrick Fire Protective District, reached the extreme point on Sunday.

HARVEST PACE IS PICKING UP

Harvesting of the 1969 small grain crop began picking up speed in the Kendrick and Genesee areas this week and while the peak of the harvest operations are still at least a week or more away, the hot weather, dust of the grain trucks and activity of the farmers leave little doubt that this is the busy time of the year.

The weather continues to hold good for cutting operations with bright sunshine and only occasional cloudiness. There have been a few threats of rain, but these haven't yet materialize. The temperatures have been staying in the high eighties and into the nineties during the daytime and dropping down into the fifties and even the forties during the night.

Ben Westendahl, manager of the Lewiston Grain Growers Kendrick warehouse, reported Tuesday morning that the deliveries are "just getting started". Ninety-five loads came in Monday and he estimated that harvest was maybe a third up to the peak. Most of the loads are coming in from Pottlatch Ridge, mainly loads of peas and barley. Yields on the barley varied, he said, some running as high as 2 1/2 tons to the acre with the average being around 1 1/2 tons. The green pea harvest is nearly completed and Austrian peas are coming in. Quality of what wheat has been brought in this season seems to be good, Westendahl stated.

"Pretty slow yet," was the report from Bob Watts, manager of the Kendrick Rochdale Company Tuesday morning. The Kendrick coop is still taking deliveries of peas and some barley is coming in, but not many loads of wheat have been delivered to the local warehouse bins.

"Harvest is coming in pretty lively" said George Brocke, Sr. from his office at the Brocke and Sons Warehouses in Kendrick. Deliveries of lentils, peas, rape seed and grass seed are all coming in to the Kendrick warehouse and George said his firm will be receiving loads at the Southwick warehouse sometime this week. Several farmers have completed the green pea harvest and Austrian peas are just getting a good start, the veteran seedman said.

GENESEE — Genesee's 1969 pea harvest is in full swing this week with the peak expected in about a week according to Leonard Singhose, manager of Asgrow Seed Co., Genesee Branch.

The Asgrow manager said Tuesday that peas delivered to his plant so far this year were of better than average quality, and doing much better than expected considering the weather. He estimated that the pea harvest is practically completed on the Rim now and operations are moving toward Genesee. He added that the harvest is about one-third complete.

Forrest Durbin, manager of Genesee Union Whse. Company said Tuesday that the quality of peas brought to the End and West End warehouses so far this season looked good, and added that small amounts of wheat and barley had been delivered from the Rim.

James A. Wilson, 70, 734 9th St., Clarkston, died Friday, July 25 at 7 a. m. at St. Joseph's Hospital of cancer. He had been ill four months.

A retired bulldozer operator for Pottlatch Forests, Inc., Wilson was a lifetime resident of the area. He was born Dec. 27, 1908 at Kendrick, the son of Alexander and Mary Wilson.

He resided at Kendrick until 1923 when he went to work for PFL. From that time until 1964 he lived at logging camps at Pottlatch, Headquarters, Clarkia and Avery.

He married Mrs. Pearl Dicks at Colfax, Wash., Jan. 13, 1964, shortly after his retirement.

He was a life member of the Moscow Elks Lodge. He had served with the U. S. Army during World War 11 but did not go overseas.

Survivors include his widow, at home; four sisters, Mrs. Eva Nelson, Garfield, Wash., Mrs. John (Olive) Thomas, Deary, Mrs. Leonard (Corvella) Wolf, Leland and Mrs. Carroll (Grace) Cox, Grangeville; two brothers, Bruce Wilson, Elk City, and John Wilson, Kendrick.

The funeral was held Monday, July 28, at 2 p. m. at Bower-Wann Memorial Chapel in Lewiston. The Rev. E. Paul Hovey officiated. Pauline Brigham was organist and accompanied Eugene Rainville who sang hymns.

Our cook this week is Mrs. Adolph Denner, our faithful Fix Ridge correspondent. Her recipes for Sweet and Sour Pork and Chinese Fried Chicken really sound delicious, and just right to serve at your next patio party. Mrs. Denner, we are told, is not only a good cook, but loves to fish, and collects antiques.

SWEET AND SOUR PORK

2 lbs pork loin or spare ribs, cut in bite size
 2 eggs, well beaten
 1 tablespoon sherry or white wine (it may be omitted)
 1 tsp. salt
 1 tsp. soy sauce
 2/3 cup cornstarch.
 Beat last four ingredients together. Place meat pieces in a bowl and pour ingredients over and let set at least two hours. Take out meat pieces and fry a few pieces at a time in deep fat. Meat will rise to top when done.
 Sauce:
 1/2 cup vinegar
 1/4 cup water
 1/2 cup sugar
 1/2 cup pineapple chunks
 1 tablespoon cornstarch dissolved in 1/2 cup of cold water. Combine all together about five minutes. Add 1 tablespoon soy sauce. Pineapple juice may be used in place of half of the water.
 The pork may be eaten with the sauce or else poured over meat and heated through in over 10 to 15 min.

Chinese Fried Chicken (Fryer)
 1 egg, fork beaten,
 add 1/3 cup water
 1 tablespoon milk
 Mix together
 1/4 cup flour
 1 teaspoon salt
 1 tablespoon cornstarch
 1 tablespoon cornmeal
 1/8 teaspoon baking powder
 Add to the liquid, beat until smooth
 12 small chicken legs or wings.
 Dip in batter, let drain over bowl a few seconds. Fry in deep fat 15 minutes at 350 degrees. May be eaten that way or served with sauce.
 Sauce:
 1/2 cup green pepper, chopped
 1/2 cup onion chunks.
 Fry in 1 tablespoon salad oil until tender. Push to one side of skillet. Pour syrup that has been made up.
 1 cup or 13 1/3 oz. pineapple chunks
 1/2 cup cider vinegar
 1/2 cup brown sugar
 2 tablespoons soy sauce
 1/4 cup water
 1 tablespoon cornstarch. Mix well, pour into skillet and boil together 3 minutes

ELK AND COUGAR KILL

Our Conservation Educator at Lewiston quotes figures, all estimates, that should make everyone happy if they are accurate. If and I say if, the elk kill was 17,000 last year, and it was 7 per cent then we must have 243,000 elk in Idaho. He claims 2,500 cougars are good for the game herds though a conservative estimate for their kill would be over 100,000. Most of these are old and diseased animals he claims. The herds must be in very bad health. The estimate for hunter kill was 95,506.

The elk tagging program was a howling success when it discovered Glover area elk wintered on Split Creek. Hunters have known for years that elk use both sides of Coolwater Ridge in summer and winter. In the 1930's I counted over 50 cow elk around a water hole in Split Creek drainage and when they spooked it seemed every cow had a calf with her. Imagine such a sight today. A number of elk wintered in the Kerr and Lottie Creek area. Some may have been from Glover Ridge.

The Wildlife Conservation Club of District 2 which was so active in getting the cougar refuge on Big Creek is now worrying about the fate of North Fork elk after the dam is finished. Which side are you on boys? Do you want the North Fork land for another predator refuge? Who said that the Big Creek cougar project did not cost Idaho tax payers anything? Game violators are stealing from you they say. How about predators? Ask Howard Wilson of Maggie Bend if his lambs were diseased. They surely would not have been killed by predators had they been healthy.

It's a shame that the work of men like Walt Wendell, Andy Yort, and many others who worked so hard to build up the elk population at the start, by reducing the predator population, has been stopped. With the heavy hunting pressure and a big increase in predators it is no wonder our big game is fast disappearing.—M. P. McClelland, Route 1, Box 101, Kamiah, Idaho.

VETERANS ADMINISTRATION

Students attending college under the GI Bill this summer are reminded that they must return their Certification of Attendance card to the Veterans Administration during the last full month of every enrollment period, including the summer session. Failure to do so will cause payment to stop since VA computers are programmed to prepare checks only after attendance cards are received. M. W. Allen, Director of the Boise VA Center, said.

Allen also urges any student who did not return his Certification of Attendance card at the end of the spring semester to do so as soon as possible to insure renewed VA payments this summer or when he goes back to school in the fall.

While veterans attending colleges under the GI Bill must return their Certification of Attendance cards during the last full month of every enrollment period, veterans attending school below the college level must return their attendance cards every month.

Idaho veterans who have questions about their status or who intend to enroll for the first time this fall are urged to contact the Boise VA Center.

IDAHO DEPT. OF EMPLOYMENT

The wind-up of haying operations and the beginning of harvest in Latah County accounted for most of the twenty persons given job finding help through the Moscow Office of the Idaho Department of Employment during the past week. Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow Office Manager said that some other workers, such as hospital, cafe, construction, and domestic workers, and office workers were also placed on jobs during the week. At the end of the week there were a total of forty-nine jobs still open, the same as at the end of the previous week. As has been the case during the past few weeks, Hartstein said, all of the jobs remaining open are for full time, year round workers and not available to the many students who are currently seeking jobs.

Ten persons filed new claims for unemployment insurance during the week, while seven persons discontinued such claims by returning to employment. The current total is seventy-eight, up from last week's seventy-five by three. A year ago the total was seventy-three. Some of these workers will probably remain idle until school starts in the fall, while others will locate jobs within the next week or two, receiving jobless pay for only a short time.

REV. HOWARD L. HAKE, TO ATTEND TRAINING PROGRAM AT EWSC IN AUGUST

GENESEE—The Rev. Howard L. Hake, pastor interim, of the Geneese Community Church, is among 31 persons named to attend a week-long training program for persons dealing with the aging, to be held at Eastern Washington State College, in August.

A grant of \$8,845 from the State Council on Aging made to EWSC under the federal Older Americans Act, supplemented by \$2,903 from EWSC for a total project cost of \$11,748 has made the program possible, Dr. Earle K. Stewart, chairman of the EWSC department of sociology and director of the project said.

First of the two week-long programs will start August 4, the second a week later, and will be held at EWSC.

Developed at the request of the Greater Spokane Council on Aging with the support of the state council, the courses were designed for training of specialized personnel to carry out programs for older Americans.

Rev. Hake was nominated by the Department of Public Assistance to attend the first week-long session at EWSC.

Rapid River Hatchery

All-out efforts to transfer the run of spring chinook salmon from Snake River to Rapid River are bringing results that are most encouraging. For example, 1965 brood stock produced 480,000 small-sized salmon for release as downstream migrants in 1967. In 1968, a count of 3,416 adult spring chinook salmon returned to the hatchery, and so far this year (July 10) 2,664 adults have returned to Rapid River hatchery.

Adults trapped now will be spawned late in August and September and the eggs will not be hatched until November. The fingerlings will be placed in raceways in December, in outdoor rearing ponds next June, and released in Rapid River as downstream migrants in April, 1971.

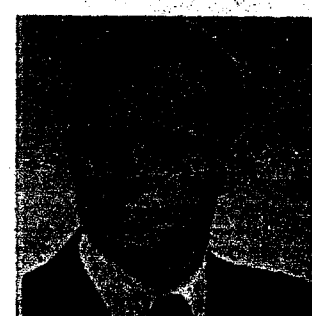

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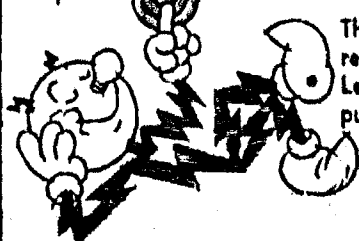
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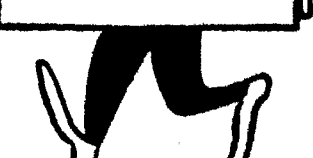

WHO CAN QUALIFY FOR MEDICARE AND HOW?

"Who can qualify for Medicare and how?" is a question often asked by people in the area, according to D. Gene Shaw, manager of the Lewiston Social Security Office.

The Medicare program is made up of two parts, Hospital Insurance and Medical Insurance. If you are 65 or over and entitled to social security or railroad retirement benefits, you are automatically eligible for hospital insurance. Nearly everyone who became 65 before 1968, except for a few persons who are covered by certain government-sponsored health insurance programs, is eligible for this type of insurance.

For those people who reached age 65 in 1968 or later, and are not eligible for cash benefits, some credit for work under social security will be required to qualify for hospital insurance. The amount of work needed depends upon a person's age. Persons who became 65 in 1968 must have 3 quarters of work under social security and those who are 65 in 1969 require approximately a year and a half of work or 6 quarters.

The important thing to remember here is that for medical insurance to be effective at age 65 a claim should be filed 3 months before the 65th birthday. Delaying this application can cause delay in coverage and possible loss of benefits.

BANKING IN GENESSEE

GENESSEE — Banking in Genessee dates back to before the turn of the century when the First Bank of Genessee opened its doors for business. Genessee are still on file at First Security and old ledger books show that the bank was organized with capital stock of \$57,000 in 1892.

Two names prominently mentioned in the old bank records are John P. Vollmer, a principal stockholder, and N. J. Walby, who apparently was the most prominent customer in the early days of First Bank of Genessee. Ledgers reveal that the first entry on the bank ledgers occurred on January 17, 1893.

A published statement of the second bank in Genessee history—the Genessee Exchange Bank—dated July 18, 1900 showed total assets of \$79,800.13.

An interesting commentary on the prosperity of the economy of Genessee is illustrated by the rather substantial bank growth shown by both banks. Published statements of November 2, 1910 showed that by that time the Genessee Exchange Bank had grown to assets of \$280,590.64, while First Bank of Genessee showed total resources of \$167,142.28.

The corner of Walnut and Fir, site of the New First Security Bank building has been the banking corner in Genessee since 1892 when it was the home of First Bank of Genessee. First Security has been in Genessee since September of 1946 when a formal change of ownership under which the First National Bank of Lewiston and affiliate branches at Genessee, Grangeville, and Craigmont, became units of First Security Bank of Idaho, N. A.

The sale was originally announced in June of 1946 in what was reported to be the largest banking transaction in the history of the state involving assets of nearly \$12 million. At that time, the Genessee bank became a separate unit of First Security and no longer a branch of the Lewiston bank.

Frank Densow became manager and Mary Bottjer was named assistant manager of First Security Bank of Genessee.

First Security bankers who have served the people of Genessee, and who are still with the First Security organization include Cloyd J. Sisty, vice president, Moscow; James E. Phelps, senior vice president, Pocatello; James C. Hoogland, manager, Kendrick; and Merlin C. Parkins, manager, Kellogg.

Visitors to First Security's new "Old West" bank might well imagine themselves doing their banking before the turn of the century. The bank is designed to reflect that period of Idaho history, and although its decor abounds in antiquity, banking service will be as modern as tomorrow.
