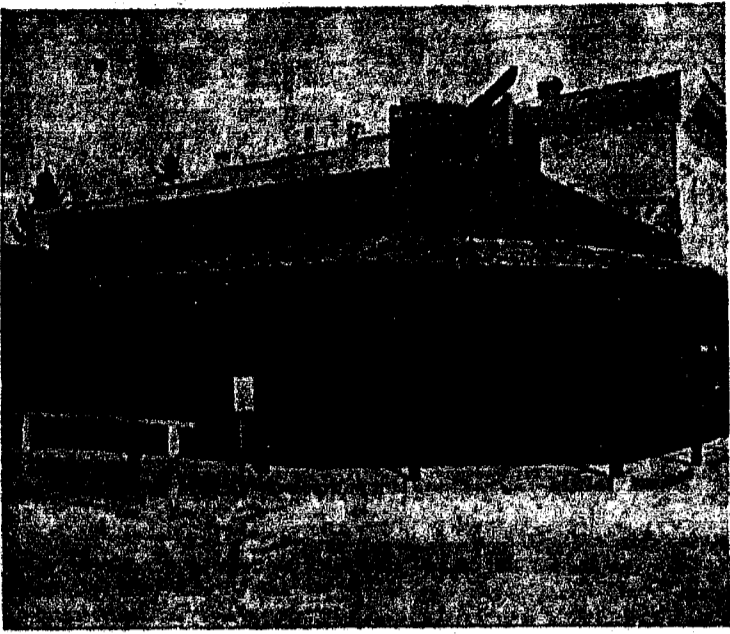


## New Genesee Bank Opens Saturday with Celebration



GENESEE—Saturday will be a big day in Genesee when First Security Bank unveils its new "Old West" bank building with gala festivities that include an old-fashioned community barbecue.

Things get under way at 4 p. m. when the doors to the new bank will be officially opened and visitors are invited to inspect the unique building. Then at 5 p. m. the Genesee Civic Association will begin serving a delicious barbecue with all the trimmings.

W. J. Phar, manager of the bank, said that visitors to the open house will have lots of interesting things to see and do, including an opportunity to win a television set and other valuable prizes in a money-estimating contest. There will also be souvenir gifts for all, banking machine demonstrations and interesting exhibits, including a fabulous gun collection by Bill Craner of St. Maries.

A brief program to officially mark

the occasion will take place in the park during the barbecue. Expected to participate in opening ceremonies are civic and banking officials including Mayor Dick Scharnhorst, Ralph J. Comstock, Jr., Boise; president, First Security Bank of Idaho; Thomas G. Bourke, vice president, First Security, Lewiston, and others. The ceremonies will be emceed by Len Bielenberg, Moscow attorney who is a native son of the Genesee area. Entertainment will be provided by the Old Time Fiddlers and a Barbershop Quartet.

The barbecue menu will consist of prime beef sandwiches, cole slaw, beans, sliced tomatoes, potato chips, punch and coffee, and home-made pies, being baked by the ladies of the St. Mary's Catholic Church and the Genesee Community Church.

Mr. Phar urges all residents of the Genesee trade area to join First Security in celebrating the bank opening. "Although it's the busy harvest season, you've got to take a dinner break sometime, so please join us for dinner on Saturday. ### Kendrick Harvest Nears Completion; Weather Stays Good

Although the temperatures dropped below average the past seven days and some wind and clouds threatened in the sky; harvest in the Kendrick area moved on without any noticeable delays and the peak of the 1969 small grain harvest is now over.

Harvest for Geo. Brocke and Sons is about 75 percent completed, reported Geo. Brocke, Sr., on Tuesday afternoon. Harvest of rape seed is complete and the pea harvest is almost complete. Only black (Austrian) peas and lentils are expected in at the local seed company.

"We're over the peak," said Bob Watts, manager of the Kendrick Rochdale Co., who added that deliveries have started to slow down. He also estimated that harvest was 75 percent finished.

Ben Westendahl, manager of Lewiston Grain Growers Kendrick warehouse, made a guess that the harvest was over sixty percent finished and added that the quality on most of the grain taken in this year was good.

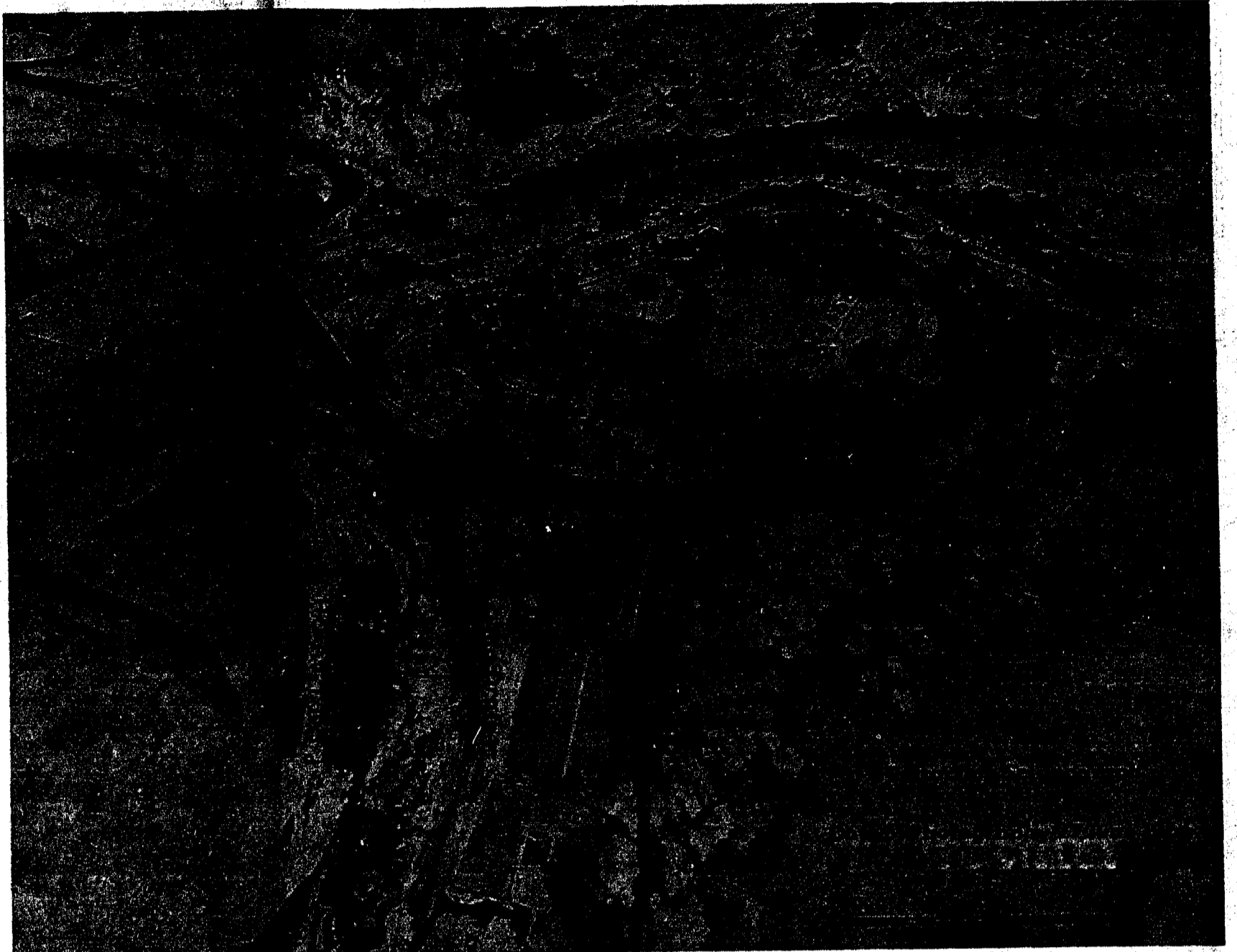

## Aerial Photo Shows Site of Bear Creek Dike



An Army Corps of Engineers Aerial photo shows just where the dike will be built on Bear Creek to protect the Kendrick school against possible future flooding. Superintendent of Schools James V. Muscat, coordinator of the project, said he was pushing to have all utilities such as power lines and water mains relocated as soon as possible prior to the letting of the construction contracts.

The 1,393-foot dike will vary in height from 3 1/2 feet to 12 feet, depending on the terrain and the course of the stream. The top of the dam will be 12-feet across with a 1 to 5 slope to the bottom. A tentative starting date of August 25 has been set and it is expected there will be a sixty-day work schedule.

The city of Kendrick is the sponsoring organization. Funds for the \$73,000 project will come from the budget of special government emergency flood control allocations. In the picture, the sketched-in line with the "x's" indicate the position of the dike.

job of controlling illegal loads. The Idaho State Police are supervising the trained weighmasters who man the 10 stations located in areas not served by the six permanent Ports of Entry.

The strategically located stations help control those highway users who overload their vehicles in violation of existing Idaho laws and help insure that the full design life of pavements and structures on the state highway system can be maintained.

Since May, the weighmasters have counted 31,149 trucks. There were 146 written, 428 oral and 533 citations issued for a variety of violations including: over axle weight, over maximum gross weight, over registration and various other equipment and permit violations.

As of July 19, the state had collected \$9,752.87 in fines for 384 convictions the Highway and Law Enforcement Department reported.

Our recipes this week are from the files of Mrs. Max (Joyce) Clemenhagen. They are favorites of her family, so that's why she especially picked them for you to try.

Joyce is with us at the Gazette office and after working all day, manages to find time to cook for three hungry children and husband, Max, who is a logger. When, and if, she ever finds a minute to call her own, she gives piano lessons and does unholstering.

**STUFFED HAMBURGER**

- 1 1/2 lb. hamburger
  - 3 cups bread (crumbs)
  - 1 egg
  - 1 teaspoon sage
  - 1 can mushroom soup
  - 1/2 cup celery (chopped)
  - three-fourths teaspoon salt
  - 1/4 teaspoon pepper
  - 1/2 cup onion (chopped)
  - 1 Tablespoon parsley (chopped)
  - 1/4 cup butter
  - 1 cup water
- Spread 1/2 hamburger in 8"x12" pan (season). Brown onion in butter. Mix with egg, sage, parsley, salt, pepper, celery and bread. Cover hamburger.
- Place second half of hamburger over that (season). Put soup and water over all. Bake 1 hour 35 d.

**PUZZLE PUDDING**

- 1 egg (well beaten)
  - 1 cup sugar
  - 1 teaspoon soda
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla
  - 1 1/4 cups flour
  - No. 2 can fruit cocktail, 2 cups (use juice)
- Mix together. Pour into 9"x13" pan. Cover with one third cup of nuts and 1 cup brown sugar. Bake at 325 d. for 45 min.

**24 HOUR SALAD**

- Cook in double boiler until thick, cool
- 6 egg yolks
  - 3 Tsp. water
  - 2 Tsp. sugar
  - 1 Tsp. salt
  - 1 Tsp. mustard
  - 8 Tsp. vinegar
- Drain 2 cans pineapple and dice. Dice 1 lb. marshmallows. Whip 1 pint cream and mix with cold dressing. Fold in pineapple and marshmallows. Let stand 24 hours.

**BANANA OATMEAL DROPS**

- 1 1/2 cups flour
  - 1/2 t. baking powder
  - 1 t. salt
  - three-fourths t. cinnamon
  - 1/4 t. nutmeg
  - three-fourths cup shortening
  - 1 cup sugar
  - 1 egg
  - 1 medium banana
  - 1/2 t. lemon juice, (fresh, frozen or canned)
  - 1 1/2 cups rolled oats
  - 1/2 cup chopped walnuts
- Mix sugar and shortening together. Beat in egg. Stir in mashed banana and lemon juice. Add dry ingredients gradually until all dry particles are mixed in well. Last, mix in rolled oats and walnuts. Drop by teaspoonfuls on greased cookie sheets. Bake 12 to 15 minutes or until edges turn golden. Bake in 350 d. oven. Makes 4 dozen.

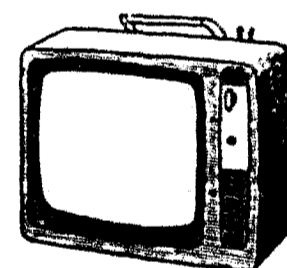

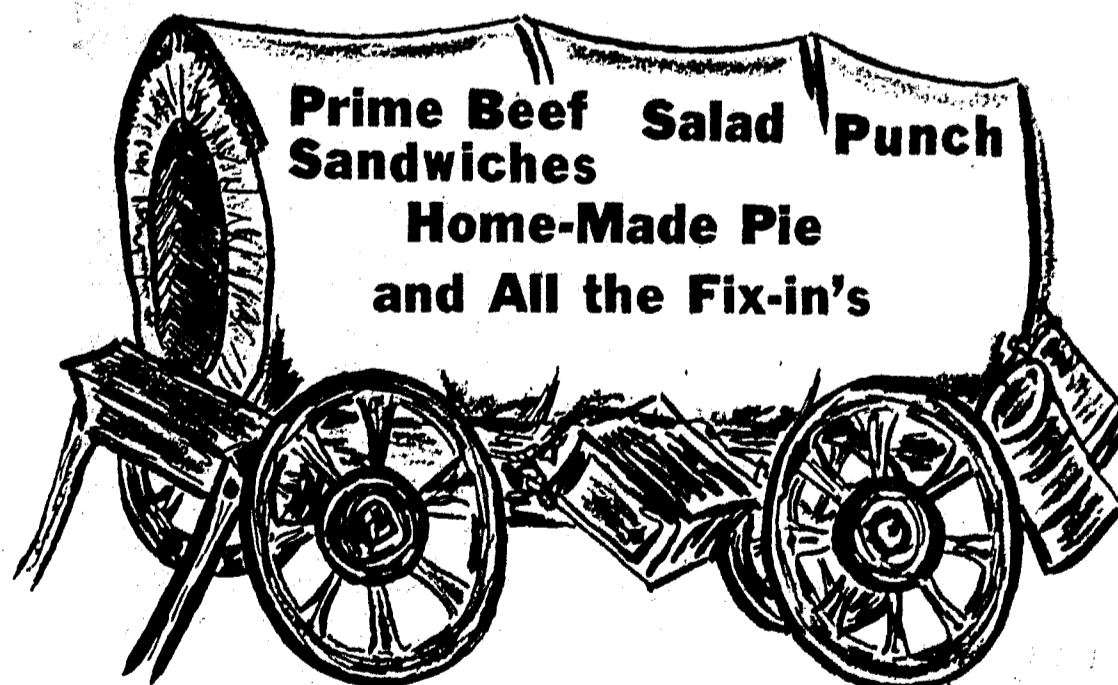

**FISH AND GAME COMMISSION  
OPPOSES LENORE DAM**

mission went on record at their July 30th meeting to oppose "any further dam building in the Clearwater drainage." Their reason for this stand was given that "Construction of any additional dam such as the contemplated Lenore re-regulating dam will compound fishery problems associated with operation of Dworshak Dam and have an adverse effect on remaining anadromous and resident fish populations in the drainage."

The Corps of Engineers gave the tentative plans for Lenore Dam in their May, 1967 report to the Idaho Water Resources Board. It shows a 75-foot dam located just upstream from the bridge at Lenore. It would back water 11 miles up to the base of the Dworshak Fish Hatchery. This area is heavily used by steelhead and bass fishermen and by general recreationists, such as swimmers and picknickers because of its ready access from Highway 12 which parallels it. The reservoir would be used to re-regulate flows from Dworshak Dam. The present sand beaches would be flooded, and the daily fluctuations in water levels in this type of reservoir would reduce its bass spawning potential and eliminate much of the attractiveness for recreation.

D. R. Eldred, Fisheries Biologist for the Washington Department of Game, told the Fish and Game Committee of the Greater Lewiston Chamber of Commerce that fishermen had not been able to effectively catch steelhead and salmon in impoundments in Washington. He indicated that the fish moved very rapidly through impoundments and were only available to the fishermen for a short time. Because of these facts, many fishermen had concentrated their efforts further upstream to the China Gardens damsite. This change in fishing location contributed a substantial amount to the Lewiston-Clarkston area since it was found fishermen spent \$61.06 to catch a steelhead. He estimated Snake River steelhead fishermen contribute \$850,000 annually to the economy of the area.

It is anticipated that Dworshak Fish Hatchery will contribute a large run of steelhead to the Clearwater run. Once we get slack water to Lewiston, the only running river stretch to fish for steelhead in the Clearwater River will be from P. F. I. millpond upstream to the hatchery. Therefore if Lenore Dam floods about half of this, fishermen would have little chance to catch these fish. There is also concern that the slack water at the base of the Dworshak Fish hatchery would cause the fish to become confused and possibly affect the operations of the hatchery, reducing the production.

The Corps of Engineers is requesting \$37,000 to begin studies on Len-

**JOB OPENINGS  
DOWN SLIGHTLY**

Eighteen workers were given job finding help by the Moscow Office of the Idaho Department of Employment during the past week according to a report made by Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager. Hartstein said this was less than the 21 helped in locating work a week ago, and only help as many as the 36 who were placed on jobs during the same week a year ago. Some of these were jobs that were for the balance of the summer, but most were permanent year 'round positions. At the end of the week there were still 62 jobs available. All of these were open for workers who would be available on a permanent basis. Job openings include those for TV repairmen, salesmen, carpenters, bricklayers, secretaries, cooks, housekeepers and many others. Young workers are still available and seeking work for the rest of the summer. Several additional workers became available with the end of summer school at the University of Idaho; and few jobs are available for these young people.

With the close of summer school, and some slight curtailments in building construction in Moscow, the number of persons filing new claims for unemployment insurance doubled from the previous week. A total of 16 workers filed new claims, compared with 8 during the week before, and with 15 during the same week a year ago. The total number of workers continuing to seek jobless pay rose to 86 from the previous week's 81. A year ago there were 66 idled workers seeking benefits. The increase was in Moscow area where the new total is 61, compared with 53 last week and 39 at this time in 1968.

ore Dam this year. As indicated in news articles in the Lewiston Tribune last year, the Corps of Engineers assured Senator Church they did not plan any immediate studies of Lenore Dam. The Dworshak Dam is presently scheduled to have 3 generators of 400,000 kilowatt capacity. Unless an additional three generators is installed, there will be no need for Lenore Dam. With the advent of cheap atomic power, it is questionable whether these additional units are justified. "The Commission feels strongly that the destruction of Idaho streams and the fisheries dependent on these streams in order to provide hydroelectric power for coastal population centers is a loss that Idaho anglers and recreationists should not be forced to accept."

School will be in session all day the opening day, and buses will run on schedule.

Superintendent Diehl said the enrollment for the school this year will remain the same as last year—about 300.

The only new course added to this year's curriculum is German, which will be taught in high school. Other courses will remain the same.

Kindergarten will start in mid-October. Again this year kindergarten children may ride the bus to school in the morning, but must be picked up at noon by the parents. Mrs. Royce Howell is instructor.

New members on the faculty this year are: Mrs. Dianna Conniff, English and German; Mrs. Rhodda Gee, first grade; Larry Gee, music, and Mrs. Darnell Robertson, 7th grade, and Edward Davis, 8th grade.

A meeting for new teachers will be held on August 22 and a general teachers' meeting is scheduled for August 23rd.

Hot lunches will be served the first day of school. Prices for students will be 30c and for adults, 40c. Cooks are Mrs. Herman Mayer and Mrs. Seth Bish.

A student may also purchase milk alone for 3 cents.

Registration fees for high school students are: book fees, \$10.00; activity ticket, \$3.50, (optional); annual \$5.50, (optional); student insurance, \$5.75 (optional); football insurance, \$12.75. (If a student plays football

they must have insurance. This insurance also covers the student for the rest of the sports and any other school injury.) Students who are already covered by M. S. B. may secure dental insurance at the cost of \$1.00. Towel fee, \$1.00.

Students playing football must have insurance.

Fees for Junior High students are: book fees, \$7.50; student activity card \$3.50, (optional); student insurance, \$4.50, (optional).

Elementary students: book fees, \$5.00; weekly scholastic magazine, 60c; student insurance, \$3.50 (optional).

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**INFLATION FIGHT HURTS LUMBER**

Portland, Ore., Aug. 8, 1969—The home building industry, including lumber and plywood is suffering severely from attempts to halt inflation, although some other sectors of the economy not only do not appear to be suffering but are continuing to fuel inflation. The situation was pointed out by Wendell B. Barnes, Executive Vice President of Western Wood Products Association as he reported current business trend figures. WWPA is the nation's largest lumber trade association, serving members in 12 Western States.

"The basic reason given for the sharp increase this year in the prime rate was to slow business loans by increasing the cost of such loans," Barnes said. "But it has not worked out this way. Business loans stood at \$91.2 billion the week ended July 28.

Far from showing a decrease under pressure of sky-high interest rates, this figure was 12.3 per cent above the \$81.2 billion in business loans registered at the end of the same week in 1968."

One of the best summations of the situation was given by the Savings and Loan News, which referred to "a long, hot summer for the nation's financial economy," Barnes noted.

This is particularly true as far as the lumber industry is concerned," he said. Lumber production nationally was 185 million board feet for the week ended July 19, down 12.7 per cent from the 212 million recorded for the same week last year.

"Yet the comparable figures for business loans show that despite the steady succession of prime rate increases banks are still actively granting new business loans," Barnes said.

Barnes indicated his concurrence with Norman Strunk, Executive Vice President of the United States Savings and Loan League, who charged last week that the banks' actions come "at a time when it is obviously in the interest of the fight against inflation and obviously the intended result of the Federal Reserve's tight money policy to have the banks cut down on credit extension."

Figures compiled by the League show that since the beginning of the year, bank business loan volume has increased at an annual rate of 14 per cent. In the four weeks ending May 28, just before the change in the prime rate, the large banks reporting weekly to the Federal Reserve increased their business loans outstanding by a seasonally adjusted total of \$1.1 billion, or at an annual rate of 17 per cent.

The problem exists in the home building and forest products industries, Barnes added, because for some years government officials have attempted to control inflation principally with monetary policies which restrict credit, lessen spending and decrease funds available for mortgages. While the policies are massive and unselective in their application, their effects are selective and

Landholder-Sportsman Council Meet

The annual summer meeting of the Landholder-Sportsmen Council will be held Friday, August 29, at the headquarters office of the Idaho Fish and Game Department, 600 South Walnut, Boise, Idaho.

The meeting will start with a no-host luncheon at 12:00 noon. Following that will be the regular business meeting. Main topic for the afternoon will be this fall's campaign for "Operation Respect." Last year about 3000 hunters joined the program by purchasing a triangle patch. This patch identifies the sportsman who follows the rules of good sportsmanship.

The familiar triangle reminds every one that it takes cooperation between the landholder, sportsman, and the fish and game department to produce good hunting. By emphasizing good sportsmanship and courtesy to the landholder the aim of this program is to open up more land to the individual hunter.

Dove and Rabbit Season Start Sept. 1 Idaho's mourning dove and rabbit seasons open September 1. Except for a special chukar hunt along the Middle Fork of the Salmon (August 9 - September 19), these are the first hunting seasons of the year.

This year the mourning dove season will last from September 1 to September 21. The bag limit will be 10 birds daily and 20 in possession after the first day. The closing date for rabbit hunting has not yet been set by the Idaho Fish and Game Commission.

particularly disruptive to some industries.

"There is a great demand for homes. Nothing should interfere with the provision of homes and the insurance of good citizenship of people who seek to own their own home. This is important in all aspects of society. We must search for some ways to control inflation without the drying up of mortgage funds for essential homebuilding and to avoid the selective injury of particular industries which occurs at intervals under the credit control system now used."

He suggested that it might be possible to require by law that a percentage of the assets of insurance companies and pension trusts be invested in single family residential mortgages or in securities representing single family residential mortgages.

"There are other methods. Interest in tax reform is at a high point with passage of the House of a new tax bill," Barnes said. "When the Senate considers the bill, perhaps a provision should be added that a single family residence mortgage be assigned a special federal tax exemption and the interest received by the investor be declared tax exempt from federal income tax payments."

Suggestion for such tax exemption was made recently by John Walker, Vice President of Lowe's Companies, North Wilkesboro, N. C., in an article in Building Materials Merchandisers magazine and has received much support from homebuilders.

"These are ideas, conceived by individuals. We need these fresh ideas, Barnes pointed out. "Perhaps we could develop some from businessmen of all categories, and from the academic communities. These, in turn could be considered by both the Administration and the Congress to provide a new look at inflation fighting so that it can be accomplished without so severely harming important parts of our economy such as the home building industry."
