

Grand Opening of Genesee Bank Draws Large Crowd

GENESEE—The best features of Genesee's early days were revived Saturday when a throng of local people turned out for the grand opening of First Security's Old West bank.

A total of 1,400 folks—many of whom were taking a well-needed rest from harvesting—visited the unique new bank building and enjoyed a delicious outdoor barbecue prepared and served by the Genesee Civic Association.

"Beautiful . . . elegant . . . different . . . quit an improvement." These were some of the words which bank visitors used to describe the new building which literally takes one back in 80 years of history. Everything in the bank is designed to reflect Genesee as it was at the turn of the century, including classic roll-top desks, antique chairs, and filing cabinets, stove and lamps.

A highlight of the opening was the barbecue which consisted of rolled beef, beans, cole slaw, and all the trimmings, topped off with delicious pies baked by the ladies of St. Mary's Catholic Church and Genesee Community Church.

The townspeople were also treated to some very fine entertainment, provided by the Old Time Fiddlers organization from Lewiston, and the Humble Four, which put on a program of harmony in the finest tradition of barbershop singing. And much interest was centered on a fabulous gun collection owned by Bill Craner of St. Maries.

Many banking and civic dignitaries were on hand for the festivities. During opening ceremonies, remarks were heard from Mayor Dick Scharnhorst, who officially dedicated the new bank; Ralph J. Cornstock, Jr., president of First Security of Idaho, N. A.; Thomas G. Bourke, vice president, First Security Bank of Idaho, N. A.; and W. J. (Bill) Phar, manager of First Security Bank in Genesee. Ceremonies were emceed by Len Bielenberg, Moscow attorney.

Other bank officials on hand included E. G. Chaffer, chairman, First Security Bank of Idaho, N. A.; Boise; Spencer F. Eccles, senior vice president, First Security Bank, Boise, who supervised the decoration of the Old West Bank; and Mason W. Smith, vice president, First Security, Salt Lake City, who supervises bank openings for the First Security system of banks.

Four people who have at one time served as manager of First Security in Genesee also attended the opening. They were James E. Phelps, now a senior vice president of First Security in Pocatello; Cloyd J. Cisty, now vice president, First Security, Moscow; Jim Hoogland, now manager of the Kendrick office of the bank, and Gordon McFee.

GENESEE—A bright, warm sun and good weather continues to favor Genesee area farmers this week as harvesting moved along swiftly under those conditions.

Forrest Durbin, manager of the Genesee Union Warehouse Company, said Tuesday morning that the wheat harvest in Genesee was over 90 percent completed, with small amounts of the grain still standing.

Spring barley, the warehouse manager said, is just reaching the ripe stage, with small amounts brought into the local warehouses. He added that harvest of this crop is just getting a good start.

Leonard Singhose, of Asgrow Seed reported Tuesday morning that pea harvest is 99 percent completed, and harvesting operations for this year's crop will be finished by next week. Quantity of the crop this year has been about average, and the quality above average, Singhose said.

Little Bear Ridge—in lieu of transportation.

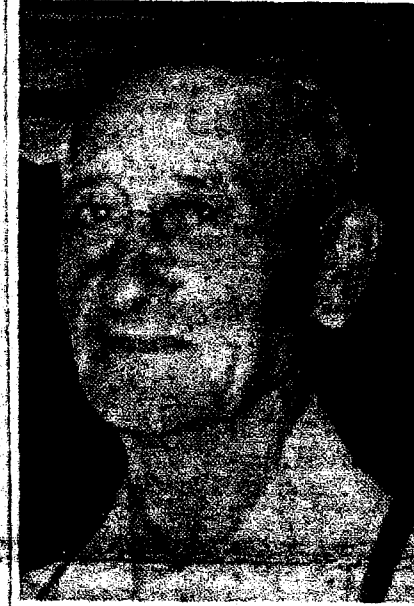

School Attire Discussed

After discussion and consideration, the following recommendations concerning school attire was made by the board:

Girls—

1. Girl's wearing attire should be of good taste. Dress hemline should be of a decent length. Dresses, pant dresses, and culottes are the only permissible girl attire.

If attire is in question, school officials will decide proper wear.

Boys—

Length of hair:
Boys hair should not come down on the neck lower than the shirt collar; it should not be over the eyebrows, and side burns should be no lower than the ear lobes. Moustaches and full beards will not be allowed.

2. Attire:
Boys to be permitted to wear burmuda shorts from the beginning of school through October 15th and from April 15th to the end of the school year. The shorts must be in good taste and cutoff blue jeans will not be acceptable.

School Insurance

The board approved the Student Insurance Program with the North Idaho Medical Insurance. Rates are as follows: Elementary school \$3.50; 7th and 8th grades, \$4.50; Senior High, \$5.75; Football Insurance, \$12.50. This is an increase of fifty cents per student rates over last year. Parents who have their children covered with their family policy, may add the dental protection for an additional \$1.00. Individual policies will be given students upon registration.

Classes Early

The Kendrick Junior and Senior High School first period class, will resume at 8:35 a. m. This is 5 minutes earlier than last year. The noon hour will be 45 minutes long instead of 40 minutes as of last year. The reason for this, Supt. Muscat explained, is due to increased enrollment and time required for serving the lunch.

Supt. Muscat reminded parents that children entering the first grade must be six years of age by October 15th. This deadline is set by the Idaho State Law.

Urges Physical Examinations

Superintendent Muscat has written the following letter to parents of students who will be entering the first, fifth and ninth grades:

Upon the recommendations of the Latah County Board of Health, the school district, and the Latah County Medical Society, it is recommended that your child have a physical examination prior to the next school year.

We are interested in the promotion of well established health habits in your child and believe that such can be accomplished through selected activities such as the following:

1. Periodic physical examinations to detect early signs and symptoms of illness.
2. Immunizations to prevent communicable diseases and their possible complications.
3. Regular dental care to assure healthy teeth which are essential to good health and nutrition.

Grades one, five and nine were selected since a physical examination at these times would coincide with growth spurts, with increased physical activities, and with the times boosters of various immunizations would be due. This same form may be used for students participating in physical education or sports. This is a most valuable investment in your child's life and will affect the health he is to enjoy in adulthood.

Your child's physical examination may be obtained at your family physician's office or at the Latah County Health Department the first and third Wednesday of each month, 2:00 to 4:30 p. m.

Social Security Program Marks 34th Anniversary

This month, with over 24 million Americans receiving \$2.5 billion a month in social security benefits and 20 million people insured by Medicare the Social Security Administration will celebrate its 34th anniversary, D. Gene Shaw, District Manager of Social Security in Lewiston, said today.

The anniversary is being observed with ceremonies and special displays in many social security offices throughout the country, as well as at the national headquarters in Woodlawn, Maryland, just outside of Baltimore. At the headquarters, a historical room is being opened this week showing mementos of the agency's history including the desk used by all the heads of the social security system since 1935.

When President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed the Social Security Act into law on August 14, 1935, he called it the cornerstone of a structure which is being built but is by no means complete.

The original law provided for old-age benefits to retired workers in industry and commerce only. Over the years, the social security program has expanded so that it now provides financial protection for virtually everyone in the country.

The first benefits to retired workers were paid in 1940. By that time amendments to the law had been passed to provide additional benefits for the dependents and survivors of insured workers.

In 1950 and thereafter, coverage was extended to millions of other people who were not covered under the original law—farm workers, state and local government employees, domestic workers, ministers, self-employed doctors, professions, and members of the armed forces.

In 1956, disability protection was added to cover the thousands of people who could no longer work because of serious illness or injury.

In its first quarter of century, social security had already grown into a program that protected a worker and his family in the event of his retirement, death, or disability. But

it didn't stop there.

In 1965, Congress created Medicare to help people 65 or older pay hospital, doctor, and other medical bills. In just 3 short years, Medicare has covered 17 million hospital stays of elderly people. And there were more than one million admissions for post-hospital extended care. Older people have also received visits in their own homes from visiting nurses, physical therapists, and other health care specialists, paid for by Medicare. Payments under the hospital insurance program totaled \$10.9 billion for the 3-year period, and a total of \$4.6 billion has been paid under the medical insurance program, which helps pay for doctor bills and other medical services.

In 1967, still other changes were made. Disabled widows became eligible for benefits at 50, people disabled before 31 needed less work to qualify for benefits, and children became eligible on their mother's earning record on the same basis as on their father's.

Through the years, increases in monthly benefits amounts were made to keep pace with the rising cost of living. Today's average monthly benefit to a retired worker is \$95, compared to \$53 10 years ago. The average benefit for a retired couple is \$166 a month, compared to \$111 10 years ago.

One out of every four beneficiaries are well below retirement age—young widows, children, and disabled workers and their dependents. The protection afforded American families in the event of a worker's death has a face value of \$90 billion in potential survivors benefits.

Ten million people are kept above the poverty level in this country because they are getting social security benefits. Since they have paid into the program for years, they have earned the right to receive their benefit checks—and do so with dignity, Shaw said.

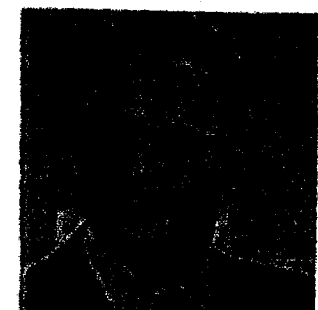

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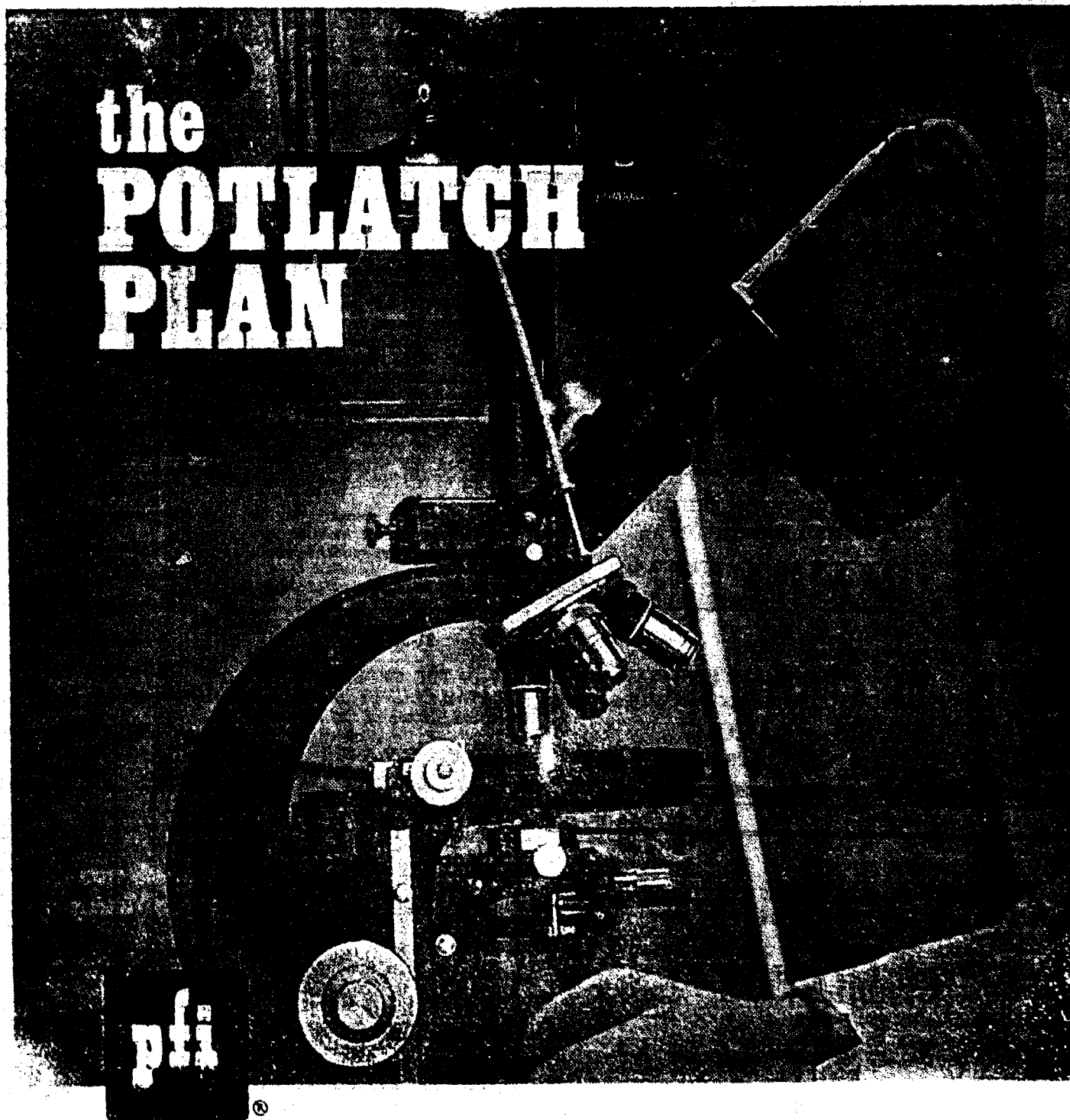

Home Cookin'...

Everyone enjoys a piece of fresh apple pie, and, with apples in abundance right now, why not make a fresh pie for dinner tonight? Our recipe for Dutch Apple Pie is from a Kendrick housewife, who asked that we withhold her name. Gladly, just so we may use her recipes. We've been told, and from a very good source, that she is an excellent cook.

6 apples
3 tsp. flour
1 cup sugar
¼ tsp. cloves
1 cup sour cream
½ teaspoon cinnamon
1½ T. sugar

Fill crust with apples. Mix flour, sugar, and cloves with sour cream and pour over apples. Sprinkle blended sugar and cinnamon over top and bake in hot oven, 400 degrees for a few minutes and cool to 325 degrees, finish baking until apples are tender. No top crust. Serve with cream.

With cabbage from the garden you might prepare cabbage rolls to serve with the Dutch Apple pie. I've made the rolls several times but never from this recipe. The cabbage adds a delightful taste to the hamburger and rice.

This recipe is from a Mormon cookbook by Winnifred Jardine.

1½ pounds ground beef
1 teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon pepper
½ cup rice, partly cooked
1 egg, beaten
½ teaspoon sage
¼ cup chopped onion
12 to 16 outer cabbage leaves
12 to 16 bacon slices
1 can (No. 2½) tomatoes
Combine hamburger, salt, pepper, sage, rice, egg, and chopped onion and form into similar rolls in shape and size of frankfurts. Wash cabbage leaves and drop into boiling, salted water long enough to wilt slightly; drain. Fold each leaf loosely around a hamburger 'frank', leaving room for rice to swell. Wrap bacon slice around and fasten with toothpick. Place into simmering tomatoes in large kettle, cover and simmer for 30 to 45 minutes. Serve hot, using tomatoes as sauce. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

INDIA WHEAT PURCHASES SHIFT TO HIGHER PROTEIN

Purchases by India of U. S. hard red winter wheat are now being made in higher protein ranges, it was revealed today by the Idaho Wheat Commission.

Wheat with 11 per cent to 12 per cent is being ordered by India as a result of American programs in that country to retain India as a cash customer after it has reached self-sufficiency in lower protein grain.

According to officials of Western Wheat Associates, a foreign marketing promotion organization backed by the Wheat Commissions of Idaho and other Northwest states, the potential purchase in India of high protein US Wheat is two million tons annually. To maintain this level after self-sufficiency is reached high protein wheat must be promoted now, Western Wheat spokesmen said.

Most Indian purchases of U. S. wheat are now made under Public Law 480, an American foreign aid plan that subsidizes trade.

Wheat varieties being grown in India are not well suited to bread flour production, Wheat Commission officials said, because the gluten is weak. A long range trade program calls for India to produce funds for purchases of U. S. wheat by selling rice to East African and East European nations.

That office now has 68 jobs available. Needed are workers who can qualify as carpenter apprentices, housekeepers, bricklayers, TV repairmen, secretaries with shorthand, parts order clerk, waitresses, cooks—both restaurant and sorority, sales clerks, good typists, babysitters, salesman and Go Go Girls.

Only 6 claims for unemployment insurance were received at the Moscow office during the past week, according to Hartstein. A total of 83 people are receiving unemployment insurance checks in Latah County at the present time. This figure is a little above the 76 persons who were receiving unemployment insurance at this time last year. During the past week 58 Moscow residents were issued checks. While in the Troy-Deary-Bovill area 11 people were receiving jobless pay. Three people in the potlatch area claimed benefits last week, and five checks are going to the Genesee area at this time, Hartstein said.

Home Cookin' . . .

Everyone enjoys a piece of fresh apple pie, and with apples in abundance right now, why not make a fresh pie for dinner tonight? Our recipe for Dutch Apple Pie is from a Kendrick housewife, who asked that we withhold her name. Gladly, just so we may use her recipes. We've been told, and from a very good source, that she is an excellent cook.

6 apples
3 tsp. flour
1 cup sugar
1/4 tsp. cloves
1 cup sour cream
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1 1/2 T. sugar

Fill crust with apples. Mix flour, sugar, and cloves with sour cream and pour over apples. Sprinkle blended sugar and cinnamon over top and bake in hot oven, 400 degrees for a few minutes and cool to 325 degrees, finish baking until apples are tender. No top crust. Serve with cream.

With cabbage from the garden you might prepare cabbage rolls to serve with the Dutch Apple pie. I've made the rolls several times but never from this recipe. The cabbage adds a delightful taste to the hamburger and rice.

This recipe is from a Mormon cookbook by Winifred Jardine.

1 1/2 pounds ground beef
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/2 cup rice, partly cooked
1 egg, beaten
1/2 teaspoon sage
1/4 cup chopped onion
12 to 16 outer cabbage leaves
12 to 16 bacon slices
1 can (No. 2 1/2) tomatoes
Combine hamburger, salt, pepper, sage, rice, egg, and chopped onion and form into similar rolls in shape and size of frankfurts. Wash cabbage leaves and drop into boiling, salted water long enough to wilt slightly; drain. Fold each leaf loosely around a hamburger 'frank', leaving room for rice to swell. Wrap bacon slice around and fasten with toothpick. Place into simmering tomatoes in large kettle, cover and simmer for 30 to 45 minutes. Serve hot, using tomatoes as sauce. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

INDIA WHEAT PURCHASES SHIFT TO HIGHER PROTEIN

Purchases by India of U. S. hard red winter wheat are now being made in higher protein ranges. It was revealed today by the Idaho Wheat Commission.

Wheat with 11 per cent to 12 per cent is being ordered by India as a result of American programs in that country to retain India as a cash customer after it has reached self-sufficiency in lower protein grain.

According to officials of Western Wheat Associates, a foreign marketing promotion organization backed by the Wheat Commissions of Idaho and other Northwest states, the potential purchase in India of high protein US Wheat is two million tons annually. To maintain this level after self-sufficiency is reached high protein wheat must be promoted now, Western Wheat spokesmen said.

Most Indian purchases of U. S. wheat are now made under Public Law 480, an American foreign aid plan that subsidizes trade.

Wheat varieties being grown in India are not well suited to bread production, Wheat Commission officials said, because the gluten is weak. A long range trade program calls for India to produce funds for purchases of U. S. wheat by selling rice to East African and East European nations.

That office now has 68 jobs available. Needed are workers who can qualify as carpenter apprentices, housekeepers, bricklayers, TV repairmen, secretaries with shorthand, parts order clerk, waitresses, cooks—both restaurant and sorority, sales clerks, good typists, babysitters, salesman and Go Go Girls.

Only 6 claims for unemployment insurance were received at the Moscow office during the past week, according to Hartstein. A total of 83 people are receiving unemployment insurance checks in Latah County at the present time. This figure is a little above the 76 persons who were receiving unemployment insurance at this time last year. During the past week 58 Moscow residents were issued checks. While in the Troy-Deary-Bovill area 11 people were receiving jobless pay. Three people in the potlatch area claimed benefits last week, and five checks are going to the Genesee area at this time, Hartstein said.


