

After discussion and consideration, the following recommendations concerning school attire was made by the board:

Girls

1. Girl's wearing attire should be of good taste. Dress hemline should be of a decent length. Dresses, pant dresses, and coulottes are the only permissible girl attire. If attire is in question, school offi-

cials will decide proper wear.

Boys hair should not come down on the neck lower than the shirt collar; it should not be over the eyebrows, and side burns should be no lower than the ear lobes. Moustaches and full beards will not be allowed. 2. Attire:

Boys to be permitted to wear burmuda shorts from the beginning of school through October 15th and from April 15th to the end of the school year. The shorts must be in good taste and cutoff blue jeans will not be acceptable.
