

Genesee Opens Grid Season Against Kamiah Saturday

Genesee High School opens the football season Saturday night, August 30 as Coach Ozzie Kanikkeberg sends his 1969 Bulldog squad out against the Kamiah Kubs on the Kib field in a non-conference contest.

The Bulldogs, who won 7 games, lost 1 and tied one in 1968, have 13 lettermen back this year to give them both strength and experience. Forty-six young footballers drew equipment this season including ten

freshmen and thirty-six from the senior high grades.

The Bulldogs looked impressive in pre-season practice and must be rated as favorites to finish high in the 11-man league. Last year they finished with 7-wins, 1-tie and no loss record in league play. The only loss came at the hands of the Colton Bulldogs in a non-league game. The tie was a battle with the Troy Trojans.

A large, experienced line could make things tough for Bulldog opponents this season. Tackles Tim Magee and Mark Dennler, guards Tim Griesser and Steve Mader and Center John Hermann are all pushing or are over, the 200-pound mark and ends Bob Schwenne and Gary Esser have good size and speed.

In the backfield, Kanikkeberg will go with Bruce Scharnhorst as quarterback. Martin Gilge and Ron Hopkins will probably get the call at the half back slots, although half back Dick Green looked impressive in a full scrimmage game Monday night.

Rounding out the backfield will be Fred Morscheck, a full back with both speed and power.

Tim Griesser and Fred Morscheck have been appointed co-captains of the team this year. Managers will be David Baumgartner and Jerry Hopkins.

Lee Brocke, head coach of the Troy Trojans, reported Monday afternoon that he issued uniforms and gear to thirty prospective Trojans this year.

Coach Brocke said he was hurt by graduation losses and will be fielding a lighter-than-usual squad this year but added he was still looking forward to a pretty good season. Troy will have some returning lettermen from last season's Trojan team and as area sport fans know, Troy never fails to produce a strong, tough squad. It was the Troy group that tagged the Genesee league winners with their tie game last year.

Three Fires Called Crews Out In Past Week

Dick Benjamin, fire warden of the Kendrick Protective District reports three fires of last week, two of which were caused by trains passing thru the areas.

One train fire was started 2.5 miles South of Harvard. It burned some four acres of timber before it was brought under control.

Another small fire broke out on the Maehl Nye property in the Pine Grove area east of Genesee in the

Little Potlatch Canyon section. It was easily contained within a few acres.

On Thursday morning, around 11:00 a. m., the second fire started by a train began not far from town on the hillside out of Little Bear Canyon. The fire was in steep and rugged areas which prohibited the use of heavy equipment. The Kendrick Protective District Firemen and many volunteers were at the scene fighting against a variable wind that complicated attempts to contain the fire as it ate its way into a former burn on the west side of the tracks.

The blaze was brought under control near the top of the ridge thru the help of all who fought it by hand. Many of the fighters were teen-agers who did a creditable job all the way. Fire Warden Benjamin expressed appreciation for the help he received.

Saturday Was Hottest
Kendrick and the valley endured the hottest day of the year last Saturday although there was no official temperature reported.

Lewiston weather stations showed their official high for the year that day with a 107-degree reading, and Kendrick is never too far behind the Lewiston average.

The temperatures gradually rose last week, with each day being just a little hotter than the previous one until the blistering Saturday was reached. Following the record high the temperatures took a welcome drop on Sunday and moderate winds also helped the cooling trend.

Sunday night and early Monday the mercury skidded down until it was in the low to middle forties at sunrise. The cooler weather continued to hold over the area during the middle of the week and the skies showed cloudiness Tuesday night.

Only traces of moisture have been recorded for the past two months, and the area is very parched and dry with fire hazards at the season peak. All people are urged to use extreme caution at all times to prevent fire.

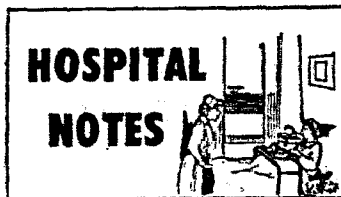

WHEAT OFFICIAL TO BE EXPORT ADVISOR

Harold West, Boise, administrator of the Idaho Wheat Commission and Idaho Bean Commission, has been appointed to the Regional Export Expansion Council of the U. S. Department of Commerce.

The Regional Export Expansion Councils of the nation advise the U. S. Department of Commerce on matters of foreign trade policy and assist the department in promoting the growth of U. S. exports. Past activities of the Council have included export workshops, seminars, and conferences.

West will attend his first Council meeting on August 27 at the Benson Hotel, Portland.



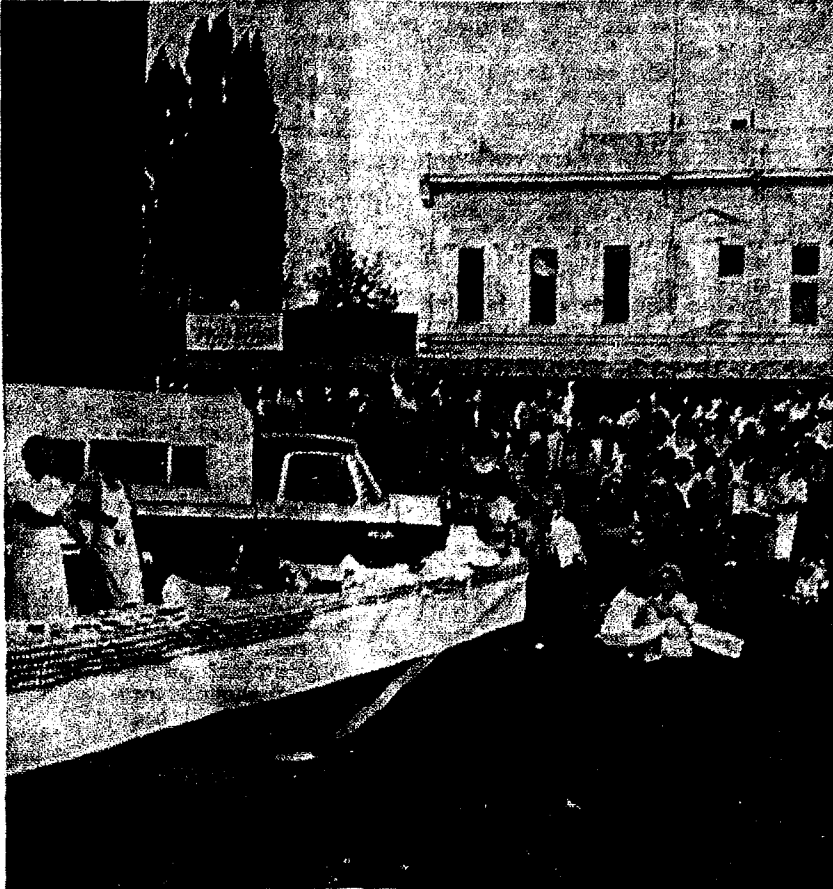

Marine Lance Cpl. Ray E. Hombel, son of Mr. and Mrs. James H. Hombel, E10921 Nixon, Spokane, was killed Tuesday in Viet Nam as a result of fragmentation wounds to the head and body he received from an enemy rocket grenade.

Cpl. Hombel, a member of Co. C, First Reconnaissance Battalion, First Marine Division, was killed in Quang Nam Province when the observation post he was on came under attack.

Born in Moscow, Idaho, Hombel was a graduate of Spokane's University High School and had attended Argonne Jr. High School. He moved to Spokane from Moscow in 1960 with his family.

He joined the Marines in January, 1968, and had received basic training at Camp Pendleton, Calif., before being stationed in Viet Nam.

In addition to his parents, he is survived by a brother, Guy Hombel, 18, and a sister, Lynne Marie Hombel, 16, both at the home; and two grandmothers, Edna Smith, Genesee, Idaho, and Genevieve McCubbin, Enter-

prise, Oregon.

HIGH MOUNTAIN LAKES IN CLEARWATER REGION

Fishing in many of the high mountain lakes of the Clearwater Region is best during the month of August. More and more people are discovering the thrill of hiking into these spectacular areas and they also provide an excellent opportunity to catch trophy cutthroat and rainbow trout up to 20 inches long.

Many of our lakes in Idaho would be barren if it were not for the regular planting program of the Idaho Fish and Game Department. Surveys have been made of most of our lakes to determine their suitability for planting. The depth of the water, food supply, and accessibility are all taken into consideration. Those lakes without natural spawning areas are usually planted about every three years. If there is heavier fishing pressure, they are planted more often.

A variety of methods are utilized to transport the fingerlings to the lakes. This could involve backpacking, horseback, or by plane or helicopter. The latter two methods are most commonly used because several lakes can be planted during each trip and it can be done more economically. As the pilot makes a bombing run on the lake the fingerlings are flushed into the water along with several gallons of water. This does not seem to harm them and very few are lost using such a method.

Cutthroat and rainbow trout are the most commonly planted fish because the eggs are readily available and they are preferred by fishermen. There have also been both golden trout and grayling planted in lakes of the Clearwater region when these rare eggs were available.

The following is a list of some of the better lakes in our area by general localities: North Fork Clearwater—Steep Lake has been good for golden trout to 17 inches (3 fish limit). Fish Lake in Cedars area has excellent cutthroat fishing with a 10 trout limit. The road into Fish Lake has been closed by the U. S. forest Service at the request of the Idaho Fish and Game Department because it was feared the heavy fishing pressure would deplete the trout population. Eggs are periodically collected from these nice cutthroat for planting of other mountain waters and it is hoped the reduced season (it didn't begin until August 1st)—and bag limit of 10 fish, will maintain this population at an adequate level.

Powell area on Lochsa—Walton Lakes have produced well on 7-11 in cutthroat. Big Sand and Hidden Lake continue to have abundant population of smaller cutthroat. For those hardy souls that are not afraid of a rigorous hike, the following lakes have big trout in them: Skookum, Moose, Granite, Sish, Parachute, North Goat Lake, and Duck Lake.

Selway Crags—Scenery is outstanding in this area with lots of wildlife also. The main jump off point is from the end of the Big Fog Mountain Road. South Three Links lakes are loaded with eastern brook trout to 10 inches long (50 fish limit because trout are overpopulated for the food supply). Rocky Lake also has some good sized brook trout. Maude and Lottie Lakes have some large trout for those willing to hike.

Selway — Bitterroot Divids—All are difficult of access but have good populations of large fish. North Whittcap, Cub, Thirteen Mountain Lakes, Battle, and Park Lake can be reached by three different routes; from the Montana side, a long hike from the Powell area roads, or off the Elk City to Darby Road.

Buffalo Hump—Accessible by 4-speed pickup or 4-wheel drive in the latter 10 miles of road from Cracker
