## Area Sizzles In Hot, Dry Weather; Relief Is Forecast

Latah and Nez Perce counties continued to feel the dry, searing heat of the most prolonged drought since 1939 as weather recorders reported that August was another .00 month with no measurable precipitation falling during the thirty-one day period. July was also totally free of moisture. The bright spot in the picture was the forecast by the Lewiston weather station that there was a good chance of rain later in the week.

John Luedke, who maintains the rain gauge in the Genesee area, said Monday that there has not been measurable precipitation in the area since June 23, when .09 inches was recorded.

Despite the tinder-dry conditions existing because of the drought, there have been surprisingly few

major fires. In the Genesee country fire destroyed a barn last week and a hog shed (see separate articles) but grain field fires have been held to a minimum. A tribute to the carefulness of the farmers.

Last Thursday, a grass fire threatened the Arnie Zumbroff residence on the Jess Lundsford property two miles below Juliaetta. The exact cause of the fire was unknown said Dick Benjamin, local fire warden, but the blaze burned on three sides of the house before it was extinguished. The fire was first spotted and reported by Mrs. Herb Millard, bookkeeper at Gem State Lumber. Quick reporting of the fire and prompt action by the fire fighters prevented possible burning of the house, said Benjamin.

Benjamin said conditions in the forests are extreme, with the fire index very high. Loggers around this area have been on restricted logging for some weeks now, because of the dry, dangerous conditions. Chain saw operations have been stopped at 1:00 p. m. each day, although skidding and work on the landings have been allowed to continue. "From noon to 6 p. m. is the high danger point in the woods right now," the warden stated. He added that because of the cool nights which have been coming during the past week, he did not think it would be necessary to place further restrictions on logging activities.

Country and forest roads has been reduced to dust bins this summer for lack of moisture. Every truck or car produces a rolling tunnel of thick dust as it passes over the roads and the heavy use of some of the roads by grain trucks during harvest have caused wash-boarding on every route with the slightest incline. Because of the dry conditions, country and district road crews are virtually helpless to correct the conditions. Grading would be ineffective even if possible.

Many of the forest roads, which are mostly without gravel, are almost ankle deep in dust, reported Benjamin. He said Monday morning that last week he was up in the mountains and in some places the dust was so deep that it required the use of a four-wheel drive vehicle to move with any degree of certainty.

### Fire Destroyed Troy Plant Saturday Night

Fire Saturday night completely destroyed the Troy Fiberlam Co., a 3-year-old fiberglass manufacturing firm which was managed by Ole Hanson of that city.

According to Assistant Fire Chief Art Johnson, the fire was reported at 9:30 p. m. and after assistance by the Moscow Fire Department, was brought under control at 11:30 p. m.

Some 30 volunteer from Moscow and Troy fought the blaze. The cause is still undetermined.

The building, valued at \$15,000 and owned by Mrs. John Theissen, Lewiston, was fully insured.

Contents of the 32-year-old frame structure, according to Hanson, were valued at \$12,000 and were insured at one-third of that.

Under construction were fiberglass boats, pickup canopies, shower stalls, kayaks, campers, plastic tanks and other fiberglass products.

Some 10 employees worked at the plant full-time, with part-time help available at Troy for small jobs.

### Kendrick School Enrollment At Record High

A record number of students enrolled at Kendrick High School for the 1969 Fall term, it was reported this week by James V. Muscat, superintendent of schools. The 145 pupils enrolled at the high school is the most ever.

The individual enrollment figures for both grade and high schools are: Juliaetta Elementary—1st, 29; 2nd, 22; 3rd, 29; 4th, 33; 5th, 40; 6th, 36.

In Junior High, 63 registered and senior high school record-breaking figure was 145.

Mr. Muscat says the total enrollment will go well over 400.

GENESEE—There was a total of 316 students enrolled for the beginning of the fall term at the Genesee Public School, reported Supt. Lester C. Diehl Tuesday afternoon.

Registered were: 32 in first grade; 23, second; 25, third; 20, fourth; 24 fifth; 30, sixth; 22, seventh; and 18, eighth.

A total of 122 students have registered in high school.

Supt. Diehl stated that high school students will have class and club meetings Friday to elect officers and set up their calendar of events for the year.

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### BARN BURNED AT VESTAL FARM

Fire, of unknown origin, completely destroyed a large hay barn at the Vestal farm, seven miles south of Genesee last Wednesday afternoon.

Besides the barn and contents, a stock loafing shed and about an acre and a half of pea stubble were burned.

### GEO. BANKS, 75, RETIRED SOIL CONSERVATIONIST, DIES

George B. Banks, a retired soil conservationist, died Sunday night at St. Joseph's hospital, Lewiston. Cause of death was not immediately determined.

He had worked for the Soil Conservation for 22 years before his retirement in 1957. He spent most of that time with the Nez Perce Soil Conservation District.

In the early 1930's he accepted employment in a blister rust camp with the Forest Service. Within a few years he became foreman of a CCC camp in Moscow. In 1940 he established and headed a CCC spike camp at Asotin until it was closed a year later at the beginning of WW II.

Banks then became a conservation aide with the SCS and worked out of the Moscow office for several months before being assigned to Lewiston. From then until retirement he worked for the Nez Perce SCS.

The body is at Vassar-Rawls Funeral Home.

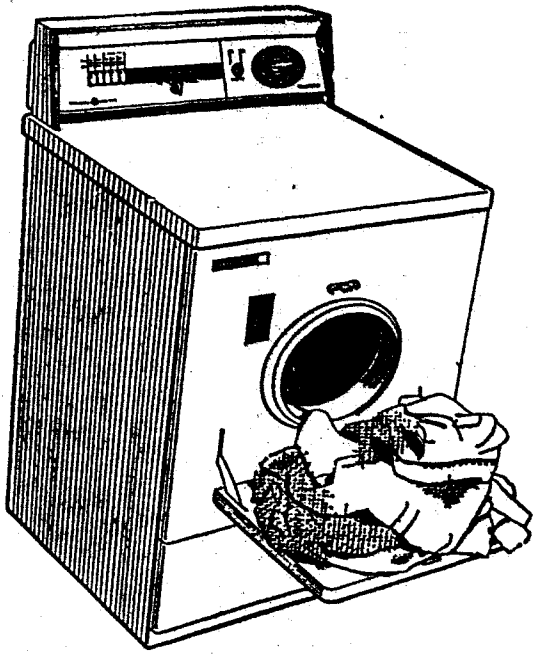
Banks was well known in the Genesee area.

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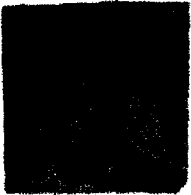

2 cups dried lima beans  
3/4 pound pork sausage  
1 1/2 cups tomato juice or 1 can of cream of tomato soup  
1/4 teaspoon chilli powder  
Salt and pepper  
Wash and sort lima beans, then soak in water to cover for several hours or overnight. Cook in same water until tender. Drain, reserving liquid. Brown pork sausage thoroughly and drain off drippings. 1 egg

Combine apples, crumbs, raisins or currants, sugar and lemon peel. Add beaten egg, melted butter, and nutmeg, and stir until blended. Spoon into mold and steam two hours. Serve with cream or autumn sunshine sauce  
Makes 8 to 10 servings  
Autumn Sunshine Sauce:  
Sift 1/2 cup brown sugar. Add 1/4 cup to 2 unbeaten egg yolks and beat until light. Add dash of salt to two unbeaten egg whites and beat until foamy. Add remaining 1/4 cup sugar gradually to egg whites, beating after each addition until sugar is blended, then beat stiff. Combine egg mixtures and fold in 1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped, and 1 teaspoon vanilla.

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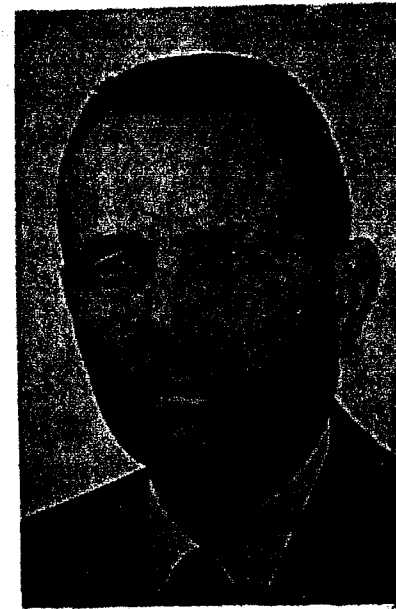

**HUNS, CHUKAR, QUAIL:** September 20 - December 31, except lower Snake and Salmon Rivers to January 25, 1970.
