

Genesee Edges Trojans 12-0; Nezperce Nips Kendrick 8-6

The White Pine League's 11-man football season opened last Friday night and following the dust of battle it appears that the league may be closer this year than at any other time, if the scores are an indication of the four teams' potential.

Genesee, rated high this year, had all the trouble they wanted as they struggled to win over the spirited Troy Trojans at Genesee. That same evening the usually strong Nezperce Indians had to play come-from-behind ball to edge out the Kendrick Tigers 8-6 on the K. H. S. gridiron.

After a scoreless first quarter, Kendrick's Steve Howerton took off for a seventy-yard scoring run in

the second period to give the Tigers a 6-0 lead over the Nezperce team. Kendrick's extra point try failed as the kick was no good. Howerton's sweep of the end gave the Tigers the lead at half-time.

The Indians tied it all up in the third quarter when their quarterback went seventy yards for a touchdown and then put the Indians ahead 8-6 on an end run worth two-points. This two points for a running or passing point-after-touchdown is a new ruling this year for high school ball. The kicked PAT is still worth 1 point.

After the game Coach Wayne Dust said he was satisfied with the defense of the Tiger team, but not with the offense. "We'll be working on offense this week," he added. About the Nezperce touchdown Dust said his team just had a little trouble getting started in the third quarter and the Indians took advantage of it. "We can improve in every department," the KHS coach said, "but I think we were their equal."

Genesee Defense Strong
Outstanding defense play on the line spelled the difference for the Genesee Bulldogs as they were hard-pressed to down the spunky Troy Trojans 12-0 on the GHS field.

Several in the Troy defensive line found themselves in the Genesee backfield almost as often as the Genesee backs, giving the Bulldog quarterback Bruce Scharnhorst little time to get set. Genesee broke into the scoring column early in the second quarter as Fred Morscheck climaxed a 65-yard Genesee drive by going 27 yards for a touchdown. Dick Green's broken field running had helped bring the ball down the field. Green's PAT attempt was stopped.

Troy, gaining little on the ground, started passing the ball early in the game although Trojan QB Bob Abbott looked good, he had trouble breaking receivers into the clear. Scharnhorst picked up the other Genesee touchdown on the fourth quarter with a 64-yard end run after picking up a crucial block as he turned the corner at left end. Troy had moved the ball down inside the Bulldog 10 during the third quarter, but the Genesee line held.

Kendrick At Genesee
The usual Friday night game has been moved back to Saturday evening, September 13, as the Kendrick Tigers invade the Genesee gridiron looking for their first win. Game time will be 7:30 p. m.

Council To Examine Possible LID Formation

Genesee — the possibility of creating a city-wide Local Improvement District to sell bonds and use the money to pave all the streets in the city was discussed for the first time at the September meeting of the Genesee City Council, held Monday, Sept. 8 at the City Building.

The formation of this LID was put forth as a solution to getting all the streets paved at one time without having to wait until a certain amount of tax money becomes available each year. What the city proposes to do now is investigate the cost of this project and then hold a series of public information meetings. If there appears to be sufficient interest the city would then hold an election, which would in effect be a bond election. More information on this will be published as it becomes available.

In other business Monday the City Council discussed with John Luedke plans for connecting his well to the city water line leading up to the cemetery. Both parties to this agreed on basic policies and Mr. Luedke will contact his attorney to draw up a contract. The use of the Luedke water well will be a definite advantage to the city, and in exchange Mr. Luedke will be connected to the city system.

The water line to the city cemetery is almost complete. The cemetery district has paid for the actual pipe used and the city will pay half of the installation costs.

Council Roth said that the restrictions placed on sprinkling and irrigation within the city limits last month is now lifted.

Last Monday the city received \$500 from the state for snow removal costs incurred during last winter's severe storms.

The Council discussed the sale of the Rice Building on Main Street. There has been one prospective purchaser and the Council will soon advertise the building for sale by sealed bids.

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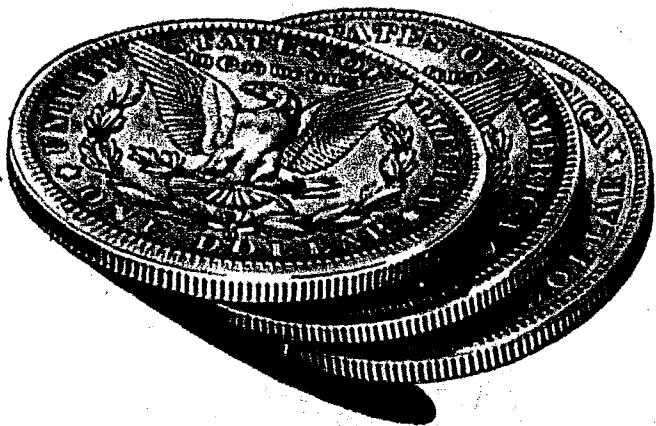
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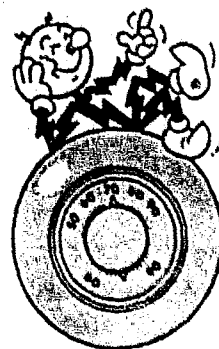


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Susan Winterfelt, 66, Genesee Native, Dies At Moscow

Now Is The Time For Fall Weed Control

It will soon be time for the fall offensive against perennial weeds, reminds Robert Higgins, University of Idaho extension agronomist. Effective blows can be struck with chemicals. Weeds ready for autumn treatment include Canada thistle, field bindweed and Russian Knapweed. If they are hit with 2,4-D in late August or early September, they have a hard time surviving.

The weeds should have good top growth at the time so that the herbicide is most effective, Higgins said. Use about two pounds of 2, 4-D in 30 gallons of water per acre usually knocks them out.

After crops on irrigated land are harvested, Higgins recommended, irrigate the field to promote weed growth. Spray when they are about six inches high. In fields that are not irrigated, spraying with 2,4 D, is also advocated, providing there is enough moisture to promote growth. After spraying, wait about a week before cultivating or plowing.

When conditions permits, he said, applications of dicamba, combinations of dicamba and 2,4-D, picloram, or picloram and 2,4-D are effective. Granular dicamba and picloram are both excellent weed killers. They

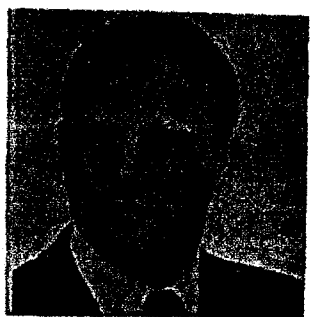
