Bulldogs Blank Tigers 40-0; Both Teams Travel Friday

Genesee's defensive-minded Bulldog football team took quick advantage of every mistake Saturday evening as they pounded out a 40-0 win over the visiting Kendrick Tigers on the Genesee field. This was the second league victory of the Bulldogs, and the second loss for the Tigers.

Both teams showed excellent defense during the first quarter, with neither squad able to maintain a good offensive drive. Genesee capitalized on a Tiger mistake to score the first points of the game. Kendrick had halted a Genesee drive on their own three-yard line, and then failing to move the ball had attempted to kick out of the end zone.

Booster Club Sought For Tigers

Lt. Col. Robert Wegner Retires From Air Force

Lt. Col. Robert A. Wegner, a Kendrick native, and a brother of Mrs. Ed. Nelson, has taken his retirement from the U. S. Air Force. In his 28 years and 10 months of service, Lt. Col. Wegner has racked up a total of 6,800 hours of flying time in 28 different types of aircraft. He began his service career Oct. 30, 1940, finishing his 30 years of service Aug. 31st, 1969.



He was born at Cameron, living there until he was 15, when he moved with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. August O. Wegner, to Pullman, where he graduated from high school. He has studied at the University of Maryland, College Park, University of Wichita, Kansas, and graduated from Industrial College of Armed Forces at Ft. McNair, Va.

He and his wife, the former Betty M. Robinson, live in Valdosta, Georgia.

Naval Academy at Annapolis next week.

On Wednesday the two will be taken to Washington, D. C. where they will be guests of a luncheon in the capitol. They will return to Annapolis for more briefings and tours and will then be flown home.

The purpose of the trip is to acquaint a select number of educators around the nation with the facilities of the military academies so they may have first hand information for young men interested in service careers.

Pythian Sisters Food Sale

GENESEE—The Pythian Sisters will hold a food sale Saturday, Sept. 27 at 2:00 p. m. at Esther's.

The ball's snap went over the head of fullback Alan Kimbley and was downed in the end zone by the Bulldogs for a two-point safety.

Stymied by the Tiger defensive line, the Bulldogs found a weakness as they sent Dick Green, their speedy halfback, on a 14-yard run that was good for six points. The extra point try failed.

Kendrick recovered a Bulldog fumble and moved the ball down to the Genesee 6-yard line before a backfield in motion penalty sent them to the 11-yard line. The Tigers couldn't move the ball again and gave it up on downs. A few minutes later Green swept around right end again for another touchdown and the Bulldogs led 14-0.

Tiger quarterback Kim Trout, who hadn't tried many passes in the game, attempted to pass out in the flat and had it picked off by the Genesee quarterback Bruce Scharnhorst, who raced 35 yards to give the Bulldogs a 20-0 halftime lead.

Dale Hickman took the opening kickoff in the second half, picked up a few blockers around his own forty yard line and then completed seventy yards for the next Bulldog touchdown.

Kendrick couldn't move the ball after the TD kickoff and gave up the ball on downs. Genesee moved 60 yards down the field, only to be halted on the seven yard line by the stubborn Tigers. The Tigers, deep in their own territory, couldn't get out and were forced to punt. The punt was partially blocked and picked up on the twelve yard line by Scharnhorst, who ran it across for another score. A pass from Scharnhorst to Schwene made it 34-0 for the Bulldogs.

Dick Green picked up the final Genesee score in the fourth quarter with another thirty-eight yard run around right end, to seal the 40-0 win.

Kendrick At Troy

Unless there is a tie game, either Troy or Kendrick is going to break a two-game losing streak Friday evening. The Tigers packed up for a game with the Trojans on the Troy field. Troy lost to Genesee 12-0 in their first game, and were downed 40-20 last Friday at Nespeere.

Home Cookin' ...

CHICKEN ALMONDINE

1 large chicken (4-5 lbs) cooked as for stewing
 1 pkg. M. J. B. New Orleans or Creole Rice
 2 cups diced celery
 2 cans Cream of Chicken soup
 4 tsp. lemon juice
 1 cup mayonnaise
 ½ cup blanched, slivered almonds
 Cook chicken until tender but not soft. Cool, and remove meat from bones in large bite-size pieces. Cook rice as directed on pkg. Reserving a few almonds, for top of casserole—mix all other ingredients and add to chicken and rice. Place in two-quart casserole or flat baking

dish. Sprinkle remaining almonds on top. Dust with paprika. Bake 350 degree, 45 min. to 1 hour.

EGG CASSEROLE WITH SHRIMP SAUCE

Remove yolks from 8-10 hard cooked eggs. Mash and moisten with mayonnaise, ½ tsp. mustard, 1 tsp. lemon juice or vinegar. About a dozen olives chopped (either ripe or stuffed), salt and pepper to taste. More mustard as desired. Stuff eggs and arrange in baking dish. Cover with either 2-2½ cups thick white sauce (or the lazy way and use 2 cans cream of mushroom soup, undiluted) Add 1 or 2 tsp. worchestershire sauce, 1 tsp. sherry wine, (optional), 1 cup or can of shrimp or crab, ½ cup finely chopped celery and ¼ cup cut green pepper. 1 tsp. finely chopped parsley, 1 tsp. grated onion. Top with grated cheese.

Bake 30 minutes at 350 degrees. Pickled beets are nice to serve with this dish.

BEEF NOODLE CASSEROLE

1 pkg. chipped beef (¼ lb).
 2 cans cream of mushroom soup
 2 cups milk
 2 cups medium noodles (good measure)

1 cup grated sharp cheddar cheese
 4 hard cooked eggs (cut up).
 ¼ tsp. dry mustard
 ½ tsp. oregano
 1 small onion, diced
 Mix all together and put in a pyrex dish (unbuttered)
 (Do not cook noodles first)
 Refrigerate over night or several hours.

Bake 1 hour at 350 degree. Let stand about 15 minutes before serving

CURRIED SEA-FOOD SALAD

1 can tuna
 1 cup or can shrimp
 ½ cup mayonnaise or cooked salad dressing
 2 tsp. lemon juice
 ½-1 teasp. curry powder, or less
 ½ cup chopped celery
 ½ cup cut up ripe or stuffed olives
 3 cups cold cooked rice
 2-4 tsp. French dressing
 ½ cup snipped parsley
 Drain tuna well. In large bowl, combine tuna and shrimp (or use all tuna if you like.) Cover with foil; refrigerate until well chilled.
 Just before serving:
 In bowl, blend mayonnaise, lemon juice, curry. Add chopped celery and cut up ripe olives or stuffed olives. Pour over tuna and shrimp mixture and toss. Toss cold cooked rice with French dressing and snipped parsley. Spoon it onto a serving platter; heap sea-food mixture on top.
 Garnish with cup up olives.
 (Sometimes I add a chopped sweet pickle and 1-2 hard boiled eggs, chopped, (optional).
 Sliced tomato wedges and sliced cucumbers are nice served with this salad.

Variations: Curried chicken or turkey salad. Add ¼ cup chutney to mayonnaise. Just shrimp or crab meat makes a tasty salad.

MACARONI AND CHEESE PUFF

(almost like a souffle)
 ½ cup small elbow macaroni (no more)
 1½ cup milk, scalded
 1 cup soft bread crumbs
 2 cups shredded sharp cheese
 3 beaten egg yolks
 ¼ cup diced pimento
 3 tsp. butter, melted in milk
 1 tsp. chopped parsley
 1 tsp. grated onion
 ½ tsp. salt
 3 egg whites
 ¼ teasp. cream tartar
 Pour hot milk over bread crumbs—add cheese to milk, cover and let stand until cheese melts. Add cooked macaroni, egg yolks, pimento, parsley, onion and salt. Beat egg whites and cream of tartar until stiff. Fold into macaroni mixture. Pour into ungreased 10x6x1½-in. baking dish. Bake uncovered 325 degrees about 50 minutes, or till set. Serve at once.

PONDEROSA COLE SLAW

1 cup light flavored honey
 1 cup vinegar
 ½ cup finely chopped onion
 1 teasp. salt
 1 teasp. celery seed (optional)
 1 large head cabbage
 1 cup diced green pepper
 1 cup diced celery
 In saucepan, combine honey, and vinegar, (wine vinegar is good to use) onion, salt, and celery seed. Bring to boil, reduce heat and simmer five minutes. Cool, then pour over prepared vegetables and toss lightly. Chill several hours or overnight to blend flavor. Some may prefer the onion uncooked.

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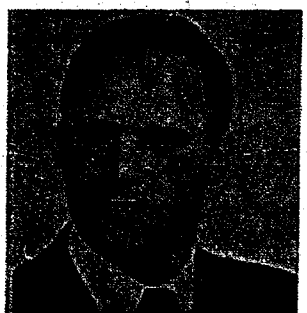

GENESEE —The following letter is one written by the officers and men under the command of Major Stanley Olson, protesting his transfer from Neu-Ulm, Germany, where he and his family have been stationed, to Kaiser-Sautern, Germany.

The letter reveals the high regard in which Major Olson is held by the officers and men under his command.

To the Editor:

(From the Overseas Weekly, 19 Schiller Str., 6 Frankfurt/Main)

On August 11, the 579th Ord Co. in Neu-Ulm lost its commanding officer. Why? Because he is conscientious, ambitious, respected, capable and willing to subordinate himself, his family and home to the needs of his men and his unit—yes, he is leaving because of all of these reasons.

What effect does this change have on a unit operating at 40 percent strength, in the process of reorganizing under a new TO&E, changing missions with a new missile system, and working an average of 10-12 hours a day per man? There can only be an extreme detrimental effect on all personnel of the unit and for the Pershing missile battalions and Federal Republic of Germany to whom we render general support and ordnance service.

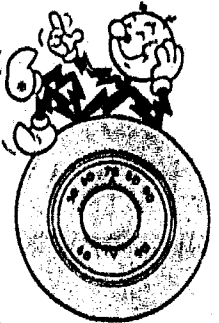

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
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"Operation Respect" Program Improves Sportsmen Relations

The "Operation Respect" program greatly improved relations between the landowners and sportsmen in the Lewiston area last year according to Stu Murrell, Idaho Fish and Game Department. This program, sponsored by the State Landholder Sportsman Council, is designed to encourage the hunter or fisherman to ask permission before entering private land.

The "Operation Respect" patches are purchased by sportsmen for \$1.00 and displayed on a coat or hunting jacket. Along with the patches, a supply of identification cards are furnished for the individual to give to the landholder when he asks permission.

 Some individuals secrete an excess of wax, which can fill the ear canal and produce an obstruction. When this happens, a physician should remove it with special tools under controlled conditions.
 Wax may periodically be wiped away from other portions of the ear canal with a piece of damp cotton.
 One should avoid using any sharp instrument, such as a hairpin or toothpick, that might damage the eardrum if pushed too deeply.
 Ear wax may be softened with a drop of olive oil or mineral oil. If not impacted, it may be flushed out with a gentle stream of water from a soft rubber syringe.

Advice On Buying Best Tasting Tomatoes

That "home-grown" flavor usually belongs to tomatoes grown nearby because they ripen on the vine, comments Mrs. Esther Wilson, nutrition specialist of the University of Idaho extension service. They have that familiar taste and juicy quality seldom found in shipments from afar that are picked green.

To make the most of the local crop that is on the market now and will be until frost, Mrs. Wilson advises choosing tomatoes that are well formed, smooth, and free of blemishes. Avoid those that are too soft, she cautions. They are likely to be overripe and bruised. By the same token, tomatoes that have green or yellow areas near the stem scar should be avoided. Chances are they are sunburned.

Ripe tomatoes keep nicely in the refrigerator. If you want to ripen some specimens a few days you can keep them at room temperature. But not in a sunny window sill, which is a common practice. To much sun, the specialist say, prevents normal color and detracts from flavor. It is a good idea to spread green tomatoes on a shelf at cool room temperature. The very green ones are best for immediate cooking or pickling.

To make the job of peeling ripe tomatoes easier, stroke the skin with

the dull edge of a knife until it is loosened. Another method is to jab a fork into the tomato and rotate it over a cook-stove burner until the skin is tight and shiny. Then pop it in cold water and peel. The skin comes off readily.
