Harris, a life-long resident of this area, purchased the Texaco Station from Fred Meyer in 1939. At that time the business consisted of just one small, block building with an out side grease pit. In January of 1940

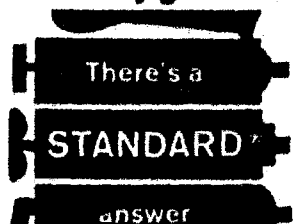

EARLY WATERFOWL SEASON

For the first time, Idaho waterfowl season starts a week earlier in 21 central and eastern Idaho counties than it does in the Columbia Basin Mallard Area. Season dates are October 4—December 28 for central and eastern Idaho duck, coot, and merganser shooting, and October 4—January 4 for geese.

In the 23 Idaho counties included in the Columbia Basin Mallard Area, the hunting season for ducks, mergansers and coots run from October 11—January 18, 1970; and the season for geese runs from October 11—January 4, 1970.

Home Cookin' . . .

For something different for that special evening meal, why not try Sweet and Sour Veal with rice or pork could be substituted for veal. This meat and rice combination gives a delightful oriental flavor.

- No. 2 can (2½ cup) pineapple tidbits
 - 1½ lb. veal or pork, cut in small cubes
 - 2 tbsl. fat
 - 1 cup celery, sliced
 - one-half cup chopped onion
 - three-fourths tsp. salt
 - pinch pepper
 - 1 beef bouillon cube
 - one-half cup hot water
 - 1 lb. can (2 cups) bean sprouts, drained
 - 1 3-oz. can broiled sliced mushrooms
 - 3 tbsl. cornstarch
 - 3 tbsl. soy sauce
 - 1 sp. monosodium glutamate
 - 3 cups hot, cooked rice.
- Drain pineapple, and reserve syrup. Brown meat in hot fat, add celery, onion, salt, pepper, bouillon cube, (dissolved in hot water) and the reserved pineapple syrup.
- Cover and simmer 60 to 75 minutes or until meat is tender. Then add pineapple, bean sprouts, and the reserved pineapple syrup.
- Blend cornstarch with soy sauce and monosodium glutamate, stir into hot mixture. Cook, stirring constantly until thick.
- Serve over rice.

FALL BEST TIME FOR FISHING

Here's why fall is best of all times to fish. Chilly nights bring waters down to ideal temperatures for active fish feeding. Lakes and reservoirs have a turnover of water in the fall just as they do in the spring—and the fish go wild.

Cooling waters sink to the bottoms of the reservoirs and lakes. This action displaces the summer-warmed layers of water below. Such mixing of water continues until all water is just under 39 degrees, and winter stagnation begins.

During the time of water circulation, fish scatter through the different temperature layers, according to preference of individual species. As cooling continues, the foraging of fish is upwards, where the most feed can be found, and action for fishermen speeds up accordingly.

New Staggered License Plate System For Autos

Under Idaho's new "staggered" license plate system, the length of time for which a motorist will buy tags this fall depends upon the last numeral of his present license plate.

If the final digit on the present license plate is 6 or higher, the motorist must buy a tag for less than a year—with a correspondingly lower payment. A 5 or lower will indicate the motorist will buy a tag for more than a year, with a correspondingly higher lump payment. Over the long run, however, it should work out that everyone pays the same rate per month for any given model of vehicle.

Everyone, however, must buy new tags before Dec. 31 this year. (The tags will go on sale Oct. 1 to spread out the purchase time and try to prevent logjams at county assessors' offices. The date the tags are purchased—between Oct. 1 and Dec. 31—will not affect the date they expire.)

The fun begins next year. Then, motorists with tags valid for less than a year will be buying their new ones any time between June and October 1970 depending on the final numeral. Those with the more expensive, long-term tags won't have to worry about it again until in 1971.

Here's the way it works: If the present license plate ends in 6, the tag purchased before the year end will expire in June, 1970. If the tag ends in 7, it will expire in July 1970. Plates ending in 8 will expire in August, 9 in September, and 0 in October.

The long-term tags also will go by the final digit, but the month indicated will be in 1971. Thus a tag purchased before the end of this year for a plate ending in 1 will not expire until January, 1971; a plate ending in 2 will expire in February, 1971, 3 in March, 1971, 4 in April, 1971, and 5 in May, 1971.

Thus, while the motorist with a lower final digit will pay more on the pro-rated system this year, he will not have to buy any plate or tag in 1970, so he'll come out even in the long run.

Once the new tags are purchased and expire, the motorist then will have to buy new tags every 12 months from the date of expiration in the future.

The new staggered system, however, only applies to passenger cars and pickups not over 8,000 pounds combined weight, bearing regular Idaho plates.

All other vehicles, such as commercial trucks and trailers, farm truck and trailers, motorcycles, house trailers, city cabs, buses, hearses, ambulances and wreckers, as well as special plates for cars such as radio

amateur, national guard and air national guard, will remain on a calendar year, Dec. 31 to Dec. 31 as in the past.

Fees for the staggered plates will be based on both the year model of the vehicle and the duration of the tags as determined by that final digit.

For a 1968-71 model, the fee is \$1.50 per month; for a 1966-67 car, \$1.25 per month; 1964-65, \$1.00; 1962-63, 80 cents, and 1961 and older, 60 cents.

Thus, for example, 1968 car with a plate ending in 6 would require a tag costing \$9—or \$1.50 per month for six months. The same car, with a tag ending in 5, would require a tag costing \$25.50, or \$1.50 per month for 17 months.

The highest fee on the schedule is \$25.50. The lowest fee would be \$3.60. This would be for a 1961 or older vehicle with a license plate ending in 6, at 60 cents per month for six months.

After the tags purchased last this year expire, future tags will cost the months fee for the model of car, times 12.

A person owning more than one vehicle which comes under the staggered plate law may purchase tags for all vehicles at the same time to avoid making more than one trip to the assessor's office, but still will pay the pro-rated fee on each as if he had purchased them at different times.

If a person trades cars after obtaining the staggered stickers, he may transfer the plates to the newly acquired vehicle as in the past, and will pay any difference in price on a pro-rated basis.

Such trades must be reported to the county assessor's office regardless of whether there will be a difference in the cost of the tags.

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More Big Game Units Will Open Saturday

Idaho's second big block of elk and deer management units start the hunting season October 4, according to printed big game seasons and regulations of the Fish and Game Department.

This means there will be both elk and deer hunting in 26 units, and deer hunting in 5 additional units, starting for the first time this year on October 4. Some of the units opening for "deer only" hunts will have controlled elk hunts at later dates this fall.

These new "opening days" do not affect big game hunting seasons which began September 20, or earlier. Management units included in Idaho's second big block opening are located mostly on the periphery of back country units already open for elk and deer hunting. These are in the high country but some access roads make the hunting easier.

Other season openings for block of game management units will be October 18 for deer and some elk hunts mainly in southern and eastern Idaho, and November 1 for white-tailed deer in panhandle and Clearwater units. On this species, hunters like to wait for tracking snow before going afield.

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Wheat Commission Will Have New Movie Soon

The Idaho Wheat Commission has completed production on a new color motion picture which will be released this fall. It was revealed here this week at a meeting of the Wheat Commission.

Titled "Big Green" the 15-minute film tells the story of how Idaho wheat is grown and marketed to consumers in the U. S. and foreign countries. Prints of the film will be distributed to educational institutions and copies for loan will be available on request from the Wheat Commission office in Boise. The film was produced by Fat Welch Pictures.

Harold West, Wheat Commission administrator, reported that a previous film, "Old Mr. In-Between," had so far been viewed by more than 22,000,000 persons in television and meeting audiences throughout the country.

In other business, the Wheat Commission approved a request from the University of Idaho for a grant of \$6,129 to purchase a plot combine for use at the Teton Branch Experimental Station.

West was authorized by the Commission to attend a September 25 meeting of the Wheat & Wheat Foods Foundation in Chicago. This organization promotes domestic consumption of wheat products, and at the Chicago meeting members will consider proposing legislation to fund the Foundation for an aggressive promotional campaign.

Wheat commission members noted that the Idaho State Wheat Growers Association 1969 convention would be held in Boise, December 1 and 2, at the Downtowner.

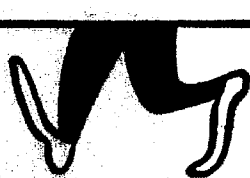
