### Incumbent Juliaetta Councilmen Will Seek Re-election Nov. 4

Juliaetta — Three incumbent members of the Juliaetta City Council have filed petitions of candidacy for re-election at the Tuesday, November 4, municipal election. In addition there has been one other petition of candidacy filed for the council position.

Jack Brown, who was appointed by Mayor Gilbert Sprout to fill out the unexpired term of Fred Silfow, last year, will seek a complete two-year term on the council. He is the only candidacy for this office.

Bruce Sherman and Lewis Groseclose will again seek election to the council for terms of four years. Richard Groseclose has also filed to be on the ballot for one of these council seats.

**Vote On Leash Law**

If the voting public approves retention of the law, the law will be more strictly enforced.

Reverse plowing will be the highlight of a mold board plowing demonstration Friday, October 10, beginning at 1:00 at the Charles Bower farm on Big Bear Ridge, between Kendrick and Deary. Farm implement dealers of Moscow will provide tractors and plows. The event is sponsored by the Latah Soil and Water Conservation District.

Reverse plowing means starting in the center of the field and plowing the entire field toward the center. It eliminates "turning" on plowed ground and over a period of time will reduce old dead furrows and stop the build-up on the outer edge of the field.

GENESEEE—A series of articles on Home Economics will appear in this paper. This is being done as a partial fulfillment for a Future Homemakers of America State Degree. Kathleen Helbling, Chap. FH A pres. The objectives of Home Ec are to develop the skills, abilities, and knowledge in a young girl so that she will be able to meet the demands of a home and family whenever the need may arise. In Genesee, Home Ec is under Mrs. Mike Fitzpatrick.

Beginning Home Ec is a composite of many different areas of Home Ec: foods, good grooming, child study, and sewing.

Beginning Home Ec or Home Ec I develops the basic skills in a student. They are currently studying foods, nutrition and menu planning, and finishing up a unit on quick breads. They studied what each ingredient does and have prepared several quick breads in class.

If a girl enjoys Home Economics she can enroll in a semester length class. This year there are four of these. Home furnishing and advanced foods are first semester, and advanced clothing and tailoring, second semester. In home furnishings you learn the basic principles of art and how to use color, plus dr. 7 floor plans and study each room. They are now doing individual projects. Some are refinishing and recovering chairs and antique furniture. Advanced foods is currently studying food preservation. They have canned zucchini relish, apple butter, apple slices, carrots, and meat. They are also studying the commercial methods of preservation, irradiation, freeze-drying, drying, etc.

### Plant Your Bulb Garden Now, Says Expert

Moscow — "Right now is the time to design and plant next year's bulb garden," advises W. H. Snyder, horticulturist and landscape architect at the University of Idaho.

There's a bulb for almost any effect you want. However, when you are browsing in the bulb catalogs, use restraint," notes Snyder. He suggests choosing a few varieties for mass groupings.

For special effects, Snyder recommends planting smaller flower narcissi under small trees or in drifts on lightly shaded slopes. Tall, straight-stemmed tulips are dramatic clusters in borders, among shrubs or in front of evergreens. Dwarf novelty tulips are at their best in rock gardens.

"Work out your design, then order your bulbs. Order early, because commercial growers fill orders on a first-come, first-served basis," Snyder discourages buying "bargain bulbs," stating that top-grade stock from reputable dealers is your "best buy."

"Plant narcissi, daffodils, jonquils, snowdrops now; tulips in mid-October or later. These easy to grow bulbs succeed in nearly every soil, but they prefer one that's easily worked, well drained and fertile."

To prepare the soil, spade to a depth of one foot or more and work well rotted manure into bottom of the bed. Cover manure with at least two inches of soil, then cover with soil into which you've worked 5-10-5 fertilizer at the rate of four pounds per 100 square feet.

"Now you can plant your bulbs. Set narcissus bulbs twice as deep as their diameters; set tulip bulbs with their tips three to four inches deep. Bulbs must not touch manure because it may cause rot and disease."

One last thing to do is to mulch lightly after the ground freezes, adds Snyder.

New license plate stickers for 1970 and 1971 now are available at the county assessors' offices, and must be purchased prior to Dec. 31, 1969. The state's new staggered system for issuing plate stickers applies to passenger car and pickups under 8,000 pounds combined weight.

## About Snowmobile Registrations

**Home Cookin'...**

Another recipe this week from Mrs. Roy Patchen. She sent it along with the others a few weeks ago, so we decided to run this one separately. She says it makes a big hit at potluck suppers. Try it, and you'll see why. It's delicious.

Early in the day cook 4 cups of noodles (one-half pound) as package directs, drain.

Meanwhile, in 2 Tbsp. butter in skillet, saute 1 1/2 pounds ground chuck until browned. Stir in three 8-ounce cans tomato sauce, 1/2 tsp. dry oregano; 1/2 tsp. black pepper; 1/4 cup concentrated bouillon, and 1/4 tsp. accent.

Remove from heat.

Combine 1/2 pound of cottage cheese (1 cup), an 8-ounce package soft cream cheese, 1/4 cup sour cream, 1/2 cup minced green onions, 1 Tbsp. green peppers, minced.

In 3-quart casserole, spread 1/2 of the noodles; cover with cheese mixture, then cover with rest of noodles. Pour melted butter over noodles; then tomato-meat sauce.

Chill.

About an hour before serving: Heat over to 375 degrees and bake 45 min, or until gravy is bubbly.

Accompanying the casserole a suggested salad of grated cabbage, carrots and crushed pineapple in lemon gelatin. For dessert frozen peaches and raspberries.

**Report Your Address Changes To Social Security**

Changing of addresses on social security checks has been made more convenient for social security beneficiaries, according to D. Gene Shaw, Social Security District Manager in Lewiston.

Printed on the back of the check envelope is a blank which can be used by the person receiving the check to change the address. This form can be mailed or personally delivered to the nearest social security office. If the change of address is received by the 12th of the month, we can always get the address changed before the next check is due, Shaw said.

The new reporting method enables the district office to take advantage of their high speed communication circuits to transmit information to records centers. Until recently, social security beneficiaries were requested to notify the records centers by mail. By notifying the social security district office, changes are more accurate and considerably faster, Shaw said.

**Home Cookin' . . .**

Another recipe this week from Mrs. Roy Patchen. She sent it along with the others a few weeks ago, so we decided to run this one separately. She says it makes a big hit at potluck suppers. Try it, and you'll see why. It's delicious.

Early in the day cook 4 cups of noodles (one-half pound) as package directs, drain.

Meanwhile, in 2 Tbsp. butter in skillet, saute 1 1/2 pounds ground chuck until browned. Stir in three 8-ounce cans tomato sauce, 1/2 tsp. dry oregano; 1/2 tsp. black pepper, 1/4 cup concentrated bouillon, and 1/4 tsp. accent.

Remove from heat.

Combine 1/2 pound of cottage cheese (1 cup), an 8-ounce package soft cream cheese, 1/4 cup sour cream, 1/2 cup minced green onions.

1 Tbsp. green peppers, minced.

In 3-quart casserole, spread 1/2 of the noodles; cover with cheese mixture, then cover with rest of noodles. Pour melted butter over noodles; then tomato-meat sauce.

Chill.

About an hour before serving: Heat over to 375 degrees and bake 45 min. or until gravy is bubbly.

Accompanying the casserole a suggested salad of grated cabbage, carrots and crushed pineapple in lemon gelatin. For dessert frozen peaches and raspberries.

**Report Your Address Changes To Social Security**  
 Changing of addresses on social security checks has been made more convenient for social security beneficiaries, according to D. Gene Shaw, Social Security District Manager in Lewiston.

Printed on the back of the check envelope is a blank which can be used by the person receiving the check to change the address. This form can be mailed or personally delivered to the nearest social security office. If the change of address is received by the 12th of the month, we can always get the address changed before the next check is due, Shaw said.

The new reporting method enables the district office to take advantage of their high speed communication circuits to transmit information to records centers. Until recently, social security beneficiaries were requested to notify the records centers by mail. By notifying the social security district office, changes are more accurate and considerably faster, Shaw said.

Boise — Going into the final quarter of the year, Idaho appears to be heading toward another highway death record, considering the fatality toll at the end of September was 10 ahead of the number recorded at that time a year ago.  
State Police records show 28 persons died in traffic accidents last month, compared with 25 in September of 1968. Highway fatalities at the end of last month stood at 228, compared with 218 a year ago.  
Last month four of the victims were pedestrians, making it the second worst month for pedestrian-vehicle accidents this year, as five pedestrians were killed in May. Pedestrian deaths this year total 22, as compared with 20 in all of 1968.  
State Police point out 82 persons were killed in traffic accidents during the last three months of 1968, and note that unless this number is reduced this year, the final count will be over 300 — the all-time highway death record set in 1968.  
State Police records show there are only four counties in the state — Camas, Clark, Lewis and Oreglia, where no traffic fatalities have occurred this year.  
To date, Latah county has had 5 fatalities; Nez Perce county 6, and Clearwater 6.
