Kendrick Faces Write-In City Election Nov. 4

Kendrick voters face the task of selecting a mayor and at least one city councilman by the write-in method at the municipal election on Tuesday, November 4. A misinterpretation of the final day for filing petitions of candidacy has caused a vacancy on the ballot. Only one candidate for councilman, Darrell Brocke, filed early enough to meet the new state requirements.

To be filled at the November 4th election will be the position of Kendrick mayor and two councilmen for terms of four years each. The ballot will show a blank space for mayor candidates and only the name of Darrell Brocke will appear in the councilman column. In order to elect two councilmen, at least one other name must be written in.

The terms of the present mayor, Donald (Bud) Elchner, and councilmen James Hoogland and Robert Watts expire December 31. These are the vacancies that must be filled. Other councilmen who still have two years left to serve are Wayne Harris and John Deobald.

National School Lunch Week Observance Planned

October 12 through 18 is National School Lunch Week. This week is being observed in the Kendrick and Juliaetta lunch rooms.

October 15 a universal menu will be served nation-wide, as recommended by the American School Food Service Association.

The suggested menu will be featured at both Kendrick and Juliaetta school cafeterias: Hamburger sandwich; buttered green beans; tossed green salad with tomatoes (choice of dressing); fruit cup; peanut butter cookie; ½ pint milk.

Following are the combined quantities of food necessary for both school cafeterias, to create this nutritious meal: 65 lbs. of ground beef along with approximately 50 lbs of flour, to make the buns.

Some of the other items of food will be ten No. 10 tins of green beans; 10 lbs. of butter; 16 heads of lettuce; 10 lbs. of tomatoes; 10 lbs. of other fresh salad vegetables; eight No. 10 tins of fruit, plus 20 lbs. of bananas; 500 peanut butter cookies and 28 gallons of whole milk.

Posters in each school class room advertising the special day are being used in the Juliaetta Elementary school. The Senior Men's Home Economics class of Kendrick High school will cook and serve the lunch at Kendrick, as this has been a project for the past two weeks in quantity cooking.

During September 7,148 lunches were served in the district schools lunch program.

Tractor Accident Claims Life Of Jerry Kasper Friday

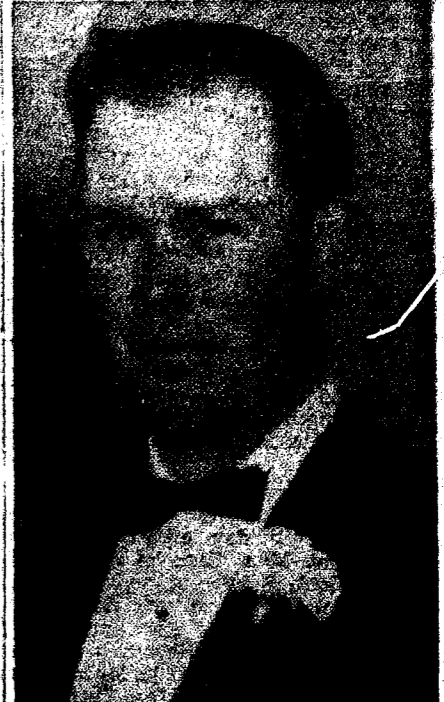
GENESEE—A tractor mishap Friday claimed the life of Jerome M. (Jerry) Kasper, 32, Nez Perce county farmer, residing four miles south of Genesee.

The accident occurred about 4:15 p. m. while Kasper was attempting to unload his tractor from a truck at the Broemeling Welding Shop. Apparently the starter on the truck-type tractor wasn't working, and in an attempt to get it started, crossed ignition wires while standing on the track. When the machine fired, the tractor moved forward, throwing Kasper underneath the track and then to the ground. The tractor continued to move, fell off the track, killing him instantly.

Jerry was born August 12, 1937 at Lewiston, Idaho, the son of Mrs.

Mary Kasper, and the late Matthew Kasper.

He attended St. Mary's Parochial school in Genesee and graduated from Genesee High School in 1955. He attended the University of Idaho for two years.

In Hard-Fought Contest—

Bulldogs Edge Lapwai 13-8 For Season's Sixth Victory

Genesee High School kept their unbeaten record safe Friday night as they defeated the Lapwai Wildcats 13-8 on the Lapwai field in the toughest football contest the Bulldogs have survived this season.

After halting an early Wildcat drive in the first quarter the Bulldogs quarterback Bruce Scharnhorst capped a 64-yard drive when he went 8 yards around left end for the first touchdown of the game. Craig Busch kicked the extra point and Genesee had a lead they never gave up.

Lapwai's single wing offense gave the Bulldogs trouble all through the game, and they were able to pick up most of their yardage rushing on end sweeps.

In the second quarter, with their backs to the wall after two successive penalties, halfback Martin Gilge

broke through the Lapwai line on a great second effort thrust, and went 87 yards for what turned out to be the winning margin. The conversion attempt failed.

Both teams fought fine defensive battles in the third quarter with Bruce Scharnhorst looking sharp on pass defense. In the final quarter the Wildcat offense started to click and they marched down the field and scored from two yards out with Bob Wittman packing the ball over. A pass from Mike Green to Paul Smith was good for a two-point conversion. Genesee took the return kickoff and held the ball until the final seconds of the game to win their sixth victory.

Gas Service Available In Genesee By October 13

Testing and purging of the seven-mile long pipeline that will deliver natural gas to Genesee started about October 9, and a spokesman for the Washington Water Power Company estimated that gas service would be available to the community by October 13.

James O'Toole, Moscow District Manager for WWP, said that hydrotests of the 3½-inch line at approximately five times its expected operating pressure are made before any natural gas is fed into the community system.

The WWP-owned feeder line connects to the El Paso Natural Gas Company's Lewiston line near the junction of highways No. 95 and No. 195. "At this El Paso metering and regulation station, we take natural gas at 150 pounds pressure," O'Toole said. "At our regulating station located on the southwest city limits, the gas pressure is reduced to 20 pounds."

O'Toole noted that natural gas is delivered to the customer at ¼ pound pressure.

"The Genesee system is composed of approximately 25,000 feet of 2-inch pipe," O'Toole said. "It will make gas service available to virtually every residence and every commercial building in Genesee."

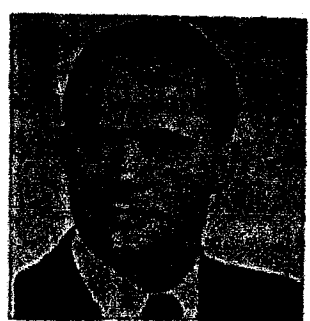

Home Cookin' . . .

Some recipes came through the mail the other day—no name signed, but we'll print them anyway. Our anonymous cook of the week says these are from a farm paper she received recently. Pineapple Fruit Salad and Pineapple Dessert. They both sound delicious, and thanks so much to our unknown cook.

PINEAPPLE FRUIT SALAD
Thicken by cooking—the juice of one can pineapple with corn starch or flour. Add one egg (well beaten) and sugar, if needed. Use this when cold for the dressing over following fruit (cut up).
1 cup pineapple
1 cup marshmallows
1 cup oranges (mandarin)
1 cup white grapes
1 cup bananas
Add: 1 cup cooked (cooled) shell macaroni. This makes a large salad and can be cut in half for smaller salad. Delicious. Sometimes, our cook omits the macaroni.

PINEAPPLE DESSERT
Put into saucepan:
1/2 cup sugar
1 cup crushed pineapple
1 egg yolk, beaten
Bring to a boil over medium heat and boil one minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and add one three-ounce package cherry gelatin and stir until dissolved. Cool until syrupy consistency.
Fold in:
1 egg white, stiffly beaten
1 can whipped canned milk
Pour into 9x13-inch dish lined with cookie or graham cracker crumbs. Chill thoroughly.

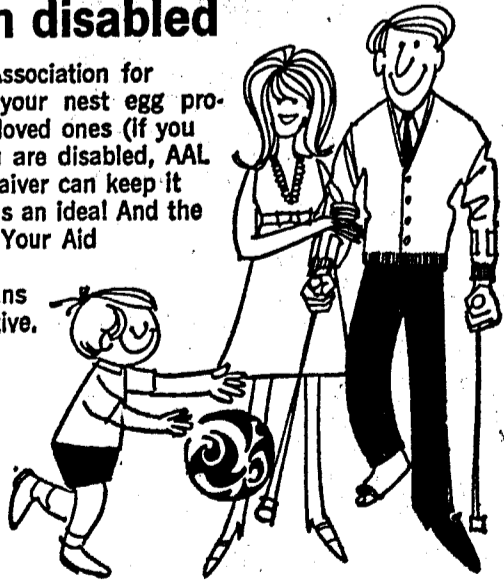

STUDY CLEARWATER ELK

Lewiston — The Idaho Fish and Game Dept. will pay a \$5 reward for each reproductive tract accompanied by the lower jaw of cow elk, or a \$1 reward for bull elk jaws turned in by hunters from big game units 10, 12, 16, 18A and 17. These will be collected at the Weippe, Koozika or Lolo Pass checking stations. Hunters entering these areas should pick up the collecting sacks and information at the checking stations before hunting, if they are interested in the reward.

This is part of a study on the Clearwater Elk herd so the department can better manage these animals. Big game can be aged by sectioning through the lower front teeth and counting the number of age rings in the teeth.

The reproductive tracts are needed to determine the reproduction

success of the herd. If there are low numbers of calves per cows, even though a high number of cows are bred, this is an indication of poor range conditions. The U. S. Forest Service is cooperating with the department in a program to improve winter range conditions in the Clearwater drainage. This study will help to find out how successful the program is in increasing production.

The cooperation of all hunters is needed for the success of the study.
