

Bulldogs Stop Colton 24-16

One of the largest crowds to ever watch a football game in Genesee gathered last Friday night to see Genesee come from a 16-0 deficit to a 24-16 victory over the Colton Wildcats in a non-conference contest.

Colton rolled to an easy two touchdown lead in the first quarter as they put on a passing attack that the Bulldogs couldn't stop.

Dick Green's two-yard run in the second quarter finally put Genesee on the score board after the Bulldogs had intercepted a Colton pass and moved the ball sixty yards on just four plays.

Genesee's backfield was lacking the services of Martin Gilge, the speedy halfback who broke an ankle in the Lapwai game.

Genesee's defensive unit put on its best exhibition of the season, once stopping a Colton drive on the one-foot line, and three times holding the Wildcats on the 4th and short yardage plays.

Colton was forced to play catch-up football after the Schwenne score and with only 25 seconds left in the game Tim Grieser intercepted a Wildcat pass and ran 12 yards for the final TD, giving the big Genesee lineman a rare chance to score.

Earlier in the quarter Tim Magee had intercepted a pass and returned it for 50 yards before being hauled down.

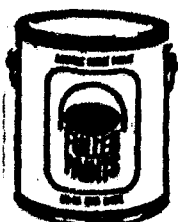

Home Cookin' ...

For those interested in making a little wine for the holidays, our cook for this week, comes up with something timely. This, she says is a general fruit wine recipe. And adds that you may need to abridge some of the instructions. So why not, (if you haven't already a batch ready to go), try Mrs. Gale Corsini's Fruit Wine recipe?

FRUIT WINE

Ingredients for approx. 1 gallon
8 cups fruit pulp
8 cups sugar
8 cups water
1 T^b yeast

It isn't practical, Mrs. Corsini says, to work with much less, but, you can make as much as you want at a time using equal parts pulp, sugar, and water.

Preparation of Fruit Pulp:

Various fruits and some vegetables can be used. For example, plums, cherries, huckleberries, elderberries, peaches, apricots, apples, beets and grapes are suitable. The fruit should be rinsed, then crushed or broken mechanically in a press or by hand.

Seeds, skins or cores can be left in. Hard fruit, such as apples may give special problems if you don't have a press. They can be grated but will cause some difficulty clogging the tubing when taking off the wine. The pulp should be placed in an appropriate crock. A 12-gallon crock should be used for 10 gallon of pulp, sugar and water. Room has to be left for it all to "work."

The sugar should be added next. If the fruit is very sweet, less sugar could be added.

Mrs. Corsini says "then add the water which has been brought to boiling. Stir. When cooled to warm 90 degrees or less, add yeast. Stir. One T^b yeast is enough for one to ten gallons. Cover crock with top or clean towel. Keep at warm, even temperature (75 - 80 d). for about three weeks.

Then remove wine with rubber tubing to narrow necked gallon jars for setting, trying not to disturb sediment on bottom of crock. Cap lightly and loosen occasionally to allow gas to escape. Keep in a cool place—like the cellar.

In about three months, Mrs. Corsini continued to say, the wine should be cleared away enough to be removed to serving bottles. Carefully aspirate with rubber tubing, taking care not to disturb sediment. Then keep wine in cellar until used. It should be kept at least a year to mellow.

Be Certain You Are Registered For Election

Eligible voters in Kendrick, Juliaetta and Genesee are reminded that if they did not vote in the last city election in 1967, they must register with the city clerk in their respective city before they can vote in the November 4 municipal elections.

Registration may be made at the Post Office in Kendrick and Juliaetta, and at the Northern Pacific Railway depot in Genesee during regular business hours. Registration books will also be open from 7:00 p. m. to 9:00 p. m., Oct. 30, 31 and Nov. 1. Resident requirements are six months in the state, and three months in the city.

There are contests on the ballot in every city except Kendrick, where a mix-up on the filing date left only one name on the ballot. In Kendrick a write-in vote will elect the mayor and one councilman. Only Darrell Brocke's name will appear in the ballot, as one of the two councilmen to be elected.

If any eligible citizen of Kendrick would sincerely accept write-in votes for either mayor or councilman, the Gazette will print his or her name so that voters will at least know of someone who is sincere in a desire to serve the city.
