Icy Highway Causes Rash Of Accidents

Black-ice caused three accidents over the week-end on the Wauncher Gulch Grade just east of Kendrick. All were near the top of the grade and happened early in the morning.

On Saturday morning at around 5:40 (before daylight) a car traveling west skidded off to the right near the corner at the Oakley Wallace turn-off. It turned completely around and went into the bank and was headed up hill, in the mishap. The black sedan, carrying some four or five college students received only minor damages and no injuries. Two of the occupants were picked up by Oakley Wallace and brought into town to report the accident.

Shortly afterward, around 6:00 a. m. Albert Glenn, driving a '68 Chevrollet pickup hit the same black ice and slid off the road to the left and over the bank, as he was starting down the hill. Mr. Glenn received some painful head and face bruises and it took 11 stitches to close a head laceration. He was picked up and taken to his home by Mr. Wallace, who was then returning to his home. The damaged vehicle was later brought to town by the Kendrick Welding & Machine Shop wrecker.

On Sunday morning, also at around 6:00 a. m., a Jeep station wagon driven by Mrs. James Daniel of Lewiston skidded on an icy spot. The Jeep wagon rolled over and went down an 8-foot embankment, and came to rest on its top. The accident happened some 100 to 150 yards below the Wegner turn-off. The passengers were "in-laws" of Rick Rogers, who was also a passenger, along with his wife and small daughter. None of the passengers were seriously injured. Damage to the station wagon was estimated at some \$700.00.

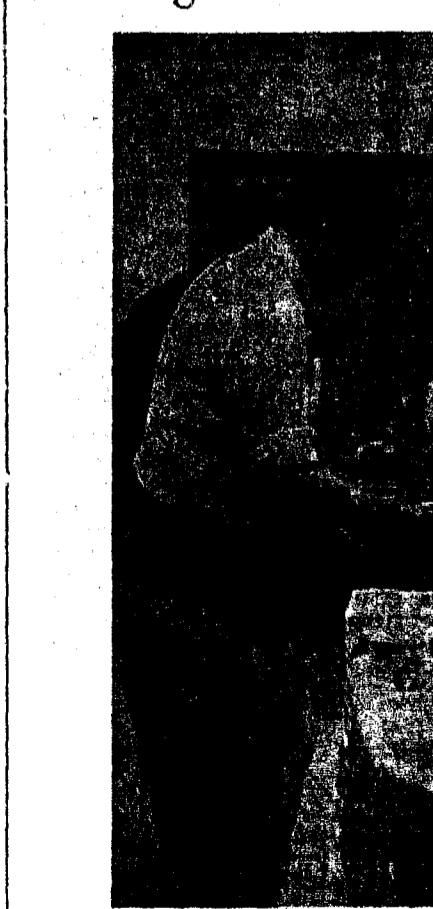

Watts To Be Kendrick Mayor; Hoogland Returns To Council

Robert Watts, manager of the Kendrick Rochdale Co., Inc., announced Monday night his decision to accept the mayoralty of the City of Kendrick. Watts received the highest number of write-in votes for the office of mayor in the November 4 election, and under state law, he had five days in which to announce his decision to accept or reject the office.

Darrell Brocke, the only candidate whose name appeared on the city ballot this year will be the other newly-elected council member.

The new council will be seated and sworn-in at the first regular meeting in January. Hold-over members are John Deobald and Wayne Harris.

Donald (Bud) Eichner will continue to serve as mayor until the new council is seated. Both Watts and Hoogland are presently members of the Kendrick council.

Holiday Dates Will Change After 1970

Beginning January 1, 1971, Idaho will join the rest of the nation in changing the dates of certain national holidays. For example, in 1971 and from then on, Veteran's Day will be observed on the fourth Monday in October, instead of the usual November 11.

House Bill No. 14, passed by the House of Representatives in January of this year and signed into law by the governor in February sets forth the following holidays:

- Third Monday in February (Washington's Birthday)
- Last Monday in May (Decoration Day)
- July 4th (Independence Day)
- First Monday in September (Labor Day)
- Second Monday in October (Columbus Day)
- Fourth Monday in October (Veteran's Day)
- Fourth Monday in November (Thanksgiving Day)
- December 25 (Christmas Day)

EDITORIAL

LITTLE BOYS AND BB GUNS

One of the problems that often plagues a small town is the enforcement of the ordinance forbidding the use of air rifle or BB guns within the city limits. Basically, this almost universal ordinance prohibits the firing of air rifles, BB guns or pellet guns in towns. While this law may cramp the style of young, would-be hunters, it is an intelligent rule and protects both people and property.

But like most laws this one is difficult to enforce if citizens become lax in their responsibilities. Two cases in point come to mind. In Genesee there have been recent incidents of street lights being broken by pellet guns and in Kendrick if you look at the War Memorial case in the park you will notice two holes in the glass made by pellet guns.

As we said before, enforcement of the law in this case is difficult. Our officers have more important things to do than patrol for youngsters with air rifles. Residents can report violations and sign complaints; but in a small town this is a pretty touchy matter when just about all families are friends, or at least well acquainted. In a situation such as this people are just naturally reluctant to sign complaints no matter if they know of a violation.

What then is the answer? It would appear that the solution rests with poor, old Mom and Dad. Parents are going to have to stress the importance of gun safety and wise use, and make certain the child does not roam around town with his air rifle.

Now we know this will not stop damage by older people who might drive through town and shoot street lights and windows from autos. This is an enforcement problem of an entirely different nature.

But with a little common sense and good regard for community and property, we feel that about ninety-five percent of the pellet gun problems in town can be eliminated. BR.

TIPS ON COOKING AND HANDLING TURKEY

U. of I. Moscow — If a whole turkey is too big for your family and you don't feel it is sensible to go to the trouble of roasting one, here's a helpful tip from Robert Black, poultry specialist of the University of Idaho Extension Service.

Select a young, frozen turkey at the market. Ask the butcher to cut it with his electric saw into crosswise slices about an inch thick. Now you have turkey steaks. Most will be a combination of light and dark meat. End pieces and small sections of wing and leg can be made into turkey soup. Meat from the bones can be used for salads and casseroles.

Wrap the steaks individually in freezer wrap or foil while still frozen and store in the freezer until ready for use. Thaw completely before cooking.

Three cooking methods are suggested:

Season both sides of two turkey steaks. Brown lightly on both sides. Place one steak on a large square foil. Cover with your favorite dressing and top with the other steak. Dot with butter. Fold foil securely over the top and bake at 350 degrees for two hours.

For fried steaks remove bones from steaks. Pound steaks to flatten. Cut into pieces of serving size. Combine half a cup of flour with two teaspoons of paprika, two teaspoons of salt, one-fourth teaspoon of pepper and one-fourth teaspoon of poultry seasoning. Powder

Our recipes this week are from the files of Mrs. Gertrude Grille, and we can personally vouch for anything she bakes, for we've tasted some of her "finished products" and they've all been delicious. RAISIN COOKIES

- 1 cup butter and Crisco
- 2 cups sugar
- 3 eggs
- 1 cup sour milk
- 4 cups sifted flour
- 2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 1 lb raisins, ground
- 1 cup walnuts
- Drop from spoon.
- Bake 15 minutes, 375 d. oven.

COCOANUT SHORT BREAD

- 2 sticks butter (1 cup)
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 cups sifted flour
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 generous cup shredded coconut
- Cream butter and sugar. Work in remaining ingredients. Make 2 rolls an inch in diameter, wrap in wax paper and chill. Slice 1/4" thick and bake in 350 d. oven until edges are slightly brown. (3 doz.)

WALDORF CAKE

- 1/2 cup butter
- 2 cups sugar
- 4 squares melted chocolate
- 2 well beaten eggs
- 1 1/2 cups milk
- 2 cups sifted cake flour
- 2 teaspoon baking powder
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 1 cup walnuts
- Cream butter and sugar, add chocolate and eggs. Alternate milk with flour and baking powder. Bake in pan 12x9x2 for 45 minutes in 350 d. oven.

YOUR GAME DEPARTMENT

By John R. Woodworth, Director Idaho Fish-Game Department
Anglers wanting a specimen of Idaho's largest fish species for a trophy have from now until December 31 to get it. New fish regulations for the 1970 calendar year provide a "catch and release" program for all Snake River sturgeon. Heretofore, all fish less than three feet in length, or more than six feet, had to be thrown back in. Beginning January 1, all sturgeon irrespective of size must be released at any time during the year.

Studies have found that sturgeon grow about two inches a year in length, and that the age of first spawning may come between 11 and 22 years for males, and 11 to 34 years for females. Subsequent spawning intervals may vary from four to nine years apart. Studies in all three northwest states on the Snake River learned that the number of "legals" within minimum and maximum length requirements are being depleted because of the many years needed to outgrow the "catchable stage."

Waterfowl Flight Data
Ground and aerial census estimates of waterfowl concentrations on 11 large lakes and reservoirs found a shade less than 300,000 ducks and 30,700 geese, coots, and swans. Most of the ducks were mallards, and the geese Canada. Principal duck concentrations were: 100,000 American Falls; 78,000, Mindoka; and 78,000 Deer Flat. All concentration points have more ducks than last year at the end of October, an average of 18 per cent more. The long-term average is 19 per cent higher, although American Falls counts were not included in the long-term statistics.

Grouse Season Ends
Forest grouse season, including blue, ruffed, and spruce species, ends November 30 in all parts of the state where it is now open. These seasons opened September 20 in most counties, except in areas having general highhorn sheep and mountain goat hunting, where it started September 6. Portions of Idaho and Lewis and Nez Perce counties opened November 15 for special reasons.

The 10 Commandments of Safety

- 1 Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. This is the first rule of safety.
- 2 Guns carried into camp or home, or when otherwise not in use, must always be unloaded and taken down or have actions open; guns always should be carried in cases to the shooting area.
- 3 Always be sure barrel and action are clear of obstructions, and that you have only ammunition of the proper size for the gun you are carrying. Remove oil and grease from chamber before firing.
- 4 Always carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle, even if you stumble; keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot.
- 5 Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger; know the identifying features of the game you intend to hunt.
- 6 Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot; avoid all horseplay while handling a gun.
- 7 Unattended guns should be unloaded; guns and ammunition should be stored separately beyond reach of children and careless adults.
- 8 Never climb a tree or fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun; never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.
- 9 Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface of the surface of water; when at target practice be sure your backstop is adequate.
- 10 Avoid alcoholic drinks before or during shooting.

Ronald Masoner, sales-service manager at Twin Falls, said 1,678 travelers boarded Air West flights at that city, up 8 percent over 1968.

System-wide, Air West carried 235,963 revenue passengers and recorded an 82.4 percent on-time performance record. The airline industry feels any on-time performance above 70 percent is excellent.

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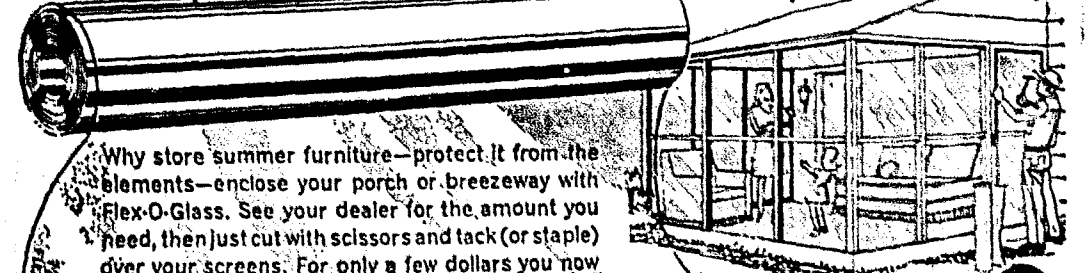

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BALMY WEATHER SLOWS SOME UNIT ELK KILLS

Statewide report card returns through October indicate that the elk and deer harvest is lagging some what behind the all-time banner big game seasons of 1963. The 1969 big game harvests are expected to finish near the long-term averages for both animal species. Calculated elk kill in 1968 was 17,000 and deer 73,500. The 10-year (1958-67) average is 14,750 for elk, and 67,745 for deer.

The Idaho Fish and Game Department said today that reported elk kills to date are 397 animals less than in 1968, by November 4, and the reported deer kills were trailing by 885 animals. These figures are from hunter report cards, which represent only part of the total elk and deer kills on any date during the hunting seasons. The statewide calculated deer and elk harvest figures are based on hunter questionnaire data.

John R. Woodworth, director, said that balmy Indian Summer weather extending through October and into November slowed big game harvesting by producing less than ideal hunting conditions. There was very little snow in the state during October. Areas that did have snow showed better hunting success, comparable with last year.

For example, some units in the South Fork of the Clearwater, eastern Idaho and the Salmon Region showed even higher hunter success than last year. The Boise River drainage, even without snow, was about one-tenth of one percent below last year in elk kills reported on hunter report cards by the end of October.

Deer units in many counties tallied even more deer harvested than last year. Some of these are the counties of Bonner, Shoshone, Clearwater, Lewis, Idaho, Adams, Valley, Custer, Butte, Camas, Owyhee, and Cassia. However, with the exception of Lewis and Adams counties, which are up on harvest so far this year, these are not top deer producers.

A dozen high-yielding elk units year after year are Coeur d'Alene (unit 4), Lower St. Joe (8), Upper St. Joe (7), Palouse, (8), Lochsa, (12), Upper Selway (17), Bargamin Creek (20), Chamberlain (20A), Gibbonsville (21A), Boise (39), Big Wood River (48), and Caribou (76).

By the end of October, 1968, card returns clearly pointed to an all-time banner year for both elk and deer harvesting. About 61 per cent of the elk kills and 49 per cent of deer were reported killed by that date. In 1967, however, about 52 per cent of the deer and 63 per cent of the elk were killed during the first 2 months of the season. During the three years prior to that, 57 per cent of the deer and nearly 80 per cent of the elk were harvested in September and October.

Although some elk and deer hunting seasons have ended, many more remain in most parts of the state. Seven antlered elk units opened for general elk hunting November 8 in eastern Idaho and the Upper Snake Region, following the end of control-

IDAHO DEPT. OF EMPLOYMENT

Jobs were located for 13 Latah Co. residents by the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment during the past week, according to Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager. Hartstein said that this compares with 12 jobs found during the previous week, but is down from the 20 workers who were placed on jobs during the corresponding week a year ago. At the end of the week there were 34 jobs still open, a week ago there were 35 and a year ago 49. Hartstein said his office has jobs available for auto mechanic, auto body repairman, insurance salesmen, a delivery boy for a grocery store, a counter girl, silk and wool finisher, typists, cafe and domestic workers. Hartstein said there are still many students seeking part time work and urged employers who need part time or short time workers to call his office.

Sixteen workers, about evenly divided among woods workers, construction workers and newcomers in to the area, filed new claims for unemployment insurance during the week, according to another part of Hartstein's report. He said the total number of workers now seeking un-

employment insurance throughout the county is 67, a week ago the total was 63, and a year ago it was 65. In the immediate Moscow area the total is 28, the same as a week ago and the same as this time last year. Four persons are seeking benefits from the Genesee area, last week there were 6 and last year there were 2. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area 22 persons are receiving jobless pay a week ago there were 18, and a year ago there were 23. Ten checks are going into the Pothatch area, 11 last week and 9 last year. At Elk River the total is 2, the same last week and up from 1 a year ago. At Kendrick is 3, last week it was 1, and last year 4.

Survey Shows Idahoans Oppose Constitutional Revision

Boise — The Constitutional Revision Commission appointed by the Idaho Legislature may have a tougher task than expected, according to results of a state-wide survey completed last week by the J & A Research of Boise.

Questioning 300 voting-age residents in Blackfoot, Boise, Caldwell, Coeur d'Alene, Idaho Falls, Lewiston, Moscow and Twin Falls, the J & A interviewers learned that four out of five people are unaware that an effort is underway to propose the "streamlining" amendments to the Idaho Constitution.

Q. Do you know whether there are any plans for submitting additional constitutional amendments to the people next year?

Yes 20%
No 33%
Don't know 47%

Q. Are you aware that there is a proposal to amend the water rights article in the Idaho Constitution?

Yes 24.7%
No 75.3%

Researchers found that a large

majority of the people of Idaho have not read the state constitution. Some respondents volunteered that they didn't know where to secure a copy so they could read it and become better informed.

Q. Have you ever read the Idaho State Constitution?

Yes 32.3%
No 65%
Don't know 2.7%

Fewer than one out of 10 Idahoans are convinced that there has been a need to modify the Idaho Constitution. However, more than half of the people of voting age have open minds about such a need.

Don't know 62.7%

A major item in the constitutional revisions now under consideration by the Commission is to change the selective procedure for certain state officials — possibly to make all the offices appointive except the gov-

ernor and lieutenant governor. Currently, Idahoans are not in favor of such a change — by a wide margin.

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
