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



The three Idaho wilderness and primitive areas combine to make a rugged mountainous region about 150 miles from north to south, and 25 to 65 miles wide. These are the Selway-Bitterroot Wilderness Area, the Salmon River Breaks Primitive Area and the Idaho Primitive Area. The Idaho portion of the Selway-Bitterroot contains 11/2 million acres, extending from the Lochsa River south to the upper Selway. The Salmon River Breaks Primitive Area extends on south to the main Salmon River.

The Idaho Primitive Area, running south from the main Salmon River lies mainly within the drainage of the Middle Fork of the Salmon River, but also includes the Chamber-lain Basin and Cold Meadows areas that drain into the main Salmon. Well over a milion acres are in this

Steep, rocky canyons are numerous in these wilderness areas. Small tributary streams are usually present in each. Sometimes gentle slopes widen the deep canyons where top soil gradually accumulates. Peaks and ridges on either side are of granite. Most of the top soil here is course decomposing rock. Wide differences in elevation are found because of the steepness. These vary from 2,150 feet at the lowest point of the Salmon River on the western edge of the wilderness area to 10,700 feet on Mt. McGuire, in the Bighorn Crags. Many peaks and ridges are 7,000 to 9,000 feet, making access difficult and travel hard.

Eighteen forest roads approach the boundaries of these wilderness areas from all sides, giving limited access. In addition, 16 back country airplane landing strips and a great many pack trails are available within the areas. Outfitters and guides are located in designated areas to provide service to hunters, though this is not required for either residents or nonresidents. Jet boats, commercially operated, reach some of the camps on the main Salmon River. These are barred from designated wilderness areas, however, along with all mechanized equipment except aircraft.

Game managers long have recognized the potential for more elk hunting in the remote portions of the Selway and of mule deer in the Middie Fork of the Salmon, but the problem of getting hunters into such areas to crop the annual herd incre-ment remains unsolved.

Figures showing reported elk kills in a dozen back country units give some idea of the quality hunting to be found. For example, hunter success there is nearly twice as good as it is in the rest of the state. But the number of hunters per square mile is so thin that the actual elk harvest is small by comparison. In an effort to get enough deer and
