John A. Platt, 92, Former Kendrick Resident, Dies In Lewiston Nov. 23

John A. Platt, 92, a former Kendrick resident, and well known throughout this region as a pioneer rancher and cattleman, and also as the author of a book on life in old Genesee and the Salmon River, died Sunday night, Nov. 23 at 9:30, at the St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston. He had been in ill health for a year, and death came of the infirmities of age.

Mr. and Mrs. Platt had been making their home with a daughter, Mrs. Stanley (Lorene) Gilson, Lewiston, for about three months. Their home previously was at 1427 9th Ave.

Platt came west with his parents in 1881, and resided at Genesee, where he attended elementary school at old Fort Genesee, and high school. He later spent 17 years homesteading on the Salmon River.

These two periods of his life were combined into a book, published first in 1959, when he was 82, by the

Asgrow Seed Enters Containerization Era For Overseas Pea Shipment



Genesee—A new innovation of hauling cargo in pre-packed containers was utilized for the first time in this area when Asgrow Seed Company's Genesee branch loaded 110,000 pounds of seed peas bound for Sweden into three metal units and shipped them out this week.

Leonard Singhose, manager of the Genesee branch, said Sunday afternoon that this was the first time his company had used this system in the Pacific Northwest and if the project is a success, he expected there will be much greater use of this new method.

The advantages of the "containerization" shipping is that it eliminates handling of the bags in ports and railheads. The huge metal boxes, each with a capacity of 40,000 pounds are shipped into the plant on one 89-foot railroad flatcar. The

containers are then loaded with 50-kilo bags of seed peas and sealed at the local plant. The rail car is then taken to Vancouver, Wash., where it is unloaded by special cranes and placed aboard a Johnson Steam Line ship, in this case the "Brasil," bound for Sweden. Overseas the containers may be unloaded in the same manner, placed on railroad cars again and delivered to the purchaser. The seed is never handled from the time it is loaded until it reaches its destination. The chance of any breakage, pilferage, or contamination is greatly reduced and the individual bags are never exposed to the elements.

Singhose said that once his loading crews become familiar with the new system, he didn't expect loading operations to take any longer than usual.

Alex Larson, 73, Passes Nov. 25

Alexander Larson, 73, retired farmer from the Kendrick area, died Tuesday at 3:15 p. m. at Gritman Memorial Hospital of a stomach hemorrhage, resulting from an ulcer condition. He had been ill a year.

A resident of the Kendrick area since infancy, Larson retired in 1965 from active participation in farming operations on Big Bear Ridge and at Leland. His home was at Cameron.

The funeral will be Saturday at 1 p. m. at Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel, Lewiston. Burial will be at Leland.

Adult Recreation Program For Genesee Discussed

GENESEE — About fifty people met Monday evening at the Genesee high school for a school information program. Supt. Diehl explained the criteria by which our local schools are judged by the Northwest Accreditation Association. The schools are accredited on the basis of philosophy and objectives, program of studies, size of staff, evaluation of program, including guidance services, school plant and equipment, instructional media center, records and record keeping, such as health, test results, transcripts, and the like, graduation unit requirements, school atmosphere, preparation of teachers, administration, teacher load, student activities, and audit bond. Our schools are fully accredited and surpass almost all the minimum requirements.

Supt. Diehl, using tables taken from a recent study, "Designs for Educational Organization in Idaho," explained the state distribution formula and how our local schools are affected and the way in which public education in Genesee Joint School District is financed. He also explained recommended changes. The public will be hearing a great deal about these matters in the near future, Diehl stated, and he feels that every person in Genesee should be aware of what is proposed and how the proposals will affect the people here and their children's education. He invited parents to come into the school class rooms at any time to observe and reminded the group that the school system is theirs, and he is willing to talk with anyone at any time about school matters.

Ray Stout, a member of the local school board, announced that an adult recreation program will be tried for the next few months. The gymnasium will be open next Monday, December 1, at 7:30 for both men and women's activities.

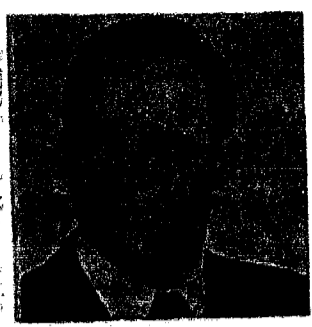

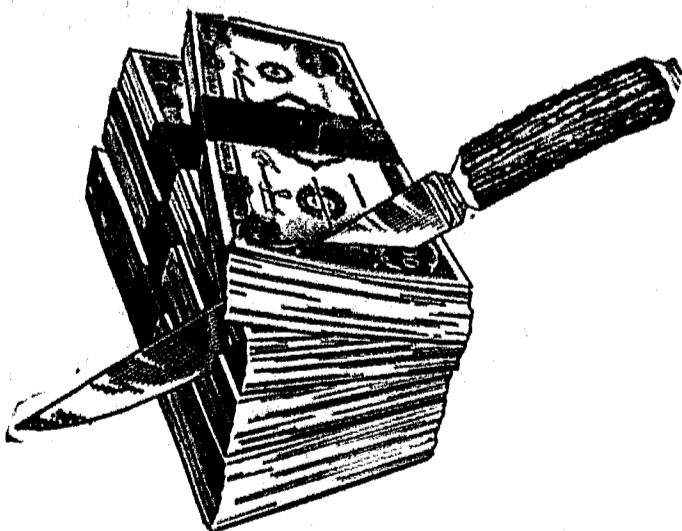

Fog, Icy Roads Hinder Travel

Temperatures in the area hovered down around 20-degrees above during the nighttime early this week and the combination of freezing weather and heavy fog made travel on most of the paved roads extremely hazardous for motorists.

Heavy fog dropped across the region Friday night and hung in the upper elevations well into mid-day Saturday. Sunday night the fog came back and the temperatures dropped well below the freezing mark. By Monday morning all the roads were ice-coated and traffic moved slowly on all of the main highways.

The highway crews in the Kendrick area were out early sanding on some of the hills and curves. It was still cool, but sunny, Tuesday.

IDAHO DEPT. OF EMPLOYMENT

Job placement activities in the Moscow Office of the Idaho Department of Employment nearly doubled during the past week according to a report made by Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager. Hartstein said that 17 area workers were assisted in locating employment during the week, compared with 9 persons given job finding help during the previous week. During the week, he said a total of 18 new jobs were listed with his office, compared with 13 during the previous week and 19 during the same week one year ago. At the end of the week, however, there were only 24 jobs still open. A week ago, there were 32 jobs available in the area, and a year ago there were 33 vacancies. Among the workers needed in the Moscow area, according to Hartstein, are secretaries (with shorthand skill), a clerk typist, a truck mechanic, delivery boy, domestic workers, cafe workers and salesmen.

Hartstein's report indicated that a total of 19 persons filed new claims for unemployment insurance during the week. He said that during the previous week 22 persons filed new claims, and that during the same week in 1968 the total was 33. The total number of workers in the area seeking jobless pay rose from 87 last week to the current 96. A year ago, however, there were 111 persons filing claims for benefits. Little change was noted from the various communities throughout the county. At Moscow the total is 39, last week it was 36 and year ago 42. At Genesee there are now 4, a week ago 6 and a year ago 7. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area the total is now 32; 29 a week ago and 34 a year ago. At Kendrick there are 3 idled workers, 2 last week and 15 last year. Two persons from Elk River are seeking jobless pay, compared with 3 last week and the same number last year. Hartstein predicted a gradual increase in the number of persons seeking unemployment benefits. He said a sudden turn for the worse in the weather could precipitate a sharp increase in unemployment at any time now.
