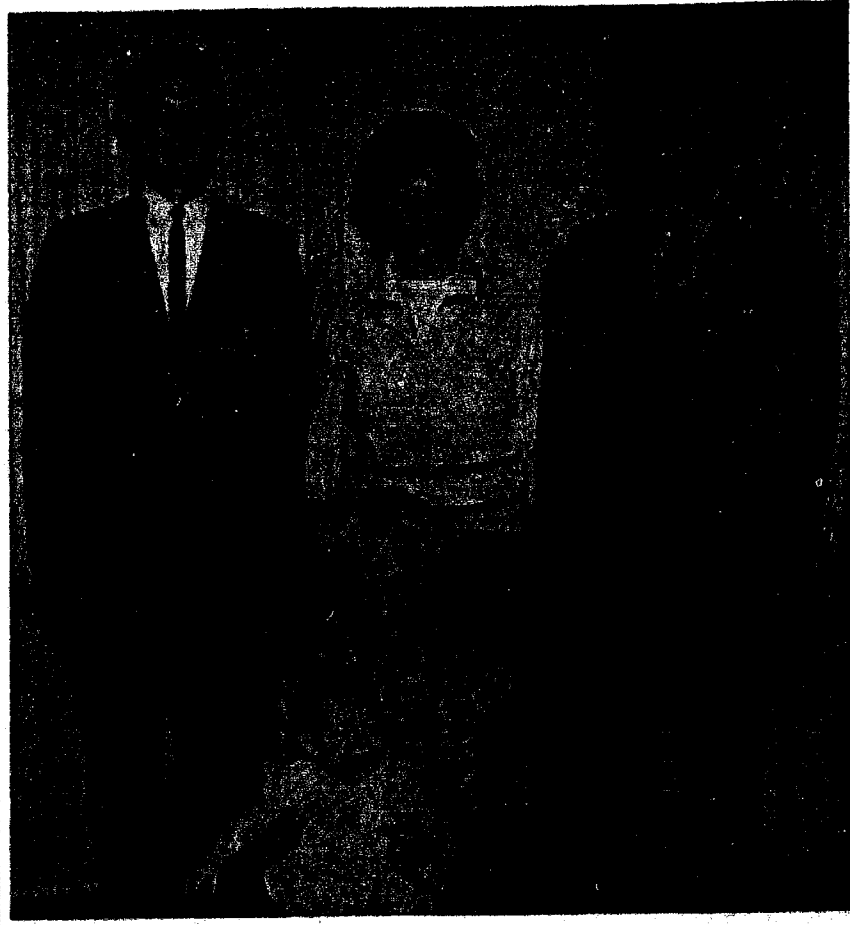

If you miss this Saturday licensing date, you may be sure of a trip to Moscow and probably a long wait in line at the court house.

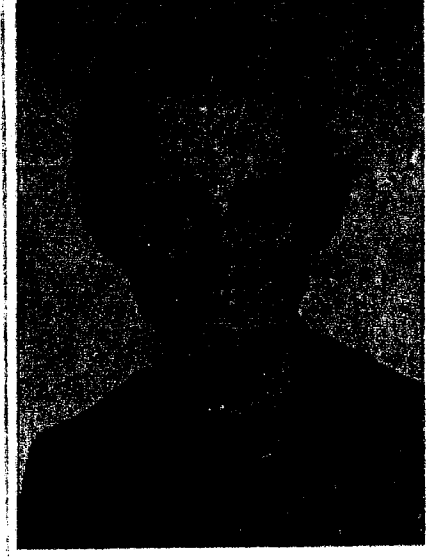
FIVE GENERATIONS POSE FOR PORTRAIT—

Six Service District Elections Held Monday

Six service districts in the Genesee and Kendrick areas held commissioner elections on Monday, Dec. 1st, and despite some fog, slick roads and cool weather a slightly better than average number of ballots were cast.

Kendrick Highway District
Walter Benecoter, Sub-District No. 1 and Roy Glenn, Sub-District No. 2, were elected as commissioners of the Kendrick Highway District for four-year terms. Benecoter received 23 votes and Glenn 25 votes.

Genesee Rimrock Highway Dist.
George Dennier, Fix Ridge farmer, was elected as a commissioner from Sub-District No. 3 of the Genesee Rimrock Highway District for a four-year term. Dennier received 32 votes. He succeeds Frank Heimgartner, who declined to seek another term.

Genesee Rural Fire District
J. P. Hermann was re-elected for another four-year term as commissioner from Sub-District No. 3 of the Genesee Rural Fire Protection District. Phil received 23 of the 24 votes cast.

Nez-Tah Cemetery District
Oscar Slind, Sub-District No. 2 and Ervin Mabbott, Sub-District No. 1 were elected commissioners of the Nez-Tah Cemetery District for four-year terms. Each of the two men received 27 votes.

Potlatch Cemetery District
Ted Meyer and Herman Johnson, Sub-Districts No. 2 and 1 respectively, of the Potlatch Cemetery District, were re-elected commissioners of that district for four-year terms. Each received nine votes.

Genesee Cemetery District
Ed. Mofken, Sub-District No. 1 and John Myers, Jr., Sub-District No. 2, were elected commissioners for four-year terms for the Genesee Community Cemetery Maintenance District. Mofken received 30 votes and Myers received 29 votes.

Isaac Lien, 77, Big Bear Ridge Pioneer, Passes In California

Isaac Lien, 77, former resident of Big Bear Ridge, near Kendrick, passed away on Wednesday, November 26, 1969, in Lakewood, California. He had suffered from a heart ailment for many years.

He was born at Forest, Idaho, May 16, 1892. As a child he moved to Big Bear Ridge with his parents the late Mr. and Mrs. Ole Lien in 1899. He was a veteran of World War I.

He married the late Goldie Munson of Moscow. She died in 1953. Later he remarried, and his widow, Ann, survives at the family home. Other survivors include one son, Rodway, Lakewood, Calif.; one brother, Henry, who lives at the family home on Big Bear Ridge; one sister, Mrs. Tom (Anna) Long, Kendrick, and several nephews and nieces. He was preceded in death by four brothers, Evan, Anton, Emref and Martin, and one sister, Mrs. Einar (Clara) Bruseth.

Genesee Council Votes To Sell Old Rice Building

Genesee — With the adoption of the necessary ordinance, the Genesee City Council made the first move to sell the building formerly occupied by Rice's City Market. This action came at the regular meeting of the council held Monday night. The building was deemed to the city several years ago by Mr. and Mrs. Rice. Since that time the council has been unable to find a use for the building and rather than continue the expense of maintenance, it was decided to sell the structure at public auction.

A public hearing will be held on the proposed sale at the next meeting of the council on January 5. Objections to the sale, if any, may be made at that time. Law requires that this be done. In the meantime, an appraisal of the building will be made.

All members of the council were at the Monday meeting presided over by Mayor D. F. Scharnhorst. Also present were Wm. Pharr and Chet Green, councilmen-elect, who will be seated next month.

In other action the council discussed the problem of moving one of the city water pumps out to the John Ludke well. Putting another siren in the west part of town was also discussed, but no action was taken.

Councilman Magee said he had received complaints about the availability of parking space in front of the post office, where mail trucks load and unload since parallel parking was adopted. The city will paint and post a restricted parking area in front of the post office, hoping that this will ease the problem.

Alex Larson, 73, Prominent Area Farmer, Passed Away November 25

Alexander Larson, 73, a resident of Big Bear ridge, and retired farmer, died Tuesday, Nov. 25th at 3:15 a. m. at the Grutum Memorial Hospital in Moscow of a stomach hemorrhage, resulting from an ulcer condition. He had been in ill health for about a year.

A resident of the Kendrick area since infancy, he retired in 1965 from active participation in farming operations on Big Bear ridge and at Leland, but continued to make his home on Big Bear Ridge. His former home was on Potlatch Ridge.

He was born Jan. 7, 1896, at Black Diamond, Wash., a son of Emil and Marie Larson. He moved with his parents to Cameron while still an infant.

He served with the U. S. Army during World War I in France and Germany, and was discharged in 1919. He was a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

He was united in marriage to Allie Jones at Clarkston, Jan. 2, 1932.

Survivors include his widow, at home; two stepsons, Homer Jones, Denver, Colo., and Raymond Jones, Lewiston; a stepdaughter, Mrs. Helen Hinrichs, Kendrick; two sisters, Mrs. Fred (Jone) Sillfow, Kendrick, and Mrs. Laurel Flesman, Othello, Wn.; a brother, George Larson, Georgetown, Calif.; four step-grandchildren, and two step-great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at the Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel in Lewiston. Officiating was Rev. James Pearson who was assisted by Rev. Ronald Perkins of Kendrick. Organist was Mrs. Oscar Slind, and singers were Eugene Taylor and Roy H. Ramey.

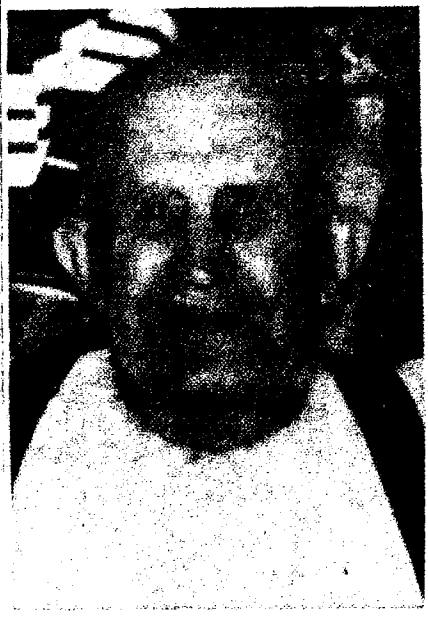

Lloyd Candler, 89, Pioneer Area Resident, Succumbs In Moscow

William Lloyd Candler, 89, Juliaetta resident for the past 34 years, passed away at the Latah Convalescent Center in Moscow late Tuesday night, November 25, 1969, following a stroke suffered five weeks earlier.



Mr. Candler, a teamster and laborer in the area, was born July 3, 1880, at Marshall, North Carolina, a son of Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Candler. He came to Idaho in March of 1902. He was employed first in Lewiston, and then took up a homestead in the Pierce area.

His wife, Flora, whom he married July 5th, 1912, survives him at the family home in Juliaetta. Other survivors include four sons: Donald, Bovill, Idaho; Floyd, Juliaetta; Dale, Alberta, Canada, and Neil of Potlatch. Four daughters also survive: Mrs. Bonnie First, Richmond, Calif.; Mrs. Betty Couturier, El Cerrito, Calif.; Mrs. Orma Rigg, Spokane and Mrs. Billie Thornton, Lewiston. Four brothers, Gifford, Kendrick; Wade, Southwick; Jeter, Cavendish and Claude, Spokane, also survive. There are 29 grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren.

A daughter, Mrs. Dorothy Chilberg, passed away in 1963.

Funeral services were held at the Short's Funeral Home in Moscow at 11:00 a. m., Monday, December 1. Officiating was Elder D. C. Perry. Music was furnished by David Carlson. Hymns sung were "Sweet Bye and Bye" and "Till We Meet Again." Organist was Marian Frykman.

U. of I. EXTENSION NEWS

Boiling and Simmering?
Do you know the difference between boiling and simmering?

Understanding the terms used in cooking helps to bring satisfactory results in preparing food, reminds Mrs. Esther Wilson, nutrition specialist of the University of Idaho extension service. She suggests a review for experienced cooks and study for those who are learning.

Here are a few definitions in the category of hot-water cooking.

Bring to a boil—Bubbles appear at the bottom of the liquid, rise to the top and break. When all the liquid is in motion it has come to a boil.

Boil—Cook at the boiling point. When boiling is to be continued, adjust heat to maintain it.

Boil rapidly—Liquid goes into rapid motion. The surface breaks into small, lumpy waves. A rapid boil does cook faster, but is better for some uses.

Full, rolling boil—Liquid rises in the pan, then tumbles into waves that cannot be stirred down. It usually occurs in heavy sugar mixtures.

Parboil—Cook food in boiling liquid until partially done. This is commonly a preliminary step to further cooking.

Poach—Cook in hot liquid. It is a common method of cooking eggs,

fish, and some vegetables.

Simmer—Just below the boiling point. It cooks food slowly. The surface of the liquid moves so slowly that no bubbles show.

Scald—Heating materials, such as milk, just below the boiling point when tiny bubbles form at the edge of the surface.

The term "hard-boiled eggs" is a misnomer, nutritionists point out. They should actually be hard cooked in water that comes to a boil and then allowed to cook at reduced temperature. Hard boiling has a tendency to make eggs tough.

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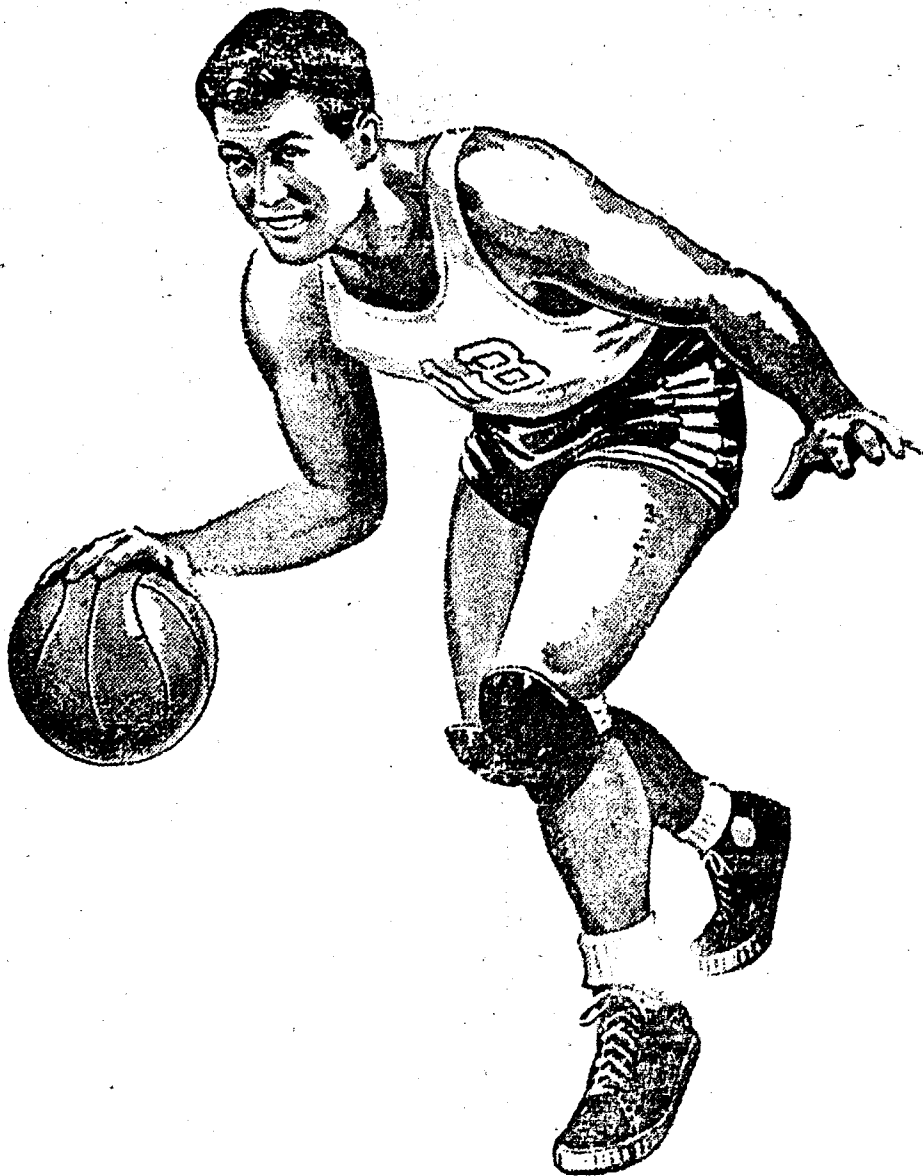

UPLAND BIRD HUNTERS GET SPECIES VARIETY

Some upland game bird hunters don't show partiality to any species. They like 'em all—the quail, grouse, partridge and pheasants, mixed with duck and goose hunting for the sake of variety. Of course, the season for ringnecks came to a close in Panhandle and Clearwater regions November 16, and November 23 for Salmon and eastern Idaho regions and in Western and Magic Valley regions December 7. The season for blue, ruffed and spruce grouse likewise ends November 30.

But sportsmen who are not wed to any one species of upland game bird; those, rather, who like to play the field will have good shooting in many parts of the state for quail and partridge through December 31, and in Hells Canyon below Brownlee Dam to Lewiston, and the Salmon River drainage in the counties of Adams, Custer, Idaho, Lemhi, Lewis, Nez Perce, and Valley, the long season, through January 25, 1970.

The delightful rigors of pursuing chukars no longer are numbered among Idaho's best kept secrets, with more hunters each year becoming convinced that this exotic partridge from India may soon rank as the state's leading game bird. From the standpoint of populations, it probably occupies first place now, but the number of hunters acquainted with this naturalized beauty is lagging somewhat. But the challenge of the chukkar, its productivity, sheer ruggedness and behavior in the field is spreading apace.

In fact, Stuart Murrell, Lewiston, regional conservation educator, for the Idaho Fish and Game Department says that the chukkar probably is the number 1 upland game bird in his area, followed by quail, dove, Hungarian partridge and pheasant in the order of numbers shot of each species. The Clearwater also has some excellent forest grouse hunting, with ruffed grouse being most numerous. Of course, there also are ruffed grouse populations in the Panhandle Region as well as in southern and eastern Idaho.

They are found generally along tributary streams about where aspen grow, though they often share habitat with blue grouse and mixed bags are taken by hunters.

Elmer Norberg, game bird supervisor, says that all wildlife species show strong characteristics for high productivity and maximum expansion to extreme limits of all suitable habitats. Any exotic species, when introduced to fill an unoccupied habitat niche, can be expected to expand quickly to occupy even the outermost fringes of suitable habitat.

Game officials in Washington state, for example, reduced the daily bag limit this fall to five chukars because of great game bird losses during the tough weather last winter. Opening day about 400 hunters were checked at Asotin, Washington, and they had bagged about 400 birds, the best hunter success for several years on chukars in that area. Checks also showed that about 79 per cent of all birds examined were young of the year. This means that there was a turnover of something like 70 percent in the

chukkar population this year.

Numerous studies on upland game birds in various states have shown that great die-offs are not uncommon, whether or not the birds are hunted. It also shows what great reproduction potential these birds have during good nesting seasons.

Hunter success each year on upland game is dependent on that year's hatch of young birds because they make up such a large portion of the population. This is the reason Idaho has retained its 10-bird limit on quail, chukars and Huns.

Last year, Idaho gunners tagged approximately 177,000 chukars an increase of 150 per cent over the 1959-63 average. Department personnel expect another jump in the total harvest this year.

Nevada ranks the chukkar as its No. 1 game bird. The mushrooming chukkar populations rival the boom in pheasant populations in some parts of Idaho and other states in earlier years. The reason is the great tracts of semi-arid country found in western states.

This country, generously highlighted with steep canyons, ravines, benches, rocky bluffs, and mesas, has an abundance of foodstuff.

Hunting methods that work on one species of upland game bird may be wrong for others. For example, chukkar hunting is best if several persons walk contours around the hills, about 200 yards apart. If somebody at a higher elevation flushes a covey, then more often than not his companions on the downhill side get some shooting. Another trick is to start at sun up in chukkar range, mostly standing and listening. If there are flocks within ear shot, their calls to each other will help locate them.

Chukars prefer grassy slopes, though they loaf and roost in rocky cliffs. If the weather is warm, they get away from the noonday sun. As the chill of autumn comes over the land, they seek out places in the sun. When the grass greens up in response to fall rains, the birds scatter over all of the range.

Murrell says Huns often share the same range, or parts of it, with chukars. But they generally prefer gentler slopes and heavier grass cover. As the season progresses, Huns become extremely spooky and it helps to stay out of sight, to keep a ridge between hunter and birds until he is ready to shoot.

Quail are found along draws in dense thickets of brush or blackberry briars. They rarely leave an area more than a few hundred yards, and can be flushed again another day. For this reason, quail are easier to hunt later in the season, when chukars have scattered. Quail hold tightly in dense thickets and are rarely hunted successfully without a good dog.

Ruffed grouse are found in brushy terrain, eating lower along the edge or picking elderberries. Immediately following a rain is a good time to see them, because they come out of the brush to dry off. Blue and spruce grouse do not live in the brushy habitat preferred by the ruffs. They usually are in mature forests in good stands of ponderosa pine or Douglas fir. Blue grouse weigh up to five pounds and can take a heavy load of shot.

Quite often pheasants are found in the same locality as quail, since they like to hide in dense cover. They also will run and flush wild, depending on the individual bird. A dog really increases hunter success on these quality birds. Don't be misled and shoot behind them, confused by their long tails. They can carry a load of shot, too. Remember, most pheasant hunting is done on private property and permission to hunt must be obtained from the owner. It's the law.

What Is A Forester?

A speaker at a recent meeting of the Siskiyou Chapter of the S. A. F., held in Grants Pass, Oregon, painted a distressing picture of a forester as people see him. It was based on a man-on-the-street survey made by asking average citizens the simple question: "What is a Forester?" The data were assembled in two categories — social and occupational.

In the social category, the impression of the forester was that he seldom wore a tie, and he was quiet — not vociferous unless talking about forestry. He was the manly, outdoor type. The forester's favorite color is green, and he is not too active in outside activities.

In the occupational category, citizens presented this image: 1. He has a direct relationship with Smokey. 2. He usually owns a sawmill. 3. He is a tree doctor or tree surgeon. 4. He is the epitome of a bureaucrat. 5. He cruises timber, which is counting trees. 6. From a logger: He hampers industry. 7. He rides in, flies over forests. Why? 8. From an insurance agent: He makes about \$800 a month and is a good risk.

NUMBER ONE CRIPPLER

Arthritis, the nation's number one crippler, afflicts some 13 million Americans and costs the economy almost four billion dollars each year.

About 700,000 persons are unable to work, keep house, go to school, or engage in recreational activities because they have arthritis reports the Idaho Medical Association.

It is estimated that direct medical costs exceed one billion dollars annually. Furthermore, the Arthritis Foundation says that Americans spend \$300 million each year for quack remedies and misrepresented drugs and devices. The costs of social and emotional problems resulting from arthritis cannot be estimated.

Although there is no cure for arthritis at present, there is still a serious gap between what is known about it and its application in practice.

Right now, disability can be arrested, often reversed. It has been well documented that chances of improving are directly related to the duration of the disease before the institution of therapy.

ACCIDENTAL POISONING IN THE HOME

More than 1,500 Americans died last year from accidental poisoning in the home. Deaths from this cause have been increasing by as much as 7 per cent a year since 1950.

Although children are all too often the victims, the fact is that more than two-thirds of such accidents happen to people older than 14.

To reduce the hazard in your home the Idaho Medical Association offers the following suggestions:

Read all labels carefully and protect them. Know exactly what is in the container. Don't reuse containers. Medicines may change with age, becoming weaker or stronger. Discard when they are old or no longer needed. Keep medicines for internal use entirely apart from those for external use.

Do not take medicine in the dark. Read labels at least twice before taking medicine or using hazardous products.

Keep medicines and pills in separate containers, never mixing them.

Never put hazardous substances in kitchen utensils. Never allow insect and rodent poisons in the kitchen.

Common household products like detergents, waxes, kerosene, mothballs, hair sprays and dyes and many others can be lethal, particularly for children. They be kept out of reach of little ones.

SAN FRANCISCO CLEANUP

A grim warning that the San Francisco Bay area either start to clean up its precious environment or face burial under its own garbage has been given by a Stanford University pharmacologist. He said: "The San Francisco Bay region serves as a prime example of ecological imbalance. It is increasing in population and at the same time, is unwilling to pay the price to control sewage and garbage disposal, air pollution, crime and traffic congestion. If man continues to exist without destroying himself in the next century, future generations will look upon us as ecological primitives."

Space systems of the future will be part of the solution to our problems here on earth, reports a National Aeronautics and Space Administration scientist. He said that the intensive study of our environment underlies our current and future uses of space and space-borne systems because it will soon become abundantly clear that our environment is the entire solar system.

JOB PLACEMENTS IN COUNTY ARE DOWN

Another holiday, coupled with winter weather curtailed the job placement activities at the Moscow Office of the Idaho Dept. of Employment during the week just ended, Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager said that his office placed 12 workers in jobs during the week, compared with 17 workers given job finding help during the previous week. He said last year at this time his office placed 11 local workers. During the week there were 15 new jobs listed with his office, compared with sixteen during the preceding week, and 16 during the same week a year ago. At the end of the week there were 24 jobs still open, the same number as for last week, but below the 38 listed for the corresponding week in 1968. Hartstein said that area employers are seeking good secretaries (with shorthand skills), an egg candler, auto mechanic, body and fender man, a truck mechanic, salesmen, a box boy and a delivery boy, cafe and domestic workers and other office workers. There are a number of workers available for part-time work Hartstein said, a few job opportunities exist for these young people.

Twenty area workers filed new claims for unemployment insurance through his office during the past week, Hartstein said. These workers came from the area's woods, from construction jobs, some were newcomers into the area and some were returning veterans recently discharged from the armed forces. The total number of workers now seeking jobless pay is 102, compared with 96 at this time last week, and 113 a year ago. Of the 14 persons who closed their claims, some returned to work, some were ineligible for benefits, and some had exhausted all benefits currently due them. In the immediate Moscow area there are now 42 persons seeking jobless pay, a week ago there were 39 and a year ago 43. At Genesee the total is now 5, last week 4, and a year ago 6. Thirty-two workers from the Troy-Deary-Bovill area are now seeking benefits, the same as a week ago, but down from the 37 of last year. At Kendrick, the total is now 3, last week it was also 3 and last year it was 7. At Potlatch there are 20 persons seeking checks, there were 16 last week and the same number a year ago. Two checks are going into Elk River, the same as last week, but a year ago there were four. Hartstein predicted a continuing gradual rise in the number of persons seeking benefits unless some drastic change in the weather would come about causing additional large scale curtailments in the area.

FARMERS RECEIVE TAX FORMS EARLY

Federal 1969 income tax forms for farmers will be sent to them about December 1 according to Internal Revenue Service Information Officer, John C. Anduiza. Estimated tax amounts in a separate package will reach farmers about the same time. All other taxpayers will receive their packages about January 1, 1970.

Farmers may elect to file and pay in full an estimated tax declaration by January 15, 1970, and file an income tax return by the April 15 dead line; or they may elect to file only an income tax return by February 16 and pay the tax due with the return. Farmers will be using the new Form 1040 to which separate schedules can be added to cover any tax situation.

HOW TO PREPARE YOUR CHRISTMAS TURKEY

SACK LUNCH—ALMOST! Why not try something a bit different with your Christmas turkey? (1) **FULLY THAW** your turkey. (2) Prepare your bird in the usual manner and add your favorite dressing. Butter, salt, and pepper. (3) Slide turkey into a large brown grocery sack, breast side up. Twist the ends of the sack and tie securely with string. (Don't store dressing in turkey overnight). (4) Place on a broiler pan on rack (no roasting pan or roaster!) Bake at 325 d. (5) If your turkey is over 12 pounds, bake 20 minutes per pound. For smaller birds, bake 25 minutes per pound.

Caution: Don't poke, don't baste! The purpose of the paper sack baking method will be ruined if you open it before the baking time is completed. This is a terrible temptation to open the sack, but if you follow the directions— presto—a golden brown, juicy bird.

After removing the bird from the oven, allow 15 to 30 minutes for the bird to cool in the paper bag before carving.

Sweet and Sour Turkey

(Leftovers?????)
 2 cups turkey, cooked, boned, and cut into pieces
 1 can pineapple chunks
 1 can mandarin oranges
 1/2 green pepper, sliced
 1 medium onion
 drain pineapple and oranges and save pieces
Syrup
 1/4 cup water
 2 Tbsp. cornstarch
 1/2 tsp. salt
 1/4 cup brown sugar
 1/3 cup vinegar
 1 Tbsp. grated orange rind
 1/8 tsp. or pinch of ginger
 1 Tbsp. soy sauce
 1 cup juice from above. If necessary fill with orange juice
 *can substitute chicken (4 breasts)
 Combine these ingredients and cook until thick. Pour into casserole and marinate overnight. Bake at 350d. for 45 minutes or 1 hour.

TIPS ON CHRISTMAS TREES GIVEN

Selecting a Christmas tree early has advantages, Vernon Burlison and Don White, University of Idaho extension foresters have some tips for shoppers.

For one thing, you have a wider choice when you visit the tree yard soon after stocks arrive. Some evergreen lots open soon after Thanksgiving. Others will spring up in preparation for the holiday.

For another thing—perhaps more important—you will have a better opportunity to test trees for freshness. A fresh tree has superior color, more fragrance, and last longer in safe condition.

Burlison and White suggest two tests. Lift the tree and drop it on the butt. If needles fall off, it is probably dry. For the second test, go back about six inches from the tip of a branch and hold a few needles between thumb and finger. Bend the needles and give a steady pull. If they break off at the base, the tree may be getting dry. The needles should bend without breaking.

When you get the tree home, cut about an inch off the base. Put the tree in a stand with about six inches of the stem in water. Keep the water level up. A six-foot tree with dense foliage can use a quart a day. Keep the tree in a cool place until it is brought in the house and decorated. Choose the indoor location so the tree is away from heat and don't overload with lights. Candles are not safe.

In case you are lighting a tree outdoors, the agents reminded, be sure the wiring is the outdoor type that will stand wet and cold.

The most popular trees for Christmas in northern Idaho are Grand Fir, Douglas Fir, and Spruce. Ponderosa pine has become popular especially when flocked. One of the most exciting developments in recent years is the sale of cultured Scotch and Austrian pine, Concolor fir and Colorado blue spruce.

Ask your Christmas tree retailer to show you the variety of trees he has to offer for sale.

WHEN SNOWMOBILES ARE ILLEGAL

Idaho sportsmen may not use snowmobiles to pursue, drive or herd any game bird, game mammal or furbearing mammal, the Fish and Game Department said today. The harassment of wildlife creatures is a misdemeanor, and persons convicted of such offenses are subject to fines and jail sentences.

It is pointed out that good intentions may sometimes get people into trouble. Wildlife photography, for example, often is a kind of harassment that is harmful to wildlife when the snow is deep and the animals are in poor physical condition.

The Idaho Fish and Game Department also reminds owners of snow vehicles that they are required this year to register and number their machines under a new state law, effective November 1, 1969, enforced by the Motor Vehicle Division of the Department of Law Enforcement, which also registers motor vehicles and motor boats.

In addition, there are various laws regulating snowmobiles using roads and highways, lights on the vehicles, brakes and muffler requirements. Law enforcement predicts 15,000 snowmobiles will be licensed during the next year. There are no title requirements.

The Motor Vehicle Division has published a booklet, "Idaho Snowmobile Registration" giving details. These are available from the Motor Vehicle Division and from the Fish and Game Department.

LICENSES SUSPENDED

Boise — During November the Driver Services section of the Department of Law Enforcement ordered suspension of 318 driver licenses, revoked five, and denied issuance of one. The suspensions included 288 Idahoans and 30 from out of state.

Of the suspensions ordered, 147 resulted from driving while under the influence convictions; 23 for drag racing convictions, and nine for violations of driver license restrictions.

The DWI suspensions included 123 from Idaho, and 24 out-of-staters.

Other suspensions were ordered for reckless driving, 46; driving on suspended licenses, 45; refusal to take a blood-alcohol test, 12; accumulation of traffic violation conviction points, 29, and failure to appear for driver improvement hearings, seven.

FISH AND GAME DEPT. NEWS FROM BOISE

Winter Fishing Here

Idaho's general statewide trout season is over, but winter-spring fishing for a wide assortment of species goes on. Year-around fishing for all or some fish species is available in all regions, and special seasons of shorter duration also are available. For example: Whitefish are beginning to bunch in schools, getting ready to spawn; better-than average runs of steelhead trout are available in the Snake, Clearwater and Salmon rivers and early spring fishing for warm water species such as perch, crappie, bass and catfish will be available later. After January 1, 1970, "fishing for fun" will regulate white sturgeon fishing in the Snake river. Under the new law, all sturgeon must be released, regardless of size.

Commission Meeting Chanced

A change in time and place of the special meeting of the Idaho Fish and Game Commission has been announced. It will be in Idaho Falls, rather than Boise, on Dec. 5th, rather than Dec. 3rd as previously announced. The regular quarterly session of the Commission will be held sometime in January to establish opening dates for big game hunting seasons in 1970. Closing dates will

be fixed in May.

Big Game Road Kills

Cooperative studies by the Fish and Game Dept. and the State Dept. of Highways indicates that hundreds of wild animals and thousands of game birds die in traffic accidents each year. The exact numbers are not available. Part of the solution is found in the slogan "Give Wildlife a Brake" especially at night in the mountainous areas posted with "deer crossing" signs.
