Community Action Agency Program

Coordinator Suggests Bird Plan

D. E. Chilberg, Program Coordinator of the Community Action Agency in Lewiston, has written to the director of the Idaho Fish and Game Department in Boise with a proposed plan to improve the upland game bird population in this area.

Mr. Chilberg revealed his proposed plan to the Gazette, Monday afternoon. The project, according to Chilberg, entails hiring and training low-income farmers in areas of good, natural habitat, to raise game bird chicks, to releasable age. At this time, perhaps a month before hunting season, the pens would be opened and the birds allowed to leave. Food

could be made available to the birds until they had become adjusted to the local habitat, when they would no longer return to the pens.

No Increase in Cost
The Fish and Game Department, Mr. Chilberg suggests, in cooperation with local poultry hatchers would supply the chicks and feed for the project and pay the farmer an amount not to exceed the costs of raising the birds on a bird farm. He said the cost per bird would not be higher than at present and he believed the state could expect a higher rate of survival to aid in establishing a native bird population. Another advantage of the program would be the supplementing of the income of at least a few farmers, Chilberg added.

"I believe Latah County is an ideal location for a pilot project in that there is good natural habitat and many individuals interested in improving the game population and recreational enjoyment of Latah County. Perhaps a local Wildlife Club would assist in training and supervising the project," Chilberg said in his letter to the Fish and Game Department.

Chilberg said Monday he had not yet received a reply to his letter, but would keep the Gazette informed as to the reception his proposals receive.

City To Receive State Health Award

The City of Kendrick will be the only municipality in the State of Idaho to receive a special Abatement of Water Pollution Award from the State Board of Health, it was announced Monday by that office. The award was based on Kendrick's willingness to face their pollution problems and solve them through a new sewage treatment plant.

Six of these awards were made throughout the state, but only this one went to a city. The Riverside Sewer District received one, and the other four went to industrial complexes. This is one reason that both the city government and the public can feel proud.

Certificates noting the reduction in pollution will be presented by Dr. Carter V. Beghtol, Orofino, a member of the State Board of Health, which authorized the honor.

Presentation At Lions Club

The presentation of the award by Dr. Beghtol will be made to the City and accepted by Mayor Donald Eichner at the regular monthly meeting of the Kendrick Community Lions Club, Wednesday evening, December 10, in the Kendrick Fire Hall.

Snow Storm Whitens Area

The first real snow storm of the season swept into the area Monday morning, and after continuing all that day and into the night, left a two-inch coating of white over both the valley and hill regions.

For almost two weeks the upper elevations, especially those around the Genesee area have been facing severe fog conditions during the evening and early morning hours. The fog and freezing weather combined to make road travel extremely hazardous. The Genesee area was plunged into darkness several times last week as the frost collected on the power lines until the weight snapped the lines in two. Friday the power in Genesee was out for a total of almost three hours and the Washington Water Power crews worked almost continuously to battle the various power outages.

The temperatures have been dipping down to 15 to 20 degrees above zero on the hill, which was freezing the fog as quickly as it touched any object. The result was a "flocking" of white frost over all trees, bushes and fences — beautiful to look at, but treacherous to drive on.

Monday morning an early drizzling rain changed to snow and continued lightly through the day. The temperature warmed in the afternoon and the snow melted as it fell in the Kendrick-Juliaetta valley, but it stayed on the ground on the ridges and in Genesee. Tuesday morning the snow that had fallen during the night when the temperatures were lower, again had covered all the general area with white. There was just as much snow in the valley as there was on the hill.

There was a brief period of clearing Tuesday morning and mid-day, but by afternoon the skies had again clouded over and snow was beginning to fall lightly.

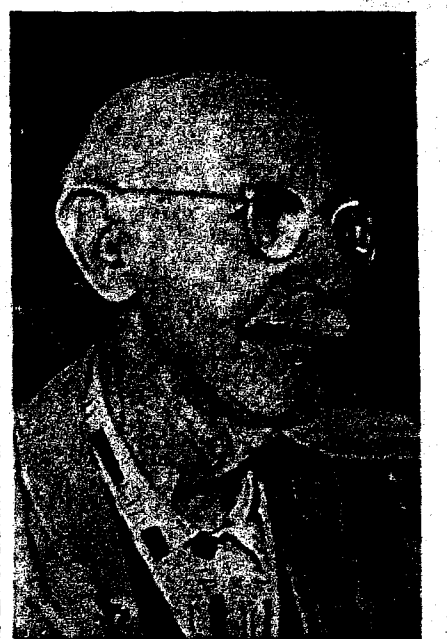

William E. Kauder Will Observe 101st Birthday Friday December 12

William E. Kauder, a true pioneer of this area, will reach the 101st anniversary of his birth Friday, December 12th. A birthday dinner will be held Sunday, December 14, at the home of his step-daughter, Mrs. Darwin Tarry, Southwick, and any of his friends wishing to greet him on this special day may do so between 2:00 and 4:00 o'clock in the afternoon on Sunday, the family said.

Mr. Kauder, who is "Uncle Billy" to most of his friends and neighbors, was born December 12, 1868, in Adams County, Illinois, just three years after the end of the Civil War. He came west in the spring of 1891, and

homesteaded in the Crescent area near Southwick, later making his home at Southwick, until moving to the Golden Rule area to live in the Alma Betts home.



Robert E. Berger, Genesee Farmer, Passes December 5

Robert Edward Berger, 68, a longtime farmer in the Genesee area, died of cancer Friday, December 5 at 1:02 a. m. at St. Joseph's hospital, Lewiston.

He was born March 13, 1901, at Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, the son of John and Mary Braun Berger. He lived in Pennsylvania until 1911 when the family moved to this area, where he graduated from Lewiston high school.

He proved up on his homestead and continued to farm until 1927, when he moved into the town of Southwick and became the maintenance man at the Southwick School, a position he held for almost ten years.

In addition to farming, Mr. Kauder is a skilled carpenter and did much of that work during his career. He was also a talented banjo player and in earlier times played for many dances in this area.

In May of 1918, Mr. Kauder married Anna Kramer, who passed away in 1953. His two step-daughters, Mrs. D. W. Tarry and Mrs. Barney Driscoll will be hostesses at the birthday dinner Sunday.

Our Oldest Subscriber

An interesting footnote to Mr. Kauder's career is that he is the oldest subscriber to the Kendrick Gazette. He became a subscriber in 1896 when the family first ran a legal notice of "proving up" on their homestead land. He has been a subscriber and reader since that time. The Gazette and all his many friends hope the association continues for a long time to come.

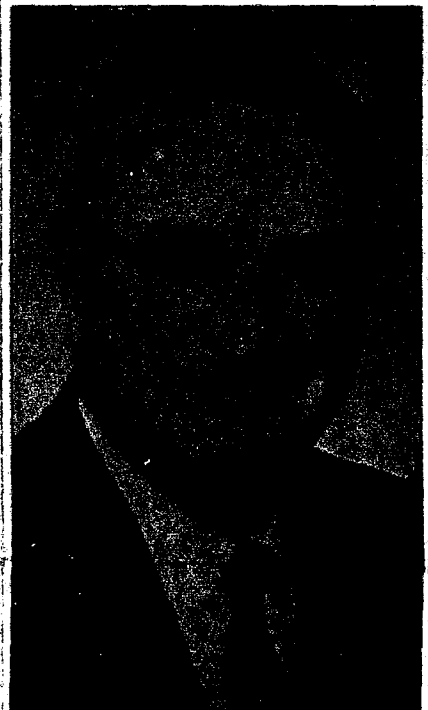
The 4-H'ers had many tours of museums and went sight-seeing during their busy schedule through the week.

WANTED BY THE FBI



JOHN WILLIAM CLOUSER

John William Clouser, a Florida mental hospital escapee, who has vowed not to be taken alive, is one of the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives."

On the night of April 2, 1964, Clouser and three other inmates escaped from the Florida State Hospital in Chattahoochee and reportedly forced two hospital employees to drive them to the Columbus, Georgia, area. The hostages were robbed but released unharmed. A Federal warrant issued at Montgomery, Alabama, on April 9, 1964, charges Clouser with transporting a stolen car from Georgia to Alabama, where the stolen car was recovered abandoned.

A former police officer, Clouser was admitted to the Florida State Hospital in February, 1964, after being adjudged mentally insane. He was then facing numerous criminal charges and had earlier been convicted of participating in the robbery, kidnapping and beating of two theater managers. His conviction was appealed, however, due to a state error, and he was released and granted a new trial.

He is a white American, born at Chicago, Illinois, on March 29, 1932. He is 5'9" tall, weighs from 165 to 180 pounds and has blond hair, blue eyes, a stocky build and ruddy complexion. He is tattooed with a panther on his right shoulder and a heart pierced with an arrow on his left shoulder.

He is described as a sadist who would not hesitate to beat a victim to death, is an expert pistol shot, exercises and lifts weights regularly and is proficient in Judo and Karate. Consider him extremely dangerous.

ORDINANCE NO. 210

AN ORDINANCE EXPRESSING AN INTENTION TO SELL REAL PROPERTY DESCRIBED IN THIS ORDINANCE OWNED BY THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO; APPOINTING APPRAISERS TO APPRAISE SAID REAL PROPERTY; PROVIDING FOR A PUBLIC HEARING ON THE ISSUE OF THE SALE OF SAID REAL PROPERTY; PROVIDING FOR THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO:

1. INTENT TO SELL. That the City of Genesee, Idaho, intends, subject to the provisions of Section 50-1403, Idaho Code, to sell all of its rights, title and interest in the following described real property situated at Genesee, in Latah County, State of Idaho, to-wit:

Lot Four (4) of Block Twenty (20) of the Original Plat of the Town of Genesee as shown by the recorded plat thereof, except the East six (6) inches thereof and excepting a one-half (1/2) interest in the brick wall on the said East six (6) inches of said Lot four (4).

2. MANNER OF SALE. That said real property shall be offered for sale and sold at public auction to the highest bidder, subject to the right of the City of Genesee, Idaho to reject any or all bids; and that no bids shall be accepted for less than the appraised value of said real property fixed by the appraisers hereinafter appointed.

3. PLACE OF SALE. That the public auction mentioned in Paragraph 2 of this ordinance be held at the City Hall in the City of Genesee, Idaho, on the 2nd day of March, 1970, at the hour of 8 o'clock P. M. of said day.

3A. TERMS OF SALE. The terms of sale shall be cash, in lawful money of the United States of America, payable within fifteen (15) days after the City of Genesee, Idaho accepts the bid of the successful bidder.

4. NOTICE OF SALE. That notice of the public auction mentioned in this ordinance shall be given by publication on three (3) consecutive issues of the official newspaper of the City of Genesee, to-wit, The Gazette-News, a newspaper published at Genesee, Idaho, prior to the date of the public auction.

5. PUBLIC HEARING. That a public hearing on the issue of the sale of the real property described in this ordinance shall be held on the 5th day of January, 1970, at the hour of 8 o'clock P. M., at the City Hall of the City of Genesee, Idaho, at Genesee, Idaho, pursuant to Section 50-1403, Idaho Code.

6. CONDITIONS OF SALE. That the sale of said real property described in this ordinance, and all proceedings in connection therewith, shall be subject to, and made and had in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 14 of Title 50 of the Idaho Code.

7. NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING. That notice of the public hearing mentioned in Paragraph 5 of this ordinance be given by publication in at least one (1) issue of the aforementioned Gazette-News, prior to said public hearing.

8. APPRAISERS. That Lester Diehl, Wayne Hampton, and Henry Koester, three disinterested residents of the City of Genesee, Idaho, be, and they hereby are appointed appraisers, pursuant to Section 50-1402 Idaho Code, to appraise the real property described in this ordinance, and that said appraisers shall return their appraisal to the City Clerk of the City of Genesee, Idaho.

9. EFFECTIVE DATE. That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect on and after the date of the first publication thereof in the aforesaid official newspaper of this City.

Misjudging Speed Major Cause of Accidents

Boise — Misjudging speeds of vehicles continues to be a leading cause of traffic accidents, State Police Supt. L. Clark Hand said this week in commenting on Idaho's highway death toll.

The danger of speed given in miles per hour is rarely understandable to most drivers, the superintendent said, but per-mile speed reduced to the number of feet a vehicle travels in a single second becomes frightening to anyone sensible enough to realize the difficulty of stopping in an emergency.

Hand offered a simple formula for computing feet per second from miles per hour: The speed per hour shown on a speedometer can be reduced to the number of feet in a single second by taking one-half the speed shown and adding this to the speedometer reading. The total becomes the feet a vehicle is traveling in a single second.

For example: The speedometer reads 32 miles per hour. Half of this is 16. Added to 32 mph you have a total of 48, the number of feet the vehicle will travel in a single second.

"Too many drivers become involved in accidents," Hand said, "because they fail to realize they can't stop in a dime."

"Drive at a speed which enable you to stop in the clear distance ahead," he concluded.

Many Vehicles As Yet Are Not Licensed

Boise — A check of vehicles not carrying renewed license stickers on plates should convince any motorist that "license renewal lines" will be long in December, warns the Motor Vehicle division. Checks with various county assessors show sales of 1970-71 stickers are running only about 10 percent of the total to be issued.

"We can't make motorists buy their stickers early," said Jack Farley, division director, "all we can do is suggest that they take advantage of the opportunity to purchase before predicted waiting lines occur."

All licenses expire at midnight, Dec. 31, 1969, and must be renewed before vehicles may be operated legally on Idaho highways after that date. Regardless of expiration dates of new stickers, renewals must be made prior to vehicle operation after the end of the year. The director also stated that there will be no grace period for purchase of the stickers or plates this year.

Under the staggered system, motorists will be buying renewal stickers for between six and 17 months, depending on the last digit of the presently held 1968 plates, Farley explained.

Stickers have been available since Oct. 1, and will be available through December as a convenience to the motorists. It's up to the individual whether he wants to wait in line later on. Renewal stickers cost the same, whether purchased now or weeks from now.

USE FOR DRY ICE

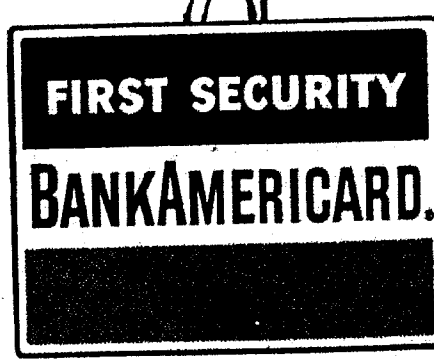

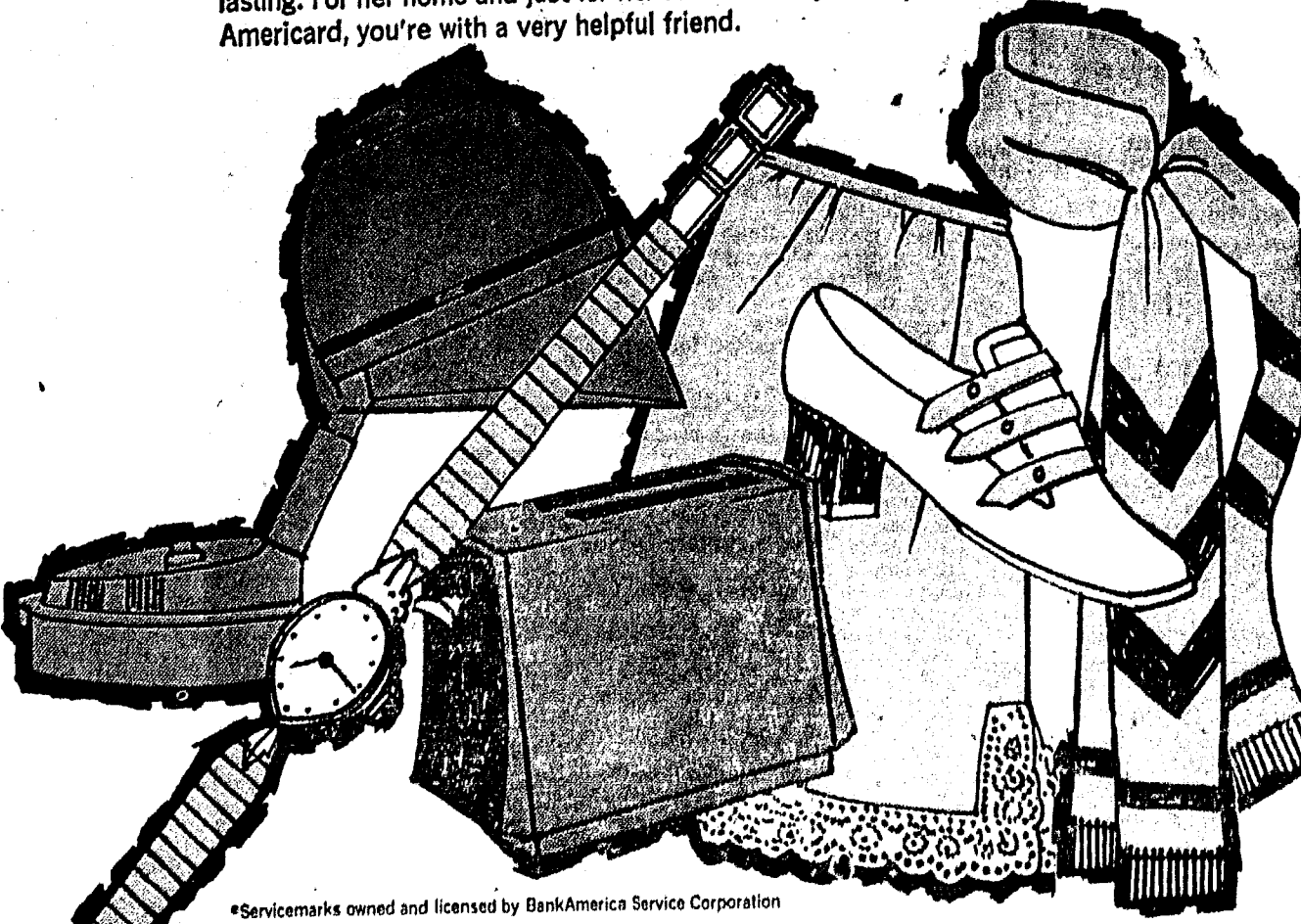

Boise — Average steelhead run in the Snake, Clearwater and main Salmon rivers still offers some good fishing for hardy anglers who don't mind chilly weather and icing conditions on gear. Here L. B. Fall Run Chinook Salmon Make Hells Canyon Stand

Boise — What may be the last act in the tragedy of Idaho's fall run of chinook salmon is being acted out on a stage just over 100 miles long. It is the Snake River from Hells Canyon Dam to the Asotin dam site near Lewiston. Of all the salmon species, chinooks make the longest migratory ascension of inland waterways to the headwaters of hinterland streams. Three separate species make spawning runs to Idaho in the spring, summer and fall.

All three races of chinook salmon are in trouble because of environmental changes in the Columbia and Snake river systems, and the loss of most of the best ancestral spawning gravel in these vast watersheds. The hardest hit of all the chinooks is the

fall-run chinook that historically spawned in the Snake river downstream from Salmon Falls some 600 miles above its mouth in the days before Swan Falls Dam was built.

These salmon were bigger than the spring and summer chinooks from the Salmon and Clearwater river drainages. Some of them weighed more than 40 pounds.

After migrating from the ocean and entering tidewater, salmon stop feeding. Instinct prompts them to "mouth" natural baits attractively offered, and to strike occasionally at artificial lures, though physiological changes prevent them from swallowing food. Salmon, of course, are no match for the nylon gillnet barriers stretched across their paths, and thousands more succumb to the concrete and steel waterfalls in the Columbia and Snake rivers, as well as to pollution.

When fish that succeed in running the gauntlet reach the ancestral spawning grounds, whether in headwater streams of the Clearwater and Salmon river drainages — or whether in the Middle Snake river in the case of fall-run chinooks — oftentimes battered and beaten from the long, troubled journey, they dig out a redd or nest in the gravel, spawn and die.

Fall-run chinook spawn from October to November. Eggs hatch in the mid-winter. Although spring-run chinook reside in fresh water for over one year and move seaward during their second spring, fall chinook generally migrate to the ocean during their first year of life. According to Terry Holubetz, regional fisheries biologist, fall chinook juveniles migrate as fry and are not termed smolts. Summer stocks demonstrate both residence patterns, but most summer-run chinook juveniles migrate to the sea in the second year of their life.

Holubetz added that since fresh

water growth is much slower than the marine growth due to less favorable food supplies, fish from the various runs of chinook salmon differ markedly in size at the same age. Fall chinook are the largest. As the fall chinook approach maturity, they exhibit a reduced catchability and this lower susceptibility to hook and line gear makes the fall salmon the least important of the three races in Idaho sport salmon fishery.

The fall run chinook is extremely important in the ocean sport and commercial troll fisheries of Oregon, Washington and British Columbia. Fall chinook are also taken in considerable numbers and make up over 40 percent of the Columbia river gillnet catch. Columbia river fall-run chinook are rarely taken south of central Oregon in ocean fisheries. Fall chinook originating in the Columbia river drainage show a definite northward movement in the Pacific Ocean and contribute their greatest numbers to the British Columbia troll fishery off the west coast of Vancouver Island. Idaho contributes to about 5 percent of the Columbia River fall chinook run.

streams. When they reach Idaho waters they virtually are home free, since the sport fishery is limited. Only fall-run salmon must face what appears to be insurmountable obstacles in their home waters in the Hells Canyon reaches of the Snake river. Their ascent to ancient spawning gravel below Swan Falls is blocked by a trio of dams without fishways. Two federal dams, Ice Harbor and Lower Monumental, already span the lower Snake river, and the construction of at least two more seems inevitable.

This means that fall-run chinook are being pushed into the lower end of the remaining free-flowing stretch of river near Lewiston, the end of the line, literally and figuratively. Historically, this race of salmon always has spawned where gravel and water conditions are suitable in the Snake river, presumably because the water temperatures are warmer in late October, November and early December, rather than in the Clearwater and Salmon river drainages. Most of the spawning activity was below Swan Falls as long as the fish could get there. Now it is concentrated between Hells Canyon Dam and Lewiston.

A survey team recently counted 569 redds or nests and 337 fall-run chinook on the river from Asotin dam site near Lewiston to Hells Canyon Dam. The survey was made by Donald R. Orcutt, Boise, field supervisor of the Bureau of Commercial Fisheries. His companion on the helicopter flight was Terry Holubetz. Orcutt made the same flight by helicopter at a comparable time of the month two years ago, observing 153 salmon redds and 12 live fish from Hells Canyon Dam to Lewiston. He adds that the increase in the number of redds observed this year will amount to about 267 percent.

The point is that there has been an increase of more than 265 percent in redd counts from Hells Canyon Dam to Lewiston. Trend information provided by redd counts is extremely useful to fishery biologists who are interested in providing optimum escapements of spawning salmon. This recent run of fall-spawning chinook, which in years past surged through Hells Canyon about 30,000 strong, now has been displaced from the upper reaches of the Snake river by the Brownlee-Hells Canyon dam complex, and out of the lower reaches of the Snake River by the backwaters of lower Monumental and Ice Harbor dams.

Any additional dam construction in the last remaining free-flowing stretches of the Snake River will most certainly doom fall chinook salmon in the Snake river in Idaho.
