Asa C. Cook, Sr., a life long resident of Juliaetta, was born just 80 years ago on New Year's Day. He has lived all those years, except for the first two, on or near the original homestead taken out by his parents, James and Hattie Cook, on the Middle Potlatch creek canyon, just north of Juliaetta.

Asa was one of five children, and only he and one sister, Mrs. Frank (Ellen) Daugherty of Washuena, are still living. He married Carrie Covert at Davenport, Wn., Nov. 26, 1926. On that day he says that he had to stop frequently to wipe the windshield of his Model "T" Ford to keep the ice off it, in order to see where he was going.

During the war years Mr. Cook held the largest independently owned cherry orchard in the Northwest. Mrs. Cook died on Feb. 21, 1962.

On New Year's Day the family will gather at the family home to help him celebrate his birthday, if he is well enough. For the past month he has been hospitalized several times.

## Charley McCarthy, 93, Dies At Moscow Sunday

Charles T. (Charley) McCarthy, 93, a resident of Kendrick since 1942, died of the infirmities of age Sunday, Dec. 28, at the Latah Convalescent Center, Moscow. He had been a patient at the center for about two years.

A retired Northern Pacific Railway Co. worker, McCarthy moved to Kendrick in 1942, and lived there until his illness. He had retired in 1947. He lived for a time at the Orchard Nursing Home in Lewiston, and then went to the Moscow home.

A life-long bachelor, he lived alone in a frame house in the banks of Bear Creek in the east part of Kendrick. In his retirement years he kept busy with gardening for himself and his neighbors.

He was born at Erie, Pa., January 10, 1876. With his parents he moved by ox team to Graceville, Minn. His father homesteaded there. The family later moved to Chicago.

McCarthy first went to work in the railroad car shops at Chicago at the age of 14, and later followed construction.

He has no known survivors.

Committal services were held on Tuesday at 2:00 p. m., at the Kendrick Cemetery. Vassar-Rawls Funeral Home, Lewiston, was in charge of arrangements.

## Dog Licenses Expire

Pet owners in Genesee, Kendrick and Juliaetta reminded that all dog licenses expired on December 31, 1969, and are due and payable as of January 1 for the coming year.

Licenses in Kendrick may be obtained from City Clerk Bob Magnuson at the post office or his insurance agency. Fees are \$3.00 for males and spayed females and \$5.00 for unspayed females.

### ENFORCEMENT RESPONSIBILITIES

Law Enforcement Commissioner Warner C. Mills said today there is a definite division of enforcement responsibilities charged to state police and weighmasters.

"Weighmasters, employed in the six ports of entry, and 10 permanent weigh stations, are not state police officers," the commissioner said. "Their prime responsibility is to regulate the trucking industry in the area of weight, width and length of vehicles and vehicle equipment."

Mills pointed out that weighmasters have uniforms different from state police, wear a shield different from the state police star and do not carry weapons.

The Department of Law Enforcement, he said, employs 50 weighmasters, who in some cases have been identified with the state's 101 state troopers.

"Weighmasters are under the jurisdiction of the superintendent of state police, but they are not a part of the state police organization," Mills concluded.

### NEW SHORT INCOME TAX FORMS ISSUED

The old short form 1040A card income tax return has been replaced by a one-page form, the Internal Revenue Service announced Wednesday.

New regular form 1040 return packets are being mailed to those who filed the 1040 A form last year.

However, for short filings the taxpayer need only use the one-page return included in the packet, IRS officials explained.

We now have snow and this morning thermometers showed 24 degrees below.

Leland News: (Dec. 13, 1919), thermometers registered 30 degrees below and on Dec. 12 Kendrick thermometers registered 25 below.

### Year-Round Waterfowl Management

January 4-10, the annual mid-winter waterfowl inventory, will be made by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service in cooperation with the fish and game department. Normally, the work is done just prior to the close of the waterfowl hunting season, but this year there are two closing dates, splitting counties within the Columbia Basin Mallard Area from those which are not.

There will be about three dozen ground and aerial observers, some federal but mostly state, engaged in counting several hundred thousand ducks, geese, swans and coots, as well as two species of eagles.

## Home Cookin'

Why not start out the New Year by inviting friends and neighbors in for a piece of warm coffee cake and a cup or two of coffee. This recipe for coffee cake was sent in with no name, but thank you cook, anyway. Doesn't it sound delicious?

Good health and happiness in abundance is my sincere wish for one and all in 1970.

- 1 cup shortening
  - 1 cup granulated sugar
  - 2 eggs, unbeaten
  - 1 cup milk
  - 1 teaspoon salt
  - 3 cups sifted all-purpose flour
  - 3 teaspoons baking powder
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
  - 1 1/2 cups brown sugar, packed
  - 3 tablespoons flour
  - 2 or 3 tablespoons cinnamon
  - 3/4 cup melted margarine
  - 2 cups seedless raisins, rinsed in hot water
  - 1 cup chopped nut meats, optional
- Heat oven to 350 degrees.  
Grease bottoms of 2 8"x8"x2" pans. Sift together flour, baking powder, and salt. With mixer at 'cream' thoroughly mix shortening with granulated sugar, then with eggs, until very light and fluffy. Then at low speed, beat in alternately, just until smooth, flour mixture in fourths and combined milk and vanilla in thirds. Spread one fourth of batter in each pan; top with one fourth of combined brown sugar, 3 tablespoons flour, and cinnamon; pour on one fourth butter; then sprinkle with one fourth of raisins and nuts. Repeat. Bake 50 minutes, or until done.

### AIR POLLUTION COULD CAUSE A "GREAT FLOOD"

UNCHECKED global industrial air pollution from the burning of fossil fuels may eventually cause another "Great Flood" by upsetting the earth's heat balance, says a scientist at the University of Rochester. It appears, he says, that although the oceans are capable of absorbing nearly all of the carbon dioxide produced by industrial activities, if carbon dioxide pollution is allowed to go unchecked the seas' capacity to absorb it may eventually be impaired. Carbon dioxide molecules in the atmosphere absorb and thereby prevent heat from radiating away from the earth's surface. Doubling of the atmospheric carbon dioxide concentration would increase the surface temperature by four degrees. As a result, polar ice caps would melt and the sea level would rise 100 to 300 feet.

AN INSTRUMENT PACKAGE to be sent on the first spacecraft flight to Jupiter in 1972 to afford science its first close-up study of that planet's atmosphere is under development at the University of Southern California. Weighing less than two lbs. the device will be similar in function to light meters used by photographers. Specifically, the device's principal mission is to determine the amounts of molecular hydrogen and atomic helium in Jupiter's atmosphere. Knowledge of the ratio of the two elements and the exact percentage of the atmosphere which they constitute may be a key to understanding the evolution of the solar system. Jupiter and Saturn, unlike the earth and other planets closer to the sun, have retained their primary atmospheres, which appear to be essentially unchanged since the planets' formation.

"SEE-THROUGH" assemblies on mbing tanks, cooking kettles, absorption columns and other pressure vessels enable industrial users to keep on eye on materials being processed, reports Tube Turns, Louisville. The sight glasses consist of a three-fourths in.-thick lens mounted between two metal flanges. The assemblies can withstand temperatures up to 500 degrees F.

### OVERLAP HUNTING SEASONS

Hunting seasons for migratory waterfowl, partridge, quail and rabbits overlap into the early part of 1970. Cottontail and pygmy rabbit hunting, the longest season, extends through February 28, while upland game bird hunting, particularly for chukars, continues in the Hells Canyon reaches of the Snake River from Brownlee Dam to Lewiston, and the Salmon River drainage in the counties of Adah, Custer, Idaho, Lewis, Lemhi, Nez Perce, and Valley where the season closes January 25, 1970.

Duck hunting ends December 28 in all counties outside the Columbia Basin Mallard Area, and goose season in these same counties ends on January 4, 1970. Duck season with-

in the Columbia Basin Mallard Area of Idaho ends January 18, 1970, and for geese, January 4, 1970.

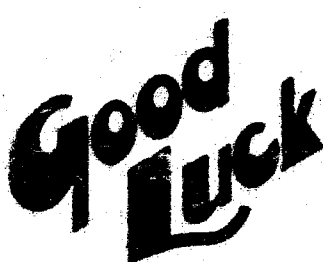
New hunting licenses for the 1970 calendar year must be obtained to finish any of these seasons, although federal "duck stamps" are valid for all of the 1969-70 waterfowl season. Fishing licenses for the new year also are required for winter fishing. Steelhead permit cards for the new calendar year will cost \$1 each.

Last Archery Season  
The last big game hunting season during 1969 was the elk-deer archery hunt in the Palouse country of the Panhandle. Archery hunting for elk and deer ended December 28 in the Gibbonsville area (unit 21-A).

Now that all big game seasons are over for another year, hunters who have not already returned report cards to the department are urged to get them in the mail promptly. The cards provide hunt information on a unit basis that cannot be obtained in any other way.

Hunters also are thanked for the cooperation given the department in the collection of jaw bones and rumen samples from deer and elk, and for retrieving bands and other markers from bagged animals, birds and fish and returning them to the department.

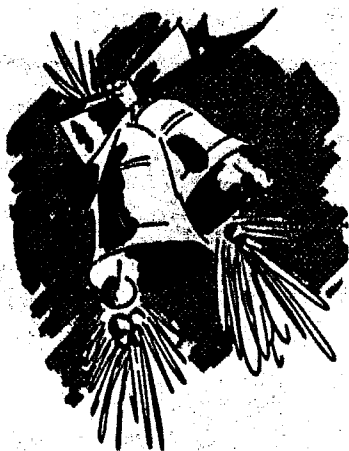



### Many Public Students In Need of Special Attention, Says Report

Nearly 21,000 Idaho public school children are in need of special educational attention, results of a statewide survey released this week by the State Department of Education revealed.

The survey was conducted in all public elementary and secondary schools last spring. Forms were given to all teachers in each school building in the state.

D. F. Englekling, superintendent of public instruction, said the purpose of the survey was "to promote awareness of the need for diagnosis, special education and related services for children who require such aid so they may receive maximum benefit from their education."

Termed "exceptional children," youngsters needing special attention are defined in one or more of seven categories.

The survey disclosed these results: Identifications of learning problems, 8,394; speech difficulties, 3,108; hearing problems, 1,655; physical handicaps, 2,310; vision problems, 1,059; behavior disorders, 4,547, and academically talented, 4,960. A total of 20,922 children were identified.

Raymond H. Lehrman, director of special education, said this number is about 11 per cent of Idaho's total public school enrollment, and is slightly under the national state average.

"The survey presents a picture of the need for further consideration of the state's educational program for exceptional children," Lehrman said.

While provision of special education for exceptional children by public school districts is not mandatory under Idaho law, 17 classes are being taught for children who have learning disabilities, and 128 for children who are mentally retarded, Lehrman said.

However, it is important to point out that 3,354 children with speech handicaps are given special help by public school speech and hearing therapists on an individual or small group basis. Similarly, those with hearing handicaps of a mild nature—more than 100—are taught lip reading on an individual basis as required.

Classrooms have not been developed for severely emotionally disturbed children. Children with emotional disabilities associated with learning disabilities are placed in classrooms for the perceptually impaired. Those with hearing handicaps which prevent normal development and use of spoken language, and those with severe sight problems, attend the State School for the Deaf and Blind at Gooding.

Englekling said many school districts are "demonstrating a sense of increased awareness" of responsibility and concern for children who have serious learning difficulties.

"However," he added, "we still lack adequate diagnosis and identification, quality special education personnel, proper classroom space and facilities, and an adequate budget."

Idaho's special education funding totals a little more than \$1 million a year in state and county money, and about \$500,000 in federal funds.

Englekling said there is increased concern in Washington for special education programs, and that he is hopeful Idaho will be able to step up its planning for exceptional children.

### Fishing Regulation Changes Noted In Clearwater Region

There have been a number of changes for 1970 in fishing regulations on resident species in the Clearwater Region. The sturgeon fishery has been changed to a catch and release regulation. Fishermen can fish for this great trophy but have to let them go no matter what their size. They can measure the sturgeon before releasing if they leave it in the water while this is accomplished.

The white sturgeon population in the Snake River has been on the decline because of hydroelectric development, pollution, and increased fishing pressure. This regulation is designed to give it further protection while providing recreational benefits. The catch and release regulation is new to Idaho this year but has proven to be very successful in other states. The Idaho Fish and Game Department is attempting to learn two facts with such a regulation. The first is, "Can a body of water provide a substantial amount of recreational fishing and at the same time allow the fish population to increase?" The second reason is "How will the people of Idaho react to such a regulation?" In other states there has been a substantial increase in anglers fishing for fun on such streams because of the greater number and trophy size of the fish available.

There has been a change in the fishing regulations for Kelly Creek, a tributary to the North Fork of the Clearwater River. As a part of a special study on the effects of Dworshak Dam, it has been designated a fishing for fun stream. It shall be unlawful to reduce any fish to possession and angling with bait is prohibited, so it's lures and flies only. This is an attempt to see if reducing the impact of fishing pressure on cutthroat trout will allow them to increase and fill the voids left by the small steelhead eliminated with the dam. At present, the small steelhead make up about 80-90 percent of the catch in the North Fork. So, this will be a tremendous loss to the trout fishery. The Cooperative Fishery Unit at the University of Idaho will be working with the Fish and Game Department on the study.

Whitefish and bass fishermen will have a much more simple season to work with, beginning on January 1st. They will be able to fish the entire year in the Selway River, South Fork of the Clearwater River, Lochsa River, Crooked River, and North Fork of the Clearwater upstream to Wetlas Pack Bridge.

There is a short closure 300 feet below the fishways at Dworshak Dam.

"A study of inquiries handled by the office indicates most interest in the state of Idaho comes from California, and the northern and south central areas of the United States," Minton said. "We intend to develop that interest into a high percentage of travel to Idaho.
