The statistics are used as bench marks for annual crop and livestock estimates. Manufacturers of machines, equipment and other products needed by farmers use the assembled census data as an aid in distributing their products. Wholesalers, retailers, service agencies, and others associated with agri-business rely on the data for future plans. In addition, the bureau says, when a farmer counts his cattle, keeps a record of yields, etc., he is taking a consus of his farm. He is concerned that the results are accurate
