Phar, Green Seated On Genesee Council

Genesee — Wm. J. Phar, manager of the Genesee Branch, First Security Bank, and Chet Green, an employee of the Genesee Union Warehouse, were sworn in and seated on the Genesee City Council, Monday evening, January 5. They replace Ed. Jutte and Bill Roth. Mayor D. F. Scharnhorst, who begins another four-year term this month, assigned Green as Commissioner of Parks and Recreation and Phar as Water and Sewer Commissioner.

John Myers, Jr., and Jack Magee are holdover members of the council and Mayor Scharnhorst, with approval of the group, appointed Myers president of the Council. The president of the council acts in the absence of the mayor.

In discussing the applications for city clerk, Mayor Scharnhorst said a closing date of March 2, will be set for acceptance of applications for the position of city clerk. The present clerk, Chuck Manfred, has said he desires to resign as soon as a replacement is found and trained.

Mayor Scharnhorst reported to the council that Wayne Hampton, Les Diehl and Henry Koster, the three men appointed to appraise the Rice Building, which the Council desires to sell, have set a price on the building. The building will be sold at public auction on Monday, March 2, 1970.

Councilman Myers, street commissioner, presented a letter from Merrill W. Conritz, a Moscow engineer, who was hired by the city to investigate the possibility of paving all the streets in Genesee with asphalt and/or seal coating. The engineer reported that there are 6.7 miles of streets in Genesee and that the cost of putting an adequate surface on all the streets could vary from almost \$100,000 down to nearly \$60,000, depending on the type of surface used, depth of application and width of street surfacing. How this could be financed, if the citizens really want this done and many other questions must still be answered. Myers said he will attempt to bring this issue to the public through meeting and discussions to find out the people's sentiments.

The preliminary budget for the coming year was discussed by the council. Genesee's assessed valuation is down \$13,800 from last year, which will force a cutback on some budget items.

Grasshopper Control Meeting Is Jan. 14

A meeting to discuss the possibility of establishing a grasshopper control program in this area has been set for 1:30 p. m. Wednesday, January 14, at the Kendrick Fire Hall. It was announced this week by Homer Futter, Latah County Agent.

Grasshoppers are rapidly becoming a cause for concern in many areas. Futter said, and if a control program can be set up now while many of the insects are in the canyon and pastures, the cost will be much less than if the infestation becomes worse and the treatment has to be applied to land crops. Federal and state funds are also available now to help control grasshoppers.

To be really effective an entire area must be blocked off for control treatment. Futter said. Spot treatment isn't too effective.

All farmers and others interested are urged to attend this meeting.

Since September of 1969, the beginning of the crop year, a total of 6.34 inches of moisture was recorded. For the same period in 1968 the total was 10.88 inches.

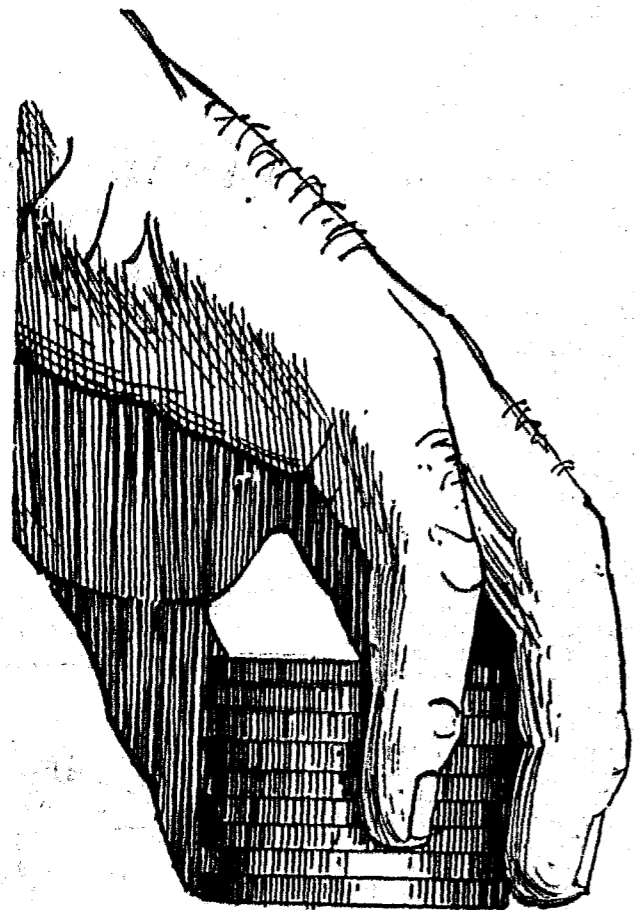

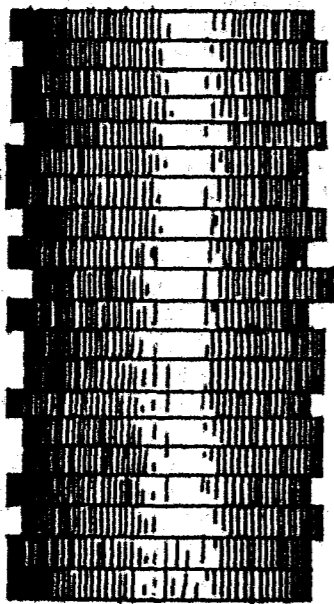

ALIENS MUST REGISTER

Wash., D. C. — Mr. Hofeller, district director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, states that the annual alien address report program usually causes a sharp rise in the number of applications for naturalization.

The law requires that all aliens in the United States, with few exceptions, report their addresses each January. Throughout the United States, almost 30 percent more applications for naturalization are received during the months of January, February and March than are received during other months. Mr. Hofeller attributes this sudden rise to the alien report program.

Aliens not required to make this report are diplomats and those persons accredited to certain international organizations.

Forms for making the reports will be available to aliens at all post offices and offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service during the month of January. Mr. Hofeller indicated that aliens desiring information concerning naturalization or similar matters should obtain the forms at an office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service where personnel trained in these fields will be available to answer inquiries.

IDAHO DEPT. OF EMPLOYMENT

Only 7 local workers were given job finding help during the past week, through the Moscow Office of the Idaho Department of Employment. Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow Office Manager reported that this compared with 27 persons placed on jobs during the same week a year ago. Hartstein explained that a year ago his office was kept quite busy answering pleas for help from snow and ice beset homes and business owners, and that many of the 27 workers placed a year ago were removing snow and ice from sidewalks and roofs. At the end of the week there were 19 jobs still open. Among the jobs available in the County, are those for power sawyers, insurance salesman, a farm hand, secretaries, cooks, waitresses, and domestic worker. Workers in nearly all categories are becoming available in increasing numbers, according to Hartstein's report.

Twenty-nine idled workers filed new claims for unemployment insurance during the week, bringing the total of Latah's jobless to 200. A year ago there were 230 workers in the area seeking jobless pay, and last week the total was 177. In the immediate Moscow area the total is now 86, compared with 78 a week ago and 107 a year ago. At Geneese there are 9 claiming benefits, 6 last week, and 13 last year. Fifty-one checks are going into the Troy-Deary-Bovill area, compared with 45 a week ago, and 64 a year ago. The Kendrick area has 14 workers seeking unemployment compensation now there were 11 a week ago, and 13 this time last year. At Elk River the totals for last year and last week were the same, as current total of 7. In the Potlatch area there are now 33 continuing to claim benefits, a week ago there were 30 and a year ago there were 26. Hartstein reported that he felt the number of jobless pay recipients would continue to mount gradually all during the period of inclement weather.

SALMON WATERS TO GET SECTIONAL EVALUATION

Salmon and steelhead fishermen in Idaho waters this year are urged to record steelhead catches by date, by numbered section and tributary stream, the Fish and Game Department said today. Purpose of the new study is to evaluate the returns of salmon and steelhead to anadromous fish hatcheries which have been built, or are now under construction. "We want to know how many salmon and steelhead are caught above and below each of the hatchery facilities," Jas. Keating, fisheries research supervisor, explains. "Conservation officers and other personnel will be checking for clipped fins and other identification marks telling us which hatcheries spawned and incubated these sea-run fish. Field checks will show how many fish came from each hatchery, as part of a cost evaluation study.

"We want to know whether Idaho fishermen are catching a significant part of the returning salmon and steelhead adults," Keating declared. He added that fisheries research workers want to know, for example, whether a steelhead was caught below the North Fork of the Clearwater River on the main stem, or whether it was taken upstream from Kooakia; or whether an anadromous fish was caught above or below the confluence of the Salmon and Snake Rivers.

On the main Salmon River, there are eight subsections with major tributary streams marking breaking points for each sub-section. According to Keating, anglers fishing near Riggins could be in either Salmon 2 or Salmon 3; while fishermen on the upper Salmon River could be in any one of a number of different areas. Use tributary names when applicable. Leaflets with map and restrictions will be given to each angler when purchasing the 1970 salmon or steelhead permit.

NEWS FROM LATAH CO AGENT

Preliminary studies by the department of agriculture show no significant contamination of the water table by farm fertilizers of cattle-feeding operations, according to a recent report. The studies were in Colorado. Research will continue to determine conditions under nitrogen fertilization and percolation from feedlots may become a pollution hazard. The irrigated part of the Colorado valley where the tests were made is intensively farmed and its feedlots handle more than 600,000 cattle at a time. Use of commercial fertilizer has increased five fold in the past decade but is not considered excessive in terms of crop needs. Investigators found that the kind of land use did not affect the nitrate concentration of water entering the bottom of holes where cores were taken. Despite the high concentration of nitrate under feedlots, scientists believe the contribution of these areas to ground water pollution is not great. Feedlots occupy a relatively small of the total area and some breakdown of nitrate probably occurs above the water table in most feedlots. Farmstead wells near feed lots are most likely to be polluted. However, the offensive odor of the water gives warning that nitrates may be present.

Home Cookin' . . .

With the holidays behind us, we'll soon be back in our old routine, of entertaining for family dinners, clubs and neighbors. This week, why not make a loaf of whole wheat bread. It will be a welcome change from all those sweets we've been over-indulging in the past few weeks. I need your recipes if our column is to continue.

WHOLE-WHEAT BREAD

Put in a mixing bowl:
 ½ cup lukewarm water
 1 package yeast
 Let stand five minutes. Stir. Put in a separate bowl:
 1 cup milk
 ½ cup boiling water
 ¼ cup sugar
 2 tsp. salt
 Mix well, cool to lukewarm and add to the yeast mixture.
 Stir in: 3 cups all-purpose flour
 Beat thoroughly. Add:
 2½ cups whole-wheat flour
 Stir with a heavy spoon or knead. When smooth, let rise until double in bulk (about 1 hour). Shape into 2 loaves. Place in greased tins and let rise again until double in size (about 1 hour). Bake about 50 minutes at 375d. Makes 2 loaves or 1 loaf and 1 dozen rolls.

1969 CENSUS OF AGRICULTURE

Farmers of Idaho, like those of the entire nation, are taking part this month in the 1969 census of agriculture. Census forms are in the mail. The Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce, asks that they be filled out and returned by February 15.

Training packets that help to answer questions about the forms have been received by county agricultural agents. The census bureau has requested such leaders to assist in obtaining a complete and accurate census. The bureau points out that a national census of all farms and ranches is the only means of obtaining an up-to-date and accurate inventory of our agricultural resources.




The information given by farmers is confidential. Individual data cannot be made available to anyone outside the bureau. For example, the reference manual says, neither the Internal Revenue Service, the FBI or the USDA can obtain information for an individual farm.

The statistics are used as bench marks for annual crop and livestock estimates. Manufacturers of machines, equipment and other products needed by farmers use the assembled census data as an aid in distributing their products. Wholesalers, retailers, service agencies, and others associated with agri-business rely on the data for future plans. In addition, the bureau says, when a farmer counts his cattle, keeps a record of yields, etc., he is taking a census of his farm. He is concerned that the results are accurate.

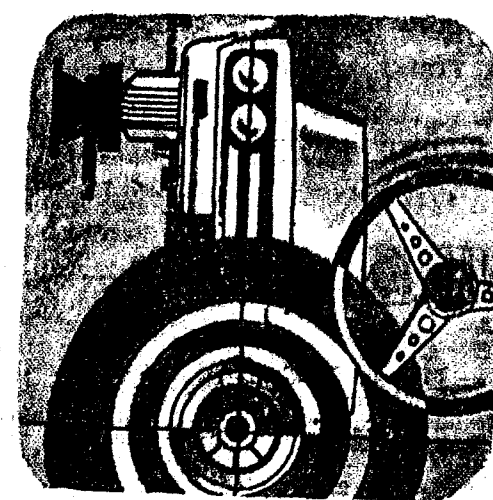
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
