## Mrs. Frank Hunt Passes In Lewiston

Mrs. Frank (Maxine) Hunt of Lewiston died at 6:50 Sunday night at St. Joseph's Hospital, Lewiston, where she had been a patient since Friday. Death was due to a heart attack, and she had been in the intensive care unit since the attack.

Mrs. Hunt was a graduate of Lewiston High School and was a registered nurse, having received her degree in nursing from St. Joseph's Hospital in 1938. She had continued her activity as a nurse since. She first took a position at Warner Hospital, Kellogg. She married Mr. Hunt at Kellogg, Aug. 30, 1940. In the early 1950's they lived for a short time at Oklahoma City, and later at Coeur d'Alene, then moved to Lewiston in 1955, when he was appointed police chief.

Mrs. Hunt was born at Turon, Kan., Nov. 14, 1915, to Mr. and Mrs. John E. Flesham. Her father farmed in the Leland area from around 1916. She attended school at Leland through most of her school years. She was active in St. Alban's Guild, and was a past president. She also was a member of the American Nurses Ass'n. and active in its affairs in the Lewiston region.

In addition to her husband she is survived by a son, Daniel L. Hunt, Las Vegas, a member of the United States Air Force, who has arrived in Lewiston; two sisters, Mrs. Andrew (Georgia) Dreps, Lewiston, and Mrs. Herman (Mildred) Johnson, Leland; and a brother, Woodrow W. Flesham of Concord, Calif.

The funeral will be at 10 a. m. Thursday at the Episcopal Church, with Rev. Fr. R. Scott Dills, pastor of the Lewiston church, and Rev. Fr. Gilbert Keithly, pastor of the Moscow Episcopal Church, as officiants.

Burial will be in the Cameron Cemetery under direction of the Brower-Wann Funeral Home. Committal Services will be at Cameron at 12:00 o'clock.

## Rain, Icy Roads Make Travel Dangerous

Rains, falling on the hard packed snow, turned many of the area roads into glass slick ribbons Monday night and made travel extremely hazardous Tuesday. Temperatures last week were on the cold side, with the mercury dipping down to the 10 and 15 above levels. Winds were very strong on the hills Wednesday and Thursday but the predicted snow storms failed to appear.

The weather warmed considerably Saturday and the area basked under a bright sun in almost spring-like conditions. Sunday was cooler but the sun shone most of the day, and the temperatures stayed above freezing.

Snow storms were predicted for Monday evening, but the storm arrived in the form of rain, and turned the snow pack into sheets of ice. A cold rain continued to fall much of Tuesday.

### Bulldogs Defeat Kamiah, NezPerce

Genesee scored its sixth and seventh basketball victories of the current season over the week-end as they defeated Kamiah 64-49 Friday night on the home court, and then traveled to NezPerce Saturday evening to roll over the NHS squad 73-45.

The Bulldogs moved over quickly Friday night and never trailed in the game, but the once beaten Kamiah Kubs stayed close until the final quarter before going down to a 64-49 defeat. Bruce Scharnhorst's jumper from the key gave Genesee a 2-0 lead and the Bulldogs' defense pressed hard, giving only 1 field goal in the first four minutes. Genesee led 19-10 at the end of the quarter. It was Genesee's domination of the backboards that was spelling the difference. Kamiah closed the gap to 22-20 once in the second period before the Bulldogs spurred ahead 33-26 at the half.

In the final half Genesee stayed ahead by six or seven points most of the time. Kamiah rallied briefly in the fourth period with less than three minutes left, but Genesee came back to stretch out the winning margin. Mike England dumped in 13 points; Fred Morscheck added 12 more, and Tim Magee dumped in 10 points.

After a close first half that saw them leading by only a 41-39 margin, the Genesee JV team pulled out with a big third quarter to win the game 58-47.

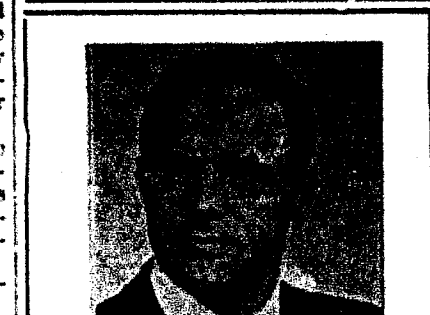

**Snow Survey**

Laverne "Andy" Anderson, publicity chairman for the Latah Soil and Water Conservation District, reported that the January 1 snow survey was completed by the Soil Conservation Service in cooperation with the Latah SWCD.

This year's snow pack is about the same as the average for the past 10 years. The East Twin and West Twin courses have about 12 inches of snow, with a water content of 2 and a half inches. Howard Creek and Cumerine courses, which are lower in elevation, also have about 12 "n. of snow with about 2 inches of water. Moscow Mountain, the highest course read, has 17 and a half inches of snow, with 5.4 inches of water.

The snow course at Sherwin, eight miles east of Bovill had 15.3 inches of snow.

The snow course will be measured each month through the first of April. Information obtained from the monthly snow surveys is analyzed and a water supply forecast is made.

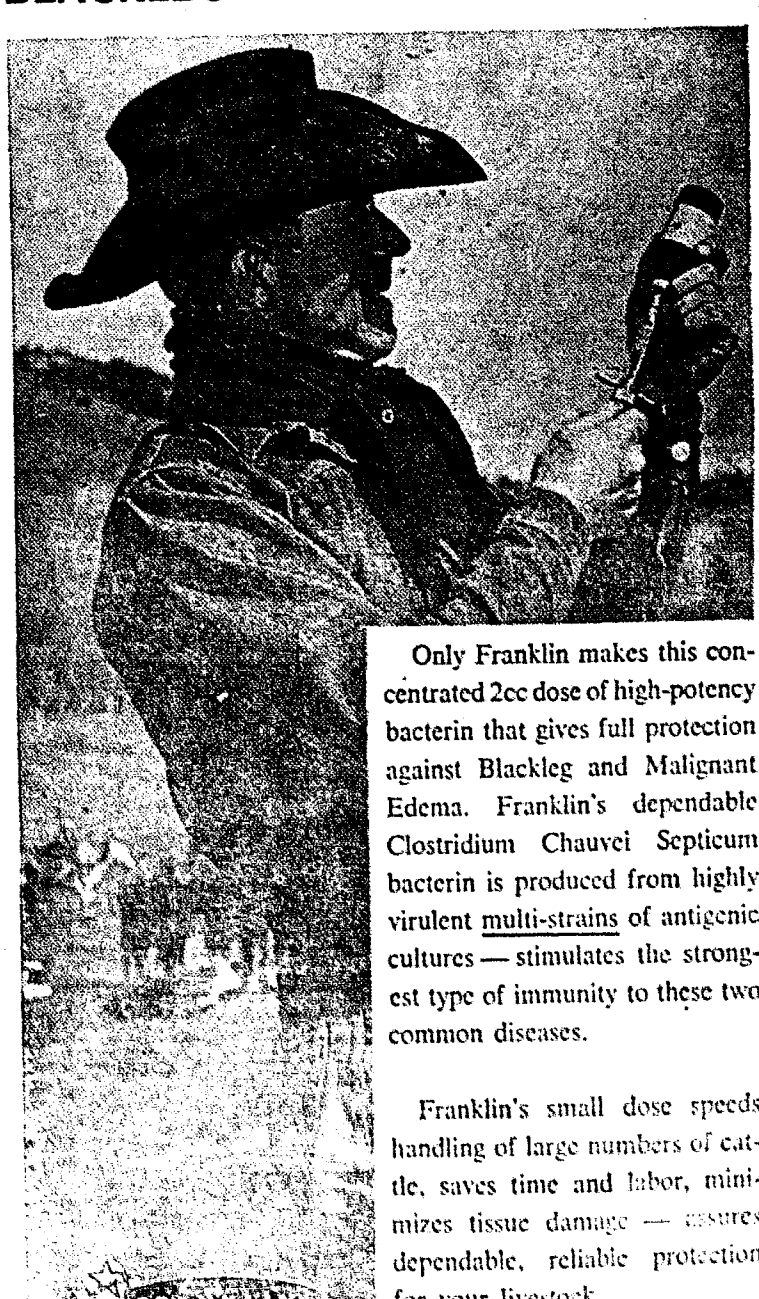

### Notes of An Ex-Soldier

"Don't let me catch you doing that," is a saying which is common in the army. This applies to everything a soldier does, from doing sloppy work to over sleeping in the morning. Much time is spent playing a game which simply involves seeing how much a man can get away with without getting caught. Now this may seem like a simple thing, because obviously everyone does it, much of the time. People drive a little faster than the speed limit, or overload a truck, or slide through a stop sign, or cheat a little at tax-time. They know they are doing it and they know that it is illegal and they know they may get caught. In this respect it is the same in the army. There is a difference, however, because in the army this game is played with a professional twist which is an accepted rule by all who want to stay in the army. When the professional soldier says, "Don't let me catch you doing that," he actually is saying, "I won't catch you if you don't catch me." This difference in the game is an unwritten rule which is accepted by all but a very few men who make the army a career. If it is remembered that a soldier is a man trained to obey the rule, to follow orders, this difference becomes very important because the army is, basically, a fantastic arsenal of destructive power. The game in the army can thus include destruction or even murder as well as cheating a little on taxes. If everyone plays by the basic rule of "I won't catch you if you won't catch me," then very few of the professionals get caught. The game can be further refined so that no one outside of the army knows what is going on. The recently publicized scandal involving career sergeants who stole thousands of dollars from enlisted mens clubs is a classic example of how the game is played within the army. There was evidence within the army that the racket existed. But nothing was done, as long as the army controlled the game. For the same reason, it is no accident that a civilian and not a soldier first publicly accused the army of covering up a possible massacre at My Lai. Another example of how the army

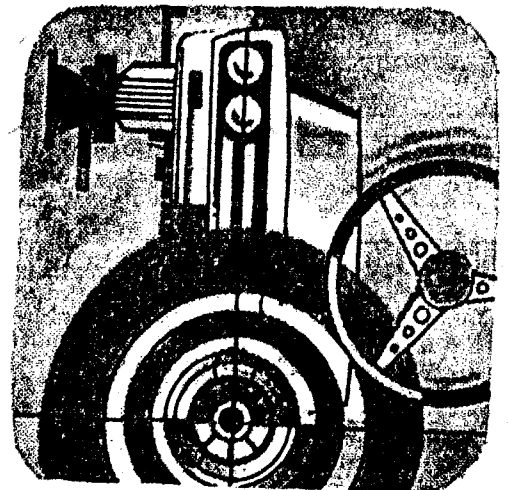
