Mrs. Minnie Koopp Passes In Lewiston

Mrs. Minnie Koopp, 84, widow of a pioneer Cameron farmer, died at the Orchards Nursing Home at Lewiston at 2:30 a. m., Sunday, January 18, of the infirmities of age.

Mrs. Koopp was born on Nov. 5, 1876, at Hanover, Germany, and at the age of 9 came with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Brammer, to Kansas, on March 17, 1884. Eight years later the family moved to Cameron. There she lived most of her life, with the exception of around 14 years, in the 1890's and early 1900's, which were spent at Kendrick and later at Juliaetta. She lived at Clarkston for a year before entering the Nursing Home in 1965.

She was married to Carl Wendt at Cameron on Jan. 5, 1899. He died April 21, 1904. Three years later she married Carl Koopp, a Cameron farmer on Jan. 30, 1907. He died Aug. 30, 1958.

She was a life-time member of the Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church.

Surviving are a son, Walter C. Koopp, Cameron; two brothers, Aug. Brammer of Cameron and Henry Brammer of Juliaetta; a daughter-in-law, Mrs. Henry Wendt, Kendrick and a son-in-law, Ernest Helmgartner of Leland. Eight grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren also survive. A son, Henry Wendt, and a daughter, Mrs. Bertha Helmgartner, preceded her in death.

The funeral was held on Wednesday, Jan. 21, at the Cameron Lutheran Church with the pastor, Rev. Theo Meske, officiating. Mrs. Oscar Slind, organist, accompanied Roy Ramey who sang "Beyond The Sunset" and "Precious Lord Take My Hand."

Bearers were Kenneth Wilken, Frank Harbert, Walter Koopp, Jr., Gerald Helmgartner, Ernest Helmgartner, Jr., and Harold Sillfow.

Burial was in Normal Hill Cemetery, Lewiston, with Malcolm's Brother-Vann Chapel in charge.

The family members of Mrs. Koopp were served luncheon at the home of Mrs. Henry Wendt by the Cameron A. L. C. W. following the burial service.

Local Student Wins Vo-Ed Scholarship

Coeur d'Alene — Two students in the Vocational Technical Education Department at North Idaho Junior College have been awarded \$160 scholarships by the Coeur d'Alene Auto Parts and the Post Fall Auto Parts companies.

Clarence E. Haight, director of the department, said Charles D. Deobald, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Deobald, Kendrick, received a scholarship to study auto mechanics, and James F. Davis, son of Mr. and Mrs. James W. Davis, Pinehurst, a scholarship in auto body and fender repair.

A. L. Odenthal of the Coeur d'Alene Auto Parts Co. said the scholarships have been given for many years to help vocational students studying auto mechanics and auto body repair.

The need for good tradesmen is tremendous, he said, and the two companies feel there are many young men with mechanical ability unable to further their education due to lack of funds. The scholarships have been established to help those students.

The recipients are selected on their ability, grades and the desire to work in the automotive industry.

A-3 Basketball Tournament Dates, Brackets Are Set

Following a meeting in Lapwai last Saturday night the dates and brackets for the 1970 Class A-3 basketball tournament have been set. It was announced this week by James V. Muscat, tournament manager.

The district tournament will be held in Lewiston at Booth Hall, Feb. 25, 26, 27, 28, and March 4, 5 and 6, and March 7, if needed. The two top teams from this district will advance into State Tournament play, which will also be held in Lewiston.

The A-3 teams in this district are Lapwai, St. Gertrudes of Cottonwood, Highland of Craigmont, Kamiah, Clearwater Valley of Kootenai, Genesee and Kendrick. This is the first year that Genesee and Kendrick will play in A-3 competition; having advanced from their previous A-4 rating of the past.

The teams will be seeded in the tournament by regular season win-loss records.

With seven teams competing, the bye on the first round will be given to Team One. Game 1 will be played Wednesday afternoon, February 25 at 3 p. m. and will match Team Three against Team Six. Games 2 and 3 will be played that same evening. Game 2, at 7 p. m. will match Team Two and Team Seven. Game 3 will be between teams Four and Five. Team One will meet the winner of Game 1 Thursday evening at 7:00 o'clock.

The tournament will then resolve into the usual double elimination route, with winners playing winners and losers losers.

Supt. Muscat said further information will be released as plans progress.

Legislative Report From Rep. Brocke

Boise, Jan. 16 — The second half of the 40th Legislature started to roll last Monday, with a State of the State address from the Governor.

There were no surprises in the Governor's message. He asked for supplemental appropriations of some \$4.25 million. He restated his stand on the White Clouds mining claim and also asked for additional State Police. He stated that a surplus of some \$15 million was occurring in the Highway Users Fund. How a surplus could occur in this fund is somewhat of a mystery as we have many highway projects that are being held up due to lack of funds.

(The State Highway Department now claims that there is no surplus of funds at this time.)

When the first session of the 40th Legislature was over, some 287 bills remained to be acted on. According to rules adopted by the first session, these bills would be carried over to this session. However, due to a ruling by the Attorney General, a constitutional question arose and in order to be on firm ground the second session of the Fortieth Legislature decided that all bills held over were dead bills and for any action on these bills, they would have to be introduced as a new bill for action in this session.

So far, 24 House Bills and 10 Senate Bills have been introduced this first week of the Legislature.

The cities are wanting more of the Highway Users Fund monies. This will be interesting to watch and will place the rural legislators against the urban legislators. It is my hope that this situation will not occur.

The Education Committee has met every day this week, taking no action on bills, only discussing the many problems that we have in the field of education. School superintendents of Latah County were in Boise this week for a superintendents' meeting.

Darrell Brocke, a newly elected director of the Idaho Cable Television Association was in Boise for a directors' meeting to assist in setting up plans for a state-wide convention to be held in Boise next month.

Heavy Rains Dissolve Snow

A total of 3.92 inches of precipitation had been recorded in the Genesee area in the past ten days, it was reported Tuesday afternoon by John Luedke, who maintained the rain gauge for the SCS. Since that time more rain has fallen and the total has undoubtedly exceeded the four-inch mark.

Heavy rains began falling over much of the area Sunday morning, and with the accompanying warmer temperatures reduced a six-inch fall of snow to a sea of slush and mud by Monday afternoon. The Potlatch River was running full Tuesday morning with roily, high water.

Snow had fallen on both the valley and higher elevations since Wednesday mid-day of last week, and temperatures were down in the mid and low twenties. Friday there was a heavy snow fall during the day, which dumped over two inches on the ground in Kendrick and Juliaetta and over three inches in Genesee. The snow continued to fall most of Saturday morning, decreasing during the day and then picking up again as darkness approached.

The snow continued to come down intermittently during the night and was still falling Sunday morning. At about 9:00 a. m. Sunday the temperature rose enough to turn the snow to rain and the rain fell the remainder of the day, that night and Monday. Travel on the secondary roads was very difficult Sunday and Monday, but had improved Tuesday.

A Message To Genesee Folks

GENESEE—A message to all the people in the Genesee area. In 1960 the Fire Department purchased a Chevrolet station wagon and had it converted into an ambulance to use in this area. Now in 1969 this was a real up-to-date ambulance and has certainly served the community well. Now ten years later, many new improvements have been installed in the new ambulances. For example, in our old ambulance, the spare tire is carried under the stretcher and oxygen tanks, therefore if we had a flat tire enroute we have to take the sick or injured out no matter what the weather—unhook the oxygen, even though you were giving it to the patient just to get at the spare tire.

There is no head room to care for the patient as the top is too low. There is no decent place to carry clean blankets or bandages, etc. which is most important in caring for wounds. All of our first aid material, such as bandaids, bandages, and medical supplies are in a small, dark compartment near the top where you have to feel for them.

These friends, are just a few of the things that have been improved in the newer model ambulances.

The Fire Department, realizing the need for a good ambulance, have started a fund known as the AMBULANCE MEMORIAL FUND in order to purchase a new ambulance to take better care of the sick and injured.

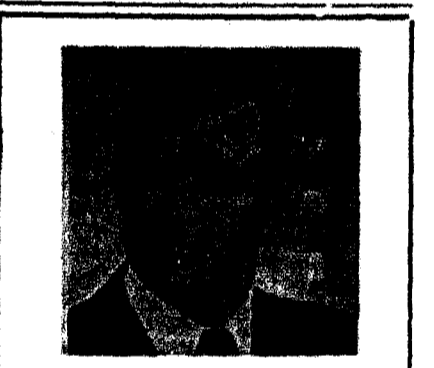

RABBIT SEASON GOES ON WHILE WATERFOWL STOPS

Cottontail and pygmy rabbit season runs through February 28, with bag and possession limit 8 bunnies in the aggregate, the Idaho Fish and Game Department reminded sportsmen today.

Goose season closed statewide on January 4, and the season for ducks, coots, and mergansers ended December 28 in all parts of the state except Idaho counties within the Columbia Basin Mallard Area, where it ends January 18. These counties in the special mallard area include Ada, Benewah, Blaine, Bonner, Boundary, Camas, Canyon, Cassia, Elmore, Gem, Gooding, Jerome, Kootenai, Latah,

Lewis, Lincoln, Minidoka, Nez Perce, Owyhee, Payette, Twin Falls, Shoshone and Washington.

All upland game bird hunting in the state is ended except chukar and Hungarian partridge and quail season in parts of the Snake and Salmon River drainages. Hunting for these species will be open through January 25 in the Snake River drainage from Brownlee Dam downstream to but excluding Tammy Creek drainage and in the Salmon River drainage in the counties of Adams, Custer, Idaho, Lemhi, Lewis, Nez Perce and Valley.

A Message To Genesee Folks

GENESEE—A message to all the people in the Genesee area. In 1960 the Fire Department purchased a Chevrolet station wagon and had it converted into an ambulance to use in this area. Now in 1970 this was a real up-to-date ambulance and has certainly served the community well. Now ten years later, many new improvements have been installed in the new ambulance. For example, in our old ambulance, the spare tire is carried under the stretcher and oxygen tanks, therefore if we had a flat tire enroute we have to take the sick or injured out no matter what the weather—unhook the oxygen, even though you were giving it to the patient just to get at the spare tire.

There is no head room to care for the patient as the top is too low. There is no decent place to carry clean blankets or bandages, etc. which is most important in caring for wounds. All of our first aid material, such as bandaids, bandages, and medical supplies are in a small, dark compartment near the top where you have to feel for them.

These friends, are just a few of the things that have been improved in the newer model ambulances.

The Fire Department, realizing the need for a good ambulance, have started a fund known as the AMBULANCE MEMORIAL FUND in order to purchase a new ambulance to take better care of the sick and injured.

RABBIT SEASON GOES ON WHILE WATERFOWL STOPS

Cottontail and pygmy rabbit season runs through February 28, with bag and possession limit 8 bunnies in the aggregate, the Idaho Fish and Game Department reminded sportsmen today.

Goose season closed statewide on January 4, and the season for ducks, coots, and mergansers ended December 28 in all parts of the state except Idaho counties within the Columbia Basin Mallard Area, where it ends January 18. These counties in the special mallard area include Ada, Benewah, Blaine, Bonner, Boundary, Camas, Canyon, Cassia, Elmore, Gem, Gooding, Jerome, Kootenai, Latah,

Lewis, Lincoln, Minidoka, Nez Perce, Owyhee, Payette, Twin Falls, Shoshone and Washington.

All upland game bird hunting in the state is ended except chukar and Hungarian partridge and quail season in parts of the Snake and Salmon River drainages. Hunting for these species will be open through January 25 in the Snake River drainage from Brownlee Dam downstream to but excluding Tammy Creek drainage and in the Salmon River drainage in the counties of Adams, Custer, Idaho, Lemhi, Lewis, Nez Perce and Valley.

PARTY CRAB SALAD
 2-3 ounce pkg. lemon gelatin
 2 cups boiling water
 1 8-oz. pkg. cream cheese
 1/2 cup milk
 1 cup heavy cream, whipped
 1 cup minced celery
 1 cup cutup stuffed olives
 Crab sauce
 Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Chill until slightly thickened. Whip with rotary beater till fluffy. Soften cream cheese gradually, add milk, stir til smooth. Add along with whipped cream to gelatin. Fold in celery and olives. Turn into 1 3/4 quart mold or pan. Chill until set. Unmold on salad greens. Serve with crab sauce.

 Blend together 1/2 cups mayonnaise 1/2 cup chili sauce and 3 tablespoon pickle relish.

New Jobs Seem Scarce Says Moscow Report

Moscow — Four Latah county workers were assisted in finding gainful employment through the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment during the past week. Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager reported that this is a far cry from the 32 persons who were sent out on jobs during the corresponding week a year ago. However, Hartstein explained, a year ago we were still digging our way out of one of the worst snow falls in a long while, and man-power for this activity was at a premium.

All of the four persons placed on jobs were given permanent employment this past week, he said. At the end of the week there were still 19 jobs open in the area. A young man is still needed to learn the dry cleaning business, an insurance salesman is needed, and fallers and cedar makers could be used in the area's forests. Good, fast and accurate typists could find work here, as well as cafe and domestic workers, Hartstein said.

Although 37 workers filed new claims for unemployment insurance during the past week, the total number of jobless pay recipients rose by only two from the previous week. Among those workers who closed their claims were several who returned to work in the woods during the past couple of weeks. A few who exhausted their claims, and some who were declared ineligible for various reasons. A year ago there were 268 persons filing claims for benefits, compared with the current total of 237.

In the immediate Moscow area the total now is 114. Last week it was 108 and last year 118. At Genesee it is now 8, 8 last week and 15 last year. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area there are now 54 active claims, last week there were 62 and last year 72. Fourteen claims are being filed from the Kendrick area, compared with 16 last week and 16 last year. At Potlatch the current total is 38, last week 33 and last year 39. There are 9 checks going into Elk River, compared with 8 last week and 8 last year.

Hartstein again indicated that his office expected a continuous and gradual rise in the number of persons seeking unemployment insurance during the next few weeks.

NEW PERMITS STEELHEADERS NEED

All steelhead anglers must have the new \$1.00 permit in their possession when going after the big sea-going rainbows. The same goes for salmon anglers, but there won't be any salmon fishing until the runs hit Idaho late in the spring. To qualify for the purchase of the new steelhead permit, a resident must have a current, valid fishing license or combination hunting and fishing license at \$15.00 or the nonresident combination hunting and fishing license at \$100.00. The tourist fishing licenses do not permit the purchase of either the \$1.00 steelhead or salmon permit. These regulations were established by the Idaho legislature in its 1969 session.

Steelheading is going on currently in the lower Salmon and Clearwater rivers and usually picks up considerably the latter part of March or early April.
