Cecille Freytag, 62, Passes At Moscow Tuesday, February 3rd

Cecille Irene Freytag, 62, wife of Ernest Freytag, died at Gritman Memorial Hospital, Moscow, on Tuesday, Feb. 3rd, following many months of illness. She had been a patient at the hospital for one day, though she had been hospitalized or several weeks during her final illness.

Cecille Freytag was born Aug. 8, 1907 in Douglas County, Wn., and grew to womanhood at Mt. Vernon, Wn. She received her education in schools there. She was a member of the First Christian Church, and was also a member of the Eagles Auxiliary at Wallace, Idaho.

On Feb. 22, 1930, Cecille Irene Hazelton was married to Ernest Freytag at Butte, Mont. He survives her at the family home.

Mr. and Mrs. Freytag moved from Butte to Oroville, Wn., in 1934, and two years later moved to Mullan, Idaho, and later to Wallace, Idaho, where he was in mining until 1949, when they moved to the farm home- stead of his late father, Wm. Freytag, near Kendrick, farming there since.

Besides her husband she is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Willis (Ellen) Hull of Seattle; Mrs. Clark (June) Cole of Vancouver, Wn., and Mrs. Leola Burger of Seattle, and a brother, Dr. Lloyd Hazelton of Falls Church, Va. Also surviving are many nieces, nephews, and a host of close friends.

Funeral services were held on Friday at 10:00 a. m. at the Kendrick United Methodist Church, with Rev. Marvin Maddux, pastor, officiating. Mrs. Herman Schupfer was organist and accompanied Mrs. Burton (Ann) Souders and Mrs. Jack (Donna) Lohman who sang "Good Night and Good Morning" and "In the Garden."

Drop Year Rainfall Totals 12.77 Inches

Crop year rainfall in the Genesee area totals 12.77 as of the end of January, it was reported this week by John Luedke, who maintains rainfall records for the Soil Conservation Service. Over half of this total was received in January when 6.43 inches of moisture was received. Crop year rainfall is computed from September 1 of each year to August 31 of the following year, and is used to determine the amount of moisture available for that certain growing season and crop.

A month-by-month breakdown of the figures reveals that 1.48 inches for September; 1.55 inches for October; only .52 inches for November; 2.79 for December, and then the deluge of 6.43 inches in January.

Little moisture has been received the past seven days, as the nights have turned clear and cold with below freezing temperatures on several occasions. Fog hung heavy in the Genesee area and across the ridges and higher elevations in the Juliaetta-Kendrick area early this week.

The lack of moisture the past week, coupled with cooler weather in the higher elevations has served to lower the level and clear the Potlatch River, which was running high and muddy for several weeks.

Manning Onstott, Soil Conservation officer from Kendrick said Monday morning that there had been some erosion noted in the area in the wake of the wet January weather. He said that washing was especially noticeable on land that was clean cultivated and worked smooth last fall. He added that on stubble land that had been turned over last fall and not worked smooth, there was little if any erosion.

The day-time temperatures over the week-end and the first two days of this week have been excellent, with blue skies and warm, almost spring-like sunshine.

Will Residents Meet With City Council

Tuesday evening of last week a group of residents from the "School House Hill" met with the City Council to discuss control of run-off water from the hill. Walter Brocke, a Main Street property owner, whose home was recently badly damaged by a slide off the hill, was also present.

There was considerable discussion of drainage problems, sewers, curbs, ditches, etc., all in connection with the recent water damage, and future run-off problems.

The councilmen agreed that something should be done about the problem, and a committee consisting of John Deobald and Wayne Harris was appointed, to meet with Bill McCreary and go over the location of drainage ditches, culverts, etc., and report back to the next meeting of the council.

The City Council also agreed to look into the location and cost, and cost of installation of tile drainage to give Mr. and Mrs. Walter Brocke some relief from the water and slide problems facing their property, and that of the Kendrick United Methodist Church, which adjoins the Brocke home.

District A-3 Basketball Tournament Plans Underway For Lewiston Contests

Under the direction of James V. Muscat, tournament manager, seven district high schools in the Class A-3 division are preparing to enter the 1970 district basketball tournament, which is to be held in Lewiston's Booth Hall beginning February 25.

Competing for a berth in the State Tournament, which will also be held in Lewiston this year, will be Kamiah, Highland of Craigmont, Clearwater Valley of Kooskia, St. Gertrude's of Cottonwood, Kendrick, Lapwai and Genesee. This will be the first year in A-3 competition for the Kendrick and Genesee teams who have just moved up from A-4

status. Genesee was the 1969 State Runner-up.

The tournament's first game will be played Wednesday afternoon, Feb. 25 at 3:00 p. m. (This is the only afternoon session scheduled) and will match the number three ranked team and the number six ranked team. Teams two and seven will play at 7:00 that evening, and teams four and five at 9:00 p. m.

The final standings in conference play will determine the school's number in the tournament. Thus, the team with the best win-loss record in regular season play will be team number one, etc. The number one team draws the first round by this year, and will play the 7:00 p. m. game on Thursday evening.

Unless Coach Ozzie Kanikkeberg and his Genesee Bulldogs fall apart between now and tourney time, they will enter the matches seeded number one. Genesee has only one defeat in conference play this season, that an early loss to St. Gertrude's, which was later avenged. Highland High of Craigmont will also be bringing an excellent record into the tournament, with St. Gertrude's and Kamiah also strong contenders.

Evenings when two games are to be played the first game will begin at 7 p. m. and the second game immediately following at about 9:00 p. m. On single game nights (March 4, 5 and 6) the game will begin at 8:00 p. m.

Prices for admission will be \$1.50 for adults; \$1.00 for high school students with activity cards; \$1.50 for high school students without activity cards, and 50c for grade school students up to the sixth grade.

There will be a First Place and Runner-up trophies, and the third place team will receive the game ball.

The gym will be open each evening at 6:00 p. m., and the concessions will be sold by the Lewiston High School with the tournament receiving fifty percent of the profits after expenses.

SCHOOL HOLIDAYS AND THE CALENDAR

The following information should answer the questions we have been receiving.

Idaho Code 33-512, Paragraph 9, reads as follows, under the government of schools. The powers and duties of local boards of trustees are:

To determine school holidays. Any listing of school holidays shall include not less than the following: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas Day. Other days listed in Section 73-108, or amendments thereto, if the same shall fall on a school day shall be observed with appropriate ceremonies; and any days the State Board of Education may designate following the proclamation by the Governor shall be a school holiday.

The State Board of Education, by resolution, has stated that schools shall be in session 180 days. Holidays are not part of the 180 days designated by the State Board of Education.

House Bill No. 14, which became effective January 1, 1971, enumerates the holidays as part of Section 73-108. This bill, in essence, designated Mondays as holidays regardless of the day on which certain holidays fall. The following changes were made by House Bill No. 14:

(1) The third Monday of February was designated as Washington's Birthday;

(2) The last Monday in May as Decoration (Memorial) Day;

(3) The second Monday in October as Columbus Day;

(4) The fourth Monday in October as Veterans' Day;

(5) The first Monday in September as Labor Day. (No change, but still a legal holiday). — James V. Muscat, Supt. of Schools.

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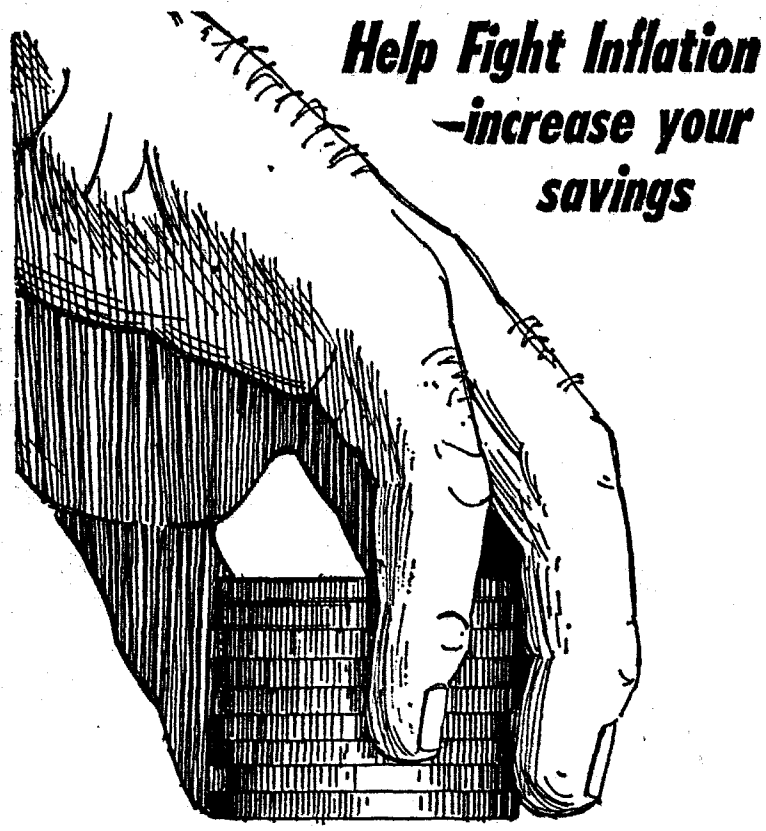

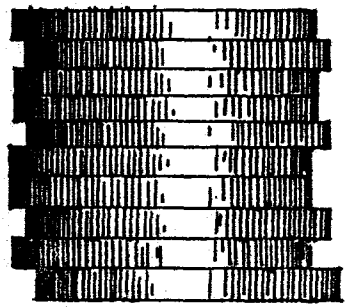

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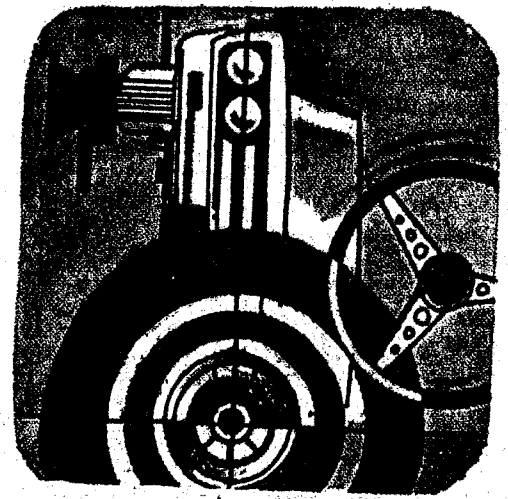
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
