Genesee residents are reminded that Genesee has a year-round leash law which prohibits dogs from running at large within the city at any time.

## Juliaetta Pioneer Dies At Tacoma Monday

Word was received at Juliaetta Monday morning of the death of Godfrey "Ott" Ottosen of Tacoma, following a heart attack at his home. He had experienced several minor attacks during the past two years.

Mr. Ottosen was born July 1, 1899 in Benson, Minnesota, a son of Louis and Mary Ottosen. The family moved west when he was two years old, and to Juliaetta in 1909, where he grew to manhood.

He married Hazel Irwin, May 9, 1920. They moved to Tacoma, where their son Louis was born. They were later divorced and he married Jeanne Quist of Yakima in 1945. They owned and operated the "J. & O. Motel of Life," a suburb of Tacoma. He was a Fire Councillman and member of the City Planning Commission at the time of his death. He was affiliated with the Masonic, Scottish Rite and Shrine organizations.

Survivors are his widow, Jeanne; two sons, Louis of Lewiston, Idaho; George, Sp5 with the U. S. Army in Viet Nam; a daughter, Mrs. Arnie (Mariene) Blankers, Emporia, Virginia; three grandchildren, Georgia, Lee and Chris Blanker, Emporia; his mother, Mrs. Mary Ottosen, and a sister, Mrs. Cecil (Crystal) Gruell, all of Juliaetta, and another sister, Mrs. Lillian Lowry, Tacoma.

A Masonic funeral will be held at Tuell's Mortuary, Tacoma, with cremation to follow. Interment of the ashes will be at the Juliaetta Cemetery. Time of the funeral will depend upon the arrival of the son from Vietnam.

## Kendrick Grange Hears Legislative Report

Kendrick Grange No. 413 met in regular session at the Fraternal Temple, March 17th at 8:00 o'clock with 28 members and four visitors present.

Guests were Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Parks and Mr. and Mrs. Ray Davis of Lewiston, who are members of the Lapwai Valley Grange.

Hugh Parks, State Grange Legislative representative had just returned from Boise, and reported on accomplishments there as follows:

Bill 404 was passed, whereas the division of community property would not have to go through Probate Court.

Property Tax Bill — Property Tax increase would not exceed 4 percent, the same as it has been.

Bill on shipments of bulk potatoes out of the state was passed. This bill requires that refrigerated cars be used for transporting bulk potatoes, since occasionally there is a delay in reaching the destination, thus cutting the risk of spoilage.

The Weed Control Bill under the direction of the Commissioner of Agriculture was passed. This states there will be a state levy on weed control to help take care of weeds on state lands by the Bureau of Land Management.

Bill 672 in which there was a discussion of 2 1/2 percent excise tax to be enforced on any motor driven vehicle was tabled.

Ray Davis, who is also Past Master of the Nezperce County Pomona Grange spoke on the existing controversy on Slack Water from the Lower Granite Dam on the Snake River to Lewiston. The Grange Resolution committee was appointed to further study the problem and present a resolution at the next Grange meeting on April 7th, in preparation for the Grange taking action either for or against this situation.

The Grange voted to donate \$5.00 to the local Red Cross fund. It was announced that the Boy Scouts will be canvassing Kendrick and Juliaetta for the Red Cross.

The Grange Bread and Cake Baking contests were held by the chairman of Women's Activities. In the cake contest Mrs. Wilbur Corkill won first and Mrs. Roy Glenn was second. Winners in the Bread contest were Mrs. Roy Glenn, first, and Mrs. Lawrence Heimgartner, second.

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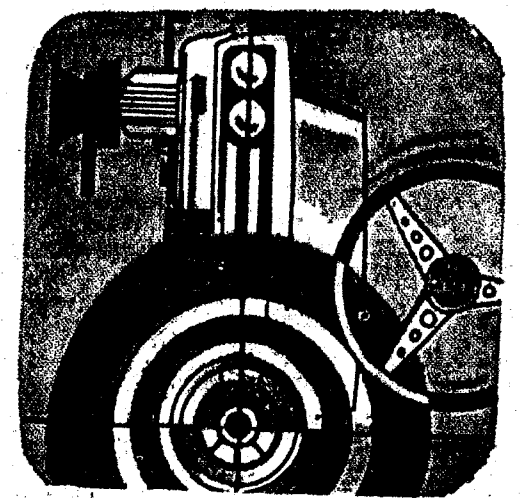

**Trend Counts Show Stable Deer Herds**

Helicopter trend counts, made last month in some of the controversial big game management units of the Salmon and Eastern regions, indicate that mule deer populations are stable and that heavy hunting pressure on two-deer units the last few years is merely cropping the annual production increase.

Concerned sportsmen, including those who had claimed that deer herds were being decimated, participated with personnel of the Idaho Fish and Game Department in the trend counts.

The East Fork of the Salmon River southwest of Challis, one of the areas mentioned most during recent attacks on game management policy showed no signs of a decline in herd numbers as the result of heavy hunting pressure.

A game management unit which figured in the controversy was 36-B, the "Challis unit." A recent helicopter trend count for the unit was 3,115 deer. It is noteworthy that boundary changes occurred in 1968, when additional area was taken from unit 36 and added to 36-B. However, comparative figures for these same areas shows 2,836 deer were counted this year, and 999 in 1966. Some 1,129 of those deer counted were in that portion of the unit in which the extra deer tag was used.

A trend count is not a complete census of all game animals in the area. A complete head count would be impossible to get. A trend count is made by recording all animals seen on a fixed route, covering the entire winter range of the unit, or a portion of it, then comparing the number with other counts made in the past under similar conditions. Trends are then established which indicate population trends are either increasing, decreasing or relatively stable.

In the Pahsimeroi and East Fork of the Salmon River, which are both two-deer units, harvests appear to have leveled the herd size and produced a stable deer population. In unit 37-A, on the north side of the Pahsimeroi River, the trend count this year is 923 deer, compared with 1,079 in 1969, 1,004 in 1968 and 895 in 1967. In some of the more accessible areas of this unit adequate harvests have been realized.

One of the main purposes of additional harvests of deer from this unit was the competition for winter forage between the deer and mountain goats which inhabit the area. In the past two years there has been an increase in mountain goat population in this unit. Increased deer harvests could well have been a factor in bringing about this increase.

Data for the last five years on the East Fork of the Salmon River trend counts show the following: 1966-'67; 1967-1,702; 1968-2,480; 1969-2,044. The 1970 trend count for the area is 2,243 deer, while the five-year average for this area is 2,087. All or parts of these units are mul-

multiple-deer units. By maintaining adequate harvests in them, some relief to winter ranges is provided, most of which have been abused by excessive wintering game populations in past years. These harvests have resulted in both increased production of available winter forage as well as increased productivity of the deer herd.

Comparative trend counts for the eastern region show unit 76 (east of Soda Springs) with 5,695 deer this year, 6,125 in 1967; unit 75 (eight mile south of Soda Springs) 2,849 in 1970 and 1,429 in 1966; Unit 78 (Bear Lake) 1,925 in 1970, 735 in 1965.

Extra deer takes and extended seasons have been used for several years. Other trend counts showed management unit 73-A (Rockland) 4,081 in 1970 and 3,091 in 1966.

The trend counts conducted in these units do not indicate any significant decrease in deer populations, despite the additional harvest emphasis that has been placed on them for several years.

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

**Cash Markets For U. S. Wheat May Increase**

BOISE—Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin feels there is a chance that cash markets for U. S. wheat in foreign countries will expand in the future, it was revealed today by Harold West, administrator of the Idaho Wheat Commission. Speaking at a regular monthly meeting of the Wheat Commission, West evaluated results of a private meeting he and several other members of the Idaho Wheat industry had with Secretary Hardin in Washington, D.C., last Friday. Hardin's optimistic view of the future for wheat exports is a result of more favorable attention by the Commerce and State Departments, West said.

Hardin told the Idaho men that provisions of a Farm Bill now in the House Committee on Agriculture are far from final.

The Secretary predicted extensive debate on the bill would be initiated by urban Congressmen when it reaches the House floor.

West said the growers debated with Hardin on the matter of a Department of Agriculture recommendation that wheat loan rates be reduced. The Agriculture Secretary asserted that such a move would stimulate more movement and tend to raise prices over the long run. Growers maintain that surpluses in other producing countries amount to too much for world markets to absorb. Prices would be reduced as a result.

West said the Idaho group, headed by Congressman Orval Hansen and Jim McClure, was the only faction receiving a private audience with Secretary Hardin during a national wheat growers visitation to the national capital last week. The meeting was arranged by Senator Len Jordan.



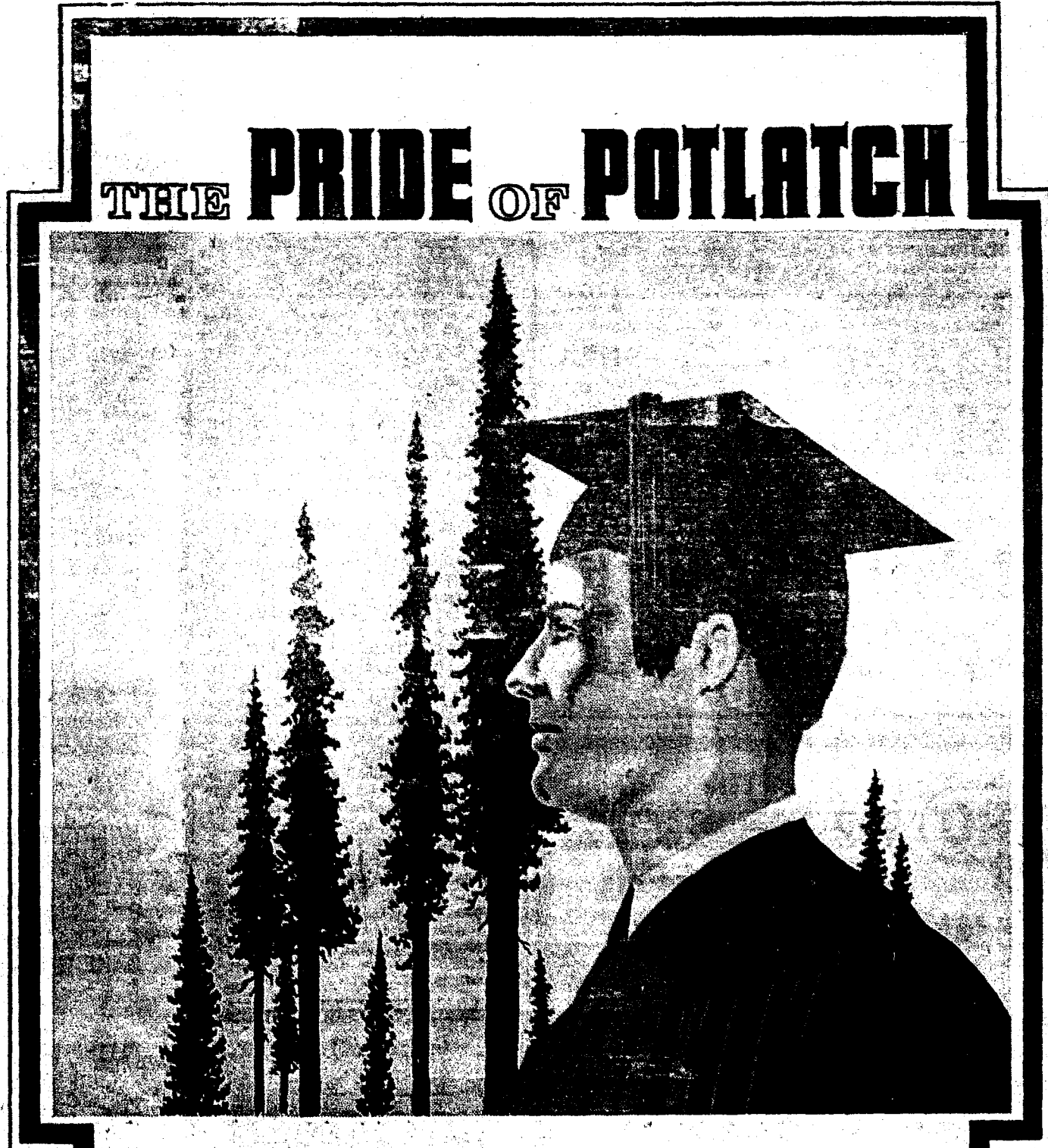

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**Some Heart Murmurs Are Innocent—Some Not**

The mother who is told that her child has a heart murmur, but that it is "innocent," or harmless, still may be likely to fret, human nature being what it is. To help dispel her fears and to help the doctor explain what he means by "no cause for alarm," the Idaho Heart Association has made available the leaflet, "Innocent Heart Murmurs in Children."

A child with such a murmur does not have heart disease, the leaflet emphasizes. The likelihood of developing it is not any greater in such a child than in any other normal youngster. Nor is the innocent murmur any reason to place any special limit on physical activity.

What, then, does innocent heart murmur mean? When the doctor says a child has an innocent murmur, sometimes described as a "functional" murmur, he is referring to a condition which is not uncommon in childhood. It occurs between the ages of three and seven, and generally disappears in adolescence.

Murmurs are sounds produced by the circulation of the blood through the valves and chambers of the heart. Sometimes heart murmurs are difficult to diagnose. A specialist may therefore find it necessary to re-examine a child from time to time. This however, still does not necessarily mean that a child has a heart condition. The murmur usually is innocent. But not all murmurs are innocent. Some, which the doctor can recognize, are organic, which means that a disease or defect of the heart is present. In such a case treatment should be started promptly, if the physician so advises. If caught in time, the condition can be improved, arrested, or corrected if quick action is taken.

Every child with an organic murmur needs the supervision and care of a physician. But an innocent murmur is not a cause to worry about. For information on heart murmurs, contact your Heart Association, 540 Vista Ave., Boise, Idaho.

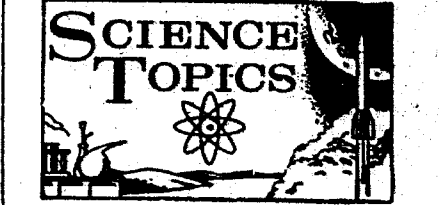

**EARTH PLANTS** grow exceedingly well in moon soil, moon researchers have found. Does this indicate that there are tiny germs or viruses hidden deep in the moon soil that could conceivably escape and contaminate the earth—or is there another, equally logical, explanation? Thus far, no one has found physical evidence of hidden germs, even though the moon soil has been examined down to the molecular level. On the other hand, two researchers at the University of Minnesota have theorized that the "unexplained biological effect" of moon soil on earth plants is caused by chemicals, since chemical fertilizers also make plants grow.

A **TINY UMBRELLA-LIKE DEVICE** inserted into a large body vein is protecting patients against pulmonary emboli—life-endangering clots that lodge in the blood vessels of the lungs. This is a common problem among bedridden hospital patients, taking as many as 50,000 lives a year. The device, developed at the University of Miami School of Medicine, has holes in it to let blood ooze through, but the holes are small enough to block any traveling clot (embolus) and keep it from getting to the lungs.

**THE 'BLUES'** will be produced in Canada for the first time soon at Port Hope, Ont. However, they aren't the musical blues. These are pigments called phthalocyanine blue. While their name may be a strange mouthful, they actually are quite popular, says their manufacturer Chemetron. They are used in automotive paints, vinyl upholstery and tops, household and industrial paints and plastics and are one of the four basic process colors for printing.

**THE EFFECTS OF LSD** and other "hippie generation" drugs are contributing to mounting evidence that schizophrenia is basically caused by chemical imbalances in the bodies of its victims, says a biochemist at Cornell University. "This offers the prospect," he said, "that with the aid of biochemistry we may one day increase man's control of his emotions, his aggression and thereby of his own destiny."

**GET RID OF PAPER REFUSE** by turning it into alcohol, one scientist suggests. Up to 75 per cent of the junk we generate is paper, he notes, and converting it is a relatively simple two-stage process—transform the cellulose to sugar, then ferment it into alcohol.

**Natural Fish Kill**  
Mormon Reservoir, south of Fairfield, had a large natural fish kill last month. Ice fishermen reported large numbers of perch and suckers were dead and dying. Dissolved oxygen samples of water taken near the southwest end of the reservoir registered less than 1/2 part per million, which is insufficient oxygen to support fish life. While it is too much to hope for a complete natural fish eradication, enough perch and suckers could have died to reduce competition for food and living space, and trout will have a better chance to flourish.

Idaho history during the next decade will repeat parts of its early territorial days of the 1860's and 1870's. Thousands of people will come here in waves from both seacoasts and points between. A century and more ago, rich strikes of gold and silver stamped them—experienced "old timers" from "petered" out placer and quartz lodes in California and Nevada, and raw "tenderfeet" from the East. Many of them settled and helped build a new state. Today, Idaho's population has grown to an estimated 710,000 residents. Some leaders think this is the comfortable carrying capacity of the state without retreating from present standards of excellence.

The cry already is heard to "keep out the nonresidents", especially the hunters and fishermen. It does not take the wisdom of Solomon, or even a crystal ball, to forecast that restrictions are bound to come as hunting and fishing grounds become congested. In California and other states of high density populations, hunting and fishing opportunities in some places are on a "first come, first served" basis, and a gate is locked when the quota is reached. Necessity requires that residents, as well as nonresidents, be excluded when capacity has been reached.

The U. S. Department of Commerce puts out projection figures of anticipated state, national and world population gains. For example, such projections show Idaho with something like 735,000 residents in five years, and more than 800,000 by 1980. Current population figures show about 204 million people in the United States, and more than 3 1/2 billion inhabitants on earth. These figures are expected to double in 35 years or less.

In spite of swift encroachment on good fish and game habitat and geometric increases in numbers of fishermen and hunters in the 1970's, the outlook should still be bright in Idaho. As always, there will be some lean times, but there are good days and years ahead in this state for hunters and fishermen willing to put out a little more effort to get away from the competition.

For example hunting in any decade depends on two things—abundance of game and abundance of opportunity. The same can be said for fishing. In Idaho, and with continued good management, there is no doubt about the abundance of fish and wildlife resources. Projecting what is known about wildlife conservation, and present social and land-use trends, the outlook in Idaho for the next ten years still is favorable.

During the 1970's, a growing part of forest management on both public and private lands will be outdoor recreation of all kinds, and hunting and fishing will have a big piece of the action. Elk and deer, both mule deer and whitetail, should hold up well in Idaho and continue to be the mainstay of hunting.

Good game management practices

can be expected to keep other species of big game animals in a healthy state. A good example is the pronghorn antelope, once a rare and endangered species, now quite common over a large range in southern Idaho and some of the other states of the Intermountain west.

Modern farming takes its toll on some species of upland game birds. Habitat changes and the use of herbicides and pesticides have revolutionized the industry within living memory. On the other hand, the introduction of exotic species like the chukar partridge from the Middle East and the Merriam's wild turkey from the mountains of Colorado have proved very successful—especially the chukar. The chukar occupies land which no native game bird uses. It is so well adapted to this arid, rocky country that biologists claim it would be difficult to over-harvest.

American technology is producing more food on less land, and agricultural experts are recommending that marginal farmlands be shifted to other uses. Best of all, farm economists say that land retirement should be on a long-term basis rather than year-to-year. This would have a huge effect on all farm game—rabbits, quail, partridge and pheasants—and give long-range game management programs a chance to pay dividends.

The 1960's was a decade of strong ups and downs for waterfowl, but generally ended on a high note. This renewable wildlife resource will continue to fluctuate in the 1970's, but harvestable surpluses of ducks and geese will be around for many years to come. There is growing support for wetland conservation and the multimillion dollar federal wetlands program, and other efforts should begin to tell. The rising tide of citizen interest is having increased effect. Ducks Unlimited, for example, collected over \$2 million for wetlands in Canada.

Dove populations are good and fit in with suburban patterns of land use. There should be enough birds in the foreseeable future to meet the demands of increased numbers of hunters.

Indeed there should be plenty of game and fish during the 1970's, but chances to shoot and angle will depend on the sportsman. He should be prepared to hunt some game species less and other species more. He should be adaptable and willing to change his habits as changes demand.

Housing developments are starting to encroach upon wildlife habitat, and such infringement is beginning to affect fish and game populations in Idaho. In several places, wintering elk and deer have suffered severe encroachment. In rough winters, these animals must be trapped and relocated or they die. Both summer homes and year-round residences are crowding winter ranges. In the future, more use of lands presently supporting wildlife can be expected by man in his need to support and maintain his own existence.

**Better Weather Conditions Increase Job Opportunities**

Better weather conditions toward the end of the week opened up a few more job prospects in the Moscow, Idaho area. Frank J. Hartstein, Manager of the Moscow Office of the Idaho Department of Employment reported that his office received calls for a total of 22 workers during the week. This compares with orders for only 10 workers during the previous week, and 11 during the same week a year ago. During the week, 8 workers were placed on jobs, and at the end of the week 37 employment opportunities remained unfilled. Currently there are job opportunities for experienced farm equipment operators, a service station attendant and a dairy man. Other jobs are available for waitresses, secretaries, alterations woman, housekeepers, day workers, kitchen helpers, cooks, nurse aides, typists, and car hops.

Forty-nine workers filled new claims for unemployment insurance during the week. Nearly all of these were persons laid off when woods operations were curtailed during the end of the previous week. Many of them had been laid off in February, returned to work for a couple of weeks, and are now laid off due to the spring break-up. Most of them will return to work about the first part of May. The total number of persons continuing claims for jobless pay now totals 376, up from last week's 344, and considerably higher than the 253 reported for the same week in 1969.

**Walking Catfish Banned**

The aggressively predaceous walking catfish, an exotic species native to Asia and Africa, is banned. Under federal regulations the importation, transportation and acquisition of any live fish or viable eggs of the walking catfish family (Clariidae) is illegal, effective January 1, 1970. Walking catfish have been introduced to Florida and several other southeastern states. It is difficult to eradicate this species. Specimens readily escape from captivity. All persons who already have these fish in aquaria are urged to destroy them. Under no circumstances should they be released into streams or reservoirs.

be more closely regulated by management units and zones and more restrictive seasons and bag limits. More species of predator may be classed as game animals.

There will be a public demand for high ethical standards of hunters during the 1970's. If hunters cannot keep their house in order, lawmakers may try to do it for him. The greatest threat to hunting and fishing sports in this decade will not be a lack of game, but vandals, litterbugs and roadhunters who are so offensive to everybody, but especially landholders and ethical sportsmen.

**Bird Hunters Travel**

All but five states of the United States, the District of Columbia and four foreign countries were represented last year in Idaho by some 6,650 nonresidents who bought licenses to hunt game birds in Idaho. Utah residents bought the most nonresident bird licenses, a total of 2,579. Other states with large numbers of bird hunters in Idaho were California 1,644; Nevada 602; Washington 477; and Oregon 258. Foreign countries represented were Austria 2, Saudi Arabia 2, Bahama 1 and Canada 20.
