Dewey R. Wardrobe Passes Saturday, April 11

GENESEE—Dewey R. Wardrobe, a resident of Geneese, Idaho, passed away Saturday morning, April 11 at Sacred Heart Hospital in Spokane, from a lung condition presumably brought on by pneumonia.

Dewey was born September 21, 1897, at Pine Grove, the son of pioneer parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Wardrobe. He attended and graduated from Geneese High School, after which he enlisted in his country's service and went to France during World War I, where he served in 2nd Engineers. He was one of four brothers who enlisted for service.

When he returned home, he worked for sometime in the forestry department until a bad ankle, injured during the war, induced him to quit. Later he did farming in the Pine Grove area.

Five brothers and four sisters have preceded him in death. Surviving him are two sisters, Mrs. Agnes Borgart of Coulooe City, Wash., and Mrs. Jessie Blackburn of Fuyallup, Wash., a brother, Bruce Wardrobe of Lewiston, Idaho, and many nieces and nephews.

Services were under the direction of Short's Funeral Home of Moscow and were held in Geneese Tuesday, April 14 at 2:00 p. m. from the Community church. Rev. J. Stanley Lyman, of the First Christian church in Lewiston officiating. Interment was in Geneese City Cemetery.

Genese Voters Approved Three Mill Levy For M and O

GENESEE—The voters of Geneese School District No. 232 approved a three-mill levy for maintenance and operation at a special election held Monday in the school gymnasium.

This levy is above the 30 mills allowed by law for maintenance and operation of the 1970-71 school year. A total of 173 votes were cast, 119 in favor of the levy and 54 opposed.

This extra levy will raise approximately \$14,500.00, that the board of trustees determined is necessary to hold the present education program and to do all maintenance that needs to be done.

The mills will only be assessed for one year.

Supt. Diehl stated Monday evening that maintenance work would be done this summer, and work will be put out on bids.

This is an excellent time to get some spring house and lawn cleaning done and the city will make no additional charge for garbage and trash collection. Trash may be set outside at regular pickup spots and the city will be running collection routes throughout the week.

Kendrick Grange Holds Session Tuesday Night

Kendrick Grange No. 413 met in regular session, Tuesday, April 2nd, at 8:00 p. m. at the Fraternal Temple.

The meeting began with a session which was open to the public, in which Carl Moore, District Port Manager, Lewiston, presented information on the proposed future port at Lewiston. He showed a series of pictures which included four dams on the Columbia and three on the Snake River which have been built to provide power, navigation and flood control. A picture of Lower Granite Dam as it will appear when completed on the Snake River was also shown. Other pictures included levees and shipping facilities in the Tri-Cities area, ocean-going barges now on operation on the Columbia River, and new facilities at Portland for handling container cargoes.

In reply to questions Mr. Moore stated that electric power to be generated at Lower Granite is badly needed since the Northwest faces a serious power shortage beginning in 1973. He also said that the levees at Lewiston will only be a few feet higher than Main Street at the Lewis-Clark Hotel. He added that flood danger at Lewiston will be a thing of the past when the Lower Granite project, including the levees, is completed.

His talk and pictures were most interesting and informative, and all questions asked were answered. The information was appreciated and enjoyed by all attending.

Old Prescription Found By Art Johns Was Both For Inside and Outside

An old prescription for liniment, which could be used either internally or externally, was found by Art Johns in an old ledger this week and brought in to Dave Clayton, manager of the Red Cross Pharmacy. Written for Robert Bigham, the doctor was identified only by the initials "M" and the prescription blank was for the Albert Moskop Drug Store.

Although there was no date on the prescription, the fact the druggist was Albert Moskop put the time somewhere between 1909 and 1914.

Among the ingredients for the liniment were: Oil of Wintergreen, sassafras, hemlock, chloroform, Opil, Gum Camphor, Turpentine and alcohol. The directions said 15 to 30 drops of this mixture in a little water and use either internally or externally.

Paul Richardson of Juliaetta, recently brought in two old medicine bottles to the local pharmacy. One was from the old Marsh Drug Store and the other from the Wallace Drug Store. Mrs. Maeci Nye told Clayton the bottle from the Marsh Drugs would be in the 1909 period and the one from the Wallace Drugs would be around 1903.

Snow Survey Results

The April 1 snow survey has been completed by the Soil Conservation Service in cooperation with the Latah Soil and Water Conservation District.

There was no measurable snow at the lower elevation snow courses. The East and West Twin snow courses each have about 22 inches of snow and 8 to 9 inches of water in the snow pack. This is about average for the past ten years, and is just slightly less than last month's snow pack and water content.

The Moscow Mountain snow course has had a considerable increase in snow pack and water content in the past month. At present there are 52 inches of snow and 18.5 inches of water on the Moscow Mountain course. This is about 20 percent more than there was last month and about 15 percent above the 10-year average.

The Sherwin course, which is northeast of Bovill, has 30 inches of snow, which is average for this time of year.

There are also graphophobia, fear of writing; hematophobia, of blood; ideaphobia, of thought; ophiophobia, of home, or even gamophobia, the fear of marriage.

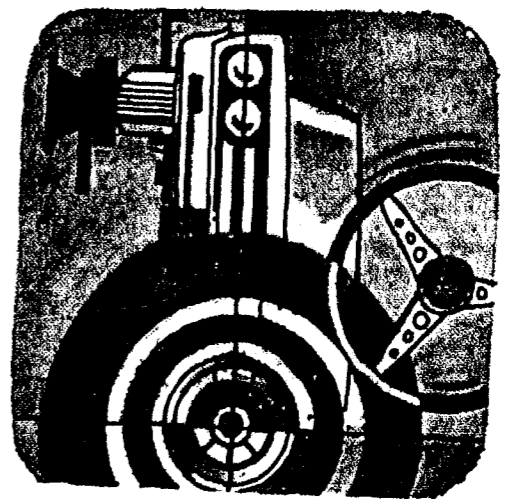

He added that flood danger at Lewiston will be a thing of the past when the Lower Granite project, including the levees, is completed.

His talk and pictures were most interesting and informative, and all questions asked were answered. The information was appreciated and enjoyed by all attending.

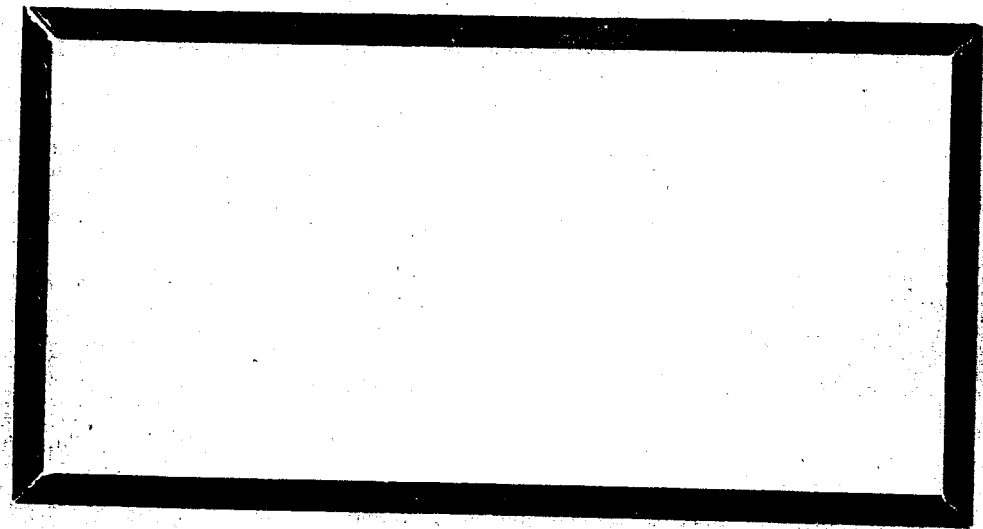

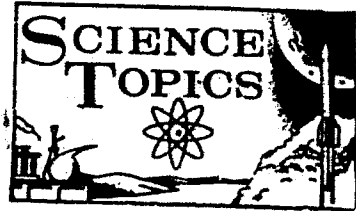

HIGH PRESSURE ENGINEERS at Cornell University are trying to create metallic hydrogen—a substance that could revolutionize rocketry and make possible a truly "perfect" conductor of electricity at room temperature. Using a 1,000-ton press, they already have created pressures up to 700,000 atmospheres—approximately one fifth the pressure at the center of the earth. (One atmosphere is 14.7 pounds per square inch.) They are pushing to reach pressures of at least 1,000,000 atmospheres.

CALL THEM "micro-earthquakes" or "mini-tremors"; whatever, they are no great shakes. Few persons notice or are alarmed by them, although the minuscule vibrations occur frequently in the California southland. Data on these micro-earthquakes may help provide scientists predictive capabilities and knowledge about larger earthquakes in the Los Angeles area, which is crossed by a system of active and inactive faults, says a University of Southern California geophysicist. He plans to monitor these minute earth tremors in downtown Los Angeles.

A MOVIE with more stars than Hollywood ever imagined—about 100,000 of them—has been produced by three scientists. The producers are astronomers from Columbia University and the University of Chicago. Their film is the first computer motion picture showing the birth of a galaxy and its early evolution. The movie covers 2 billion years in 10 minutes, beginning with the first turbulent moments of a galaxy's life: a vast cloud of gas 100,000 light-years wide begins to swirl; spiral arms emerge and spin; and stars are formed.

ALTHOUGH NEW METHODS will be developed and utilized, the greatest growth in the welding industry in the '70s will come from the increased use of existing automatic and semiautomatic processes that use gas-shielded continuous electrodes, predicts ARC Products, Hanover, Pa. These processes, which require flux-cored or solid electrodes and use the shielding effects of externally applied carbon dioxide to protect the welding zone from contaminants in air, are just now beginning to enjoy wide use.

SPICED NUTS

2½ cups nuts, (pecans, walnuts, or mixed)
1 cup sugar
½ cup water
1 tsp. cinnamon
¼ to 1 tsp. salt
1 to 1½ tsp. vanilla
Heat nuts in 375 oven for 15 minutes, stirring often to prevent burning.

If salted nuts are used, omit salt. Cook sugar and water with cinnamon and salt to soft ball stage. Remove from heat. Add vanilla and nuts; mix gently until well coated and mixture becomes creamy. Spread on wax paper to cool. Break nuts apart when dry. Nuts store very well in a covered dish.

Better Weather Aids County Job Picture

Spring weather returning to the Palouse country provided job opportunities to many more local workers during the past week. Frank J. Hartstein, Manager of the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment, reported that his office assisted a total of 17 workers in finding gainful employment during the past week. During the previous week there were 12 workers given job finding assistance, and during the week before, that only 10 were so helped. Several of the jobs were on the area's farms, and varied from a few weeks to all seeding season and a couple were for permanent year 'round workers. Other workers were placed in local jobs in the retail trades and in the service industries. At the end of the week there were still 46 jobs open and these included jobs for a bank teller, secretaries, cooks, waitresses, a seamstress, as well as jobs for a service station attendant, crop dusting helpers, nursery workers, a plumber, a creamery worker, and an insurance salesman.

During the week a total of 20 persons filed new claims for unemployment insurance through the Moscow Employment office, Hartstein said. He reported that another 24 workers had reopened claims against the state of Washington in compliance with a change in that state's unemployment insurance law. The total number of workers still receiving jobless pay dropped however, from last week's 395 to the present 361. Some workers returned to the area's woods, others returned to construction jobs, and still others just ran out of available benefits as a result of the change in Washington's laws.

Radar-Controlled Brake Being Developed

The Idaho Department of Highways received an announcement from the Federal Highway Administration stating that what might be an answer to frequent kinds of driver irresponsibility such as tailgating, speeding and driving on the wrong side of the road, has been developed.

The new device is a car with radar-controlled brakes. Transportation Secretary John A. Volpe was impressed enough with a demonstration to say he would ask the Safety Board to evaluate it.

When the radar-equipped car gets too close to the one in front, the device automatically applies brakes and closes the throttle; also warning the driver with a soft "beep."

The device in prototype costs \$800, but it could be mass produced for about \$200 a unit.

The U.S. Department of Transportation estimates that benefits to the automobile owner should amount to about \$100 a year when the Interstate Highway System is completed, through lower operating costs, reduced accidents, and time and other savings.

Goose Nest Search

A search for goose nests on the islands of the lower Snake River between Walters Ferry and Weiser, and below Emmett on the Payette River is being made cooperatively by personnel of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Idaho Fish and Game Department. Workers flush geese, find nests, mark sites, record eggs, and estimate how long until bits of fluff emerge from cracked shells.

A second look at the same nests will be made about May 1 for follow-up work to learn the amount of hatching success, the number of nest desertions, and the amount of nest destruction by predators. Predation, as a rule, plays a very small part in the failure of goose nesting.

Wild Turkey Status

A recent success story in the history of exotic game bird transplants to Idaho appears in the making. In January of 1961 the first shipment of 17 Meriam's wild turkeys were live-trapped in the mountains of Colorado and released on Deer Creek, a tributary of the main Salmon River below Whitebird. Two other shipments have been received from Colorado since that date, for a total of 39 birds. Progeny were trapped for the first time in 1965. To date, a total of 107 turkeys have been released in Idaho, some from Colorado stock and some raised in this state.

Idaho's release program is based on habitat evaluation made by field biologists. Eventually the goal is to have wild mountain turkeys in all suitable habitat.

Sooner or later, spring gobbler hunts can be expected, possibly as early as next year. Part of the thrill any sportsman gets from a spring gobbler hunt is "calling" a bronze beauty within shooting range. Only males respond to the challenge of a hunter.

Gobbler heads turn blood red in the springtime. Toms grow long spurs in their second year and ceremoniously strut to impress females. Spring gobbler hunts are popular in all states because they come in late April or early May when other seasons are closed. Spring hunts give sportsmen opportunities to collect another fine trophy species.

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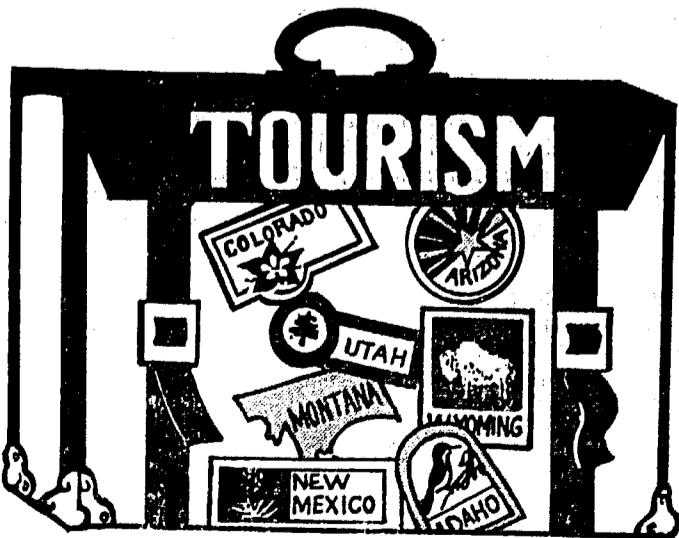

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ORDINANCE NO. 149

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE ABATEMENT OF PUBLIC NUISANCES, DEFINING PUBLIC NUISANCES, AND ESTABLISHING PENALTIES FOR CREATING OR PERMITTING PUBLIC NUISANCES

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA (LATAH COUNTY, IDAHO):
SECTION 1. PUBLIC NUISANCE DEFINED: A public nuisance is a thing, act, failure to act, occupation or use of the property which:

- (A) Shall annoy, injure or endanger the safety, health, comfort or repose of any considerable number of persons;
 - (B) Shall offend the public decency;
 - (C) Shall in any way render any considerable number of persons insecure in life or in use of property.
- SECTION 2. NUISANCE SPECIFICALLY DEFINED: The following specific acts, omissions, places, conditions and things are hereby declared to be nuisances:
- (A) Accumulations of manure or rubbish which are breeding places for flies, mosquitoes or vermin.
 - (B) All loud or unusual noises and annoying vibrations which offend the peace and quiet of persons of ordinary sensibilities.
 - (C) All hanging signs, awnings and other similar structures over the streets or sidewalks so situated or constructed as to endanger public safety.
 - (D) Filthy, littered or trash covered cellars, house yards, factory yards, vacant areas in rear of stores, vacant lots, houses, buildings or premises containing trash, litter, rags, accumulation of empty barrels, boxes, crates, packing cases, lumber or firewood not neatly piled, scrap iron, tin, and other metal not neatly piled, or anything whatsoever in which flies or rats may breed or multiply or which may be a fire danger.
 - (E) Any unsightly building, billboard or other structure or any old, abandoned or partially destroyed building or structure or any building or structure commenced and left unfinished or any abandoned well or excavation not properly protected and which may attract children and endanger them in the course of play.
 - (F) All places used or maintained as junk yards or dumping grounds or for the wrecking or disassembling of automobiles, trucks or machinery of any kind, or for the storing or leaving of worn out, wrecked or abandoned automobiles, trucks, or machinery of any kind, or of any parts thereof or for the storing or leaving of any machinery or equipment used by contractors or builders or by other persons, which said places are kept or maintained so as to essentially interfere with the comfortable enjoyment of life or property by others.

SECTION 3. PENALTY: Any person, firm or corporation who shall knowingly cause or create any public nuisance or permit any public nuisance to be created or to be placed upon or to remain upon any premises owned or occupied by him or them, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100.00), together with costs of such action, and in default of payment of such fine and costs, may be imprisoned in the County Jail or Municipal Jail at the rate of one (1) day for each five dollars (\$5.00) of such fine or costs; or confinement in the County Jail of not more than thirty (30) days; or both such fine or imprisonment, in the discretion of the Court. The imposition of one (1) penalty for any violation of this Ordinance shall not excuse the violation, or permit it to continue and all such persons shall be required to correct or hereby remedy such violations or defects within five (5) days; and when not otherwise specified, each five (5) days that prohibited conditions are maintained shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 4. SEPARATE OFFENSE: Each day's or part of day's continuance of anything prohibited by this Ordinance shall be a separate offense.

SECTION 5. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and first publication thereof.

Youth Conservation Camp To Be Held At Farragut State Park

The State Park Department announces the Tenth Idaho Youth Conservation Camp will run from June 15 to August 9, inclusive. Any resident Idaho boy between the ages of 14 and 17, inclusive, who has not previously attended the Idaho Youth Conservation Camp, and who is of good health and character, is eligible to apply. Requests for application blanks should be sent in no later than May 1st.

All interested boys meeting the above qualifications are urged to write to the Idaho Department of Parks for applications. The address is: Idaho Department of Parks, Statehouse, Boise, Idaho 83707

This year's camp will be located at Farragut State Park on Lake Pen Oreille in beautiful North Idaho. The campers will be improving recreation areas and working on various conservation projects in Idaho's State Parks, under the direction of experienced counselors.

A maximum of 50 boys will be selected by drawing to attend the camp. One boy will be selected from each legislative district and one extra boy will be selected from Districts 1 through 5 and 28 through 35, inclusive. The boys selected will be furnished transportation, bedding, food, and suitable work shoes. The boys will be paid \$39 per month.

Highway Department Aids Junk Cleanup

Since Congress enacted the Beautification Act of 1965 and the Idaho State Legislature passed Senate Bill No. 61 (The Junkyard Law), it has been illegal to place or expand either junkyards or dumps within 1,000 feet of the right-of-way of an Interstate or primary highway in Idaho. The only exception is where local zoning ordinances specifically permit the land to be used as a junkyard or dump.

The Idaho Department of Highways was directed to regulate and restrict the establishment, operation, and maintenance of junkyards on the State Highway System.

To comply with State law and to cooperate with junk dealers and auto wrecking yards, the Department has encouraged private enterprise to salvage and market the scrap metals for a profit rather than destroy the metals by burying them in remote areas without realizing any economic benefit.

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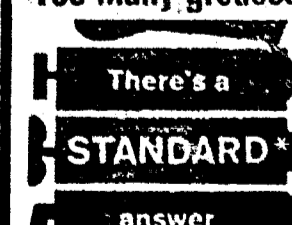

Trustee Election Set May 11

GENESEE—May 11 has been set for the trustee election for the Genesee School Board.

The only board members term to expire this year will be Ray Wodin from trustee district No. 2. Trustee District No. 2 takes in everything north of the city limits of Genesee and west to the Washington State line and South to the NezPerce County line and west to the Jay Nelson place and then on a straight line to the northern end of the school district.

Nominating petitions may be picked up from Mahlon Follett, Clerk of the Board and must be filed with Mr. Follett 18 days prior to the election date. This would mean that all petitions must be filed by April 25th. This year House Bill No. 506 also changes the voting requirements for Trustee elections. To be eligible to vote at the time of election,

1. An elector within the meaning of Article 6, section 2 of the Constitution of the State of Idaho

2. A resident of the district and, in case of election of Trustees, a resident of the same trustee zone as the candidate or candidates for district trustees for whom he offers to vote.

This is the same regulations as the last election at the schools. A person has to be a United States citizen and lived in Idaho for 6 months and in the school district for 30 days and 21 years of age.

At its regular meeting April 13, 1970 the Genesee School Board approved the 1970-71 school year calendar.

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Resolutions Cover Wildlife Subjects

The Idaho Wildlife Federation closed its 35th annual convention at McCall recently by commending the Idaho Fish and Game Commission and Department for policies and programs which have been criticized. A corollary resolution supported a thorough investigation by an independent organization which is qualified to do the job.

Following are some of the resolutions passed by the Idaho Wildlife Federation:

- Favor Snake and Columbia river moratorium on new dam construction without environmental impact studies.
- Passage of an Idaho streambed protection law.
- No more selling, trading or removing from public access of lake-shore and riverbank property.
- Extension of Columbia Basin

Mallard Area to include Idaho counties of Power, Bannock and Blingham.

—Management of 5,000 acre "hard core" range adjacent to Dworshak Reservoir for wildlife as mitigation for big game losses from flooding.

—Favored St. Joe Wilderness Area of about 200,000 acres.

—Urged U.S. Forest Service to grant special use permit for Fish and Game Department to build fishing-only reservoir at Elk Valley in southeastern Idaho.

—Urged new federal-state mining laws to protect natural resources

—Federal-state protective laws against use of hard pesticides harmful to people and wildlife.

—Combination national park-wilderness recreation area for White Clouds-Sawtooth region.

—Opposed more logging on Krasse District of South Fork Boise because of potential damage of spawning beds.

Trustee Election Set May 11

GENESEE—May 11 has been set for the trustee election for the Genesee School Board.

The only board members term to expire this year will be Ray Wedin from trustee district No. 2. Trustee District No. 2 takes in everything north of the city limits of Genesee and west to the Washington State line and South to the NezPerce County line and west to the Jay Nelson place and then on a straight line to the northern end of the school district.

Nominating petitions may be picked up from Mahlon Follett, Clerk of the Board and must be filed with Mr. Follett 18 days prior to the election date. This would mean that all petitions must be filed by April 25th.

This year House Bill No. 506 also changes the voting requirements for Trustee elections. To be eligible to vote at the time of election,

1. An elector within the meaning of Article 6, section 2 of the Constitution of the State of Idaho

2. A resident of the district and, in case of election of Trustees, a resident of the same trustee zone as the candidate or candidates for district trustees for whom he offers to vote.

This is the same regulations as the last election at the schools. A person has to be a United States citizen and lived in Idaho for 6 months and in the school district for 30 days and 21 years of age.

At its regular meeting April 13, 1970 the Genesee School Board approved the 1970-71 school year calendar.

A report was given to the Board by Superintendent Diehl on the teacher situation for the coming school year. It now stands that two teachers have resigned at the end of this school year. Resolutions Cover Wildlife Subjects

The Idaho Wildlife Federation closed its 35th annual convention at McCall recently by commending the Idaho Fish and Game Commission and Department for policies and programs which have been criticized. A corollary resolution supported a thorough investigation by an independent organization which is qualified to do the job.

Following are some of the resolutions passed by the Idaho Wildlife Federation:

- Favor Snake and Columbia river moratorium on new dam construction without environmental impact studies.
- Passage of an Idaho streambed protection law.
- No more selling, trading or removing from public access of lake-shore and riverbank property.
- Extension of Columbia Basin

Mallard Area to include Idaho counties of Power, Bannock and Blingham.

—Management of 5,000 acre "hard core" range adjacent to Dworshak Reservoir for wildlife as mitigation for big game losses from flooding.

—Favored St. Joe Wilderness Area of about 200,000 acres.

—Urged U.S. Forest Service to grant special use permit for Fish and Game Department to build fishing-only reservoir at Elk Valley in southeastern Idaho.

—Urged new federal-state mining laws to protect natural resources.

—Federal-state protective laws against use of hard pesticides harmful to people and wildlife.

—Combination national park-wilderness recreation area for White Clouds-Sawtooth region.

—Opposed more logging on Krasseel District of South Fork Boise because of potential damage of spawning beds.
