## Kendrick, Genesee Track Men Set Records At Regional Meet

Track men from Genesee and Kendrick high schools set two new records as they competed in the Regional A-3 track championships held last Saturday at Lewiston's Volmer Bowl. Mike Hamilton from Kendrick cleared the bar at 13 feet, 9 inches to better by 7 inches the old pole vault record set in 1958 for the state record. Bob Schwenne of Genesee leaped 6 feet, 10 1/2 inches in the high jump to break the 1959 regional record of 6-10. Schwenne and Paul Smith of Layton each tied at the 5-10 1/4 mark, but the first place was given to Schwenne because he had fewer misses. Genesee's Martin Gilge won first place in the 100-yard dash and the 230-yard dash. Gilge's time was 10.8 seconds in the 100 and 23.5 in the 230. Genesee's Bruce Scharnhorst placed third in the 880-yard run and Dale Hickman placed fifth in the long jump. The Genesee mile relay team placed fourth in that event. Sixteen teams competed in the A-3 events. Genesee finished with a total of 24 points. Kendrick picked up 8 points. Hamilton, Gilge and Schwenne will be eligible to compete in the state track meet at Twin Falls this week-end.

### Educationally Speaking . . .

#### Straws-In-The-Wind Department

Data indicating that more than 82 million adult Americans are expected to take part in educational programs outside the traditional school system by 1976 is reported in a new study, "The Learning Force," developed by the Educational Policy Research Center at Syracuse, N. Y.

The figures, which represent almost a 100 percent increase over 1965 data suggest an explosion in adult learning activities in a variety of situations not considered education.

One possible outcome of such a development, the report maintains, is "an educational system constructed around the principle of learning as a life-long purpose, with alternative routes and many entrances and exits, depending on the changing needs and interests of participants."

#### Adult Basic Education Institutes

Twenty training and planning institutes for adult basic education teachers, teacher-trainees, administrators, and paraprofessionals are scheduled for this summer and the 1970-71 academic year.

The institutes will train basic education teachers in the use of new methods and materials in the areas of programmed instruction, computer-assisted instruction, team teaching and television.

Adult education directors in each state will nominate those who will attend the institutes. Full tuition, travel expenses and stipends will be provided.

#### The Long and the Short of It

The economics as well as the learning yield of a year-round school system plus its impact on the community will be studied in a recently announced USOE project awarded to the Valley View Schools of Lockport, Illinois.

Scheduled to begin this summer, the project will produce a case history of the experiences of a school district involved in transition from a nine-month schedule to a year-round program, as well as two 10-year cost projections designed to offer cost comparisons between the shorter and longer programs.

#### GRASS TETANY

There has been some report from Cattlemen to the Latah County Extension agents that grass tetany has caused losses this spring. This is a disease not too well known, but seems to be a nutritional problem. It is found in cattle, especially lactating cows, and is fatal in many untreated cases. It seems to effect nerves and muscles with rapid breathing and high temperature.

A recent article in a farm magazine, by Dr. Richard Hall, Extension Veterinarian, explains it and its treatment. Magnesium oxide on feed or intravenous injection are preventatives and treatment.

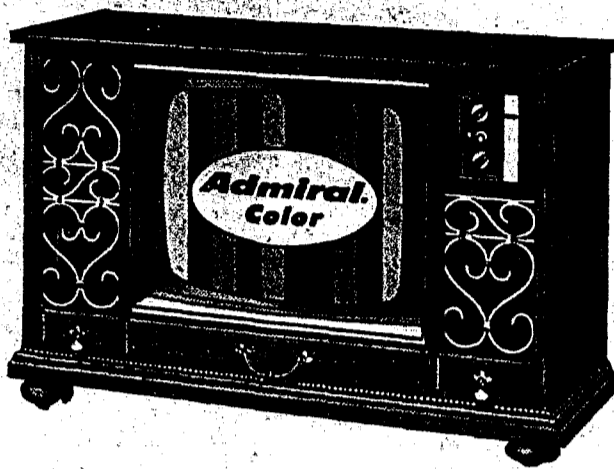

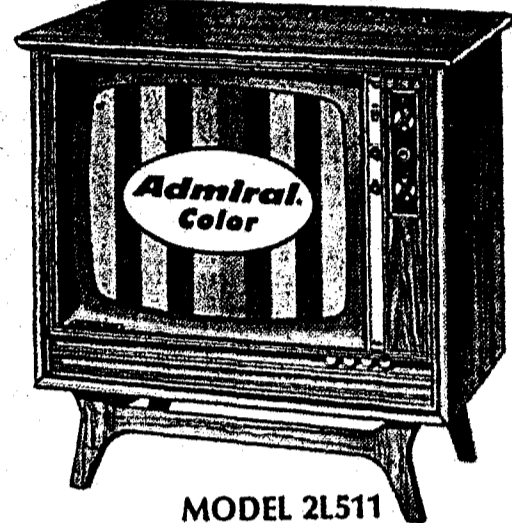

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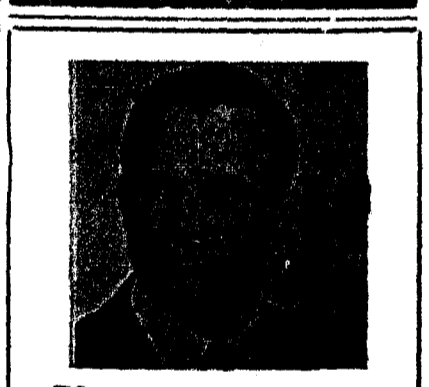

**PANHANDLE LAKE SEASON**  
Idaho's early trout season for lakes, but not streams, opened May 2 in Area I, the drainages of the Kootenai, Pend Oreille and Spokane rivers of the Panhandle region. This special season runs through November 30. Stream fishing, unless otherwise specified in the regulations, does not open in the Panhandle until May 30, the start of the general statewide trout season. The main reason for the early lake season for trout in Area I is that big mackinaw and Kamloops trout and Dolly Varden are more accessible to fishermen early in May and November.



## Spring Chinook Salmon Numbers About Average

Test fishing in the lower Columbia River, and salmon counts at Bonneville and Ice Harbor dams indicate this year's run of spring chinook is average or slightly better, the Idaho Fish and Game Department disclosed today.

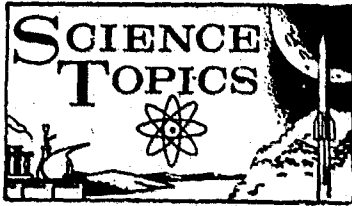
Spring chinook runs entering the Columbia River during the past ten years have averaged about 166,700 fish, according to Jerry Mallet, anadromous fish supervisor. He added that this year's run is expected to be about 160,000 to 170,000 salmon.

The Idaho department sent two representatives to the recent interagency hearing of the Oregon Fish Commission and the Washington Department of Fisheries. These two agencies have the authority and responsibility for setting commercial fishing seasons on the Columbia River. Mallet explained that Idaho is a member of the Columbia River Advisory Council, which includes the two downriver state commercial fisheries management agencies, as well as the Oregon Game Commission and the Washington Department of Game (sport fishery agencies). The meeting was held in Portland, Ore., on April 24.

"This Advisory Council has no powers to set or alter seasons, but recommends to the state fish regulatory agencies on desired length of seasons," Mallet said.

"Directors of all five state agencies are official representatives of the Advisory Council, and each state has one or more fishery biologists as technical aids to their directors," Mallet said.

So far, the spring chinook salmon run is ahead of its normal timetable for reaching specific points on the river system. As of April 27, a salmon count of 71,131 was recorded at Bonneville and 7,794 fish at Ice Harbor Dam on the lower Snake River. About 50 of the big fish were counted at the Lewiston Dam on the Clearwater River. This is a greater number for this date than was counted in past years, and can be mostly attributed to salmon restoration efforts in the Clearwater River during recent years. There is a small remnant population of chinook still in these waters that goes back to pre-dam days near the dawn of this century.



### OLD SOUTH POLE WAS IN SAHARA

THE SOUTH POLE of 450 million years ago now broils in the Sahara desert sun, a Columbia University Scientist reports. A team of leading earth scientists from 11 nations unanimously agreed to this conclusion following a recent expedition to southeastern Algeria. "There is no question about it," he said. "The territory that was the earth's south polar region in the Upper Ordovician period is now the central Sahara." The flattened topography of the area grooves in ancient rock showed the result of continental glaciation—the kind that occurs only under a polar ice cap. At the time, South America and Africa were one continent and Antarctica and Australia were another. The North Pole of that area is now in the middle of the Pacific somewhere south of Hawaii.

COMPUTER MUSIC can be "humanized" by using a pair of telegraph keys instead of a baton to "conduct" it, a Stanford University professor says. Combinations of letters and numbers enable musicians to designate the duration of musical notes, pitch, amplitude, and rhythm. "Quite acceptable computer performances can be produced with this means," he said, "but they lack the subtly controlled discrepancies inherent in human performance. In order to use humanly produced rhythm, a program can be written that creates input by reading the real time values tapped on two telegraph keys."

Terry Holubetz, Lewiston, regional fishery biologist, suggests that the vanguard of the spring chinook salmon run should be in the lower Salmon River from its mouth to Whitebird within a week or ten days. He added that these fish normally do not reach the Salmon City area until about the last week in May.

The fishery management agencies of Oregon and Washington try to set the season to allow an escapement of 80,000 to 90,000 spring chinook salmon over Ice Harbor Dam. Most of these fish are destined for Idaho.

Fish passage problems already have been noted at the John Day fish ladder. Mallet says that a stipulation was made at the recent interagency hearing in Portland which provides for an emergency meeting if these problems are not solved in time to get the minimum upriver fish escapement. Appropriate action will be taken to insure the desired fish passage. This could be a season closure or delay in the season opening. A total of 16 days of commercial fishing spaced around weekend closures is about normal for recent years, although the season has been much longer in the past.

"The length and timing of the commercial season depends on what the actual size of the run is found to be, and fish passage conditions up the Columbia River," Mallet averred. "Upstream escapement of salmon depends on these things. We are working on this with the Oregon Fish Commission and the Washington Department of Fisheries."

### IDAHO DEPT OF EMPLOYMENT

The resumption of logging operations on a limited scale in the Latah County area provided work opportunities for many persons who had been claiming unemployment insurance. Frank J. Hartstein, manager of the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment reported today that the number of jobless pay recipients reduced from 339 to 272 during the past week. Most of the decline was noted in those areas of the county where most of the woods workers reside Hartstein said. High unemployment among construction workers, however, he explained, keeps the number of idled workers higher than during the previous year. A year ago there were only 177 persons receiving unemployment insurance benefits. Currently there are 83 workers receiving unemployment insurance bene-

fits. Currently there are 83 workers receiving unemployment insurance in the Moscow area compared with 102 last week, and 38 during the same week a year ago. At Potlatch the total is now 50, a week ago it was 68 and a year ago 30. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area the total is now 118, down from the 140 of last week, but still higher than the 80 of last year. Hartstein said his information indicates that many more woods workers will be returning to work during the next couple of weeks, weather permitting. This will reduce the number of claimants in the area drastically.

The number of workers placed on jobs during the week was just one higher than were given job finding help during the previous week. Thirteen workers were helped in locating suitable employment during the week. Hartstein said this compares with 30 persons sent out on jobs during the same week a year ago. At the end of the week there were still 49 jobs available. Most of these were for persons requiring skills, training and experience and have been difficult to fill locally.

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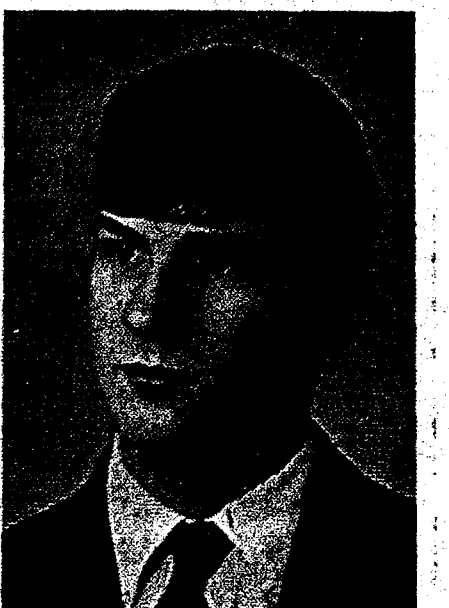
