New Book on Area History Authored by Local Woman

The book "They Came to a Ridge" was written by Ann Nilsson Driscoll. The writer was raised in the Lewiston area, but is now married, has two daughters and lives south of Troy on Driscoll Ridge, where her husband's family pioneered. The book contains history of Moscow, Lewiston, Genesee, Troy, Kendrick, Juliaetta, Deary and Bovill; also these extinct trading posts — Nora, Anderson, Collins, Stabtown, Janesville and Lenville. It tells of the life of many of the pioneer families of American and Driscoll ridges, which lie south of Troy, such as — a pioneer breaking the sod with an

axe and dropping in the seed; home remedies; rules for the social etiquette of the day; funerals that were held in the home, and a father building his child's casket from available boards and carrying the child in the casket from their home in a canyon to be buried in a nearby cemetery.

There is a diary written in 1882 by Fannie Roberts while on a wagon train trip from Kansas to Idaho Territory. The journey lasted about three months and the route included Wichita, Denver, Boise, Walla Walla, Lewiston, Juliaetta, and American Ridge — which was to become her home.

She tells of their horse going lame, the illness of her children, the people in Boise City who were so "mean" and her wish that there were some women along who had some "get up about them."

All three teachers are teaching either the second or third generation children of many, many families in the Southwick-Kendrick-Juliaetta areas.

Ben P. Cook

After receiving his Junior High School Life Diploma from Lewiston State Normal School in June, 1928, Ben P. Cook began his teaching and coaching career at Southwick. He served six years there, leaving in 1934 for Genesee, where he accepted the grade school principalship, high school coaching position, and to teach the 7th and 8th grades.

He completed two years of Education at the U. of I. during eight summer sessions and with correspondence received his Bachelor of Science Degree in Education from the U. of I. in June, 1943.

Cook left Genesee in July of that year to serve as Craigmont school superintendent for four years. In August, 1947, he moved his family to Kendrick as he took a year's rest from teaching. In September, 1948, he began a 21-year tenure for Kendrick School District No. 283. The

Darwin Tarry, a life-long Southwick farmer, is busy through the summer months, so they have not as yet made any plans for trips, as such.

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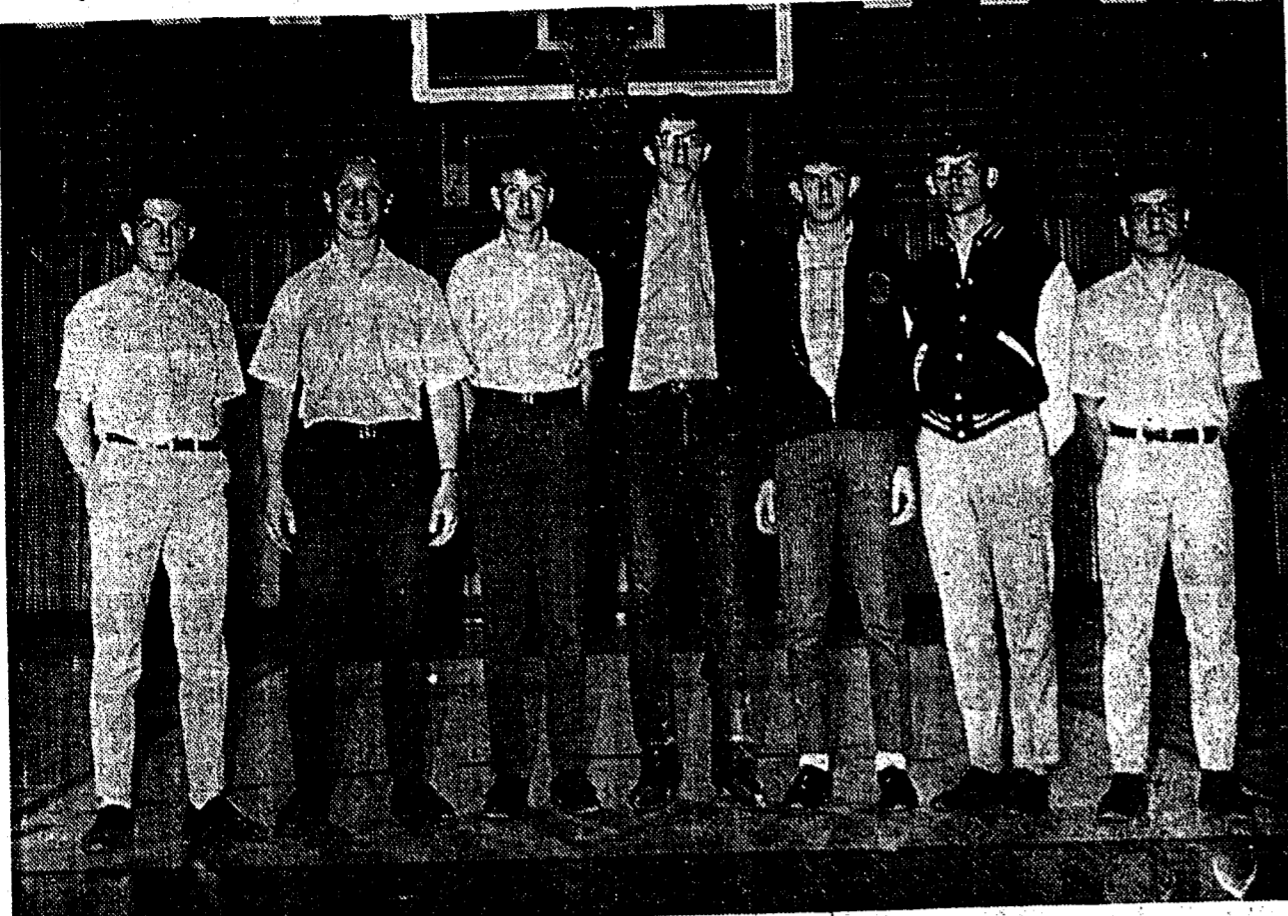
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Boys State Delegates

FIELD DOG TRAINING

"Born near Fortsville, Kentucky, Johnson is a descendant of the famous pioneer Kentucky surgeon, Ephriam McDowell, whose likeness stands in Statuary Hall in the Nations Capital. His family later moved to Illinois where he received his major education," Alexander explained.
"A resident of Belleville, Illinois, he started his climb to prominence as a member of the St. Clair (IL) County Board of Supervisors and six years as a member of the Illinois General Assembly," Alexander said. "As a member of the St. Clair county Board of Supervisors, he brought about the disclosure of large scale tax graft and as a member of the Illinois General Assembly, Johnson organized the drive to break the loan shark and collection agency rackets of Southern Illinois," he added.
"Appointed to the Woodward Commission, he exposed relief racketeering and brought about legislation to stop the waste of relief funds. Later, quired every able-bodied man on re-work or Don't Eat' law which re- and forced the abandonment of the left to work and earn the amount of his budget," Alexander said.
Elected to the United States Congress in 1942, Johnson continued to campaign for the principle of government he espouses. He exposed and forced the abandonment of the program whereby the American Taxpayer's money was used to pay farmers in Peru not to raise cotton. Highway Department Spring Housecleaning

BOISE—The Idaho Department of Highways has started its annual Spring-Summer maintenance program that involves putting the roads back in shape following a long Winter as well as grooming the areas alongside the highways.

It is estimated that state highway crews will mow 41,000 acres of roadside grass over difficult terrain during the Summer months.

One tractor, busy at roadside maintenance, mows about 12-15 acres a day. So it takes approximately 80 days for one tractor-mower with a five to six foot cutter bar or rotating attachment to cut 1,000 acres of grass—one time. But, the roadside grass on the right-of-way has to be cut up to three times a season to stay neat.

That means a lot of men and a lot of mowers are needed to handle just that one job every year.

Then, the hard working crews for the Highway Department have a lot of other jobs to handle each Spring-Summer season too. From over 80 equipment repair and storage facilities around the state, more than 280 trucks, 90 motor graders, 150 front end loaders and other equipment along with about 286 maintenance men are already at work on state highways. Repair crews are filling potholes, patching cracks and stripping roadways.

The crews will pick up hundreds of tons of trash, take down about 75,000 lineal feet of snow-fence where necessary, scoop thousands of cubic yards of sand and other material off the highways and apply nearly 10,000 miles of line-stripping to the roads to provide for motoring safety.

They will treat some roads with oil and cover up the black, gooey stuff with a layer of sand to provide a non-skid surface and prolong the life of the highway.

They will also rehabilitate guard-rail by painting and making repairs and treat the weeds and grass under the rails with a chemical vegetation remover to avoid under-rail mowing in many areas.

Added to all of this activity, the six Highway Department Districts are also responsible for "beautification and safety" landscaping on medians and roadside areas.

The beautification-safety planting is done to provide noise barriers,

light barriers, screening at unsightly points, and for other reasons.

Least liked of all the seasonal work is litter and trash clean-up because most of it could be avoided. Next on the list of least-liked activities is the repair work brought about by vandalism. Again, as with littering, virtually all vandalism could be eliminated if citizens would act responsibly.

Littering each year costs Idaho highway users about \$250,000. Vandalism accounts for about \$50,000 annually.

According to highway department spokesman, Maintenance Engineer Roy Jump, "that same \$300,000, if it could be saved and put to better uses would re-surface over 20 miles of the states deteriorating pavements."

So, the Highway Department will be busily going about its appointed rounds all Spring and Summer. A total of almost 5,000 miles of state highways have to be kept up. All of this work has to be accomplished with no Federal Aid but has to be paid for entirely by State funds as a part of the Highway Department's regular maintenance program.

Besides the obvious benefits to our own citizenry and to commerce, our highways bring in thousands of tourists and visitors who spend an average of 200 million dollars in the Gem state annually. Sheer Yankee acumen can recognize the benefits of making that much business welcome to our

It's rhubarb time again. It's so plentiful and there are so many delicious ways to prepare and serve it, that I'm sure you will enjoy the recipes sent in this week by Mrs. Kenneth Jenkins. The Jenkins' family raise some of the most delicious rhubarb I've ever eaten. Try one or two of these recipes, we know you'll enjoy them. Rhubarb is full of vitamins and minerals.

Rhubarb Festive Spring Salad

2 cups rhubarb
1/2 cup sugar
one tablespoon lemon juice
two-thirds cup sliced green celery
one-half cup water
one-third cup chopped nut meats
1 pkg. apple jello
1 3-ounce pkg. cream cheese

Cook unpeeled rhubarb with sugar and water. Bring to boil and reduce heat to low for 10 minutes. Dissolve the gelatin in the boiling hot rhubarb sauce. Add the cream cheese which has been mashed to break it up, and stir until dissolved in the hot mixture. Chill until it begins to thicken. Whip until light and fluffy, then add lemon juice, celery, and nut meats. Turn into a salad mold or into individual molds. Chill

Rhubarb Sherbert

2 cups rhubarb
1/2 cup sugar
few grains salt
1 cup table cream
2 beaten egg yolks
1 tsp. lemon juice
1/4 tsp. vanilla
2 egg whites
1/4 cup sugar

Combine unpeeled rhubarb; 1/2 cup sugar and salt (no water); cover and simmer until rhubarb is tender. Cool. Combine cream, egg yolks, lemon juice and vanilla. Mix with rhubarb. Freeze to mush in refrigerator tray at coldest setting. Beat egg whites, gradually add one-fourth cup sugar, continue beating until stiff. Turn frozen mixture into chilled bowl and beat until smooth but not melted. Fold in egg white mixture and return to refrigerator. Freeze until firm.

Rhubarb Peekaboo

4 cups rhubarb
1 cup sugar
1 tsp. grated rind of lemon
1 pkg. white cake mix
Mix cake as directed on package. Pour batter into greased baking pan, 7 1/2 x 12. Top with diced unpeeled rhubarb and grated rind. Sprinkle sugar over top. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 to 45 minutes. As the Peekaboo bakes, the rhubarb goes to the bottom, forming a sauce and cake rises to top. Sprinkle top of cake with powdered sugar. Serve warm with cream.

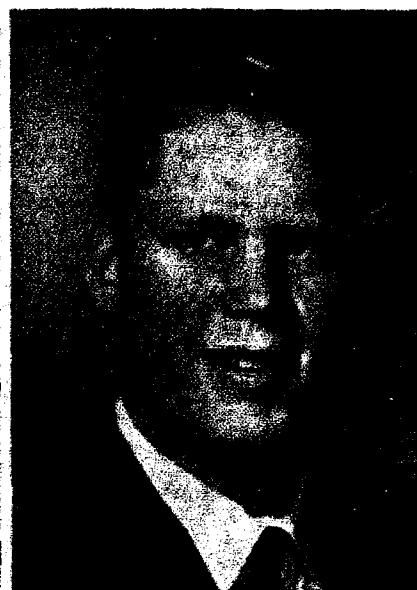

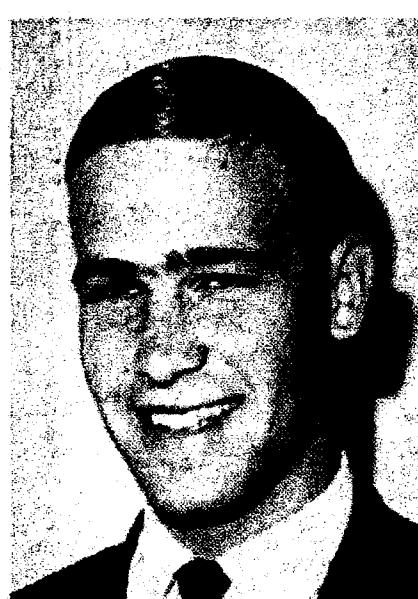

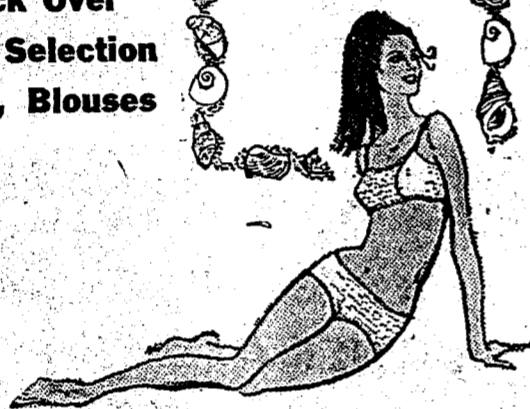
