The crews will pick up hundreds of tons of trash, take down about 75,000 lineal feet of snow-fence where necessary, scoop thousands of cubic yards of sand and other material off the highways and apply nearly 10,000 miles of line-stripping to the roads to provide for motoring safety. They will treat some roads with

oil and cover up the black, gooey stuff with a layer of sand to provide a non-skid surface and prolong the life of the highway.
