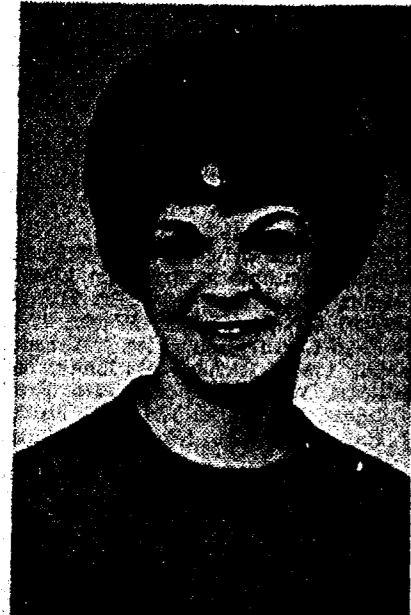

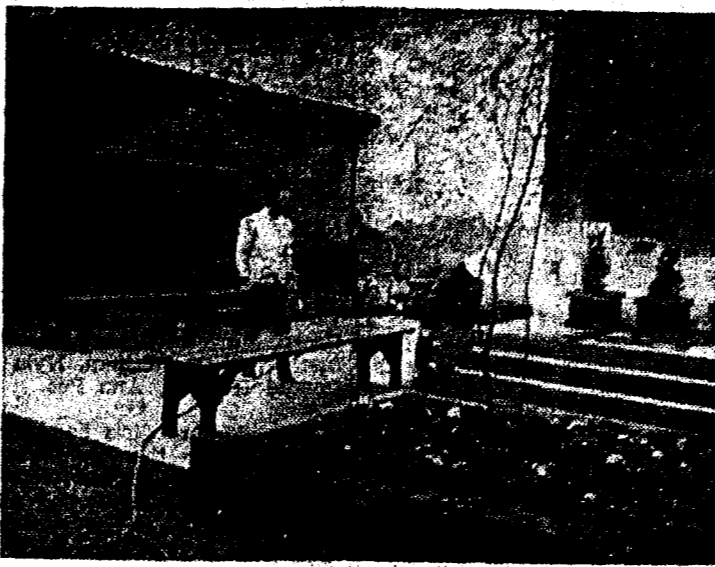
Karen Freeman Chosen To Be Part of BYU Choral Group Tour

Poppy Sale Success

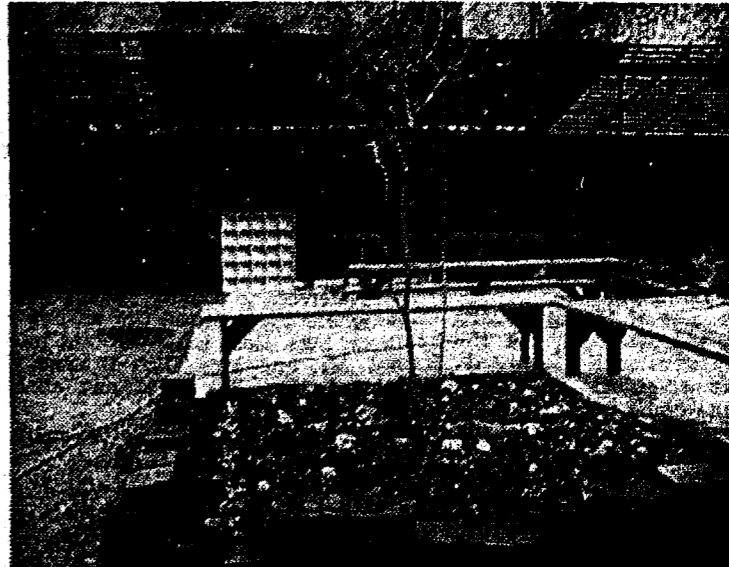

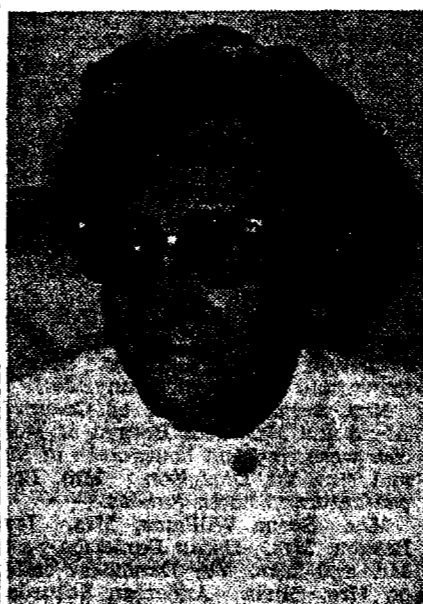

children, to join his other children, who had earlier come to this area. They arrived at Juliaetta on Oct. 27, 1903. He died on Jan. 21, 1904. Following his death she quit school and made her own way, working in 1907 with Mrs. Hatfield in the Carlson cook house. In 1908 and 1909 she ran the cookhouse for Woody, with one helper, cooking three meals daily for 24 to 30 men, for some 40 days during the harvest season. Hours were from 4:00 a. m. to 11:00 p. m., at \$1.50 per day. In 1910 she cooked for 60 fruit ranch hands at Silcott, Wn.

On Jan. 22, 1911, she was united in marriage to William Dygert. They lived on Bedrock Flats near Cream ridge until 1922, then farmed on Cream ridge from 1922 to 1945, when they moved to Lewiston. There she worked at food processing and at laundries until she quit to care for her husband, who died in 1956. In 1961 she cared for her brother, Tom, in Spokane; then later, cared for others of her family. She moved to Kendrick in 1963, where she has lived in the home of her son, Virgil, keeping up the housework, doing gardening and canning. She has been an active member of the W. M. C. of the Assembly of God Church. Recently she underwent surgery at Tri-State Memorial Hospital, Clarkston, where it was determined she had terminal cancer. She is now being cared for at the home of her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Davis at Southwick. Loved ones and friends may visit her there, in this, her 81st year.

Toasted Cheese Sandwiches

Eight slices buttered toast
2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons flour
1 cup milk
1/4 teaspoon salt and pepper
one-third cup cheese, cut fine
2 egg yolks, 1 tbb. catsup
Melt butter, add flour and milk. Cook until thick sauce forms. Stir at the time. Add seasonings and cheese, cook 1 minute. Add egg yolks and catsup. Spread on buttered toast. Arrange in shallow pan and

broil till tops are brown.

Devils Food Cake

2 cups sifted Swansdown cake flour
Add 2 teaspoons baking powder and 1/4 teaspoon salt. Sift 3 times.
Cream 1/2 cup butter thoroughly; add 1 1/4 cups firmly packed brown sugar, gradually, creaming until light and fluffy. Add 2 unbeaten eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add three squares Bakers unsweetened chocolate, melted. Blend. Add flour-alternately with 1 cup milk, in small amounts. Add 1 tsp. vanilla. Bake in two layers in moderate oven for 25 minutes.

COOK OUTS
The season for the cook-out is upon us, notes the Idaho Medical Association, and a few simple precautions will help insure that the barbecue brings only pleasure.

The outdoor cook gets burned most frequently either when trying to start the fire with highly flammable liquids such as gasoline or lighter fluid or when pouring the liquid on dying embers to bolster the fire.

If you use liquid starter, follow label instructions. After pouring fluid on the coals, wait a while before lighting. Never use these products once the fire has started. This can result in flareups or explosions. Paper, leaves, wood shavings or other non-liquid combustibles can be used to pep up a fire.

Be wary of electric starters and electric rotisseries. Both are potential sources of shock.

NEW U. OF I. PUBLICATION

U. of I., Moscow — Newest of University of Idaho publications to serve the people of the state is the first issue of the semi-annual Idaho Business and Economic Review, published by the Bureau of Business and Economic Research.

Articles in the initial issue include: "Idaho — an Undeveloped State?" by Dr. Nybrotten; "The International Monetary System, Gold and the Dollar" by Dr. Max E. Fletcher and John M. Cooper of the College of Business and Economics faculty; "Are You Ready for a Computer?" by Charles W. Rice, Jr., of the college faculty, and "Family Investment Plans for Income and Security" by William C. Moore, also of the college faculty.

CLEANING AND COOKING OATS-CRAPPIES NOT BAD
Warm water species of fish, called "pan fishes," sun fishes, and spiny-rayed fishes" by countless men, women and youngsters, can be caught in great numbers when most other fish either are out of season or in their doldrums.

Trophy fishermen who go for big trout and ocean-going species oftentimes have little regard for black crappies, bluegill and other sunfishes as well as yellow perch and brown bullheads.

Although these species are not prized as tackle busters or tail dancers, they have the widest following among anglers of all ages because they make up for these shortcomings in catchability and flavor.

The Idaho Fish and Game Department says that warm water species, including black bass, are exotic fishes, imported by homesick pioneers from the East and South. Small-mouth bass was imported into the Pacific Northwest in 1921-1926, some 20-30 years after the successful introduction of largemouth bass, carp, tench, catfish and other "desirable" warm water species. However, personnel of the Idaho Fish and Game Department first planted small mouth

bass in the Snake River in 1942, and in the Clearwater in 1948.

Crappie, bluegill, and other sunfish have been stocked for many years in ponds, reservoirs and lowland lakes. They are prolific breeders, often becoming nuisance fish in waters managed for other species, and can be caught in great numbers. There is no bag or possession limit. When young, they feed on insects, graduating to minnows and aquatic animals. They stay in groups or schools. Lucky anglers often find them in the hundreds of flooded timber or brushy areas, or in riffles above large reservoirs.

Channel catfish were introduced into the waters of the Snake River in southwestern Idaho a few years ago and have established themselves and are a fine fishery. These are a different species from the yellow bullhead. The skin can be scrubbed

clean and eaten along with the fish when cooked, or removed by skinning. Peanut oil is good when frying catfish because it splatters less than other types and absorbs less of the "fishy" flavor. Deep frying in fat is a recommended method. These fish also can be panfried, baked, barbecued, or stewed.

Good bluegill waters are found in Twin Lakes, south of Twin Falls, and "hot" crappie angling is available during the springtime spawning season at Strike and Hells Canyon reservoirs on the Snake River, Lake Lowell south of Nampa, and Owyhee Reservoir in Oregon. Many waters in northern Idaho are good fishing for spiny-rayed species.

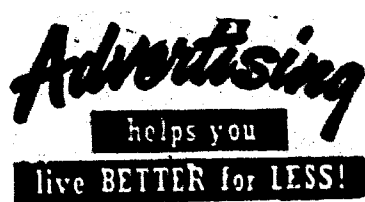
