Boyd Candler, Kendrick's 1970 delegate to the American Legion sponsored Gem Boys State, returned home Sunday after spending the week of May 31 through June 7 at Boise College at the annual conference with young men from over the State.

As the delegates arrived they were shown to the different dormitories that housed the boys of different cities and counties. Then in assembly all were welcomed and given an outline of what to expect during the week and just what the purpose of Boys State is.

Through the week they went to different classes in legislative law, and law enforcement. Elections were held, first for the city officials, and then for the county, State and for Boys Nation. Boyd was selected as an election Board Councilman and city treasurer.

## Drenching Rains Break Heat Wave

Heavy rains, exceeding one half inch in some areas, broke the first heat wave of the summer season Monday. After a very warm week that saw the mercury push up near the 100 degree mark late last week a storm blew in from the coast late Monday afternoon bringing wind and heavy moisture.

Dick Benschoter on American Ridge reported that .34 inches of rain fell Monday afternoon and evening. American Ridge also had a total of 1.30 inches of moisture during May.

Charles Bower on Bear Ridge recorded .64 inches of rain Monday night and early Tuesday and then also added that 1.30 inches had fallen during May's thirty one days.

John Leudke who keeps the rainfall records in Genesee said the Monday rains drenched .51 inches in that area.

Moisture Was Welcome  
Both the break in the heat and moisture were welcomed by area pea growers who were beginning to worry because of the heat on the plants that are just now blooming well. Most of the peas in the area are looking good at this time except for a few fields which caught some of the hail that fell two weeks ago.

Mr. and Mrs. Ben Johann, of Moscow, will celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary at a reception, June 14th, hosted by their two daughters, Mr. and Mrs. John Neely, of Moscow, and Mr. and Mrs. Willis Thornton, of Lewiston, with the assistance of the Aspendale Community Club.

Ben Johann, who served in the U. S. Army during World War I, and is the son of John and Katherine Johann, and Gertrude Sprenger, daughter of Joseph and Catherine Sprenger also of Genesee, were married June 15, 1920 at the Thorncrest Catholic Church.

During their first year of marriage, they lived on the Joe Roth place south-east of Genesee on the Rim Rock. That first year their crops were hauled out and they moved to the John Randall farm seven miles southeast of Moscow. They farmed for Mr. and Mrs. Randall until 1933. Since that time, they have lived on the Cuddy place near the community of Linville, (no longer existing) and the Aspendale Community.

Four daughters were born to them during the first fifteen years of their marriage. Rita Marie, now Mrs. John Neeley, and Arlen Anne, now Mrs. Willis Thornton. Two other daughters, Joyce and Mary, died as infants. The Johann's have nine grandchildren and one great-grandson.

In 1942, they bought their present home from John Stevens, then of Genesee. In 1951, they built a new house and developed a terracing garden, of which many people visit during the spring. They have over one hundred different varieties of daffodils and tulips.

Besides their flower garden, they have many hobbies such as "rock-hounding" and fishing. Johann likes fishing flies, and polishes and facets stones. They both work in the large vegetable garden from which they can their winter supply for themselves and their daughters' families.

Besides farming from 1937 to 1945, Johann worked for the Latah County Grain Growers at Joel. Growing a little weary from hard work, he quit and returned to just farming.

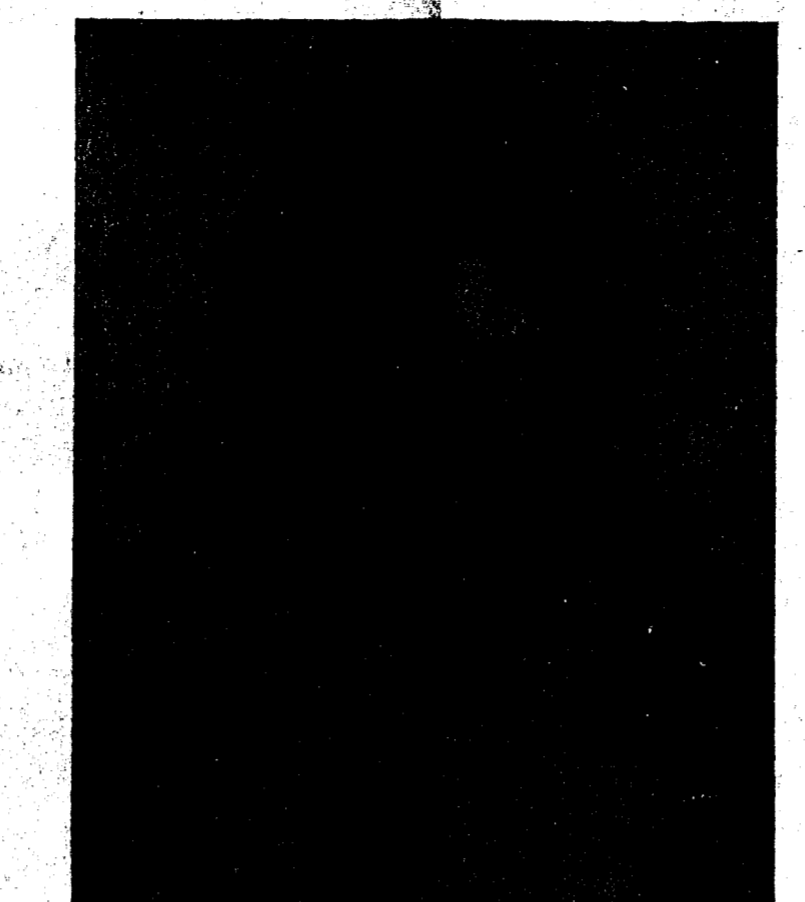

The breakfast committee reported serving over 400 paying customers, in addition to the usual number of complimentary free meals, and free servings for pre-school children.

The kiddie and main parade following breakfast were well received by the onlookers who were well pleased with the entries displayed. Winners in the kiddie parade were Bess Marston, Vicki Myers, and Eric Jenness.

George Anderson headed the parade as marshal, accompanied by his wife, Selma. The convertible carrying the Andersons was driven by Bill Erickson.

Main parade winners were the float decorated and entered by the Lutheran parishes, the cub scouts, and the JayCees. The Genesee Jumpers won the prize for the most novel entry.

### GHS Class Of 1925 Reunion Held Community Day

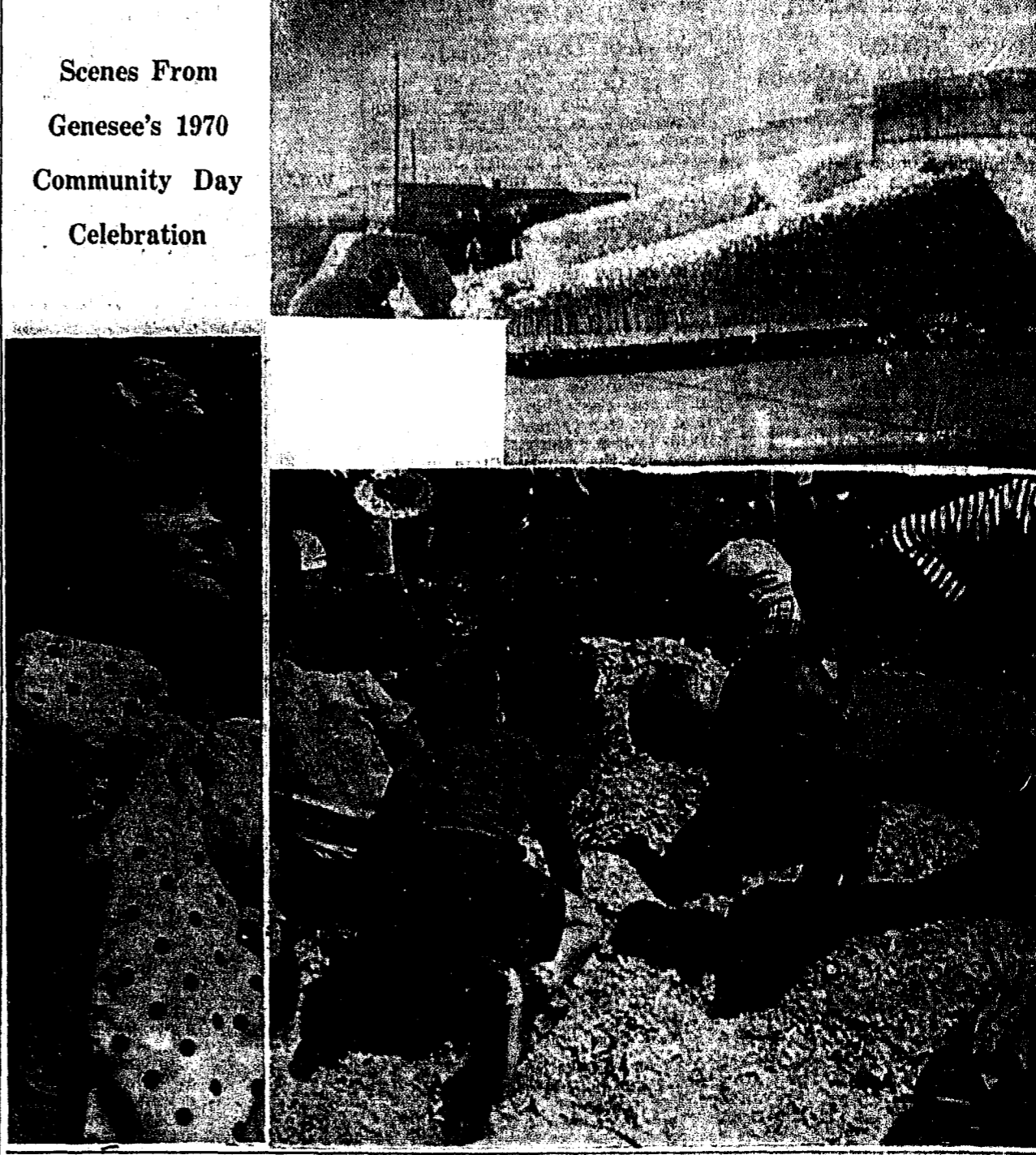

### Home Cookin' ...

For something real "filling" why not prepare some Oven Hash, accompanied by Perfection Salad? With warm weather already here, meals should be prepared and served as simple and with the least fuss possible.

**Easy Perfection Salad**  
Place the contents of two 3-ounce packages of lemon-flavored gelatin in an 8 1/4 x 4 1/2 x 2 1/4-inch loaf dish. Add 2 cups boiling water and stir to dissolve gelatin. Add 1 tablespoon vinegar and 12 to 15 ice cubes; stir constantly till gelatin begins to thicken (about three minutes). Remove any ice cubes that have not melted.

Into the partially set gelatin slip the tops of 6 or 7 small green onions and 1 pimiento. Using scissors, cut through the contents of one 1-pound can (2 cups) sauerkraut. Add sauerkraut to gelatin; stir gently to distribute vegetables. Chill till set, about 4 hours or overnight. Unmold on crisp greens. Garnish with ripe olives and crisp carrot curls.

**Oven Hash**  
1 1/2 cups coarsely ground cooked beef  
1 cup coarsely ground potatoes  
1/2 cup coarsely ground onion  
1 teaspoon salt  
pinch pepper  
2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce  
1/2 cup evaporated milk  
one-third cup slightly crushed corn flakes

1 tbl. butter or margarine, melted  
Mix beef, potatoes, onion, salt, pepper, Worcestershire sauce, and milk. Turn into greased 1-quart casserole. Mix corn flakes and butter and sprinkle over top. Bake in moderate oven 350 degrees 30 min.

### YOUR GAME DEPARTMENT

**Downstream Migration Starts**  
Smolt-sized chinook salmon, propagated from eggs in Idaho hatcheries, are being released from holding ponds to start their long downstream migration to the Pacific Ocean. About 500,000 are fall chinook salmon smolts, propagated at the Ox-bow Fish Hatchery. These will be trucked about 30 miles and released below Hells Canyon directly into the Snake River system. They are from eggs taken at the federal Spring Creek hatchery on the lower Columbia River near Bonneville in the fall of 1969. They are smolts averaging about 100 to the pound.

The Pahsimeroi salmon hatchery has released about 200,000 chinook smolts from the hatchery directly into the Pahsimeroi River, a tributary of the main Salmon River, downstream from Challis. These fish were reared at the Mackay Hatchery for five months, then transferred to the Pahsimeroi salmon facility.

**License Vendors' Seminar**  
About half of the meetings have been held in the current series of seminars for license vendors at Coeur d'Alene, Lewiston, McCall, Boise, Twin Falls, Pocatello, Idaho Falls, and Lewiston. The purpose of the seminars is to review changes in license fees made by the last session of the state legislature. Some of these include non-resident hunting-fishing combination license fee increase from

\$100 to \$135; nonresident game bird license increase from \$25 to \$35; and nonresident deer-only licenses, good this year anywhere in the state from \$25 to \$50. Vendor sales commissions also increased from 5-15 percent, depending on license class. A minimum commission is 15 cents per tag sold, and maximum of \$5 per license sale.

**Clearwater Salmon Progress**  
Salmon restoration on the Clearwater River looks good this year. More than 600 adult spring-run fish were counted at the Lewiston Dam by June 2, with significantly more fish expected during June and July. These are adult salmon returning from eyed egg plants in the Selway River in 1966. Prior to 1927, the Clearwater had natural runs of anadromous salmon, but fishable numbers were eliminated by inadequate fish passage facilities when the Clearwater Dam was built.

Cooperative work the past several years by the Fish and Game Department, U. S. Bureau of Commercial Fisheries, and the Washington Water Power Company, have provided efficient fishways by modifying and replacing original fish ladders. Fish passage also has been provided at Selway Falls.

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
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**VACUUM BOTTLES — HANDLE WITH CARE**

Encouraged by sunshine and cool breezes, Idahoans in increasing numbers are setting forth for camping trips and picnics in the out-of-doors, observes the Idaho Medical Association.

Many will have one or more vacuum bottles along. These flasks are safe enough if handled with tenderness in the nostrils. The flask can become a bomb looking for a time and place to explode.

Never insert metal utensils or wire bottle brushes into vacuum bottles. They can scratch or break the glass

liner. Use plastic utensils.

Do not carry carbonated beverages in vacuum bottles. Pressure can build up inside the bottle as the released carbon dioxide expands.

Do not create temperature extremes by such action as washing the bottle in hot water, and immediately filling it with cold liquid. Don't put ice cubes directly into the bottle; pour the liquid in first, then add the ice.

Do not eat or drink directly from the bottle. There could be broken glass inside.

And, never wash a vacuum bottle in an automatic dishwasher.

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**GLUE SNIFFING**

Glue sniffing may be on its way out, thanks to a new glue currently on the market. The glue is made from a synthetic essence of horse-radish reports the Idaho Medical Association. As an element of glue the horse-radish formula has no odor, but causes potential sniffers considerable discomfort in the form of puffy, watering eyes and an extreme burning effect are temporary and harmless but unpleasant enough to discourage more than the first sniff. For its intended use, the new glue is at least as reliable as the old, and it is not offensive, except to abusers. The developer has made the horse-radish formula available to seven other major manufacturers of models. Of these, six have already made plans to adopt it while the seventh is still conducting evaluation tests.
