Research Shows Value Of Wheat As Feed Grain

BOISE—The value of wheat as a feed grain for cattle and sheep received a boost today when research results were released showing that efficient energy utilization from wheat requires less expensive processing than other feed grains.

The research, supported by grants from the Idaho Wheat Commission and Northrup King Seed Company, was conducted by agricultural science consultant Dr. Kenneth Eng of Casa Grande, Arizona, and researchers from Texas Tech University, Lubbock, Texas.

"A ration ingredient's 'true' price is its price after processing charges have been added," Dr. Eng said in his report to the Wheat Commission. "Grinding or rolling grain costs 25 to 50 cents per ton, while methods like steam flaking or pressure processing cost up to four times that much."

Dr. Eng said sophisticated processing methods had been developed because they increase the energy utilization of feeds like milo, corn and barley. The new research findings, however, reveal that these expensive methods "added" nothing to the efficiency of wheat in digestion trials on test animals.

"Both university and commercial research results have indicated that wheat is a satisfactory feed comparable to other feed grains," Dr. Eng noted. "Furthermore, commercial feedlots in many areas of the country are using increasing quantities of wheat."

Idaho Wheat Commission administrator Harold West said Dr. Eng's research project grew out of recent renewed interest in wheat as a feed grain due to lower wheat prices and higher prices for other feed grains. West predicted even more attention to wheat would be paid by cattle and sheep feeders as a result of Dr. Eng's findings.

Kendrick Firm Burglarized Sunday Night

Burglars, apparently more than one, gained forcible entry into Fleming Truck and Equip. Co. of Kendrick late Sunday night or early Monday morning, and stole a 1961 International pickup truck and approximately \$650 in tools and supplies. The break-in was discovered by Wayne Harris, a co-owner of the local farm equipment firm, as he opened for business Monday morning.

Entry into the building was made by prying open a large rear door in the back shop area, Harris said. From there the burglars went into the office area where they attempted to open a large safe. They managed to pry the combination knob from the safe, but could not open it. Falling into the shop area where they took a cutting torch, batteries, battery charger and various tools. From the used car lot near the building the thieves took a grey, 1961 International pickup truck which they apparently used to haul away a portion of the stolen items.

The pickup truck was found off the road and abandoned Monday morning on Cherry Lane Grade (Hubbard Gulch) by Bruce Sherman, a Juliaetta rural route mailman. The condition of the vehicle is not known at this writing.

Latah County Deputy Sheriff Elton M. Walker of Moscow investigated the burglary. There are apparently no clues as to the identity of the thieves at this time.

ORDINANCE NO. 151

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE ERECTION, CONSTRUCTION, ENLARGEMENT, ALTERATION, REPAIR, MOVING, REMOVAL, CONVERSION, DEMOLITION, OCCUPANCY, EQUIPMENT, USE, HEIGHT, AREA, AND MAINTENANCE OF BUILDINGS OR STRUCTURES IN THE CITY OF JULLAETTA, IDAHO; PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF PERMITS AND COLLECTION OF FEES THEREFORE; DECLARING AND ESTABLISHING FIRE DISTRICT; PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF, AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES AND PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT THEREWITH.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JULLAETTA, LATAH COUNTY, IDAHO:

SECTION 1. ADOPTION OF CODE. That certain document, one copy of which is on file in the office of the Clerk, being marked and designated as "Uniform Building Code, 1970 Edition, Volume 1" and "Uniform Building Code, 1970 Edition, Volume 2, Mechanical", and "Uniform Building Code, 1970 Edition, Volume 3, Uniform Building Code Standards", edited, copyrighted and published by the International Conference of Building Officials, be, except for the amendments, additions, and exceptions and deletions hereinafter set forth: the moving of buildings and the permits required therefore, violations and penalties thereof, building permits, be, and the same is hereby adopted as the building code of the City for the erection, construction, enlargement, alteration, repair, moving, removal, conversion, demolition, occupancy, equipment, use, height, area, and maintenance of buildings and/or structures in the City.

SECTION 2. AMENDMENTS: Section 105 of Uniform Building Code referring to buildings or structures moved, is amended to read as follows:

Buildings or structures moved into or within the City shall comply with the provisions of this code for new buildings or structures. Any person intending to move any building or structure along, over or through any public place within the corporate limits of this municipality shall first make application to and obtain a building permit from the City Clerk. The applicant shall file the application with the City Clerk in writing. The application shall contain accurate statements as to the kind of character of the building, its dimensions, the material out of which it is constructed, the legal description of the premises upon which it is to be moved, a description of route over which it is proposed to be moved, and a description of the means to be employed in moving such building or structure.

Before the moving permit is granted the applicant shall deliver to the City of Two Thousand Dollar (\$2,000.00) cash or surety bond, to save and protect the City against any loss or damage it may sustain arising out of or incident to the moving of the building or structure.

When the applicant has secured a moving permit, he shall give to all public service corporations owning or operating public utilities along or across any of the streets included in the application permit, written notice of the time when the work and moving is to be commenced. Said notice shall be served at least twenty-four (24) hours before the proposed time of commencing the moving.

Upon receipt of such notice it shall be the duty of such public service corporation to move, rise or otherwise dispose of its wires or other instrumentalities in such time and manner as will not cause delay to the holder of the permit, all of which shall be done at the expense of the applicant.

Before any building is moved over or on any public street, the police department shall be notified and they shall direct the moving at a time and route designated by the department. Any building moved into a neighborhood shall have a final appraised evaluation of not less than the average appraised evaluation of the surrounding buildings.

BUILDING PERMIT FEES Section 303 of said Uniform Building Code, referring to building permit fees and plan checking fees, is hereby amended to read as follows:

A fee for each building shall be paid to the Clerk as follows:

New Construction 5.00
Remodeling of any existing structure 1.00

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and first publication thereof.

property owners upon whose premises water is consumed by the owners, by tenants or otherwise, must have a water meter to be furnished by the municipality at the expense of the property owner, installed in, at, and upon the respective premises, and all municipal water used therein or upon said premises shall pass through and be measured by said water meter. In the event that any property owner shall refuse to allow such meter to be installed or refuse to pay for the same, or refuse to pay for the metered water used, it shall be the duty of the Water Commissioner to forthwith discontinue the water from the premises of such property owner or the property.

SECTION 2. CHARGES AGAINST PROPERTY OWNER. When a meter has been installed, water will not thereafter be supplied to the premises of such property or property owner, except upon metered water rates to be paid by the property owner or tenant for all water used upon said premises, whether by himself, tenant or otherwise. The property owner shall be responsible for all charges incurred, whether by himself, tenant or otherwise, for the installation of water meters and the charge of water consumed upon the premises, whether by himself, tenant or otherwise.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and first publication thereof.

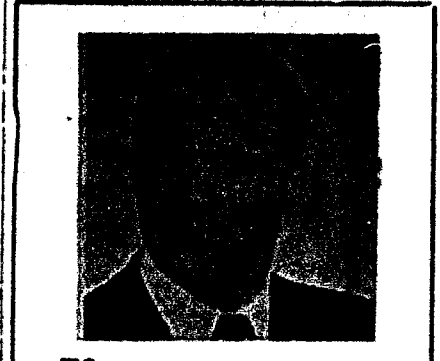

YOUR GAME DEPARTMENT
By John R. Woodworth, director Idaho Fish and Game department Drawing Applications Ready

Applications for public drawings to obtain controlled hunt permits are available from license vendors and regional and headquarters offices of the Idaho Fish and Game Department. Also available are regulations and maps for controlled hunts on moose, antelope, mountain goats, big horn sheep, elk and deer. Applications for controlled hunts must be received in Boise not later than July 15, or postmarked by midnight of the same day. Drawings will be in Boise July 22, at 2 p. m., and where necessary, August 12, at 2 p. m. Both drawings will be at the state headquarters office of Fish and Game Department, and the public is invited.

Chinook Check Stations
Chinook salmon check stations will be operated in strategic places as soon as high, muddy runoff waters subside. A better-than-average run of spring chinook is in the Salmon River drainage but fishing is unproductive now because of water conditions. The checking stations will be located on the new Stanley, Lowman road near Cape Horn Creek; Frenchman Creek above Stanley on the way to Sun Valley; and on the way to Challis going north, just before the Trail Creek Junction. These checking stations will be operated every Saturday and Sunday during the season, plus three week days, but not necessarily the same days each week.

DESPITE the relatively small amount of water in the atmosphere at any given time (about 3,100 cubic miles), land areas receive large amounts of precipitation because atmospheric vapor is being continually renewed by evaporation, reports the U. S. Geological Survey. On the average, a given molecule of water remains in the atmosphere as vapor only about 8 to 10 days.

Poor Weather Drops Employment Chances

Poorer weather during the week just concluding reduced the number of jobs filled by the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment, according to a report made by Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager. Hartstein said that his office placed only 11 workers during the week compared with the 22 sent out successfully on jobs during the previous week. A year ago 23 local workers found work with the help of the Moscow Employment office. Forty-two jobs remained unfilled in Moscow, and included opportunities for secretaries, stenographers, and bookkeepers as well as cafe and domestic workers. Men could find work as insurance salesmen, a plumber, a creamery operator, a farmhand, and part time janitor, and a part time bartender.

The number of persons currently receiving unemployment insurance dipped sharply from the previous week. The current total is now 152 compared with 193 a week ago. Many of those persons who discontinued their claims had returned to employment during the past couple of weeks, while others just returned during this current week. Woods workers and construction workers were among those who discontinued filing claims for jobless pay. Most of the decline was in the Moscow area where the figure fell from 97 to 81 over the week, and in the Troy-Deary-Bovill area where the drop was from 62 to 46. A year ago there were 58 idled workers throughout the county seeking unemployment insurance benefits.

Hartstein indicated that his office continues to receive numerous applications for work from college and high school students, and that very few jobs or opportunities exist for them. He also noted that there were more young workers coming

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INTERNATIONAL PROGRAM BRINGS BETTER HABITAT

A program as modern as today—especially when highlighted by mass protests against pollution and the universal cry for a better place to live—is now 33 years old and still working for a better environment for man and wildlife. During those three decades, more than 900 projects have been built by Ducks Unlimited on lands made available by Canadian landholders. The work has kept 1,600,000 acres of wetlands in their natural state, according to the Idaho Fish and Game Department.

"While funds to build these havens, from Pacific to the Atlantic oceans, come chiefly from United States' sportsmen, many other sources are noteworthy. These include conservationists, Canadian landowners, small and large farmers, ranchers, governments, (both provincial and

federal)," according to Al Norberg, state bird supervisor.

"Many prairie farmers give up much each year to allow waterfowl to hatch and grow up on their productive lands," he added. "They understand that wildlife is part of their heritage and that quality land available for wildlife is dwindling. They, along with their sportsmen competitors, are concerned and doing something about it."

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
