## Heavy Winds Buffet Area But Heat Wave Still Holds

Stifling, moist heat still prevailed over most of the region Wednesday morning despite the severe wind storm that rocked the area Tuesday evening. Temperatures have held near the 100 degree mark Tuesday and give every indication of continuing in the same pattern Wednesday.

The heat wave followed on the heels of a wet early part of June when over 1 1/2 inches of moisture fell in a one-week period. In one 24-hour period .64 inches of moisture fell.

When the skies cleared the temperatures climbed and stayed hot since then. Tuesday afternoon the skies clouded up and the wind began increasing in velocity. Geneese was rocked by winds exceeding forty miles per hour and the force of the blow caused a power outage of two hours; from 9 p. m. to 11:00 p. m. The power failed momentarily twice in the Kendrick-Juliaetta area but did not stay off. There were some slight sprinkles of rain in Kendrick Tuesday night but they did not last.

Applications for "new farm" wheat allotments may be filed at the Latah Co. Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office until July 1, 1970.

Clarence A. Jensen, chairman of the Latah Co. ASC committee reported that farmers who want to be considered for such allotments should get in touch with their ASCS office during June for full details.

In general, a producer eligible to file an application for a "new farm" allotment for the 1971 winter wheat crop must meet the following qualifications:

1. Own or operate the farm for which a wheat allotment is requested.

2. Have no interest in a wheat allotment on any other farm.

3. Have available land and adequate equipment and facilities for the successful production of a wheat crop on the farm.

4. Have at least 2 years experience during the last five years in producing wheat.

5. Expect to receive more than 50% of his current year's income from the production on the farm he operates.

Other factors also are involved, and the ASC committee chairman suggests that interested producers discuss the details with the ASCS county office officials.

### FOOD SCIENTISTS at Louisiana State University report initial success in experiments with food capsules for the feeding of shrimp and crawfish. Scientists are giving special attention to the nutritional requirements of invertebrates, particularly red swamp crawfish. Experiments with a food pellet and a food capsule have caused considerable excitement among the scientists. A fish protein concentrate and single-cell protein were found to result in significant weight increases in both crawfish and shrimp.

Place in hot oven (400d) with shallow pan of water in bottom of oven, until crusty and brown. About 45 minutes.

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**Lasagne**

1/4 lb. lasagne  
2 T butter  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
1/2 lb. ground beef  
1/2 cup (6-oz. can) tomato paste  
2 cups tomato sauce  
2 cloves garlic, minced  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
1 teaspoon Italian seasoning  
1/2 lb. cottage cheese  
1/2 lb. Mozzarella cheese  
1/4 cup Parmesan cheese  
2 eggs  
Cook lasagne in four quarts boiling water until tender, stir occasionally, then drain and cool. While lasagne is cooking, melt butter in large skillet. Add onion and cook gently for 5 minutes. Add ground beef and cook until completely cooked. Stir in tomato paste, sauce, salt and pepper, Italian seasoning. Cook for about 15 minutes. Beat eggs

and add to cottage cheese. Grease a 10x12" baking dish and make layers of meat sauce, lasagne, cottage and Mozzarella cheese. Top with Parmesan cheese. Bake 30 minutes at 350d.

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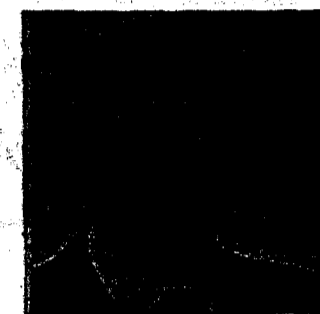

**Red Devil's Food Cake**

Cream together until very light:  
2 cups sugar  
3/4 cup shortening  
Add, one at a time and beat in well:  
2 eggs  
Sift Together:  
3 cups cake flour  
1/4 tsp. salt; 1/4 cup cocoa  
Add dry ingredients alternately with:  
1 cup buttermilk  
Beat until smooth.

Dissolve, then add to batter: 2 tsp. soda in 1 cup boiling water.  
Mix until well blended. Bake in three large, layer pans or a large loaf pan in a moderate oven (350d) about 40 minutes for layers, and 1 hour for a loaf.

Note: This cake batter is quite thin. It makes a large, moist, delicious cake. Island Spareribs

3 lbs. lean, country style spareribs  
3T brown sugar  
3T cornstarch  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 9-ounce can crushed pineapple  
1/4 cup vinegar  
1 T soy sauce

Cut ribs in serving pieces. Combine sugar, cornstarch, and salt and stir in vinegar, catsup, crushed pineapple and juice, and soy sauce. Cook until slightly thickened, about 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Arrange layers of spareribs in roasting pan. Cover with half the pineapple mixture. Add second layer of ribs and top with rest of sauce.

**DEPT. OF UNEMPLOYMENT**

At the close of the week, Frank J. Hartstein, manager of the Moscow office of the State Department of Employment, reported that there had been a slight rise in the number of persons claiming unemployment insurance benefits through the Moscow office. The number rose from 158 last week to 168 this week — compared to the 53 persons claiming benefits this time last year. Eighty-four continued to claim benefits in the Moscow area compared to 81 last week and 58 one year ago. In the Genesee area five persons claimed benefits. Three persons claimed benefits in the Elk River area and 3 in the Kendrick area. Potlatch area claimants numbered 22, the same as one week ago and the Troy-Deary-Bovill area had a rise in claimants from 46 last week to 51 this week. During the week ending June 20, 26 new claims were filed compared to 15 the previous week and 17 one year ago. The increase in the number of persons claiming benefits was partially the result of rainy weather and the seasonal lay-offs due to the closure of the area schools and colleges.

Hartstein reported that 11 persons were placed on jobs during the week; the same number as last week. At the close of the week there were 25 job openings available. Five new jobs were received during the week. Jobs available include babysitters, day workers, housekeepers, barmaid, cooks, parttime bookkeeper, and clerk-typist. Also listed with the Department of Employment at the end of the week were openings for farmhands, fallers, insurance salesmen, T. V. repairman, part-time bartender, and various odd jobs.

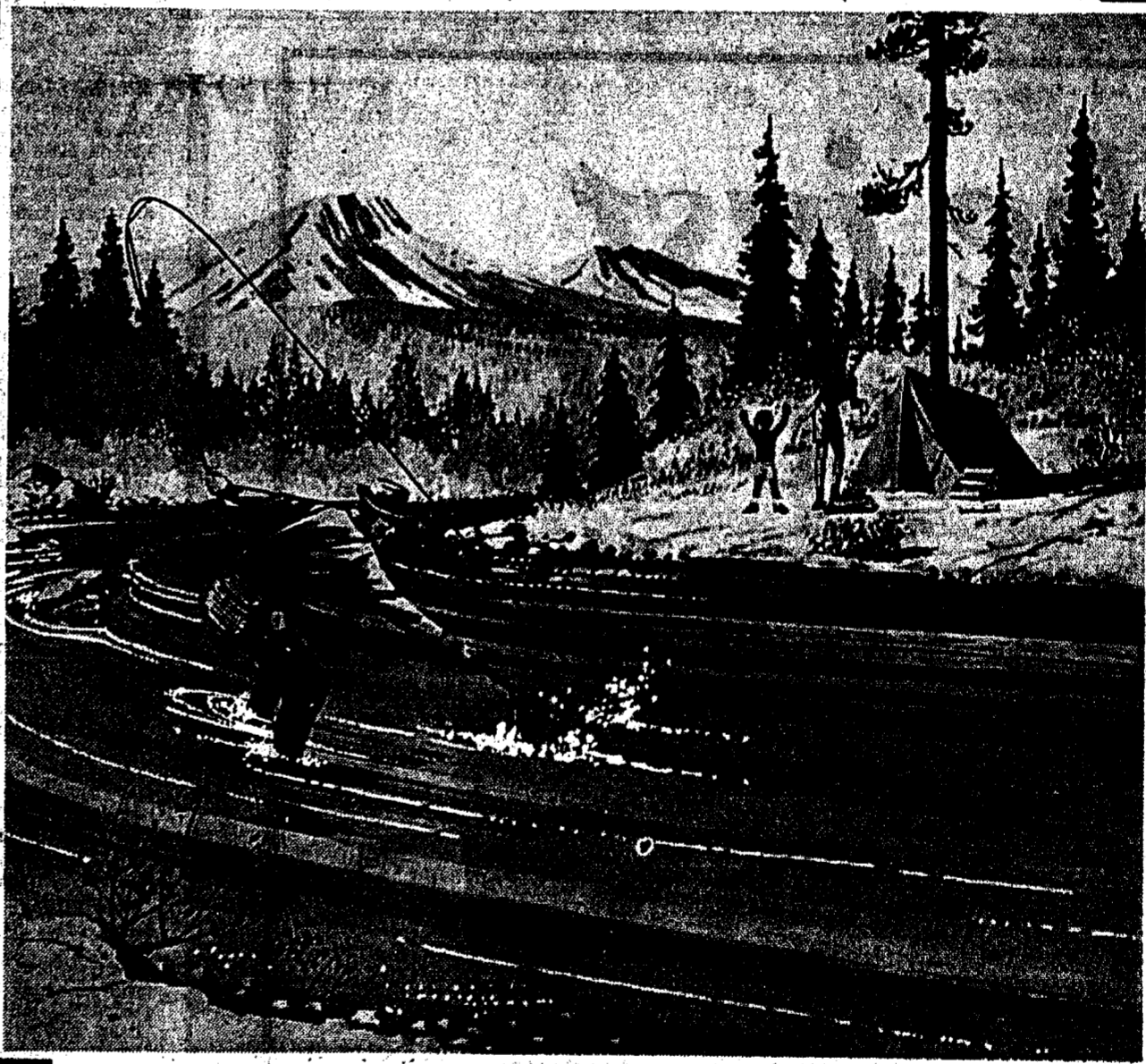

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### FOREST SERVICE GETS AID IN FUND REQUEST

The Idaho Game and Fish Department is making a plea for help in obtaining special funding from congress for a five-year program of stream rehabilitation work proposed by the U. S. Forest Service on the South Fork of the Salmon River.

Director John R. Woodworth disclosed that letters outlining the estimated \$5 million project have been mailed to the state's congressional delegation. Goals proposed by the Forest Service would help restore an adequate summer run of chinook salmon in the South Fork.

About 31 percent of Idaho's chinook salmon harvest between 1960-1964 was caught in this drainage. The catch has declined from a high of 4,000 chinook in 1960 to zero (elimination of the sports fishing season) in 1965. The exception was a limited fishery in 1968, which took only 91 salmon. Fishing pressure dropped from 12,500 angler days in 1962 to zero during the present closed season. In addition, about 5 percent of the state's steelhead harvest and 10-15 percent of the steelhead fishing occurred on the South Fork of the Salmon River.

The steelhead resource has been adversely affected by deteriorating river conditions with fishing effort and catch severely declining since 1965. The South Fork historically contained a good resident trout fishery which has disappeared since the resting pools and food production areas have been filled with sediment.

Based on Forest Service surveys, Woodworth says that the loss of the fishery resource has been due primarily to logging and associated road building in a watershed composed of unusually unstable granitic soils.

A Forest Service statement said that, if approved, the work will help restore and maintain a resource of national significance. The program is designed to reduce sedimentation rates and to remove accumulated sediments from the river to the point that the South Fork once again will be capable of naturally "cleansing" itself and regaining conditions favorable for aquatic life.

"Each year the South Fork goes on

without stream improvement measures being taken," Woodworth averred, "salmon runs will continue to decline below today's already dangerous levels."

Woodworth added that as much as 30 percent of the salmon redd count annually in major spring and summer chinook spawning streams formerly were found in the South Fork, which is entirely a summer-run fishery. At one time, it was the most important stream for summer chinook salmon in the entire Columbia River system. Its value is shared by Oregon and Washington, since both sport and commercial anglers from these states harvest some fish which were hatched in the South Fork of the Salmon and tributaries.

He said a petition containing over 300 names and asking him to establish a salmon fishing season on the South Fork for 1970 was received recently. However, the position of the Fish and Game Commission is that any salmon fishing season on the Salmon River prior to the rehabilitation of the watershed would severely endanger the remaining stock of fish that must sustain this run of salmon until the South Fork once more is suitable for good fish production.
