Physical examination forms have been sent home with the students and are also available at the doctor's offices.

It is urged that physical examinations be obtained early in the summer to avoid the last minute rush.

On each Sunday night at seven o'clock there will be a MYF meeting at the parsonage for all Junior and Senior high young people.


John and Sharon Hunsberger will be the counselors for both groups. John is the church student pastor.

### Nelson Hubb Stedman Passes In Moscow

Nelson Hubb Stedman, 93, a Kendrick resident since 1951, died suddenly of a heart attack at Paradise Villa Nursing Home, Moscow, on Sunday, June 28, 1970. He had been a patient at the home for only the last few months.



Mr. Stedman was born April 2, 1877, to Dave and Pauline Stedman, at Shiloh, Ronald Township, Michigan. He was united in marriage to Margaret Harriet Jones, Sept. 5, 1897, by the Rev. Dobson of Palo, Michigan. Last September they celebrated their 72nd wedding anniversary at the Paradise Villa Home, where she has been a patient for some time.

The Stedmans came west in 1903, settling first in Aberdeen, Wn., though returned to Palo, Mich. after two years. They again returned to Washington living at Elma and in 1910 moved to Cosmopolis, Wn.

There he operated the North River Stage Line until his retirement in 1940. They moved to Kendrick in 1951 to make their home near their son and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Stedman.

Survivors are his wife of almost 73 years, at Paradise Villa Nursing Home; his son, Fred of Kendrick; a granddaughter, Mrs. Jeffrey (Barbara) Comyn of Seattle, a grandson, Rev. Samuel H. Stedman of Sweetwater, Idaho and ten great grandchildren and one sister, Mrs. Maude Sayles of Los Angeles, Calif.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. on Wednesday, July 1, at the Kendrick Assembly of God Church, Rev. James Pearson of Post Falls, a former pastor of the church will officiate.

Interment will be in the Kendrick Cemetery.

The family suggests that memorials may be made to the Memorial Fund of the Assembly of God Church.

**A REVIEW OF HIGHWAY DEPT. SAFETY PROGRAMS**  
Accident Surveillance and Safety Improvement Program: A mile-posting system covering the Idaho state highway system was installed in 1963. Accidents on the state system are located by milepost, and 35 items are coded for the computer programs for each accident. These items concern where, when, accident details, investigation, site conditions and action of vehicles. Several computer programs are utilized to present information for corrective action. An important feature of the Highway Department's computer program is the ability to carry before and after improvement accident information and include it in the printout. The Department is now working on a 10.5 million dollar program to correct hazardous locations pinpointed by the accident analysis programs. The mileposting system was extended to cover the local Federal-aid secondary road system in 1968 so that accident information on county Federal-aid secondary roads can be made available to cities willing to pay the nominal cost of the data processing.

Design Standards: On major roads, design standards have been upgraded to provide for 6:1 fore-slopes, breakaway sign posts and light pole bases, buried end treatment for guardrail protection for larger posts. A program has been initiated to replace hazardous overhead gore-mounted interstate signs with sign bridges.

Highway Striping: A yellow barrier line is now being placed to indicate restricted sign distance on horizontal curves. Edge striping has been used effectively in many hazardous locations.

Fatal Accident Investigation: Each fatal accident on the State Highway System is investigated by the District Traffic Engineer. If evidence indicates that highway conditions contributed to the accident, a full report is made with recommendation for corrective action.

Accident Reporting: The Highway Department's Traffic Section has prepared and distributed to all law enforcement officers a manual on accident reporting.

Railway Grade Crossing Study: Hazard index ratings of all grade crossings on the state system are being re-evaluated. A total of 4 million dollars was spent in Idaho for crossing signals and railroad overpasses from 1962-67. There are 157 crossings on the state system. Eighty-three of these are protected by crossing signals.

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### PEOPLE ARE FOR HIGHWAYS

Boise—While some people take highways for granted, there just isn't any substitute for America's great system of paved roads.

Our road builders have created, and continue to produce, the most effective means known for moving goods and people from one place to another. Roads connect front door with market. They reach to the recreational wonders of our country, bringing mountain, seashore and lakeside within an easy two-day drive for every motorist.

Roads sustain the existence and promote the growth of our greatest industries—steel, rubber, oil, and of course, automobile. How acute would be our plight if one day 101 million registered motor vehicles had to brake to a permanent standstill because there were no more paved roads left to run on. How desperate would be the shape of our economy and our employment picture if suddenly the great highway market place and market maker for the products of our giant corporations ceased functioning.

A far-fetched thought? Perhaps. But it points up the need to keep on building and improving our road system, or just such a situation inevitably will develop. Consider that the four million added vehicles that moved onto our roads in 1968 would clog a two-line highway 8,000 miles long—a third of the way around the world. Consider, too, that we have been adding each year since 1946 about three million vehicles to the total of the year before. One wonders why anyone advises curtailment of road building in this country.

But some people do advocate such curtailment. They're in the minority.

**MOUNTAIN GOAT TRAPPING**

Trapping and transplanting of mountain goats is underway again on Snow Peak and Black Mountain in the Clearwater River drainage. This work has been going on for several years. Transplants have been made to Lake Pend Oreille, Echo Bay and Green Monarchs, Dome Hill east of Grangeville, and Palisades Creek northwest of Swan Valley in Bonneville County.

An additional five goats, two males and three females, were sent to Colorado in exchange for 30 turkeys. Since 1962, 17 mountain goats have been re-sold in the Seven Devils Mountains and these have multiplied and otherwise established themselves. This fall the first controlled hunt (No. 618) will be held in the region, with 5 permits.

**Catch Mostly Steelhead**

Juvenile steelhead make up 65-70 percent of the fish caught on the North Fork of the Clearwater River from Isabella Creek upstream to Kelly Creek. This is part of a fishing success study of these waters to learn what effects the reservoir will have on the fishing and the type of fishing in the river. It will run through 1974. Sampling on some streams already has shown a decrease in steelhead young which would have been produced if the adults had been allowed past the dam last year.

**Catch-Release Fishing**

Anglers are reminded that Kelly Creek and its tributaries on the North Fork of the Clearwater River are limited to a "catch and release" program. Fishing with any type of baited hook is unlawful, and it is illegal to reduce any fish to possession.

#### ARTIFICIAL GENE CREATED IN LAB

THE FIRST TOTAL SYNTHESIS of a gene—the basis hereditary unit—has been accomplished by a University of Wisconsin biologist and his colleagues. The achievement—long awaited by molecular biologists—will now make it possible for organic chemists to synthesize the basic genetic material from simple organic chemicals.

RATS have been taught to become heavy drinkers by a team of Loma Linda University nutritionists. They put the rats on a "teenage diet"—one high in sugar and carbohydrates and low in vitamins, minerals and protein. It included: doughnuts and coffee for breakfast; sweet rolls and coffee for breaks; hot dogs, soft drinks, apple pie and coffee for lunch; spaghetti and meat balls, French bread, green beans, salad, chocolate cake and coffee for dinner, and candy bars, cookies and coffee for snacks. The researchers think the craving for alcohol came from a chemical imbalance created by the inadequate diet.

TALK is common today about \$100-a-day hospital charges within a short time. But relief may be in sight, says a medical expert at Chemetron Corporation, Chicago. "Labor-saving equipment that permits hospitals to use their staffs more efficiently and to improve care at the same time offers hope not of reversing the upward curve of costs, but of slowing it," he said.

SOUND has been heard from points in space from which scientists thought no sound could come. Columbia University astronomers report. They disclosed that to their "great surprise" their instruments on Bermuda heard the sound of the Apollo 12 and 13 rockets passing overhead more than 100 miles above the earth.

ONE of the most accurate measurements in science history has been made by two University of Michigan researchers. They report measuring the "g-factor" of electron to within 7 parts in a billion. Their determination of this basic constant is the world's most accurate to date. Electrons are among the tiniest of charged atomic particles. As they spin they produce a small magnetic field. An electron's g-factor is the ratio of its magnetic strength to its spin. This ratio is the same for all electrons in the universe. Finding it experimentally offers a key test of quantum electrodynamics theory, upon which much of modern physics is structured.

### IDAHO DEPT. OF EMPLOYMENT

Work opportunities increased slightly during the past week in the Moscow area according to Frank J. Hartstein, manager of the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment. Hartstein reported that his office received 18 new job listings during the week compared with only 5 new job requests during the previous week. Most of the increase was due to the start of haying operations throughout the area, he said, and a few of these jobs will not start until next week. At the end of the week there were a total of 24 jobs still open, compared with 25 last Friday, and 35 at the end of the same week a year ago. Fourteen work-ers were placed on jobs during the week, a slight increase from the previous week's 11, but down from last year's 27 job placements. Still needed in the area are bookkeepers, secretaries, domestic and cafe workers, as well as farm workers, fallers, salesmen and a TV repairman.

Hartstein's report indicated that a total of 22 workers filed new claims for unemployment insurance during the week. He said that some of those filing were connected with the area's university, some as students and some as workers. Others who filed new claims were woods workers and construction workers. Thirty-two workers discontinued their claims for benefits, most of whom returned to work. Some exhausted their benefits while others were made ineligible for various reasons. At the end of the week there were 158 workers still seeking jobless pay. A year ago the total was only 74.

Hartstein said that his office still has a large number of young workers, both high school and college students seeking summer work. He urged employers to list any jobs that could be done by youth with his office.





#### ARTIFICIAL GENE CREATED IN LAB

THE FIRST TOTAL SYNTHESIS of a gene—the basis hereditary unit—has been accomplished by a University of Wisconsin biologist and his colleagues. The achievement—long awaited by molecular biologists—will now make it possible for organic chemists to synthesize the basic genetic material from simple organic chemicals.

RATS have been taught to become heavy drinkers by a team of Loma Linda University nutritionists. They put the rats on a "teenage diet"—one high in sugar and carbohydrates and low in vitamins, minerals and protein. It included: doughnuts and coffee for breakfast; sweet rolls and coffee for breaks; hot dogs, soft drinks, apple pie and coffee for lunch; spaghetti and meat balls, French bread, green beans, salad, chocolate cake and coffee for dinner, and candy bars, cookies and coffee for snacks. The researchers think the craving for alcohol came from a chemical imbalance created by the inadequate diet.

TALK is common today about \$100-a-day hospital charges within a short time. But relief may be in sight, says a medical expert at Chemetron Corporation, Chicago. "Labor-saving equipment that permits hospitals to use their staffs more efficiently and to improve care at the same time offers hope not of reversing the upward curve of costs, but of slowing it," he said.

SOUND has been heard from points in space from which scientists thought no sound could come, Columbia University astronomers report. They disclosed that to their "great surprise" their instruments on Bermuda heard the sound of the Apollo 12 and 13 rockets passing overhead more than 100 miles above the earth.

ONE of the most accurate measurements in science history has been made by two University of Michigan researchers. They report measuring the "g-factor" of electron to within 7 parts in a billion. Their determination of this basic constant is the world's most accurate to date. Electrons are among the tiniest of charged atomic particles. As they spin they produce a small magnetic field. An electron's g-factor is the ratio of its magnetic strength to its spin. This ratio is the same for all electrons in the universe. Finding it experimentally offers a key test of quantum electrodynamic theory, upon which much of modern physics is structured.

### IDAHO DEPT. OF EMPLOYMENT

Work opportunities increased slightly during the past week in the Moscow area according to Frank J. Hartstein, manager of the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment. Hartstein reported that his office received 18 new job listings during the week compared with only 5 new job requests during the previous week. Most of the increase was due to the start of haying operations throughout the area, he said, and a few of these jobs will not start until next week. At the end of the week there were a total of 24 jobs still open, compared with 25 last Friday, and 35 at the end of the same week a year ago. Fourteen workers were placed on jobs during the week, a slight increase from the previous week's 11, but down from last year's 27 job placements. Still needed in the area are bookkeepers, secretaries, domestic and cafe workers, as well as farm workers, fallers, salesmen and a TV repairman.

Hartstein's report indicated that a total of 22 workers filed new claims for unemployment insurance during the week. He said that some of those filing were connected with the area's university, some as students and some as workers. Others who filed new claims were woods workers and construction workers. Thirty-two workers discontinued their claims for benefits, most of whom returned to work. Some exhausted their benefits while others were made ineligible for various reasons. At the end of the week there were 158 workers still seeking jobless pay. A year ago the total was only 74.

Hartstein said that his office still has a large number of young workers, both high school and college students seeking summer work. He urged employers to list any jobs that could be done by youth with his office.

**SUMMER IS EASY TIME TO BEGIN HEART-HELPING DIET**

Summertime, where the livin' is easy, should be the best time to begin new eating habits, that may reduce the risk of heart attack, suggests the Idaho Heart Association.

The abundance of fresh fruits and vegetables and the tendency to eat more salads in place of heavier foods, make it easier to begin such a diet now for the whole family. If the homemaker can extend it to a year-round habit it can help adult hearts and provide protection for children in later years.

The typical American diet, high in saturated fat and cholesterol, contributes to hardening of the arteries, an important factor in heart attack and stroke. Factors implicated in artery disease must be present over long periods of time before this condition becomes evident. There are no symptoms. Then, suddenly, a heart attack may occur. So, the earlier a heart-helping diet is adopted the better.

To help reduce the risk of heart attack, the Idaho Heart Association recommends a diet that uses less saturated fats and more polyunsaturated fats; more meals of fish and poultry and less beef, pork and ham; margarine instead of butter and skimmed milk in place of whole milk.

Other diet tips include serving lean cuts of meat, trimming off the fat and limiting egg yolks to three a week. When cooking, use vegetable oils instead of butter and lard.

When dessert time rolls around, think in terms of sherberts or ices instead of ice cream. This is the season for fresh watermelon and cantaloupe.

**HELP TO FARMERS NOW GETS PLACES TO HUNT**

"When the shooting is all over, too many hunters forget the little things that make big differences next fall when new seasons beckon. Things will go better if sportsmen remember the farmers who were generous enough to allow hunting privileges on their lands."

John R. Woodworth, director of Idaho Fish and Game Department, says that farmers are remembered—but not too often it's just a few days before the season begins.

"Wouldn't it be a whole lot wiser and fairer to drop around now, and during the summer, with a mess of cleaned fish, a gallon of ice cream, or other remembrances," he opines.

Remember the dogs that worked themselves sore-footed, bone-weary and dog tired to the point of exhaustion because nobody had time to get them in condition ahead of the hunting season. Well, take time to get them out weekly romps afield, around the house, play retriever games, with sticks, or a sock filled with bird feathers. Let them know who's boss, and friend, and it will carry over with noticeable effect, come fall.

It may be a man's world but it's certainly not that way in the water. Statistics show that nearly 85 per cent of all drowning victims are male.

Your buddy is your best friend, especially when you need assistance in the water. When the subject is swimming safety, always think in terms of two's, says safety experts.

Know where your children swim. New and unfamiliar spots may be a big challenge to them but they could also be very dangerous.

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**SPECIES SURVIVAL BASED ON BIG YEARLY INCREASE**

What happens when a pair of field mice and their offspring are left to breed unchecked for two years? Enough mice will be produced to spread head-to-tail from New York to Los Angeles and back, that's what. The surplus will reach 25 times around the earth and 100 trips to the moon, with enough mice left over to scare all the women in Idaho, and feed all the cats and their offspring for one year. There are many checks that prevent this from ever happening.

The Idaho Fish and Game Department says that this simple biological fact of life is the first principle in wildlife management, overstocking occurs year after year whenever animals or birds are living in good habitat.

Usually all good range and some of the poorer living space in the broad vicinity of the breeding stock becomes temporarily overpopulated.

Whenever there is food and cover for a certain number of any species, the number, and then some, generally is there by the end of the summer. That is Nature's way of insuring continuity.

But the surplus quickly is weeded out, making it hard to understand that such enormous breeding potential exists. Only when a species such as a rabbit is placed in a favorable habitat such as Australia which was previously unoccupied by that animal, can the full extent of the reproductive force be realized.
