Salmon Permit Cards

Chinook anglers are reminded that they must have in possession a valid 1970 anadromous salmon permit card when fishing for this species. Fishermen must record the month, date and place where all catches are made immediately after landing fish. Bona fide residents of Idaho who are expressly exempted from license requirements (those under age 14 or above 70) may optionally purchase and use salmon permits as any individual, or he may take anadromous salmon if accompanied by a properly licensed holder with a permit and includes any salmon he takes with their bag and possession limits.

Nonresident boys and girls who have not reached their 14th birthday are required to fish with licensed fishermen, unless they want to buy a season non-resident fish license and salmon permit. Anadromous salmon catches must be recorded on the permit cards of licensed fishermen and included in their bag and possession limits. Trout and other game fish are counted as part of the bag limit of the licensed fishermen.

IDAHO DEPT. OF EMPLOYMENT

Weather, a short work week, and the anticipation of the holiday joined forces and resulted in a curtailment of employment activities in the Moscow area, Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager for the Idaho Dept. of Employment said that his office placed only 7 workers on jobs during the past week. During the previous week, 14 workers found jobs through the efforts of his office, he said. Although haying operations began during the latter part of the previous week, the week-end rain slowed this activity down, and few calls were received for haying hands during the week. At the end of the week there were 26 jobs still open, but most called for special skills or training, or were for workers who are just not available at this time.

Workers continue to seek unemployment insurance in larger numbers than during the previous year. At the end of the week there were a total of 166 idled workers throughout the county seeking jobless pay. A year ago there were only 91. Construction workers and woods workers make up the largest percentage of those seeking benefits. Hartstein said: He added that a number of college students and employees are also seeking benefits at this time. In the immediate Moscow area there are now 92 workers receiving checks and a week ago there were 83 and a year ago only 52. In the Troy-Deary-Bowll area the current total is 45, last week 44 and last year only 17. 22 checks are going into the Potlatch area, compared with 28 last week and 14 a year ago.

Hartstein's report indicated that a large number of college age and high school age young people continue to seek work for the summer. Many of these young people, particularly of college age, must find work in order to return to school in the fall. Most of the high school students will find it difficult to continue also, if they are unable to find work this summer.

QUARTERLY REPORT ON HIGHWAY PROGRAM

Boise—Over 29,000 miles of the 42,500 mile National System of Interstate and Defense Highways are now open to traffic and construction is underway on another 4,850 miles according to the Idaho Department of Highways.
 Information as of March 31, 1970, showed that 70 percent of the 42,500 mile system is now open to traffic. Only 4% has not been advanced beyond the preliminary status.

The total mileage in use by passenger and commercial vehicles rose from 27,975 a year ago and 29,638 as of December 31, 1969, the date of the last survey, to 29,906 as of March 31. Thus mileage open to traffic was increased by 1,931 miles during the past 12 months, including 268 miles in the quarter ending March 31.
 The "Big Highway Story" in Idaho right now is the outstanding progress the State is making on its share of the Interstate Highway System. As of the first of June, 440 miles (70 percent) of Idaho's 612 miles of Interstate mileage is open to traffic.


It has been determined that one life is saved each year for every five miles of highway built to Interstate standards.
 The Interstate Highway System is principally financed with money from the Federal Highway Trust Fund matched with State funds. In Idaho, the matching ratio is 92 percent Federal and eight percent State.

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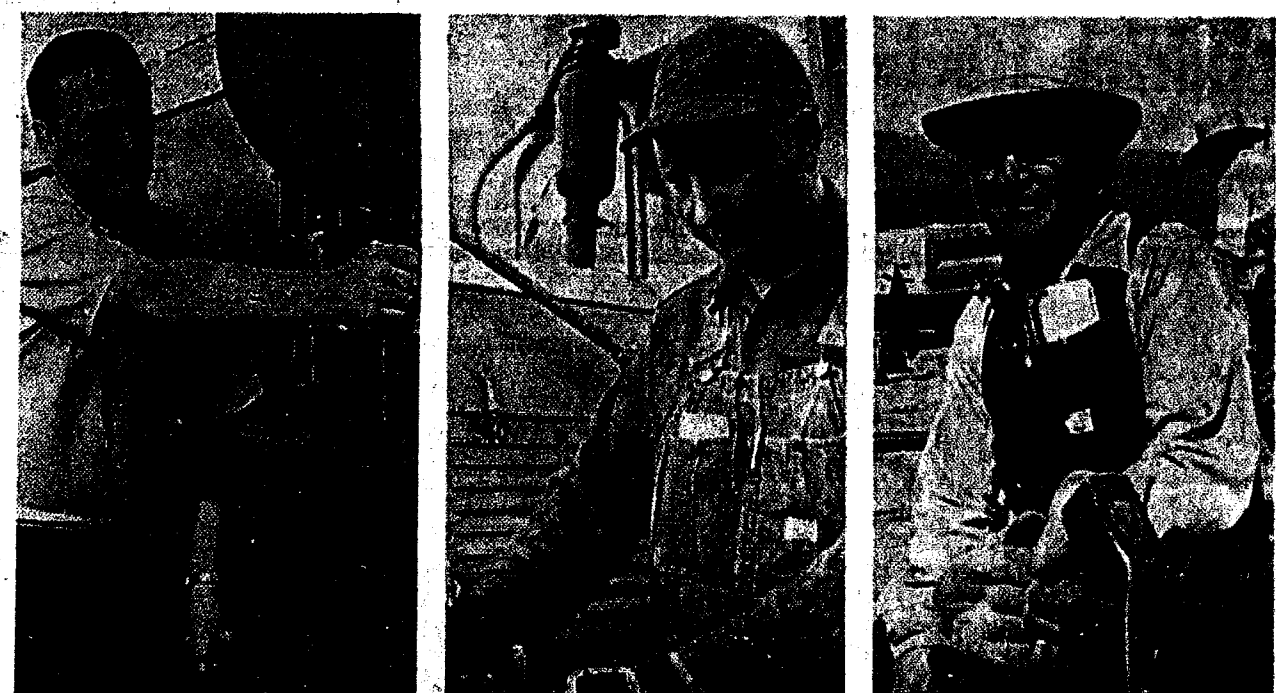
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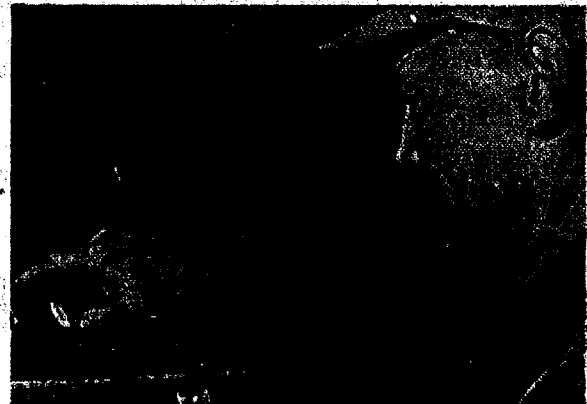

IDAHO FISH LOSS SERIOUS AT SNAKE RIVER DAMS

Recent studies by Wes Ebel, Fisheries Biologist U. S. Bureau of Commercial Fisheries, at Pasco, Washington have shown serious losses of Idaho's downstream migrant salmon and steelhead smolts because of nitrogen supersaturation caused by dams. Preliminary findings indicate an estimated 30-40 per cent of the smolts released from Dworshak fish hatchery were lost by the time they reached Ice Harbor Dam because of nitrogen gas bubble disease. Ebel estimated about 2,367,000 steelhead smolts have been exposed to nitrogen gas bubble disease on the Snake River this spring.

The marked fish from Dworshak Hatchery, Hayden Creek Ponds and Rapid River Hatchery have helped Ebel to pin down the losses of Idaho's fish. Ebel also indicated that the loss was serious for the 1 1/2 million steelhead smolts migrating from the Salmon River this spring. A detailed report on the percentages of these different runs lost will be available by September.

In addition to the loss of downstream migrants, Dick Simmons, Fisheries Biologist, Washington Department of Game, has documented a total of 2,169 dead fish of different species counted in the Snake River from its mouth upstream to Little Goose Dam. These included adult chinook salmon, smallmouth bass, crappie, bluegill, channel cats, bullhead, suckers, carp, and steel-

head smolts. This is only a small percentage of the total fish lost because it is difficult to find them in large rivers after decomposition and seagulls have taken their toll. They put their kill at a minimum of 43,400 resident fish. Washington Department of Game has asked for compensation from the Corps of Engineers of \$936,066 to replace their fish losses this spring.

Bureau of Commercial Fisheries personnel have been operating live boxes with chinook salmon smolts in them, set at levels in the reservoir that natural migrants would have to pass through. They found 84 percent of the salmon held in these live boxes died from nitrogen gas bubble disease. This was during one of the worst periods of nitrogen saturation in the latter part of May. One of the problems associated with dams is the increased time it takes for smolts to get to the ocean. The addition of Lower Monumental and Little Goose Dams have substantially prolonged the period it takes for steelhead smolts to reach Ice Harbor Dam from the trap at Whitebird on the Salmon River. This exposes them to the nitrogen gas concentrations for a longer time.

The nitrogen gas concentrations can be directly attributed to the effect of dams because water spilling over the dams creates the problem. The plunging water traps nitrogen gas under pressure below the spillway. The nitrogen remains above the saturation level in reservoirs. Free-flowing streams allow the water to release the excess nitrogen gas. Fish exposed to this gas develop bubbles in their blood, killing them rapidly. Others form gas blisters on the way for secondary infections, such as fungus disease. It can also cause their eyeballs to pop out or for them to become blind at a later date. Ebel stated that 120 percent nitrogen has caused mortality to smolts. The lethal level varies with temperatures and pressure. They have measured concentrations up to

146.4 per cent at Lower Monumental Dam on June 3, 1970. Concentrations have been above lethal levels since early May. This is the period when Idaho's salmon and steelhead smolts have been trying to reach the ocean.

Bureau of Commercial Fisheries personnel have been working on methods of passing downstream migrants around dams, but they need more time to develop successful methods. They have been trucking some chinook salmon smolts from Ice Harbor Dam down to the mouth of the Columbia River since 1968. They have found the adult salmon from these releases have returned in about twice the numbers as those that had to pass the several dams below Ice Harbor as smolts. This would indicate a 50 percent loss of chinook smolts from Ice Harbor downstream in 1968. All of their experiments on trapping and transporting fish around dams have shown better success with chinook than steelhead smolts.

Ebel indicated the greatest problem area for nitrogen concentrations was Lower Monumental and Little Goose Dams and reservoirs. He stated Lower Granite might be the added factor that could eliminate successful downstream migration of Idaho's anadromous fish.
