are now open to traffic and con-struction is underway on another 4,850 miles coording to the Idaho 28.61 Department of Highways.


Information as of March 31,1970, showed that 70 percent of the 42,500 mile system is now open to traffic. 70.75 Only 4% has not been advanced 77.85 beyond the preliminary status.

The total mileage in use by pas-senger and commercial vehicles rose 51.15 from 27,975 a year ago and 29,638 as of December 31, 1969, the date of the last survey, to 29,906 as of March 31. Thus mileage open to traffic was increased by 1,931 miles during the past 12 months, includ-ing 268 miles in the quarter ending March 31.

The "Big Highway Story" in Idaho right now is the outstanding progress the State is making on its share of the Interstate Highway System. As of the first of June, 440 miles (70 percent) of Idaho's 612 miles of Interstate mileage is open to traffic.

It has been determined that one life is saved each year for every five miles of highway built to Interstate standards.

The Interstate Highway System is principally financed with money from the Federal Highway Trust Fund matched with State funds, In Idaho, the matching ratio is 92 per-None cent Federal and eight percent State.


