## Southwick Grade Getting Seal Coat

A reduction in the number of winter vehicle accidents is one of the goals of the seal coating project that began Tuesday morning on the road leading from Kendrick to Southwick (old highway 7), said Lloyd Craig, a foreman on the county highway crew given the job of applying the new surfacing. "We think with the proper surface, we can reduce the accidents on the grade by 75 per cent," Craig commented.

The work began on the surfacing job at 9:00 a. m. Tuesday morning at the bridge near the bottom of the grade. Approximately ten miles of county road is involved in the seal coating operation.

**Traffic Delays**  
Because of the nature of the repair work, motorists using the grade may expect to encounter delays of up to one-half hour as they wait for the pilot car to lead them through under controlled traffic conditions.

Flag men will halt traffic for the pilot cars. The traffic will be controlled twenty-four hours a day while the seal coating is being applied.

The reason for this, Craig explained, is that the county crew is using a larger size rock than usual in the seal coating and this rock needs a longer period of time to "set up". This larger rock will be less inclined to ice over during winter, giving motorists a better gripping surface for their tires. The grade is a well-known traffic hazard during winter and even in a mild winter such as this year, there were numerous reports of cars and trucks sliding from the road during and after snow or ice storms.

It is expected that the project will take five days for completion.

Craig said he and his crew knew the delays work an inconvenience on motorists but, he added, "If the public will cooperate, we'll have a lot better road up there."

## Wheat Referendum Date July 27-31

The proclamation of a mail referendum on 1971-crop wheat marketing quotas has been made, according to Clarence A. Jensen, chairman of the Latah County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, with the dates set for July 27-31.

"As most wheat growers know, the Agricultural act of 1965 specifically suspended marketing quotas for wheat producers only for the duration of the ACT. Now we go back to the previous law, which requires the marketing quota referendum—unless, of course, Congress should act to change or postpone these provisions," Mr. Jensen said.

"As it now stands, we're planning for a referendum in which wheat producers will decide whether or not they want marketing quotas. If two-thirds or more vote yes, there will be quotas, which would mean loans available on all production on allotted acres, wheat certificates on the domestic portion of allotments, and marketing quota penalties on excess production."

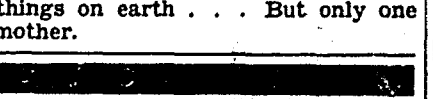

### GLADY'S CINNAMON KNOTS

2 cups milk  
2 T. sugar  
2 beaten eggs  
1 scant tsp. salt  
¼ cup oil  
1 pkg. dry yeast

Let rise twice.  
Pinch off a small amount and roll out to about a 3-inch roll.

Dip each one in melted margarine, then in a mixture of cinnamon and sugar. Tie in a knot and set to rise.

Bake in a 375 degree oven for 25 min. or till light brown.

### MARSHMALLOW-CREAM CHERRY DESSERT

¼ cup graham cracker crumbs, plus 1/3 cup butter and 1 T. sugar.

Mix and press into oblong pan, bottom and sides for crust. Refrigerate while preparing remainder.

In double boiler melt one-half pound marshmallows plus one-half cup milk over hot water. Cool and fold in 1 cup cream, whipped.

Put a layer of cream mixture on bottom crust. Cover with 1 can cherry pie filling (blueberry is also good).

Top with remaining cream mixture and sprinkle with additional crumbs. Refrigerate for several hours or over night. 6-8 servings.

**NITROGEN CAUSES MORTALITY**

Twin evils of spilling floodwaters over eight dams above Bonnaville and warming river temperatures in the Columbia and Snake are causing high concentrations of nitrogen throughout several hundred miles of the inland waterway system used for fish passage by summer-run chinook salmon. About 30 per cent of samples of fish taken at Bonnaville show symptoms of "bubble disease", or nitrogen supersaturation. Bubbles in the blood stream either kill fish outright, including trout, or destroy natural defenses against fungus and bacteriological infections. Rising water temperatures give nitrogen more lethal effects.

Last year an alarming number of summer-run shinnok salmon died in Idaho waters prior to spawning.

**NITROGEN CAUSES MORTALITY**

Twin evils of spilling floodwaters over eight dams above Bonneville and warming river temperatures in the Columbia and Snake are causing high concentrations of nitrogen throughout several hundred miles of the inland waterway system used for fish passage by summer-run chinook salmon. About 30 per cent of samples of fish taken at Bonneville show symptoms of "bubble disease", or nitrogen supersaturation. Bubbles in the blood stream either kill fish outright, including trout, or destroy natural defenses against fungus and bacteriological infections. Rising water temperatures give nitrogen more lethal effects.

Last year an alarming number of summer-run shinnok salmon died in Idaho waters prior to spawning.
